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1 Monday Afternoon Session, 2. August 7, 2017. 3 4 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It appears we 5 have a quorum, but just to confirm that I will take roll. Kimberly Marinello. 6 7 MEMBER MARINELLO: Here. 8 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Michael Sexton. 9 MEMBER SEXTON: Here. 10 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Doug Preisse. 11 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Here. 12 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And Brad Sinnott. 13 MEMBER SINNOTT: Yes, thank you. 14 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: We do have a quorum. 15 First item on the agenda is approval of 16 the minutes. I think everybody was sent a copy of 17 the May 18, 2017, minutes. If there aren't any corrections, deletion, additions, I would entertain a 18 19 motion. 20 MEMBER MARINELLO: I move that the Board approve the minutes of the May 18, 2017, meeting of 21 2.2 the Franklin County Board of Elections as submitted.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

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DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in

favor signify by saying aye. All opposed.

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(Vote taken; motion passes.)

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

If it pleases the Board, I would like to move the challenge of right to vote to the top of the agenda. We have Maxine Irvin here that filed the challenge. She's present, so to respect her time, if we could move that to the front of the agenda.

Alicia, do you want to present the case?

MS. HEALY: So the challenge before you
is for correction of registration list. You guys
should have that. And Maxine Irvin is challenging
the address of Raymond Eichenberger. She has
included a copy of a court document that states that
Mr. Eichenberger shall vacate the marital residence
at 4981 Pegasus Court, Hilliard, Ohio 43026 no later
than January 3 of 2016.

Mr. Eichenberger used that as his residence address but used a different location which appears to be a business address for his mailing address to request an absentee ballot for the 2016 Primary and General Elections.

A national change of address was sent to Mr. Eichenberger in February of this year, and it was

returned with a yellow label stating that he moved, left no address, and was unable to forward and return to sender. The challenge that we've noticed that we mailed to him was returned with the same verbiage.

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So, right now, Ms. Irvin, if you have anything you would like to add.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: Before you begin, for the Members, if you look at page 2 of the Magistrate's decision, there is a note or a highlight on the left-hand column, notes the provision in the Magistrate's order that defendant will vacate the residence. If you would like to.

Would you like to hear?

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Yes. If she wishes to address the Board, we would like to hear. Would you mind, you can speak from the podium if you are comfortable. And for the record being taken here, please state your name and we ask for name and address.

MS. IRVIN: My name is Maxine Irvin, and I live 4981 Pegasus Court, Hilliard, Ohio 43026. And thank you, everyone. It's a pleasure to speak before you. I really wasn't expecting this. I had no idea what to -- what would happen when I came here, but I

think it's very important in a situation like this that it be noted that he was not abiding by the law because we are supposed to change where we vote when we move. And he was actually forced to move out of the house and vacate the premises.

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And this is another example where he continues to do what he wants to do rather than abiding by what is right and proper. So I thought it was really important to make sure that it is noted that this is another case of him violating what is acceptable practice. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Did Raymond indeed move out no later than January 3, 2016?

MS. IRVIN: Yes, he did. He was forced to by court order, and he has not lived there since that date.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: I would ask that the challenge form, you are the -- you signed the challenge form?

20 MS. IRVIN: Yes. I wrote and signed the challenge form.

22 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Anybody else have any 23 questions?

MEMBER MARINELLO: No.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Thank you, Maxine.

MS. IRVIN: Thank you.

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DIRECTOR LEONARD: Thank you very much for your coming in.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: The staff researched this. I don't know if the Board is interested in hearing their recommendation.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Yeah.

MS. HEALY: Okay. So the official election manual states the Board must reach a decision, and if the decision is to remove the person from the registration list, then we must remove. ORC 3503.24(C) states, in part, "The person's name shall be removed from the list and the person's registration forms canceled." So based on the information that we have received today that the voter no longer lives at that address, we hereby should cancel the voter.

