5	Payne. And if everybody would state their name
6	prior to speaking, that would probably help the
7	court reporter out.
8	I'm going to take roll call.
9	Kim Marinello.
10	MEMBER MARINELLO: Here.
11	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Mike Sexton.
12	(No response.)
13	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Doug
14	Preisse.
15	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Here.
16	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And Josh
17	Jaffe.
18	MEMBER JAFFE: Here.
19	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We have a
20	quorum.
21	First item on the agenda is the
22	approval of the minutes from the October 23rd, '22,
23	and November 7th, 2022. I think those minutes were
24	sent to you.
25	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I even read them

1	this time.
2	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: You read
3	them, that's great.
4	MEMBER MARINELLO: Kim Marinello. I
5	move that the Board approve the minutes of the
6	October 3rd, 2022, and November 7th, 2022 meetings
7	of the Franklin County Board of Elections as
8	submitted.
9	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Doug Preisse,
10	second.
11	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
12	properly moved and seconded.
13	All those in favor of the motion,
14	signify by saying aye.
15	(Vote taken.)
16	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
17	same sign.
18	(No response.)
19	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
20	carries.
21	The next item on the agenda is the
22	start of the recount. It requires a, something to
23	get started here, somebody a motion, I believe.
24	MEMBER MARINELLO: Kim Marinello. I
25	move that the Board of Elections begin the recount

1	today at 9:00 a.m. or thereabouts in the races for
2	State Representative (Fifth District) and Judge of
3	the Court of Common Pleas commencing January 1st,
4	2023.
5	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Doug Preisse,
6	second.
7	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
8	properly moved and seconded.
9	All those in favor of the motion,
10	signify by saying aye.
11	(Vote taken.)
12	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
13	same sign.
14	(No response.)
15	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
16	carries.
17	I think Matt is here, and Matt can
18	take all of the observers back to the vault to
19	begin the recount.
20	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Can you give
21	us one more of those observer things, the badge?
22	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: May I swear
23	her in real quick?
24	MEMBER JAFFE: Please.
25	(Thereupon, an observer was sworn in

1 | by Deputy Director Payne.)

2 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Fantastic.

3 | Thank you.

The next item on the agenda is an ES&S EMS 6.3.0.0 upgrade. And we'll call on Carla Patton, our operations manager, to tell us what that is.

MS. PATTON: Good morning. Carla Patton.

In front of you, you have a quote from ES&S for an upgrade to our current EMS election management system, which is tabulation. Currently the system that we have is over five years old now, and in computer terms, that's old. And so we are looking to upgrade to the newest version of software that Election Systems & Software has to offer for tabulation, 6300.

So the quote in front of you is for all the computer equipment, which replaces all the current systems that we have; a new server, four new work stations, all the equipment that goes with those, the monitors; as well as upgrading the three of the four computers that we currently have, with the fourth one being maintained for historical purposes, and also using the current server,

1 upgrading that as a redundant backup to the new 2 server that we will be receiving. 3 So we would ask that you approve 4 this quote for us to purchase the upgraded software 5 and the equipment for that. 6 DIRECTOR WHITE: And Carla, if I 7 may; in addition to the purchase of the equipment, 8 there's training that will be involved in learning 9 the new software, and we've got multiple Democrat 10 and Republican teams that will be trained on the 11 new software. 12 MS. PATTON: Right. 13 training session with Election Systems & Software 14

It's a five-day staff training us. And we've identified a total of 11 people in the office to at least go through the training, to be familiar with it, and at the least, but at the most, be able to code an election from start to finish.

DIRECTOR WHITE: Including the director and deputy director.

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MEMBER JAFFE: Great.

MEMBER MARINELLO: Kim Marinello. move that the Board authorize the purchase of the tabulation software and equipment EMS upgrade in the total amount of \$35,519 from ES&S.

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1	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Doug Preisse,
2	second.
3	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
4	properly moved and seconded.
5	All those in favor of the motion,
6	signify by saying aye.
7	(Vote taken.)
8	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
9	same sign.
10	(No response.)
11	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
12	carries.
13	The next item on the agenda, we have
14	two voter challenges. I'm going to call on Travis
15	Simmons, our voter service manager, to talk about
16	those two voter challenges.
17	MR. SIMMONS: Good morning.
18	According to Ohio Revised Code,
19	Section 3503.24, a qualified elector may file an
20	application for correction or challenge in person
21	or by mail with the office of the Board of
22	Elections. The challenger must use the Secretary
23	of State Form 257 to file an application challenge
24	no later than 30 days before the election and state
2.5	the reasons for the application challenge, and also

1 | sign under penalty of election falsification.

In these two cases, all of those requirements were met. I think you should have those exhibits in front of you.

The first one is Millie Jenkins.

