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approval of minutes from the October 5th, 2020 meeting, the October 16th, 2020 meeting, and the

2	are any if there aren't any corrections or
3	deletions or additions, I would take a motion to
4	approve those minutes.
5	MEMBER MARINELLO: Okay. Hearing
6	none, I move that the Board approve the minutes of
7	the October 5th, 2020 regular meeting, the
8	October 16th, 2020 special meeting, and the
9	November 2nd, 2020 regular meeting of the Franklin
10	County Board of Elections as submitted.
11	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Doug Preisse with
12	a second.
13	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
14	properly moved and seconded. I'll take roll.
15	Kim Marinello.
16	MEMBER MARINELLO: Yes.
17	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Mike Sexton.
18	MEMBER SEXTON: Yes.
19	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Doug
20	Preisse.
21	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Yes.
22	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And Brad
23	Sinnott.
24	MEMBER SINNOTT: Yes.
25	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion

carries.

The next item on the agenda is the selection of voting precincts for the recount of the 16th State Senate race as well as the Gahanna-Jefferson school levy. I'm going to turn this over on Jeff Mackey to explain what we'll be doing, and then I will take a motion to conduct the recount.

So Jeff, do you want to start off by explaining what we'll be doing as far as the recount?

MR. MACKEY: Sure.

This is Jeff Mackey. I'm going to share my screen here, I think.

Manual. In order to accomplish this, the Board will randomly select precincts whose vote totals for the race in question or issue to be recounted equal at least five percent of the total vote of the race to be recounted. We've got a definition of randomly select there. And then choose whole precincts as indicated for the 16th Senate race and the issue in Gahanna-Jefferson schools. The only direction we have there is enough precincts shall be selected for the recount to equal at least five

percent of the total votes cast, and it gives some options here for selecting those precincts. It says that each precinct must have the same chance of being selected as any other precinct. Some acceptable methods include rolling dice, as we've done before, drawing slips of paper, which we've done before, both of which we've found to be a little bit inefficient.

I was talking to Jeff Gatwood in our IT section the other day as we were preparing for this. He said why don't we just use a random number generator, and I thought that was a fantastic idea.

So we have selected a random number generator here online, and let me share that with you. Random dot org. It has some stuff in here about how to use atmospheric noise to randomly generate the numbers for us. As we get there, I'm going to input the number of precincts that we have for each race, and it's going to jumble those up and randomly select an order for those precincts. We have each precinct numbered one through however many precincts there are, and it will select those for us. And I'll just copy those and paste those right into our spreadsheet and we will be ready to

go. And that will be more efficient unless anybody has objections or any questions on that

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CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So, Jeff, -- Doug

Preisse here -- there is the smallest value box and

then the largest value box. I mean, what are you

putting in there? Did you put that into there or

what are those?

MR. MACKEY: It defaults to that. When we get ready to choose the precincts, each precinct is given a number in our spreadsheet. And I can share that. So each precinct here you'll see has a number assigned to it, and this is the --Let's just do this one, it's the smallest. Gahanna-Jefferson issue has 42 precincts that I've numbered 1 through 42. So those are the numbers I will put into those two boxes in the random number generator and then it will jumbled up the 1 through 42 and spit out a random order for those numbers and I'll stick those in Carolyn's handy spreadsheet here and it will tell us when we've picked five percent. Actually, I'll just grab one -- two or three I think will do it for this one, and see if we hit the five percent mark.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So you're going to -- as we proceed with this and the other recount

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1	that you've calculated what five percent of that
2	contest is and then you're going to keep a running
3	total till we reach it as we usually do?
4	MR. MACKEY: Yes. Correct.
5	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Thank you.
6	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Any other
7	questions or comments for Jeff?
8	MEMBER SINNOTT: Seems as though
9	we're ready for a motion. This is Sinnott.
10	The results of the 16th State Senate
11	race and the Gahanna-Jefferson school levy require
12	a recount. I move that the Board conduct a recount
13	in these races by using voting precincts and that
14	the recount shall begin on Monday, November 30th.
15	MEMBER MARINELLO: Kim Marinello. I
16	second.
17	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
18	properly moved and seconded. I'll take roll.
19	Kim Marinello.
20	MEMBER MARINELLO: Yes.
21	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Mike Sexton.
22	MEMBER SEXTON: Yes.
23	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Doug
24	Preisse.
25	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Yes.

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1	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And Brad
2	Sinnott.
3	MEMBER SINNOTT: Yes.
4	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
5	carries.
6	Jeff, do you want to start with
7	what's your preference, to start with the 16th
8	Senate District?
9	MR. MACKEY: That's fine.
10	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Okay. Let's
11	do that, then.
12	MR. MACKEY: All right. So in the
13	16th Senate District we see here we have 1 through
14	286 precincts in the Senate district. Those are
15	the numbers I will use in our random number
16	generator, get our sequence, spit it out here.
17	Grab a few here.
18	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: So do you
19	want to just read some of the sequence for the
20	folks on the phone?
21	MR. MACKEY: Sure.
22	It has randomly generated a
23	sequence. The ones that I have selected here from
24	the top are 43, 44, 81, 244, 90, 159, 167, 49, 121,
25	181, 202, 31, 157, 120, 205, and 251.

