9	the voters were in the wrong precinct and the wrong
10	location; in other words, we found that they did
11	not live in the 15th Congressional District. We
12	had one voter who did not provide any form of
13	identification. And then, as I mentioned before,
14	we have two provisionals for Board review where the
15	voter provided an incorrect year for their date of
16	birth.
17	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Would it be
18	appropriate, Mr. Chairman, to discuss the 18, if
19	there are any questions concerning that? I think
20	Mel did a pretty good job of
21	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I don't have any
22	questions. Gang? Let's keep going.
23	MEMBER SEXTON: Mr. Chairman, I move
24	that the Board reject the counting of 18
25	provisional ballots as identified by category in

9	mentioned, the voter provided their correct month
10	and correct day for their date of birth, but we had
11	two voters that provided the year 2021 as the year
12	of their birth, which is a common mistaken. And
13	the Ohio Revised Code does say that if at least
14	three of the Board members find the voter has met
15	all the other requirements under Ohio Revised Code
16	3505.183 that we can still approve and count these
17	two provisional ballots. I do have copies of the
18	front of the provisional affirmation statement if
19	you would like to see them; or if you would like to
20	take my word for it, that's okay, too.
21	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Let's take a
22	quick look at them.
23	MS. FUHRMANN: Sure.
24	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Not that we don't
25	take your word, but we've got the material right

3	I can read the wording of the Ohio Revised Code, as

9	requirements of division (B)(3) under Ohio Revised
10	Code 3505.183 are, one, the provisional voter is
11	registered to vote; two, the provisional voter is
12	eligible to cast a ballot in the precinct and for
13	the election in which the individual cast the
14	ballot; three, the provisional voter provided all
15	the information required, for example, the printed
16	name, signature, date of birth, current address,
17	and provided the identification on election day;
18	four, if the provisional voter provided their
19	Social Security number, driver's license or state
20	identification number and that number is not
21	different than the number contained in the
22	statewide voter registration database; five, the
23	provisional voter provided their current address;
24	and six, if the provisional voter has been
25	challenged which none of these voters were

but if they had, that they provided information
necessary to resolve the challenge during the seven
days following the election.
CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Thank you.
Looks straightforward to me.
MEMBER SEXTON: To me, too.
MS. FUHRMANN: And I will note for
the record that both of those voters met all of
those requirements under 3505.183.
CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Thank you.
MS. HUMMER: I would just ask that
your motion references a Ohio Revised Code section.
MEMBER SEXTON: Pursuant to Ohio
Revised Code 3505.183 I move that the Board approve
the counting of two additional provisional ballots
and rejection of zero provisional ballots and that
all provisional ballots determined valid will be
counted and included in the official canvass
results for the August 3rd, 2021 Special
Congressional Primary Election.
CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I second the
motion.

2	Jeff Mackey, manager of Petitions
3	and Campaign Financing.
4	the list of all the 91 locations
5	in the Special Congressional Primary Election. The
6	last time we did an audit we began using the
7	Random.org to generate our randomly selected
8	location selections instead of the dice, which were
9	not as easy to use, and it worked out pretty well
10	for us last time. We numbered the 91 voting
11	locations with the numbers 101 through 191, and we
12	need to get to at least five percent of the total
13	votes cast in the Special Congressional Primary
14	Election for the audit.
15	MEMBER JAFFE: So roll the dice
16	until it adds up to five percent?
17	MR. MACKEY: Yeah. Right.
18	So if you would like, I will go
19	ahead and start here and click our generate button.
20	109. So 109 LID is 1122 and had 97 voters. We can
21	check that here real quick. 109, LID 1122, 97
22	voters. Looks like it's working right.
23	DIRECTOR WHITE: Jeff, will you call
24	out these numbers for the record.
25	MR. MACKEY: The second number was

1	130 for LID 2035. The third number was 174 for LID
2	4018. Fourth number is 106 for LID 1074.
3	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Where's the total
4	that's accruing?
5	MR. MACKEY: Up here. Sorry.
6	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. There it
7	is.
8	MR. MACKEY: Fifth number, 167 for
9	LID 3038 and that has taken us over the five
10	percent mark. All right. All set.
11	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay.
12	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I think we
13	should maybe make a motion.
14	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Well, yes. We
15	just did that backwards.
16	Why don't you just say in the motion
17	as was just selected.
18	MEMBER SEXTON: As was just selected
19	by staff, in the race for the 15th Congressional
20	District which requires an audit I move that the
21	Board conduct an audit of the 15th
22	Congressional District by voting locations using
23	Location Identification numbers for each of the
24	voting locations in the 15th Congressional
25	District.

