we have a unique situation with three voters in the Groveport-Madison School District. I'd ask Karen Cotton, our Elections Operation Manager, to come forward for a moment and brief the Board on this unique situation with these voters.

MS. COTTON: In this particular precinct only, a portion of the precinct is in the Groveport-Madison Local School District. This was also noted on your exhibit on your machine assignments where we were planning to assign those voters.

The precinct is Ward 86, Precinct A. And per the Ohio Revised Code, Section 3503.01, paragraph (B), when only a portion of the precinct is involved within the boundaries of a school district for a special election, the Board is permitted to assign those voters for a temporary assignment to an adjacent precinct as long as we provide them notice at least 10 days prior to the election.

So we're requesting that instead of them voting at their home precinct which is Dayspring Community Church, we're asking that they be assigned for this election only to World Harvest Church at 4595 Gender Road. World Harvest is another precinct

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open that has several of its assigned precincts open for this election.
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DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Does the Board have any questions for Karen on this?

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And we will notify them in the mail?

MS. COTTON: We'll notify them by mail that they've been temporarily assigned for this election only and it says specifically in the letter. We also include an absentee ballot request form that gives them the option of requesting an absentee if they don't want to go to the polling place if it's inconvenient for them to drive to the location. I've checked with the warehouse and this is the most convenient of the locations that are open for these individuals.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. Fine.

Karen just stay up there. As you know, we're
required in the Ohio Revised Code to limit the size
of precincts, and no precinct is allowed to be up
over 1,400 voters in that precinct, and we do have
two precincts that are nearing that threshold that we
have gone about splitting those precincts so that
they are now within the guidelines of the code.
Karen will talk to you for just a moment about that
too.

You do have in your packets two maps, Exhibit D and Exhibit E, that do explain these two situations and show the new boundaries that we're

proposing.

MS. COTTON: And Ward 72, Precinct E, we have a precinct that is currently listed as having 1,560 voters. That's all voters not just active voters. We have 1,334 active voters. But we felt that with the pending increase in voter registration at this General Election that it was to our advantage to go ahead and split this precinct now.

So we're proposing that we split the precinct along I-270 and make one precinct north of I-270 and one precinct south of I-270. The one that would be north of I-270 would have 876 total voters. The one south of I-270 would have 684 voters. We would create a new precinct there of Ward 72, Precinct G.

The second precinct that is growing quite a bit is in the area of Grove City out around Pinnacle Golf Course and Buckeye Parkway; a lot of development out in that area. The current registration figures are 1,526 total voters; 1,357 are active.

We're proposing using census boundary lines to break the precinct using Buckeye Parkway and several of the streets through the Creekside

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subdivision, making it 3B precinct with the remainder of 879 voters, and the 3H precinct, the new precinct, as 647 voters. Pinnacle Golf Course is the area that we expect the most growth in that area.
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In both of these instances most likely we will create, say if they are currently a LID 3, meaning there are three precincts in the location, the addition of another precinct, these folks who already have been voting at the existing polling place we would simply change the name of the LID to a LID 4 or a LID 5 to accommodate the extra precinct that would be assigned to that location.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: As Karen said, these do conform with census geography, so they are okay by Ohio law and requirements that precinct boundaries do match census geography. Any questions for Karen on these?

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: How many precincts do we have all together?

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Excuse me?

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: How many precincts

does that get us to?

    four or five years old and are showing wear and tear,

    and with technology upgrades, et cetera, we do have

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some coverage area problems with the current phones that we have.

So we have talked with Sprint who is our current provider on this, also a provider -- county provider of cell technology.

And do we have somebody here from Sprint today? If you would come forward. We do have a representative from Sprint today. You do have, in your packets, a proposal that was put together by the folks at Sprint to help us replace — to help us replace the phones we currently have.

MR. RICE: Yes.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Welcome. If you'd identify yourselves for the members of the Board, that would be great.

MR. RICE: My name is Bob Rice. I'm the account manager to the Franklin County Board. For the better part of five or six years we've been your provider. Vonda Dilley, my colleague, is the account executive dealing with the elections board. She put the proposal together.

We got called about a week ago and they had mentioned that there's more of a defined need for texting. This particular phone that they've selected

will help them deal with the texting. There's a keyboard on the device. It's a very simple phone to use. We think it will be suited to the population that tends to do the volunteer work at the precincts.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: One of the things, as you all probably know, we have an automated phone system here at the Board of Elections that we can use to send out, you know, blast voice mails to the polling locations if we need to on Election Day.

We felt that also having the capability of doing a follow-up text message of some sort, too, would be beneficial to us. Just the more ways we can potentially get in touch with our voting location managers we felt all the better. And with needing to do an upgrade of our technology anyways, we did ask the folks from Sprint to provide us with the ability to do, you know, blast text messages out, et cetera, if we need to also.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So who gets -- who works with the phone on Election Day?

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: We provide one for each voting location. The voting location manager gets it. We then communicate with them via

this office or out at the warehouse. We got some additional phones in here for our warehouse staff and the folks that are on the phone all day on Election Day that could communicate with the polling locations if we need to.

BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Did we get any credit for all the phones turned in?

MR. RICE: As a matter of fact -
DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: I think you wanted to talk a little bit about that.

MR. RICE: We actually have an alternative deployment of those devices. In fact, we'd like to keep them in the same location. There are other activities going on dealing with emergency response activities for the county.