MEMBER MARINELLO: I move that the Board approve the challenge of right to vote filed by Maxine C. Irvin of 4981 Pegasus Court, Hilliard, Ohio, against Raymond L. Eichenberger of the same address and order that Raymond Eichenberger's registration be canceled in the Franklin County voter

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2 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in favor signify by saying aye. All opposed same sign.

(Vote taken; motion passes.)

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: Did you want to state for the record, Tim, he did receive -- attempt was made to serve him notice of this proceeding, correct?

MS. HEALY: Yes.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: Is it Eichenberger?

MS. IRVIN: Eichenberger.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: I just wanted to make

sure.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: For tomorrow's election we are required to do a paper ballot allocation, a machine allocation, as well as an electronic pollbook allocation. So for the paper allocation, Carla, do you want to speak to that?

MS. PATTON: I have provided an exhibit that for the paper ballot allocation that allocates 25 ballots to the Village of Minerva Park's Special Election and 10 ballots for each ballot style for the Madison Plains.

10 1 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Do they have 2. that? CHAIRMAN PREISSE: This one? 3 4 MS. PATTON: Give each one of the splits 5 in the Madison Plains 10 ballots each. Requirements 6 by the State of Secretary's election manual requires 7 we provide at least 5 percent of the last provisional 8 ballots that were cast in the last similar election 9 so those standards are being met overwhelmingly to be 10 in accordance with the election official manual. 11 went ahead and put a few extra into Minerva Park due 12 to the fact that they are developing the golf course 13 so there may be a few additional provisional ballots 14 come from that. 15 MEMBER SINNOTT: I move that the Board 16 adopt the paper ballot allocation formula in Exhibit 17 A compiled by the Board staff for the August 8, 2017, 18 Special Election. 19 MEMBER SEXTON: Second. 20 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in 21 favor signify by saying aye. All opposed same sign. 2.2 (Vote taken; motion passes.) 2.3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries. 24 For the voting machine and the electronic

pollbook allocation, Carolyn Gorup, do you want to address that?

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MS. GORUP: I will. We are meeting the minimum of one machine per the 175 voters with no less than three machines per location. So Minerva Park we have five, and in Madison Plains we have three. And we are placing three electronic pollbooks at each location. That's about it.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. Sounds good.

MEMBER SEXTON: I move that the Board adopt the voting machine allocation formula in Exhibit B compiled by the Board staff for the August 8, 2017, Special Election.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in favor signify by saying aye. All opposed same sign.

(Vote taken; motion passes.)

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

Originally on our agenda we had precinct boundary changes that we were going to vote on but something came up with the Ohio Secretary of State. Do you want to address that just real quickly, Matt?

MR. RUSHEY: Yes. Following the Presidential Election of last year, we had about 40

precincts that we needed to split due to high voter totals. And of those there were, I believe, seven that we needed to send waivers to the Ohio Secretary of State's Office for them. And the waiver is required because when you split a precinct, you are required to follow census block lines. And for about seven of those precincts we couldn't follow census block lines because there were no census block lines to follow.

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Generally that can happen such as campus precincts where they may knock down a residence hall, build a new one in a different location. And so one of those seven factors was an Ohio State University precinct. And so if there are no census block lines to follow, we have to get a waiver to cut that precinct from the Ohio Secretary of State's Office.

And so those waivers have been sent. We are waiting on response from the Secretary of State's Office. We thought it might be better just to go ahead and get your approval to split all 40 plus precincts at the same time and that way if there is any problem with the Secretary of State's Office, we can address before the next meeting on the 21st.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We think we will

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have the waivers by the 21st.
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but --

DIRECTOR LEONARD: Spoke to the representative at the Secretary of State's Office that handles those matters. She indicated they will be completed with that by the August 21 Board meeting in time for us to consider that at the August 21 meeting.

MEMBER SINNOTT: So we are in the business of creating a bunch of new precincts?

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: There will be what? Six?