21	the withdrawal of Don Kline for Judge of the
22	Franklin County Municipal Court.
23	Do we want to talk Should that be
24	two motions to talk about the replacement or
25	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I think we

3	about the replacement.

15	is proper and timely and all the necessary
16	MR. MACKEY: Viewed by staff and
17	found to be timely filed, valid, and sufficient.
18	MEMBER JAFFE: All right. In that
19	case, I move that we accept the withdrawal of Don
20	Kline for Judge of the Franklin County Municipal
21	Court, full term commencing 1-2-2022, and accept
22	the nomination of William S. Ireland to fill that
23	vacancy and that his name will appear on the

21	to Josh Hart came in today, and I think he's in
22	the back there somewhere raising his hand so you
23	can put a face with a name. We're down a couple of
24	people in Voter Services so it will be great to

3	We've heard good things, Josh.

6	Services Department as a full-time employee at a
7	rate of \$16.11 and a start date of today, August
8	16th, 2021.
9	MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.

11	properly moved and seconded.

2	You have a resume before you for
3	Christopher Binder who comes to us by way of
4	Louisiana and he is a graduate of Southeastern
5	Louisiana University. He's been here in central
6	Ohio since the spring of 2018. He's served in a
7	variety of capacities since he's been here, mostly
8	as a political consultant or a campaign manager.
9	He's worked for a number of campaigns. But Chris
10	has really made central Ohio his home and wants to
11	be here.
12	And we hired Chris back in June to
13	come in part time to help manage our online poll
14	worker training. And as the Board is aware, last
15	year during the pandemic we implemented online poll
16	worker training as a part of our regular training
17	to our poll workers. It's now a really integrated
18	part of our process. So Chris came in. He helped
19	to manage that while we had a void with our
20	training coordinator position, and really he proved
21	himself to be very invaluable during that time.
22	He's worked well with staff, our managers, our
23	trainers, and he's assisted in the training
24	coordination of all of our poll workers for the
25	August Special Election.
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1	So with that, we'd like to bring
2	Chris on full time as our training coordinator to
3	work in the PEO department at a rate of \$25.24 an
4	hour pending your approval. And Mr. Binder is
5	sitting right here to put a face to the name.
6	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Sounds good.
7	Thank you for that report, Antone.
8	MEMBER SEXTON: Mr. Chairman, I move
9	the Board hire Chris Binder who will serve as the
10	Supervisor of the Precinct Election Officials
11	Department as a full-time employee at a rate of
12	\$25.24 per hour and a start date of August 16,
13	2021.
14	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.
15	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
16	moved and seconded.
17	All those in favor of the motion
18	signify by saying aye.
19	(Vote taken.)
20	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
21	same sign.
22	(No response.)
23	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
24	carries.
25	Congratulations, Chris.

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1	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Welcome aboard.
2	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We're all
3	excited to have Chris on board. No one is more
4	excited than Steve Bulen.
5	The next item on the agenda is the
6	purchase of warehouse carts. Antone, do you want
7	to walk us through that?
8	DIRECTOR WHITE: Sure. Happy to do
9	so.
10	Back in February, February 16th, at
11	our regular Board meeting the Board approved the
12	purchase of 24 carts for the purposes of
13	transporting and storing our ADA signage that we
14	use at polling locations. These carts were to
15	replace sort of the old method of storing them on
16	skids which was really not an efficient way to
17	store them or transport them. And so the Board
18	approved the purchase of \$11,149 for that purpose
19	back in February.
20	Subsequent to that meeting, we
21	purchased the carts and when they arrived they
22	just they were not of quality. Many of the
23	carts were had broken joints and just the entire
24	quality of the purchase was not up to standards.
25	So I asked our warehousing logistics

