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PROCEEDINGS

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DIRECTOR ANTHONY: I would like to call the Franklin County Board of Elections meeting to order. I will do the roll call.

(Roll call taken.)

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Mr. Chairman, everyone is here and accounted for. The first item on the agenda would be the Amended Certification.

Before we start that, Jeff is here. It seems there was an anomaly in one of the ES&S programs. I have Jeff here to explain it or Carolyn. They are much better at explaining what happened.

Jeff.

MR. MACKEY: We don't have a real good description from ES&S yet as to what exactly happened, but we do know that 13 precincts were not totaled correctly by the Unity system. So once Carolyn had discovered that, she was working from her numbers, we went back in and informed ES&S that something was wrong. They have a feature on their system that corrects this problem, so we ran that and got the correct totals, which are now presented to

5 1 you in the report form. 2. MR. PREISSE: What was the substance of 3 the difference? 4 MR. MACKEY: There was a total of 136 5 votes that were in the system but were not in the 6 totals, so all of the buckets appeared to be correct, 7 a bucket being --8 MR. PREISSE: Does that mean 136 voters? MR. HAAS: Or individual votes? 9 10 MS. GORUP: Voters. 11 MR. PREISSE: So the entirety of what 12 they voted for? 13 MS. GORUP: Unfortunately, it's not 14 consistent. 15 MR. PREISSE: Okay. 16 MS. GORUP: Throughout the races there 17 were individual -- in 13 precincts where some of the 18 individual types of votes, whether they were in person or election day, didn't add up to the total 19 20 that ES&S said it did.

> MR. PREISSE: How did you catch that? MS. GORUP: I do a lot of statistical work with the results afterwards and things weren't adding up.

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1 MR. PREISSE: And what is the status of 2 ES&S' description to us, an explanation of what 3 happened and the remedies? 4 MR. MACKEY: We have not heard back from 5 them. 6 MS. GORUP: But there is a remedy. It's 7 a known problem to ES&S, something that's been in the software since it's been certified. Basically what 8 9 it does, it zeroes out the totals and re-adds them. 10 MR. PREISSE: You mean the fixed totals? 11 MS. GORUP: Yes. 12 MR. MACKEY: We are prepared to use that 13 going forward at the end of night, every night, every time. 14 MR. PREISSE: Is this the first time that 15 16 we've experienced this? 17 It was the first time. MR. MACKEY: 18 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: And we weren't the 19 only county. 20 MR. PREISSE: We weren't the only county. 21 How do we know that? 2.2 MR. MACKEY: Because Dan Shevesta, our 2.3 vendor representative, also has Delaware County, and 24 they called him about the same time we were calling

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him and notified him of an issue.
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MR. PREISSE: What is the plan to understand this, if we have one, because I think we need one, to understand this in intimate detail?

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: I totally agree. We have been talking about it, and we do expect ES&S to give us a full explanation of why this happened.

Meanwhile, we have resolved it, and we know how to resolve it so it won't happen again in another election. We have no idea why it happened in this election and not prior elections. Once we have that information, we will get it to you so you guys have it.

MR. HAAS: Did we look at basically all the precincts?

MS. GORUP: All the precincts and all the races.

MR. HAAS: It was in these 13 precincts where this took place, only these 13?

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: That's correct.

21 MR. PREISSE: Is there any pattern to this, or is it all over the place?

MS. GORUP: We don't know if it has
anything to do with it. These were the ones that we

call coded ballots, which is your ADA provisional.

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DIRECTOR ANTHONY: But in prior elections we have had coded ballots and they did nothing.

Again, we are trying to just ascertain what happened, and that is still based on ES&S.

MR. HAAS: All of these were coded ballots?

MS. GORUP: We don't know which ones weren't properly added, but there were 22 coded ballots, but every place that there was an issue was a multiple of eight, 8, 16, 24.

MR. PREISSE: Interesting.

MR. HAAS: I'm just curious, I mean, if northeast weren't thrown out across the board, how do we know, how do we find out that these votes weren't actually counted? People drop off. They don't vote in certain races.

MS. GORUP: Well, this was a case, we refer to them as buckets. There's a number of how many people voted absentee in person, how many voted absentee by mail, election day paper, election day machines, and provisionals ballots. And when you add those five buckets together, it was off under 8, 16, a multiple of 8.

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      caused it, but that's all it would be, would be

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1 MR. HAAS: I would really ask that we 2 have at the next meeting an explanation from the 3 vendor about, A, what happened; why it's not been fixed, because this is the kind of question we need 5 the answer for voters. All of the concerns about 6 computer voting, I mean, this brings them right to 7 the surface, and we need to have the answer. You 8 know, not -- I mean, I understand and I appreciate 9 everybody's effort on this, but I really would like 10 to be able to say to people, this is what happened. 11 If we get guestioned, I don't want to just say -- you 12 know, a reporter would call and we get a question and 13 just say, Well, it's something in the software and 14 they don't know where it's at. That just doesn't... 15 MS. GORUP: We agree with that. 16 have taken a copy of the database back to the 17 manufacturer to work with it. 18 MS. MARINELLO: Is this standard 19 procedure, for you to do your statistical? 20 MS. GORUP: Yes. 21 MS. MARINELLO: Thank goodness for you. 2.2 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: We certainly agree 23 with you, Board Member Haas, that we need an 24 explanation that we can stand in front of God and all

humanity and say, This is what happened.

