5	this meeting of the Franklin County Board of	
6	Elections, the November 16th meeting, to order.	
7	I will remind you that we have a	
8	court reporter. So please identify yourself prior	
9	to speaking. Again, this is David Payne. I will	
10	take roll.	
11	Kim Marinello.	
12	MEMBER MARINELLO: Here.	
13	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Mike Sexton.	
14	MEMBER SEXTON: Here.	
15	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Doug	
16	Preisse.	
17	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Here.	
18	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And Brad	
19	Sinnott.	
20	MEMBER SINNOTT: Here.	
21	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We have a	
22	quorum.	
23	The first item on the agenda is	
24	provisional ballots. Voter Services is starting by	
25	recommending 15,273 provisional ballots for	

counting and a rejection of 3,408 provisional ballots. I'm going to turn this over to the supervisor of the Voter Services Department, Sara Ziemba, to discuss the rejections.

MS. ZIEMBA: Thank you, David. Good morning everyone. I'm Sara Ziemba, the supervisor of Voter Services, and I am going to present the ballots that we recommend for acceptance -- or approval, which would be 15,273, and all of the different categories for the ones that we recommend to be rejected with a total of 3,408.

I just want to start by saying thank you to all of the nearly 80 people we had processing these over the shortened 12-day period following the November 3rd General Election. They all did great. Even Court Reporter Carla here, she helped us, as well. We had people from PEO, Absentee, Early Vote, trainers, VLMs, and our Voter Services staff. They all did a wonderful job and I just want to recognize them and thank them for their time.

And these are the numbers that we have. Like I said, we are recommending the accepting of 15,273 good provisional ballots. All of these ballots, the voters provided all of the

required elements, a name, birth date, Franklin
County address, some form of ID, and their
signature. So we recommend that those be accepted.
That, again, is 15,273.

Of the 3,408 that we recommend to be rejected, these are the various breakdowns for why we recommend that the Board reject these ballots.

2,160 that were not registered anywhere in the state of Ohio. And you can reference these numbers on Exhibit A. I think the Board members should all have that. So of the 2,160 that are not registered anywhere in the state, bipartisan teams worked together to process all of these ballots. They do three searches within the county database and three searches within the statewide database. And after those six searches, then another bipartisan team goes ahead and double checks all of those. These 2,160 voters were not found to be registered anywhere in the state of Ohio.

The next category is the voters who voted in the wrong precinct and the wrong location. So there were 333 of these voters. According to the Ohio Revised Code, voters must vote where voters live and the addresses that these voters

provided on their provisional affirmation statement on the envelope were not -- they went and voted in the incorrect location for where their current address stated they should vote. And that's 333 for voters who voted in the wrong precinct and the wrong location.

The next category on your exhibit is wrong precinct and correct location, and we had zero voters that fall into that category.

The next category for rejection is no signature. There were 24 voters who did not sign their affirmation statement; and as that is one of the five required elements in order to be able to count the ballot, we recommend that since they didn't sign those 24 ballots be rejected.

The next category is no printed name. There were eight ballots where the voter did not provide a printed name on the top of the ballot, which is also one of the five required elements. And so for the omission of the printed name, we recommend those eight ballots be rejected.

The next category is the failure to provide a valid current address. There were 105 voters who gave us an address that was not a current valid address in Franklin County. They

could have been voters who gave us an out-of-county address or they put down a post office box or a business address. And so for those 105 voters that failed to provide a valid current address, we recommend those ballots be rejected.

The next category is no ID. There were 309 ballots where the voters did not provide a valid form of identification. They either did not provide any form of identification or they provided a mismatch which does not match what we have on file or what the state has on their database. And so by law we are recommending that those 309 be rejected because they did not have one of the five valid forms of information that is needed to count the provisional ballot.

The next one is signature mismatch. We had one signature mismatch where the signature that that voter provided on the provisional ballot affirmation envelope did not match what was on the statewide voter database. And so for that one voter we could not reconcile that it was indeed a voter that signed it, so we recommend that one be rejected as well.

The next category is voter has already voted. There were 387 voters who cast --

their provisional ballot was the second vote that they had cast either through in-person or early vote or absentee by mail. 387 people had already cast a ballot by the time we went to evaluate the provisional, and for that reason we recommend that those 387 ballots are rejected.

The next category you see is challenge upheld, and there were zero ballots that fell into that category.

The next one is date of birth missing. There were 43 ballots in which the voter failed to provide a date of birth. You might see down further on the exhibit here for Board review tomorrow we'll look at 65 cases where voters did provide some form of date of birth where the Board may vote to accept those; but for these 43, they did not put anything down on the line. And so they're missing one of the five required elements, and we recommend that those 43 also be rejected.

And the last category, there was no ballot in the envelope, we had 38 envelopes that just came back empty with nothing in them. And so we also recommend that because there's no ballot in there to count that we reject the 38 that didn't have a ballot.