Ms. Jenkins is challenging the voter registration status of Tom Rose. This is a simple case of voter inactivity at this address. Ms. Jenkins has lived at that address since 1975.

MS. GIBBONS: Travis, it looks like, it appears that we don't have Ms. Jenkins on with us yet.

DIRECTOR WHITE: So if you want to take the other one.

MS. GIBBONS: Sorry.

MR. SIMMONS: No problem.

Okay. We'll start now with Steve Loos. He's challenging -- Steve is right here. Steve is challenging the voter registration status of Michael Denton. Steve has, as you can see from the exhibit, Steve originally was registered to vote in Franklin County on February the 20th of 1996. He has remained a regular voter in Franklin County, voted in nearly every election in which he was eligible.

1 Steve updated his voter registration 2 to 1087 Urana Avenue with an online registration in 3 2019. And Mr. Loos affirmed on his challenge that 4 Mr. Denton does not live at 1087 Urana Avenue, and 5 the activity on Mr. Denton's record supports that 6 statement. So in lieu of that, the voter 8 services department recommends that the Board 9 uphold the challenge against Mr. Denton and remove 10 as a registered voter in Franklin County. 11 research supports that statement provided by 12 Mr. Loos that Mr. Denton no longer lives at 1087 Urana Avenue and should not continue as a 13 14 registered voter at that address. 15 Any questions? 16 MS. HUMMER: We need to have the 17 challenger testify. 18 MR. SIMMONS: You ready, Steve? 19 MS. HUMMER: He needs to be sworn. 20 (Thereupon, the challenger was sworn 21 in by the reporter.) 22 MS. HUMMER: You need to provide 23 your name and your current address. 24 MR. LOOS: Steven M. Loos, 25 1087 Urana Avenue, Columbus, Ohio.

1 MS. HUMMER: And provide the 2 information to the Board regarding why you are 3 challenging this individual's voter registration. 4 MR. LOOS: Absolutely. And thank 5 you for the Board's time this morning. 6 We've received several mailings and 7 documents in the mail for Mr. Denton, and it 8 appears that he has had voter activity signing a 9 petition in the past. But from what I can tell, 10 the gentleman lives in Pickerington and has not 11 voted in Franklin County, and he's not currently at 12 our address. I bought the home in 2019. And so in 13 order to clean up our voter rolls, I thought it was 14 good to bring it to the Board's attention. 15 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I'm going to read 16 the narrative here. 17 MEMBER JAFFE: So you don't know 18 Mr. Denton? 19 MR. LOOS: No, I've never met him. 20 And the person that sold the home to us didn't 21 recognize him being a tenant in the past. He may 22 or may not have been, but they didn't recognize 23 him, so. 24 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So he signed a 25 petition in 2019 which caused his, his voter

1	activity to go back to active, but he wasn't living
2	there then; you were already there?
3	MR. LOOS: Correct.
4	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And then that's
5	why he's getting mail there now.
6	MS. HUMMER: For purposes of this
7	matter and not questions, it's my understanding
8	that there was a publication notice posted, so that
9	this individual would receive some kind of notice
10	of this hearing to be present, and he has not
11	appeared.
12	MEMBER JAFFE: Do we have any
13	contact information other than his address that
14	is
15	MS. GIBBONS: We don't.
16	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I don't have any
17	other questions.
18	MEMBER MARINELLO: I don't have any
19	questions.
20	MEMBER JAFFE: Nor I.
21	Anything else, Kim?
22	MEMBER MARINELLO: No.
23	MEMBER JAFFE: This is Josh Jaffe.
24	I will move that the Board approve the Challenge of
25	Right to Vote filed by Steven M. Loos, 1087 Urana

1	Avenue, Columbus, Ohio, against Michael R. Denton,
2	1087 Urana Avenue, Columbus, Ohio, and that Michael
3	R. Denton's registration be removed in the Franklin
4	County voter file.
5	MEMBER MARINELLO: Second. Kim
6	Marinello.
7	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
8	properly moved and seconded.
9	All those in favor of the motion,
10	signify by saying aye.
11	(Vote taken.)
12	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
13	same sign.
14	(No response.)
15	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
16	carries.
17	Does it look like we have
18	Ms. Jenkins on now or
19	MR. LOOS: Thank you.
20	MS. GIBBONS: It does not appear
21	that we have her on the call.
22	MS. HUMMER: It's my understanding,
23	if I may, that the individual that is challenging
24	does have medical issues. And the Board does have
25	discretion to move the matter and postpone it to a