MR. RUSHEY: A total of about 40.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: New precincts

MR. RUSHEY: Six or seven. I need waivers for 40 new precincts because every

Presidential Election the numbers go on and then there's a big push to get people registered and some of that settles down after a while. But, now, we need to get in compliance about 40 precincts, and 6 or 7 of those actually require the waiver. The other 33 are okay. They don't need waivers.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: The importance of that too is to get those approved so we can begin the

process of notifying voters of the precinct changes. 1 2 Their polling places are not MR. RUSHEY: 3 going to change. We are basically taking Precinct A 4 and splitting it into two and both of those new 5 precincts will vote at the same location. So one will become a lid 2. They are going to vote at the 6 7 same place. We just need to cut down the numbers in 8 a few locations. 9 MEMBER SEXTON: When do we have to serve 10 that notice? 11 DIRECTOR LEONARD: I don't have that off 12 the top of my head. 13 MS. GORUP: I don't believe there is a 14 requirement within a certain number of days, but we 15 want to get it done well in advance of early voting. 16 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Right. 17 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Any other 18 questions? 19 Matt, thank you. 2.0 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Thanks, Matt.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Our Relia-Vote machine, we need some upgrades for that. So, Zach Manifold, if you would give a presentation on the

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CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Thanks, Matt.

Relia-Vote machine.

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MR. MANIFOLD: Good afternoon. You guys should have a memo in front of you about the Relia-Vote upgrades. It's a two-page memo regarding upgrades that we are looking at. I am going to give you -- I am going to start out with a brief history of the Relia-Vote system so you guys kind of know how we got where we are at.

The first system was installed in 2007-2008, before that -- the 2008 presidential election, and we used it for four -- four years until the fall of 2012. And in the fall of 2012, we completely re -- traded in the first system and got a whole new system which is called Advantage Sorter system we have currently. The good news is the Advantage Sorter system, there have been very many upgrades in the mail system since we got that system in 2012.

So instead of trading in a whole system and getting a whole new system, we are actually just going to keep the equipment that we have currently and make some upgrades. The great news is we own the system that we currently have in the building as of, I think, next month it becomes our -- our equipment

and we own it going forward. There are a few upgrades that will be -- so -- well, I guess I will start with we are going to have a significant annual savings. We've been paying about \$280,000 a year for our Relia-Vote lease for the past decade. So that lease will go away with these upgrades. We will no longer be asking the Commissioners' Office for funding to continue the lease.

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DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's fair to say they were exited about that.

MR. MANIFOLD: Yeah. They were pretty excited because we think the system -- because of the slow down in upgrades and mail system and what this can do, we think our current system probably could get another five to seven years out of it. We may have more upgrades in five years.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: It's like buying a leased car.

MR. MANIFOLD: Yeah, yeah.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Make sure we keep changing the oil.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: But it is worth noting that actually the lease agreement from the outside made it clear that as soon as we -- it was really

lease to own, that as soon as you -- as soon as you started making payments, as soon as it was delivered, it was ours so long as we kept making the payments. We did and so, now, it belongs to us but there are upgrades that need to be made in order to keep it running for us over the next 5 to 10 years.

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MR. MANIFOLD: So we have about 100 and I think -- and I'll say when we first started talking to Pitney Bowes, I think their first offer back was close to a million dollars for upgrades. And we really dug down in and, you know, went through all the process and checked out what we really thought the system needed and what upgrades we thought made sense for the -- for the cost. And we were able to substantially decrease that number to right at 503,000, I believe is the total.

503,000 so we cut it almost in half from the original proposal. I think we have 150,000 in what's essentially technology that's just obsolete, servers, workstations, Inkjet printer that prints all the stuff at the end of the line, that prints on the address and voter information, those are all obsolete. So if anything broke on them, we wouldn't be able to fix them in their current state. So those

upgrades kind of have to happen.

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The other 350,000 is a combination of automated full plate, so we've currently taken on more jobs to try to save the county more money.