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1	manager, Patrick Harris, to return the carts and
2	let's start over. So he did so. He went back, he
3	researched, got three more quotes, found a quote
4	that he liked and he purchased one cart and brought
5	it in to make sure it was going to be of the
6	quality and standard that we were looking for. It
7	was.
8	And so now we come today to ask for
9	the Board to approve the purchase of 23 additional
10	carts at a cost of \$16,496. Now, that is more, but
11	we've gotten a better quality cart that we feel
12	good with.
13	MEMBER MARINELLO: That sounds
14	awesome.
15	I move that the Board authorize the
16	purchase of 23 metal carts at \$717.22 each for the
17	storage and transport of ADA signage. The total
18	expenditure for the carts would be a total of
19	\$16,496,06.
20	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.
21	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
22	moved and seconded.
23	All those in favor of the motion
24	signify by saying aye.
25	(Vote taken.)

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1	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
2	same sign.
3	(No response.)
4	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
5	carries.
6	The next item on the agenda is poll
7	worker online training licenses. I'll call on our
8	newest full-time employee, Chris Binder, who's been
9	on board four and a half minutes, to explain that.
10	MR. BINDER: The Adobe Captivate is
11	the system that we use to allow all of our poll
12	workers to access the online training portion of
13	their PEO training. It's a vital part of our
14	entire training process. It allows our poll
15	workers to be prepared to go to their in-person
16	training. It gives them a refresher on everything
17	that we do. And it's also a way for us to
18	internally figure out which poll workers might need
19	a little extra help and which poll workers might
20	need to come back for Practice Makes Perfect.
21	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Chris, this
22	doesn't take the place of our in-person training,
23	it just augments our
24	MR. BINDER: It just augments our
25	in-person training.

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1	MEMBER SEXTON: When would we start?
2	Would we start using it for this election or
3	MR. BINDER: We have already started
4	using it. I believe the first time that we used it
5	was in November of 2020. And so we basically
6	purchased a license from Adobe for a year and this
7	is us essentially renewing a service that we
8	already use.
9	MEMBER SEXTON: So we will be using
10	it again in November?
11	MR. BINDER: Yes.
12	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Sounds good.
13	MEMBER JAFFE: I move the Board
14	approve the purchase of 3,500 online training
15	licenses from ENGAGE so poll workers can do online
16	training. Total cost for the purchase, \$40,820.
17	MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.
18	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
19	moved and seconded.
20	All those in favor of the motion
21	signify by saying aye.
22	(Vote taken.)
23	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
24	same sign.
25	(No response.)

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1	31 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
2	carries.
3	The next item on the agenda would be
4	the certification of candidates to the November
5	2nd, 2021 ballot. I'll turn that over to Jeff
6	Mackey.
7	MR. MACKEY: Before we talk about
8	the candidates that we are going to certify, we did
9	have one candidate request a unique ballot name
10	that I wanted to go over. Make sure I don't need
11	to change my exhibit or anything like that.
12	A candidate for New Albany City
13	Council, Edward Joseph Fellows, requested to appear
14	on the ballot as Chip Fellows. Four years ago he
15	did the same thing. The Board said that he could
16	not do that based on the guidance from the
17	Secretary of State under nicknames, which says that
18	a candidate's nickname may be printed on the ballot
19	if the nickname is a natural derivative of the
20	candidate's legal name. I think we discussed that
21	and determined that Chip is not a natural
22	derivative of either Edward or Joseph.
23	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Are you saying
24	Chip?
25	MR. MACKEY: Like chocolate chip,
l	

32 chip off the old block. 1 2 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Yeah. This very 3 matter came up to us four years ago? 4 MR. MACKEY: Yes. 5 DIRECTOR PREISSE: I have a recollection of that. 6 7 MR. MACKEY: We said no. 8 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I was thinking of 9 Bud Zappitelli. Didn't we say no to Bud 10 Zappitelli? 11 MR. MACKEY: Yes. We also always 12 say no to --13 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And if we had a 14 Peggy come before us whose real name was Margaret 15 they couldn't use it. 16 MS. HUMMER: Yes. A natural 17 derivative. 18 MR. MACKEY: Qualified as a natural 19 derivative. 20 MEMBER JAFFE: Kip Greenhill in 21 Upper Arlington is another one. He's always as 22 Francis. Right? Seems like we're being 23 consistent. 24 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Does that 25 require any action by the Board?