1	later date to maybe see if she is able to come
2	forward in another month after her medical issues
3	are resolved. Or you could just
4	MEMBER MARINELLO: Try again on the
5	19th meeting?
6	MEMBER JAFFE: Could we take care of
7	the rest of the agenda and see if she joins us in
8	that time?
9	MS. HUMMER: You can.
10	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Do we have to
11	have the presence of the challenger?
12	MS. HUMMER: That is the person who
13	is bringing forth the matter, and you want to have
14	that testimony. Other than that, you just have to
15	have the Board's information. But if you want the
16	proper process, you should have the person who is
17	actually challenging present providing that
18	testimony.
19	DIRECTOR WHITE: In person?
20	MS. HUMMER: In person.
21	DIRECTOR WHITE: But it's up to the
22	Board to make that determination?
23	MS. HUMMER: Right.
24	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. Well,
25	let's pass on that until the end and see if she

1 joins us or not, and if she doesn't, we'll discuss 2 it further. 3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Fantastic. 4 I'm wondering if we may go to the 5 ward and precinct update for Dublin, Grove City and 6 Hilliard. Matt Rushey is here, and he needs to be 7 back in the recount. 8 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Sounds good. 9 Matt, you DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: 10 want to come on up, then? Matt Rushey works in our 11 petitions and filings department. 12 MR. RUSHEY: Good morning, 13 everybody. My name is Matt Rushey. 14 I will just say briefly that 15 following the most recent census, which was 16 approximately two years ago, the cities in Franklin County of Dublin, Grove City and Hilliard redrew 17 18 their ward lines. Now, they have discretion to 19 draw their ward lines. We at the Board of 20 Elections have discretion to draw the precinct 21 lines to match their new ward lines, and so that's 22 what we recently did. 23 And there are several suburban 24 cities in Franklin that do that, and those are kind

of the first three that we've come across. And the

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reason why they do that is to have the population
balance between their wards, and so every ten
years, they like to take a look at their wards and
make sure that everything is relatively similar
regarding population. And so we have recently
redrawn precinct lines in Dublin, Grove City and
Hilliard.

Also mention that Grove City and

Also mention that Grove City and Hilliard also added a fifth ward, okay, which didn't exist before. And that can certainly come into play with regarding central committee, county central committee seats, for instance, as well as city council seats in some cases that are not at large.

So I'll just mention to you again
Dublin, Grove City, Hilliard, recently, we just
recently redid precinct lines in each of those
cities. And so that's what we are asking for
approval from the Board today. And if there's any
questions, I'll be glad to take them.

MEMBER JAFFE: I have a question.

MR. RUSHEY: Yes, sir.

MEMBER JAFFE: It's my understanding that in terms of, if they elect board members to their city council, their charter would govern how

1 they elect a new member in the cases where they've 2 added a ward. But with respect to county central 3 committee, does the ward exist now that the cities 4 have created it for the purpose of the central 5 committee or at the next election? 6 MR. RUSHEY: And that's a great question, and I talked to Jeff Mackey, who's our 7 8 manager of petitions and financial filings. 9 his opinion, and so I'm borrowing from what he told 10 me; and that is that we believe that, yes, that 11 the, since these changes are in effect for all 12 three suburbs at this point, Dublin, Grove City, 13 Hilliard, they're all in effect, their councils have duly processed those changes and passed them; 14 15 that the parties, Democratic, Republican parties 16 would be at liberty to either fill the seat now or 17 wait until 2024, the next election for county 18 central committee. 19 MEMBER JAFFE: Okay. 20 So we believe, we MR. RUSHEY: 21 believe that they're at liberty, the parties are at 22 liberty to fill the seat now, the fifth seat, or to 23 wait till 2024. 24 MEMBER JAFFE: Thank you.

DIRECTOR WHITE:

And that's in

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1	Hilliard, is that correct?
2	MR. RUSHEY: That is Hilliard and
3	Grove City both, yes, sir.
4	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Good report,
5	Matt. Thank you.
6	MR. RUSHEY: Thank you.
7	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: What do you
8	think, Kim?
9	MEMBER MARINELLO: I don't have any
10	questions. You guys?
11	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: No. I think this
12	sounds sensible.
13	MEMBER MARINELLO: Kim Marinello. I
14	move that the Board accept the changes proposed by
15	the Board of Election staff to the identified wards
16	and precincts in Dublin, Grove City and Hilliard.
17	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Doug Preisse,
18	second the motion.
19	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
20	properly moved and seconded.
21	All those in favor of the motion,
22	signify by saying aye.
23	(Vote taken.)
24	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
25	same sign.