We've taken on additional jobs with the Relia-Vote Pitney Bowes mail system. We do a monthly mailer for Job & Family Services. We've also taken on a job for the Treasurer's Office the last few months, so we are actively looking for more jobs we can take on during down periods to save the county money with this —with this mail system so.

The automated full plates, that would help a lot because right now it should reduce our service cost because right now we manually have to take all the plates out and manually put them back in.

And if they are off at all, then you have to call for service to get somebody out to get the job running so that's going to all automate under the new system. It will be automated full plates, a moving beam scanning capability. The thought there is if we decide to take on more and more jobs, we can actually track -- if we put in this beam scanning, it will actually track to make sure that the correct

envelopes are going, that we made the change out on each job, that the wrong envelope doesn't end up with the wrong job so the system could tell us there is something -- something here for this job isn't right.

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And then the Advantage Sorter bins is probably the largest cost and this is probably the biggest upgrade and it basically allows us to sort into 72 bins. Our current capacity is probably right around like 25 to 30 bins that we can use. would allow us to better store our ballots. currently store all of our paper ballots into two -two segments, Columbus and then everything else. ES&S has been pushing us for years to really change how we store ballots in case we have an audit or recount. Instead of having to essentially run the entire room's ballots over and over again to try to find those ballots getting it on the front end when the ballot first comes back and splitting it into wards or precincts in some way would substantially save us time and make our audits a lot more accurate. I think so.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: Commissioners approved the funding at the last session of the Commissioner -- Board of Commissioners meeting. As

Deputy Director and Zach had mentioned, that they were very enthusiastic about it because the fact it adds greater lifespan to the system and greater functionality and actually the funding for the machines for this machine upgrade they have because of the chargebacks that we have for conducting the Election and the Primary, Office on Aging was charged back a significant amount for conduct of that election.

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Those funds -- those funds that were charged back went into a fund and they were available to pay for these upgrades and so that's where the Commission derived the funding for these -- these upgrades, so it was a supplemental appropriation. It was granted at the last meeting of the Board of Commissioners.

MR. MANIFOLD: So the money is there, and it will save probably 2 to 3 million going forward depending on how long it lasts, so it's really great news.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Keep changing the oil.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: So the resolution we have before us since we're not quite -- have the contract ready for you to sign it, the resolution

would authorize the Director and/or Deputy Director to go ahead and sign that contract when it's ready and then reviewed by the Prosecutor's Office.

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MEMBER SINNOTT: Then I move that the Board authorize the Director and Deputy Director to execute a contract with Pitney Bowes for upgrades and support of the Relia-Vote system in an amount not to exceed \$503,385 in calendar year 2017.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in favor signify by saying aye. All those opposed same sign.

(Vote taken; motion carries.)

We have an election tomorrow in Minerva Park and Madison Plains, and it requires that we declare the polls open tomorrow. So in that you won't be here tomorrow at 6:30, it's customary to have a --

MEMBER SEXTON: Well, I won't be so I'll move that the polls be declared open for the Tuesday, August 8, 2017, Special Election beginning at 6:30 a.m. and closing at 7:30 p.m. and that in

accordance with the Ohio Revised Code Section 3501.32, any voter in line prior to the close of the polls at 7:30 p.m. shall be permitted to vote.

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CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in favor signify by saying aye. All those opposed same sign.

(Vote taken; motion passes.)

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

Before we recess I do think it's worth noting that
the last couple months have been pretty difficult on
the staff in that we have had two members of our
Board of Elections staff, Bubba Raphael and Randy
Tarr, passed away. So I just want to acknowledge
both of them were valued members of the staff, and so
a lot of folks here have known them both a lot longer
than I have, but they were both valued members of
this Board of Elections.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Well, we knew them both too and were good citizens, good partisans, good participants in their public responsibilities here and in their political life beyond the walls of this building. So we miss them both, and I'm glad you brought that up because I know that sentiment is