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MR. PREISSE: So you and Dan will work up the plan for us to be informed and maybe even directly briefed and informed by ES&S. Why don't you guys talk about that?

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All right. I think, I mean, we need to know because, like you said, this is the kind of thing that could cause a cascading problem for us. Folks think that there's anomalies that can cause anything to happen.

MR. HAAS: Frankly, it scares probably all of us. It scares me. It's, like, there's this problem we just found out about. It's, like, what don't we know about?

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Exactly. We will get to the bottom of this.

MR. HAAS: I do understand, and I think the important point in their summation and that we ought to make sure that people understand is that all the votes were in the buckets.

MS. GORUP: Yes.

MR. HAAS: It wasn't like it tipped any scales or anything like that and the people in those races were thoroughly random for last. I think those

are obviously two important factors to stress. But I appreciate your thoroughness.

MR. SINNOTT: I move that the results of the official canvass of votes cast in the November 4, 2014 General Election and certified by the Board on Monday, November 24, 2014 be amended and be certified as reflected on the Amended Official Canvass.

MS. MARINELLO: Second.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor,

10 say aye.

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(Vote taken; motion passed.)

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Motion carries.

MR. PREISSE: The certification form, I am going to follow that with the overlap certification form that has all the votes from the other counties which were the most populous. I will sign those as well.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: The next item on the agenda, if you guys are ready to proceed, is -- we talked about this at the last meeting. It is the holiday hours, and we wanted to put some ideas out there for holiday hours.

 $$\operatorname{Back}$$ in 2012 the way we did the holiday hours was we gave -- we closed our offices at that

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      time the day before New Year's because of the way New
      Year's fell on a Friday -- a Monday, New Year's Eve
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      fell on a Monday. The Board closed the office on
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      December 31, the day before New Year's, and then we

      granted employees 24 hours of additional personal
 6
      leave to be used between December 26 and January 25.

Do you want more 4 copies, or would that suffice? 5 MR. PREISSE: I don't think you need to. 6 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: We kept the offices 7 open. It never closed. We had a skeleton crew that 8 worked, and those three days we allowed the folks to 9 use within a 30-day period, is basically what the proposal was. We are asking for the same thing, 10 11 pretty much, this time around as well. 12 MR. SINNOTT: There was a fall holiday we 13 reassigned to last Friday, right? DIRECTOR ANTHONY: That's correct. 14 MR. SINNOTT: Which holiday was that? 15 16 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Columbus Day. 17 MR. SINNOTT: So we already reassigned 18 Veterans Day to December 26. 19 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: That's correct, and we 20 assigned Columbus Day to the day after Thanksgiving. 21 MR. SINNOTT: Okay. So we are going to 2.2 be closed December 26 in any event. 2.3 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: That's correct. 24 MR. SINNOTT: And we have --

1 MR. PREISSE: I'm looking at my calendar. 2 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: I keep getting it 3 wrong every time I talk about it. I'll pull my calendar out, too. We will be closed December 25 and 4 5 the 26th. Then what we are proposing is that 6 December the 29th, the 30th and 31st, that we allow 7 24 hours of personal leave that a person could -- you 8 know, those would be the dates we would allow for 9 that personal leave or they could take off between 10 December 29 through January 31. 11 MR. PREISSE: We work a full day on 12 Christmas Eve? 13 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Yes. Normally what 14 happens on Christmas Eve is that the County normally 15 closes at noon and we send everybody home at noon on 16 Christmas Eve. Christmas Eve is a working day. 17 MR. PREISSE: We're not instructed by the 18 commissioners to send people home at noon? 19 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: No. That normally 20 happens at the last minute on the 24th. But right 21 now, the 24th is not part of what I'm proposing. The 2.2 24th is a workday. 2.3 MR. HAAS: I thought Brad had a good 24 suggestion and I've done some research on my own

talking to some other offices in the county, and, actually, I even checked in with a few in the private sector, and the idea of keeping the office open but recognizing the incredibly slow demand, that it does seem pretty typical to allow supervisors a lot of flexibility in terms of time because, you know, the phones aren't ringing and people aren't coming in and there's not a lot of activity.

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I know last time we kind of talked about closing set days, and, you know, I think we all kind of -- all four of us weren't wild about that idea, but in terms of keeping it open and kind of recognizing the pace of things, it seems pretty consistent with a lot of public and even private sector folks do allow that.

MR. SINNOTT: Greg, I have a report here that the Auditor, Recorder, and Treasurer offices will be closing at 2:00 o'clock on Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve, and at least the Auditor's Office is planning on running on reduced staff the day after Christmas and the day after New Year's. I don't know what the Recorder and Treasurer were planning on doing.

So if we were to do something in '14

2012 we had several employees that said they were willing to do that, and we would do the same now.