1	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And if that
2	gets us to five percent, we're good; if not, you'll
3	continue on. Is that correct?
4	MR. MACKEY: I will grab a few more
5	from the list and probably I'll be deleting here.
6	So let's see. So we're just over five percent.
7	That was a good stab on my part. I see that we are
8	over by 1,568 here, so I think I can delete this
9	last one which only had 745 voters. So and now we
10	are down to 5.37 percent, which is still good, and
11	we're over by 823. And the last precinct selected
12	has 1,024 voters, so that's the one that put us
13	over the top. So we will use I don't know if
14	you want me to read the precincts we have selected.
15	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I think that
16	would be fine, yes.
17	MR. MACKEY: Columbus 67B, Columbus
18	67C, Columbus 75B, Upper Arlington 1F, Columbus
19	76B, as in boy, Grove City 1F, Grove City 2G,
20	Columbus 67H, Brown Township A, Grove City 4F,
21	Hilliard 4B, Columbus 64E, Grove City 1D, Columbus
22	87E, and Hilliard 4E.
23	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Fantastic.
24	Thank you, Jeff.
25	If there aren't any comments or

1 questions about that, why don't we move on to the 2 Gahanna-Jefferson school levy and draw precincts for that, as well. 3 4 MR. MACKEY: I'm sorry. Did we 5 order the recount for the Gahanna-Jefferson school 6 levy? We did that 7 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: 8 in both -- Yes. The first motion was for both of 9 them, yes. 10 MR. MACKEY: So, again, 42 precincts 11 in Gahanna-Jefferson School District. Back to our 12 number generator here. Numbers 1 through 42 are 13 the numbers I have selected here to get our new 14 I think it's probably only going to take sequence. 15 three. The first three in the list that was 16 generated for us are 38, 8, and 3. That was a lot 17 more than we needed, so let me get rid of last one 18 again. We do have to have at least two precincts. 19 So the two that are now selected are Jefferson F 20 and Gahanna 1F. 21 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Fantastic. 22 Are there any questions on that? If not --23 And that was very efficient, Jeff. 24 So I thank you and Jeff Gatwood for coming up with 25 that procedure.

1 The next item on the agenda is the 2 post-election audit. 3 Jeff, do you want to explain that 4 just a little bit and then we'll proceed with that? 5 MR. MACKEY: Sure. 6 After each general election in an 7 even year we're required to perform an audit of 8 several races to make sure that what we counted 9 equals what the machines said and counted. And 10 we're going to choose five percent of the -- I 11 believe at the November 18th meeting the Board said 12 we could use locations. So we're going to choose 13 five percent of the vote total choosing locations 14 to do our hand audit on that. 15 Is that good? 16 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Yeah. 17 think that covers it. 18 My question, I guess, is we have to 19 do the recount prior to doing the audit. Is that 20 correct? 21 MR. MACKEY: Right. You cannot do 22 the audit until we have completed the recounts for 23 both of those elections. 24 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And I think 25 the date we were contemplating for the audit was

1	December 7th to begin that.
2	So if there aren't any questions
3	concerning the post-election audit, I would
4	entertain a motion to begin the audit on
5	December 7th.
6	MEMBER SEXTON: I just have a
7	question. So on This is Mike Sexton. I'm
8	sorry. So on the recount, the recount is going to
9	start on November 30th and then be completed by
10	December 6th, and then we start the audit on
11	December 7th. Is that correct?
12	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: That's
13	correct. I think we would like to have that
14	recount completed in advance of December 6th; but,
15	yes, you are correct.
16	MEMBER SEXTON: Okay.
17	With that, Mike Sexton I move
18	that the Board set the post-election audit to begin
19	December 7th until completed and that the audit be
20	conducted in accordance with the Secretary of State
21	Directive 2012-56 and be held at the Franklin
22	County Board of Elections, 1700 Morse Road.
23	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: This is Doug
24	Preisse. I second.
25	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been

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1	properly moved and seconded to start the
2	post-election audit on December 7th. I will take
3	roll.

10	MR. PREISSE: This is Preisse. I'll

16	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Mike Sexton.

