MS. HEALY: I'm not sure if you're going to be able to handle this one. We only had one provisional ballot cast and, unfortunately, it was a 520, no ID, so rejection.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: And the individual did not come to the Board to correct it.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: They didn't have a Social Security number or any form of ID.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Oh.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We gave them the flyer on how to come back and I can tell you that was all done because I personally worked the provisional. I was honestly excited when I had one customer the whole day.

Provisional ballots for consideration.

So we would have -- your recommendation would be that we had one submitted and we would approve zero?

MS. HEALY: Correct.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: If the Board agrees with that, we'd be inclined to take a motion.

MR. SINNOTT: I move that the Board

approve the counting of no provisional ballots and the rejection of one provisional ballot and that all provisional ballots deemed valid will be counted and included in the official canvass of results for the August 8th, 2017 Special Election.

The final thing we need to do then is certify the election results of the August 8th Special Election. Carla, do you want to give a

18 report?

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MS. PATTON: Yeah. Before you, you have the results from the August 8th Special for the Village of Minerva Park as well as our portion of the Madison-Plains Local School District. We had a total of, I believe, about 157 voters show up at the polls on Election Day, in addition to the 6 total early vote or absentee ballots, for a total of 163 ballots

cast entirely within the election. So you have the results before you and we recommend certification of those results.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Has anybody looked to see what the turnout percentage was?

MS. PATTON: 13.76 percent turnout. Out of 1,185 voters, 163 voted.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay. I move that the Board certify and declare as final the official canvass of votes cast in the August 8th, 2017 Special Election.

Included on that list are two write-in candidates, Joel Motil for the City of Columbus and Janet -- Jennifer Staten.

MR. MACKEY: Exhibit B has the list there. I think our handout of the top three reasons why petitions don't make the ballot is having an impact in that only 1 of these 9 failed to do the first two which are sign the Declaration of Candidacy on the front and complete the Circulator Statement on the back, including the number of signatures witnessed. So of the 9, only 1, after reading that, still failed to fulfill those requirements. The rest just did not gather sufficient valid signatures for one reason or another.

MEMBER SINNOTT: What is the standard in the Southwestern School District? Is it 300 signatures?

MR. MACKEY: 300. It is, next to Columbus, the largest in the county.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Everybody ready?

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Yup. Thank you.

MR. MACKEY: Mr. Fleming is a candidate for Grove City Council. We reviewed his petition and he does have more than the requisite number of valid signatures; however, his petition as filed is a little different than what we would normally see.

One front, a normal petition, a part-petition would have a front and a back, so he has one front. One part-petition would not be sufficient to gather all the signatures required for Grove City, so he has added the back four times.

So he had sufficient lines for the number of signatures he wanted to collect. He signed the Declaration of Candidacy on the front, so that's good. Each of the circulator statements is signed and completed. He has, in each instance, indicated the total number of signatures that he collected which was 50.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Oh. So he's got not a total of the part-petition, but a total -- thinking the whole thing is the petition.

MR. MACKEY: Since there isn't really a part-petition, so we are inclined to lean towards

I 9 forget what his given name is, but he wanted to 10 appear on the ballot as "Kip." 11 MEMBER MARINELLO: I remember that, yeah. 12 MR. MACKEY: Francis and Kip, yes. Did 13 not have the similarities that the Chairman was 14 speaking of here. 15 MR. LECKLIDER: And my initial reaction 16 to that was he should not be able to appear on the 17 ballot as "Kip," but I believe that we consulted with 18 the Secretary of State's office. 19 MR. MACKEY: That was a different 20 question because it was a question and not a 2.1 candidate election, so the statute didn't apply. 22 MR. LECKLIDER: Okay, okay. 23 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I thought there were 24 times when we looked at the evidence of what people 25 are known by professionally, what it says on their

business card, the sign on their lawyer's door, how they advertise, what their utility bills say. We've talked about that --

evidence --

MEMBER SINNOTT: -- that the person in question was known throughout the community as "Kip So and So," not by his given name. I think that was important to the Board's decision.

MEMBER MARINELLO: Yeah.

MR. MACKEY: That argument, just so we're clear, that was a question on whether to re-call a person. It wasn't a candidate election like this. So the nickname rule in the Secretary of State's handbook did not apply in that situation. It was more of a question of whether that name, as part of the question, was acceptable based on how the petition was circulated and how the municipality presented the ballot language.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: The natural derivative standard comes from not the law, but the Secretary of State's handbook?

MR. MACKEY: Correct. Probably based on

1 some stuff.

MEMBER SINNOTT: I don't feel strongly about this. I mean, I think "Peg" or "Peggy" would be the common nickname for Margaret, but if you think "Marnie" is close enough, I certainly can agree to that.

"Peggy" are probably the very most common, though I wouldn't actually say they're a natural derivative, although I don't think nobody would, I think, question it because it's so commonly known. "Marnie" is actually to me a more natural derivative. Where did they get "Peggy" from Margaret?

Some residence halls were knocked down, some were rebuilt, no census lines or census geography existed to allow me to split those precincts, and so I basically had to draw lines using parcel lines instead of census lines. In order to do that I had to send that to the Secretary of State's office and get permission to do that and they allowed that.

MR. RUSHEY: Also too, I'm sorry, pardon me for interrupting. I just wanted to mention there were two adjustments, either on the back of that page or on the second page of Exhibit E, which are not