1 So that grand total, again, of all 2 those categories together was 3,408. 3 And if there's any questions about 4 categories or anything, I'd be happy to answer. 5 Thank you. Very nice 6 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: 7 report. Thank you very much. 8 If there are no questions, I would 9 entertain a motion for the recommending the 10 counting of 15,273 ballots. Unless there are any 11 questions or comments. 12 MEMBER SINNOTT: This is Sinnott. 13 David or Sara, at the bottom of 14 Exhibit A there are two categories that are 15 described as for Board review. 16 MS. ZIEMBA: Yes. 17 MEMBER SINNOTT: What are those? 18 MS. ZIEMBA: So the Board review 19 categories, the first one is the date of birth 20 issues where -- Mel will talk about this in 21 tomorrow's meeting -- where there's a provision --22 or an exception to -- in the manual where if the 23 voter provides some date of birth that the Board 24 can vote by a majority of three members to accept 25 small discrepancies in date of birth, like the

month, the day, or the year. Sometimes people will put 2020 as their birth year. And if we have -everything else on the ballot matches what we have on the database, then the Board members may vote to accept those ballots. So we have different categories. Mel will give more information on those tomorrow at the adjudication meeting tomorrow morning. And then the second category is the outstanding county-to-county ballots. With the shortened period, everybody -- all the counties were sort of pressed to get everything done and we are still waiting on hearing back from other counties where the voter voted in Franklin County but they are registered in a different county. we have to send a copy of our ballot to the other county to see if the voter is registered, the signature matches, and that they didn't cast a ballot in the previous county as well. So we will have a full report on those tomorrow once we hear back from some more counties. Does that help? MEMBER SINNOTT: Those two

categories are deemed as items of business for
Tuesday's meeting?

MS. ZIEMBA: That's correct.

12	properly moved and seconded. I'll take roll.

16	MEMBER SEXTON: (No audible
17	response.)

21	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I'll come
22	back to Mike.
23	Doug Preisse.
24	MEMBER SEXTON: Can you hear me?
25	DEPUTY DIRECTOR DAVID PAYNE: Yes, I

20	Michael Sexton. I move that the Board reject the
21	counting of 3,408 provisional ballots as identified
22	by category in Exhibit A and that all provisional
23	ballots rejected will not be counted or included in
24	the office canvass results for the November 3rd,
25	2020, General Election.

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1	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: This is Doug
2	Preisse. Second the motion.
3	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
4	properly moved and seconded for the rejection of
5	3,408 provisional ballots. I'll take roll.
6	Kim Marinello.
7	MEMBER MARINELLO: Yes.
8	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Mike Sexton.
9	MEMBER SEXTON: Yes.

23	MEMBER SEXTON: Mr. Chairman,
24	Michael Sexton. I move that the Board authorize
25	the staff to remake provisional ballots and that

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1	these remade ballots shall be tabulated and	
2	included in the official canvass of the results of	
3	the November 3rd, 2020, General Election with a	
4	report to be made to the Board later.	
5	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: This is Doug	
6	Preisse. Second the motion.	
7	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been	
8	properly moved and seconded for the remaking of the	
9	provisional ballots. I will take roll.	
10	Kim Marinello.	
11	MEMBER MARINELLO: Yes.	
12	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Mike Sexton.	
13	MEMBER SEXTON: Yes.	
14	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Doug

16	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Yes.

22	The next item and final item on the	
23	agenda is the remaking of unscanned election day	
24	ballots. And I will turn that over to Carla Patton	
25	to describe those 61 unscanned ballots that we	

1	would like to have authorized.	
2	MS. PATTON: Good morning. This is	
3	Carla Patton.	
4	On election night we had received	
5	curbside ballots in our office that were voted	
6	throughout the day on election day as well as	
7	ballots that were deposited into the kiosk chute by	
8	ADA voters. As we processed through those ballots	
9	that scanned we found that there were 61 ballots	
10	that needed to be remade due to a tear in the	
11	ballot or a deficiency in the bar code of the	
12	ballot that was marked by the ballot markers. So	
13	we're asking that we remake those so that we can	
14	move those ballots into the official count.	
15	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And that	
16	total was 61, Carla?	
17	MS. PATTON: 61 ballots.	
18	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I would	
19	entertain a motion to authorize the scanning of	
20	those election day ballots.	
21	MEMBER SEXTON: Mr. Chairman, that's	
22	61, to my understanding? This is Michael Sexton.	
23	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: 61 is the	
24	correct number.	
25	MEMBER SEXTON: This is Michael	

1	Sexton. I move that the Board authorize the staff
2	to remake 61 unscanned election day ballots and
3	that these remade ballots will be tabulated and
4	included in the official canvass of the results
5	from the November 3rd, 2020, General Election with
6	a report to be made to the Board later.
7	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: This is Doug
8	Preisse. Second the motion.
9	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
10	properly moved and seconded for the scanning of the
11	61 remade ballots. I will take roll.
12	Kim Marinello.
13	MEMBER MARINELLO: Yes.
14	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Mike Sexton.
15	MEMBER SEXTON: Yes.
16	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Doug
17	Preisse.
18	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Yes.
19	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And Brad
20	Sinnott.
21	MEMBER SINNOTT: Yes.
22	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
23	carries.
24	That's the last item on the agenda.
25	The one thing I wanted to mention

1	that Sara mentioned was the 65 date of birth issues
2	on the agenda for tomorrow, because And I'll
3	have Mel Fuhrmann explain tomorrow, but I believe
4	we can deal with all of those en masse in that the
5	directive explicitly states that the Board can
6	accept a date of birth as long as there was an
7	attempt to write a date. So we've looked at those
8	through bipartisan teams, Mel and Sara have both
9	looked at those, and the Director and I have all
10	looked at those. And tomorrow I believe we will be
11	recommending the acceptance of all those, but I
12	will have Mel deal with that tomorrow.
13	So unless there are any questions
14	about today's proceedings or tomorrow's
15	proceedings, I'd recommend a motion to adjourn.
16	MEMBER SINNOTT: This is Sinnott.
17	Move to adjourn.
18	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
19	second?
20	MEMBER MARINELLO: Second. Kim
21	Marinello, second.
22	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I will take
23	roll. All those in favor
24	Kim Marinello.