1	Thank you for those comments there,
2	Jeff. I appreciate that. So you want to go ahead
3	and do your random generator for the post audit?
4	MR. MACKEY: There are 324 voting
5	locations in the county. I don't think I'm going
6	to be as lucky this time. It takes quite a few
7	with this.
8	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We are
9	presently at 10 percent. Is that right?
10	MR. MACKEY: Yes. So we're at 10
11	percent now, so let me delete a few more here. I
12	think if I take this one out it will put us under
13	the mark there. So I will leave that one and
14	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: What, are we
15	at 5.58 percent?
16	MR. MACKEY: Yes.
17	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Okay. Go
18	ahead and read those in.
19	MR. MACKEY: I just have the LID
20	numbers here. So LID 2164, 1225, 6008, 1231, 2205,
21	3047, 4001, 1004, 1112, 7002, 4023, 2029, 3073,
22	1208, 2155, 2153, 5022, 2024, 5029.
23	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Okay. Thank
24	you, Jeff. And those LIDs are location
25	identification numbers. And so after this meeting

1 why don't we post the corresponding polling 2 locations for the numbers that we drew so that 3 everybody knows what we're actually auditing. 4 MR. MACKEY: Excellent. 5 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: So good. 6 Thank you, Jeff. 7 The next item on the agenda is the 8 Tenex non-disclosure agreement. And again, I'll 9 turn that over to Director Leonard. 10 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Again, good 11 morning, Board members. 12 As we were working with the 13 Secretary of State's office to access the test for 14 the Tenex voter registration software system it 15 came to our attention that the Franklin County 16 Board of Elections didn't have a non-disclosure 17 agreement with Tenex. It wasn't part of the 18 original contract packet that we entered into back 19 from 2019. 20 And so the agreement that's 21 submitted for approval is a standard template 22 non-disclosure agreement that is used by the 23 Secretary of State's office for the contract that 24 the Secretary of State has with Tenex and it's also

the contract template that they've recommended by

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1 the Secretary of State for other counties that have 2 agreements with Tenex. It's been reviewed by the Assistant County Prosecutor, Harold Anderson, who 3 4 handles contracts. He made some minor input on the 5 preamble or the whereas section of the agreement; 6 otherwise, it's consistent with the template the 7 Secretary of State's office proposes that gets used 8 for these types of non-disclosure agreements. 9 So barring any questions, just would 10 ask for authorization to go ahead and enter into 11 this non-disclosure agreement. 12 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Ed, it's Doug 13 Preisse. Just probably a minor observation, but 14 Section B, the first paragraph, paragraph one, The 15 company will not use confidential information for 16 any purpose except to evaluate and prepare a quote 17 for the opportunity, that's not accurate, is it? 18 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Correct. I can 19 strike that. Because this was I think the template 20 the Secretary of State used for when it was working 21 with Tenex to develop a proposal. So strike that 22 Thank you. one. 23 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Thank you. 24 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Any other 25 questions?

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1	MEMBER SEXTON: Can I assume we have
2	no other questions?
3	This is Mike Sexton. I move that
4	the Board authorize the Director and Deputy
5	Director to sign the Tenex non-disclosure

3	wanted to work for us. And I've gotten nothing but
4	great response from anybody that's worked with him.
5	He's very personable. He's a hard worker, very
6	conscientious, and we would like to hire him
7	starting back retroactively November 9th, 2020, as
8	a full-time employee of the Voter Services
9	Department that works with our voter registration
10	database at a rate of \$15.80 per hour.
11	If I could, I'd just like to bring
12	Brandon over so you can put a face and a voice with
13	the name here just to say hello real quick.
14	MR. POTTS: Hi. How's it going?
15	MEMBER MARINELLO: Hi, Brandon.
16	MR. POTTS: Nice to meet you.
17	MEMBER MARINELLO: Same here.
18	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: You want to
19	tell them a little bit about what you've been
20	doing?
21	MR. POTTS: Yeah. I just started in
22	the Early Voting Center and then I have been
23	learning how to key in and update all these
24	provisionals that we've been going through. You
25	know, we had over 20,000 that needed work done. So

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1	we're moving through that.
2	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Fantastic.
3	That's perfect.
4	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Thank you,
5	Brandon. Welcome aboard.

4	Congratulations, Brandon.
5	The next item on the agenda is
6	holiday hours. Our office was open for Veterans

10	between after the audit concludes and before the
11	first of the year. So if that would be amenable to
12	our Board, we'd like, again, to have a floating
13	holiday instead of the Veterans Day holiday that we
14	were unable to allow our employees to take off.
15	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Doug Preisse
16	here. Define floating holiday, David, for us,
17	please.
18	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: So the
19	floating holiday would be that our full-time
20	employees would be able to take a day off, eight
21	hours, in between the conclusion of the audit and
22	before the first of the year.
23	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Do they self
24	select?
25	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: They self

2	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. I mean,
3	obviously not everybody is going to take the same
4	day off or what have you, but you guys monitor
5	that.
6	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Yeah. They
7	need approval from their manager. Thank you for
8	clarifying that.
9	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Thank you.
10	MEMBER MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, I
11	move that the Board grant a floating holiday, eight
12	hours, as a replacement for the Veterans Day
13	holiday in which full-time Franklin County Board of

5	if we reach out to you individually to see what
6	date works?
7	MEMBER SINNOTT: Yes. I hope that
8	Director Leonard will still be with us at the time
9	we have our December meeting, though.