1	(No response.)
2	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
3	carries.
4	Thank you, Matt.
5	Matt does a fantastic job for us
6	here at the Board of Elections.
7	MEMBER MARINELLO: Yes, he does.
8	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And he's a
9	very nice gentleman.
10	MEMBER MARINELLO: Yes, he is.
11	MS. HUMMER: You can tell it's the
12	holiday season, can't you?
13	DIRECTOR WHITE: Thanks, Matt.
14	MR. RUSHEY: Thank you.
15	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: The next
16	item on the agenda is the Piedmont lease. Antone,
17	was that something you were going to?
18	DIRECTOR WHITE: Yes.
19	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Okay.
20	Fantastic.
21	DIRECTOR WHITE: Good morning.
22	Director White.
23	This is an extension with the City
24	of Columbus to utilize the building at 750 Piedmont
25	Avenue for their building to use for poll worker

training. We've used this building now since 2019. This is an extension for \$18,000 to utilize this building through May 19th, 2023. This will be our final extension for the use of that facility. The City of Columbus is repurposing that building and the building next to it, which they call Carolyn Avenue. They're using those buildings for public safety purposes, so I think they're going to be demolishing those buildings.

And so we will have to find a new facility to conduct our poll worker training.

We're currently working with the county to find a facility. I'm working with county administration right now. We've got some options that we're working on. So we're optimistic that we'll have something in place in time, you know, that our lease is up here in May. But we do have one more extension we'd like the Board to approve today.

MEMBER MARINELLO: Absolutely.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Sounds good.

MEMBER MARINELLO: Kim Marinello. I move that the Board approve the lease agreement to rent the building space at 750 Piedmont Avenue for \$18,000. The space will be used for the training of poll workers for the upcoming May Primary. The

1	lease agreement commences December 1st, 2022, and
2	ends at midnight on May 29th, 2023.
3	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Doug Preisse,
4	second the motion.
5	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
6	properly moved and seconded.
7	All those in favor of the motion,
8	signify by saying aye.
9	(Vote taken.)
10	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
11	same sign.
12	(No response.)
13	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
14	carries.
15	The next item on the agenda is the
16	E.E. Ward contract extension. Antone, was that
17	something you were going to?
18	DIRECTOR WHITE: Yes. Director
19	White again.
20	This is our annual contract with
21	E.E. Ward, our transportation contract for the
22	hauling of voting equipment to our polling
23	locations for Election Day. This contract, this is
24	the second extension of a contract that we entered
25	into an agreement with E.E. Ward back in 2020. The

previous year, we had a contract for, we entered into a not-to-exceed-amount contract for 200,000. This year going into 2023, it's

286,000. We extended or we increased the amount because we wanted to add in a third election. We wanted to make sure that we had enough budgeted in case we had a third election, because the last two years, we've had a third election. And also we have, we move equipment offsite for L&A testing, so we move equipment offsite to Piedmont, so we make room in our warehouses for testing purposes.

So we've added to that budget to ensure that we have enough there for transportation services. It's a not-to-exceed amount. So we don't expect to get to 286; it's there just in case.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Gotcha.

MEMBER JAFFE: This is Josh Jaffe.

I'll move that the Board authorize the director and deputy director to enter into an annual trucking contract extension with E.E. Ward in an amount not to exceed 286,000 for delivery and pickup of our voting equipment in 2023.

MEMBER MARINELLO: Kim Marinello, second.

1	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
2	properly moved and seconded.
3	All those in favor of the motion,
4	signify by saying aye.
5	(Vote taken.)
6	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
7	same sign.
8	(No response.)
9	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
10	carries.
11	The next item on the agenda is the
12	Veterans Day holiday, which was Friday,
13	November 11th, 2022. And our office was open and
14	working. Typically that's a holiday for the Board
15	staff. And what we would ask the Board is if they
16	would grant a floating holiday, which would be
17	eight hours to be used prior to Tuesday,
18	January 31st, 2023.
19	MEMBER MARINELLO: Absolutely. Kim
20	Marinello. As the BOE office was open on Friday,
21	November 11th, Veterans Day, I move that all
22	full-time Board employees be given a floating
23	holiday of eight hours to be used prior to Tuesday,
24	January 31st, 2023.
25	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Doug Preisse,

1	second the motion.
2	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
3	properly moved and seconded.
4	All those in favor of the motion,
5	signify by saying aye.
6	(Vote taken.)
7	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
8	same sign.
9	(No response.)
10	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
11	carries.
12	The final item on here would be, I
13	suppose, to recess the, recess the Board.
14	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Well
15	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Oh. We got
16	to go back and I'm sorry.
17	MS. GIBBONS: She's not on there
18	still.
19	MEMBER MARINELLO: Could we have her
20	on the 19th? Is that too soon or too late?
21	MS. HUMMER: You can.
22	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So we'll just
23	pass on that for now.
24	MS. HUMMER: Well, you need to do a
25	motion to postpone the matter to date, I would say

1	the 19th. That will allow Erin to reach out and
2	see if we can have her on. But I think given the
3	fact that she had mentioned to Erin her health
4	difficulties, I think that would be a fair
5	resolution.

7	I move to postpone the Challenge of Right to Vote
8	filed by Millie Jenkins to our next meeting on
9	December 19th.

13	properly moved and seconded.
14	All those in favor of the motion,
15	signify by saying aye.