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1	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I don't think so.
2	We just provide the guidance really to the
3	candidate.
4	MS. HUMMER: It's a not on his birth
5	certificate or anything along that line. Right?
6	MR. MACKEY: Right.
7	MEMBER JAFFE: I am seeing that his
8	ballot name has got two typos in it on in
9	Exhibit B.
10	MR. MACKEY: Okay. Edward Joseph
11	Fellows. I tried to fix that quick this morning.
12	I must have tried to fix it too quick. I'll make
13	sure to correct that. If you would like to correct
14	your exhibits there.
15	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: We ready to move
16	on?
17	MEMBER MARINELLO: I move that the
18	Board certify to the November 2nd, 2021 General
19	Election ballot those candidates listed on
20	Exhibit B and that these petitions were timely
21	filed and found to be valid and sufficient.
22	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.
23	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
24	moved and seconded.
25	All those in favor of the motion

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1	signify by saying aye.
2	(Vote taken.)
3	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
4	same sign.
5	(No response.)
6	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
7	carries.
8	The next item on the agenda are
9	candidates not recommended for certification. Do
10	you want to walk us through each one of those,
11	Jeff?
12	MR. MACKEY: You have before you
13	Exhibit B which includes candidate petitions that
14	staff reviewed and
15	DIRECTOR WHITE: It's C, I believe.
16	MR. MACKEY: Exhibit C. Sorry.
17	staff examined and found to be
18	invalid or insufficient. You want me to go through
19	each one or I'm happy to read through the
20	exhibit there.
21	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Give us a second
22	to look at it. I don't think we need to go through
23	it since you provided it unless one of the other
24	Board members wishes to.
25	MR. MACKEY: The number that appears

1	in brackets on there would be the required number
2	of signatures.
3	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Gotcha.
4	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Jeff, is it
5	fair to say that whenever we're recommending a
6	candidate not appear on the ballot that we make
7	multiple efforts to attempt to see if there is a
8	way to get that candidate on the ballot that goes
9	through multiple passes that we
10	MR. MACKEY: Correct. Every
11	petition is reviewed at least twice. Petitions
12	that look to be invalid or insufficient are
13	reviewed at least four times.
14	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Well, we've had
15	candidates come in in the past and ask to try to
16	reverse the decision by examining petitions. Has
17	each of these potential candidates been notified?
18	MR. MACKEY: No. They will be
19	notified after this meeting.
20	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay.
21	MEMBER JAFFE: In each of these
22	cases they didn't have enough valid signatures
23	whether that's because there's a petition page
24	error or just not enough valid signatures?
25	MR. MACKEY: Right. Ultimately each

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1	ends up not having enough valid signatures because
2	of some error or another.
3	MEMBER JAFFE: I'm satisfied with
4	the staff review.
5	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I am, too.
6	MEMBER JAFFE: Unless anybody has
7	any other questions, I move that the Board deny
8	certification to the candidates appearing on
9	Exhibit C on the basis that their petitions were
10	either not filed timely or found by staff to be
11	invalid or insufficient and that these candidates
12	will not appear on the November 2nd, 2021 General
13	Election ballot.
14	MEMBER SEXTON: I'll second.
15	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
16	moved and seconded.
17	All those in favor of the motion
18	signify by saying aye.
19	(Vote taken.)
20	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
21	same sign.
22	(No response.)
23	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
24	carries.
25	The next item on the agenda would be

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1	certification of questions and issues to appear on
2	the November 2nd, 2021 ballot.
3	MR. MACKEY: Before we do that, we
4	did have two candidates on a joint petition that I
5	wanted to discuss further because we weren't sure
6	what to do with them.
7	Candidates on a joint petition for
8	Educational Service Center of Central Ohio, Joyce
9	Galbreath and Chermal (phonetic) London, submitted
10	a petition consisting of six part petitions. One
11	of the part Actually, I have copies here.
12	So the first part petition they did
13	not fill out the statement of candidacy at all. So
14	we did not count any signatures on that part
15	petition.
16	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Where are we
17	looking?
18	MR. MACKEY: Under the statement of
19	candidacy above where they indicated their names.
20	So we did not verify any signatures on that page.
21	On the next five they did indicate
22	that they were running for Educational Service
23	Center of Central Ohio, but in the Educational
24	Service Center of Central Ohio there are two
25	subdistricts, the Franklin Subdistrict and the

1 Delaware Union Subdistrict. They did not on their 2 petition indicate which subdistrict they are 3 running for. I think we can assume that they are 4 running for the subdistrict in which they reside. 5 But if you will refer to Exhibit C, the second page 6 there, candidate petitions. So our statutes 7 prescribing the form of candidate petitions 8 generally require substantial compliance as Board 9 Member Jaffe just indicated. And when there is an 10 error or omission on a petition form, the board of 11 elections must determine whether the prospective 12 candidate substantially complied with the form of 13 the petition. In determining whether the 14 prospective candidate substantially complied with 15 the form of the petition, the inquiry is typically 16 fact specific, which I think this is. Under the 17 office section in the Ohio Education Official 18 Manual it says the declaration or statement of 19 candidacy signed by the prospective candidate must 20 identify the office sought so that both electors 21 signing the petition and the board of elections are 22 able to ascertain from the petition which office 23 the candidate seeks. 24 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And Jeff, you're

telling us that there are two sets of members --

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1	MR. MACKEY: They call them
2	subdistricts. One is the Delaware Union
3	Subdistrict and one is the Franklin Subdistrict.
4	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: They are elected
5	simultaneously?
6	MR. MACKEY: Yes. Both will be on
7	the ballot this time.
8	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And then they
9	come together in a single ward?
10	MR. MACKEY: Yes. So I would equate
11	it to the Ohio House, each being elected from a
12	district and then coming together in the
13	legislature.
14	MEMBER JAFFE: Are there enough
15	valid signatures on all of the pages that they did
16	correctly fill out excluding the one blank one?
17	MR. MACKEY: They do have, if we
18	count these last five part petitions, sufficient
19	signatures to qualify for the ballot.
20	MEMBER MARINELLO: So this other
21	stuff doesn't really matter because they got what
22	they need?
23	MR. MACKEY: Right. Well, the first
24	page we didn't count at all, the first part
25	petition. The other five part petitions, if you

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1	decide that it has met the burden of sufficiency,
2	that they have sufficient signatures on those five
3	to qualify for the ballot.
4	MEMBER MARINELLO: Even without the
5	subdistrict down or
6	MR. MACKEY: Well, if you decide
7	that the subdistrict needs to be on there, then,
8	no. There's only six.
9	MEMBER JAFFE: The second part
10	petition is also missing the day of the election.
11	Less significant.
12	MR. MACKEY: Yeah. Under the
13	substantial compliance area, understanding that
14	it's the November General Election is generally
15	sufficient.
16	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I mean
17	MEMBER JAFFE: What would we do if
18	it were an Ohio House of Representatives candidate
19	that left off the district number, if that's the
20	analogous situation?
21	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Well, it's not
22	exactly analogous, in my opinion. If these folks
23	had been living outside the district they couldn't
24	run anyway. They're living inside the district,
25	which you suggested. Right?

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1	MR. MACKEY: Right. Correct.
2	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And it's not
3	are they the only candidates in this?
4	MR. MACKEY: No.
5	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And are these
6	head to head or top vote getters?
7	MR. MACKEY: I believe it is vote
8	for two.
9	MS. HUMMER: Would it be possible
10	for you to go through with the exception of the one
11	that doesn't the first one that doesn't even
12	name the Educational Service Center? You've
13	indicated each one of these documents are
14	insufficient or has some invalid point. Can you go
15	through each one? Like, 000453, what is the
16	problem with that one?
17	MR. MACKEY: Sure. Well, I think
18	all five have the same deficiency,
19	MS. HUMMER: Okay.
20	MR. MACKEY: which is they lack
21	the designation of the subdistrict they are
22	interested in running for.
23	MS. HUMMER: And I see 453 did not
24	include the day of the election that you mentioned.
25	So is it only those two items?

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1	MR. MACKEY: Only those two items,
2	yes.
3	MEMBER MARINELLO: Where would the
4	subdistrict go? Where would you put that on the
5	petition?
6	MR. MACKEY: Had they used our form
7	from our website it would all be squeezed in there
8	under the Educational Service Center.
9	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Jeff, is it
10	fair to say that even though there are two
11	subdistricts that they only live in one subdistrict
12	and they would only be eligible to run for one
13	subdistrict?
14	MR. MACKEY: Yes.
15	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Right. That's
16	the point I was making. Irrespective of the
17	missing language, they couldn't run in any other
18	district. I sort of tried to avoid answering your
19	hypothetical question earlier.
20	MS. HUMMER: If you choose to make a
21	motion to accept this I believe the four other
22	documents are sufficient I would make your
23	motion to include the fact that the subdistrict
24	that is missing would be this by virtue of the fact
25	that the two candidates are living in that

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1	<sup>43</sup> subdistrict so there's no question of what they're
2	running for.
3	MEMBER JAFFE: Would that same logic
4	not apply to the one page where they've completely
5	left it blank because it's a petition exclusively
6	for an Educational Service Center office and they
7	only live in the one county in the one district?
8	Seems to me like
9	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Well, but we know
10	that the guidance provided by the code and the
11	Secretary of State is it should be filled out
12	substantially. So even though it says it's
13	typed there on the wrote form, they haven't filled
14	it out. Which to me this one falls on the side of
15	insubstantial. This one clearly falls closer to or
16	on the other side.
17	MS. HUMMER: And has there been a
18	history of making decisions based on this
19	previous similar petitions where the Board has
20	approved them substantially?
21	MR. MACKEY: I couldn't think of
22	any, but certainly there have been substantial
23	compliance questions before. As far as involving
24	district, I was unable to think of any.
25	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: What's the

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1	status of So we don't have a staff
2	recommendation, you're just bringing this up?
3	MR. MACKEY: Exactly.
4	DIRECTOR WHITE: So Jeff, if the
5	Board accepts these five part petitions with the
6	missing subdistrict, would that then qualify the
7	candidate to the ballot?
8	MR. MACKEY: It would.
9	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Do we need to
10	vote on this or do you just need guidance?
11	MR. MACKEY: At some point you need
12	to certify these candidates to the ballot or deny
13	certification of these candidates.
14	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So they were not
15	on either list?
16	MR. MACKEY: Correct.
17	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I gotcha.
18	Anybody dying to make a motion?
19	MEMBER JAFFE: I'm a little
20	concerned about the precedent for surmising
21	information that the voter has left off the
22	petition. I brought up the hypothetical of the
23	House of Representatives District, which if we were
24	to make a decision on that basis today I could
25	easily see that being justification for making a

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1	similar decision in the future. And I don't know.
2	That concerns me slightly. If there's no precedent
3	or guidance to go on, we're creating a precedent
4	here.
5	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I see your point.
6	Which brings us back to the question is this
7	petition substantially executed.
8	MEMBER JAFFE: I do see we've been
9	advised to seek the advice of our legal counsel on
10	that subject.
11	MS. HUMMER: I will tell you that
12	this is the first I'm hearing of this issue. So I
13	cannot provide you with case law or any AG opinion
14	on it.
15	What is our time period for
16	getting
17	MR. MACKEY: Today is the deadline
18	to certify candidates and issues to the ballot.
19	I'm not sure
20	MEMBER MARINELLO: I would say if
21	there was a blank that said district number or
22	something like that and it was left blank, maybe
23	then; but I have a problem with the district not
24	being there.
25	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Any other

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1	discussion? I'm prepared to make a brief motion, I
2	think.
3	I move that the Board certify to the
4	November 2021 General Election ballot the
5	candidacies of Joyce Galbreath and Chermal London
6	for Educational Service Center of Central Ohio
7	MS. HUMMER: Corresponding to the
8	district that they are entitled to be a candidate
9	of based on their address.
10	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: corresponding
11	to the district that they are entitled to be a
12	candidate in according to their registered the
13	address where they are registered.
14	MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.
15	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Are you going to
16	do a roll call or break with democracy?
17	MEMBER JAFFE: I think erring on the
18	side of ballot access is fine. I'm just concerned
19	about precedent.
20	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Noted. Well
21	said. We need to take a vote.
22	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We do.
23	It's been properly moved and
24	seconded.
25	All those in favor of the motion