With the Sheriff's office being right across the street from the warehouse where these particular phones are located, the Board of Elections has offered to keep them under lock and key in the event that there might be a need for those devices.

Keep in mind, all devices, the new devices that you're acquiring and the devices we'd like to have on hand in a cache to use in an emergency circumstance, none of these are being

billed to the county unless usage occurs.

It's a very unique type of a solution that Sprint is offering only to Franklin County, but it's been in place for six years and we'd like to continue to keep it the same way and it seems suitable to the staff.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: We only pay for time that we use. We don't have a monthly service contract or anything like that that we pay on a regular basis. We only pay for any usage time that we actually are using the phones which is a --

BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Did you say we had coverage problems?

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: With some of the old ones. But we've worked with Sprint, we've actually done some testing out at some of the locations that we had problems with in the past to ensure --

BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: A new phone will help the coverage?

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Yes, with the coverage area, yes.

Thank you very much for being here. We appreciate it.

Now we'll go ahead and bring Karen back up again. As I said, I kind of put these in the wrong order here. Now we got her up and we can keep her up for the rest of the meeting.

Per directive of the Secretary of State's office we are required to do a new provisional ballot envelope this year in an effort to bring uniformity throughout the State. The Secretary of State's office has developed a new provisional ballot envelope.

We were able to use some remaining supplies that we had on our -- the provisional ballot we have been using through the primary, but now it is required for us to move to this new provisional ballot envelope for the General Election.

And Karen put out a bid for that for providing us a new provisional ballot envelope, so I'll let Karen discuss what we did and what our recommendation is.

MS. COTTON: First off, we evaluated what

our needs were going to be for provisional ballot envelopes and we estimated that we needed 100,000 of the yellow provisional envelope to be prepared for this November's election, and also 25,000 of the blue provisional envelope, being one press change difference on the blue one inasmuch as it has a unique sequence number on it to use for the ADA provisional.

Given the amount that we paid for the provisional envelopes in past elections, we expected this charge for the provisional envelopes to be in excess of \$30,000. So we put together a bid. We sent it to three printers. The three printers were Dayton Legal Blank, West-Camp Printing, and Haman Midwest.

We received a bid back from Dayton Legal Blank with the bid bond as required in the amount of \$14,390. We received a quotation from Haman Midwest for \$11,745; however, there was no bid bond included in that response. And West-Camp printing contacted me via e-mail and said that they were not going to be bidding the project since they had not been able to secure a bid bond.

So the recommendation is that we award

the bid to Dayton Legal Blank in the amount of \$14,390 for 125,000 provisional ballot envelopes for the General Election. We will also be using those envelopes for the August Special Election.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Any questions?

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Karen, remind me,

again, the difference between the ADA and the blue
and yellow?

MS. COTTON: The yellow one, they get a paper ballot and they put the voted ballot in the yellow envelope. The ADA provisional is someone who is unable to cast their ballot on paper, either through manual dexterity or other problems, and they vote through their ballot on the voting machine, but it's coded. We use the unique code that is printed on the envelope to code the ballot which holds that ballot in suspension that has to be released then after the Election once the validity of the provisional envelope has been determined, so we have many fewer of those ADAs.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Any other questions?

BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, I
move that the Board authorize the Director and Deputy

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Director to enter into a service contract with Dayton Legal Blank in the amount of $14,390 for the purchase of provisional ballot envelopes.
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DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Do I have a second on that?

BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: Second.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: All those in

favor, say aye.

BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Motion passes.

Now we have Karen up here to stay with us a moment.

MS. COTTON: I'm going to ask Carla to bring some books up to show you. We have the VOTR Books which we provide all the supplies to the precinct election officials. We have some paperwork that's included in that book. We have the PEBs that we put into the book that the polling officials will use to open the polls, close the polls, activate the machine throughout the day. At the end of the day when they remove the flash memory from the voting machine, that goes in that book also, as well as the paper tapes.

And what we were finding, we have 483 of

these coming in on any given election, and we're handling those and different people are handling them and what we have experienced recently is a lot of destruction and just wear and tear on the books that are causing them to fall apart and we're losing track of things, not to the point that we've not been able to find them, but we're just not happy with the security there. So we are going to have to replace several components of those books if we don't replace them.

So we went and visited a few of the other counties in the state that use the same voting system we do, and we found a company in Bellville, Ohio that does some custom work and we basically told them what we wanted to do with it and they designed this book for us, and what it allows us to do, instead of the looseleaf binders, it allows us a place to put PEBs.

BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Oh, my gosh.

MS. COTTON: So if we have a precinct that has four PEBs, we would put spacers in here. We're proposing that we eliminate the one side for the smaller LIDs, so they would just make a cover for this. We could still have our paper tapes in a compartment. We could still use our flash memories

here and have the ring binder to put whatever documents that we wanted here.

On these here, if we had, say, a precinct that had 10 flashes because they had 10 machines, we could put something in the other so that once they open this book on election night they could see very, very quickly that every space is filled either with a flash or a piece of paper that says this is blank intentionally.

BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: That's nice.

MS. COTTON: So the proposal you have before you -- I would love to get everything which would cost about \$40,000 for the whole county, but we can live with a partial installment of these for the cost of about \$21,000, with the expectation to finish out the county, early next year, with another purchase of about \$19,000.

MS. COTTON: It's just a little more than half now. It would be, like, 21,000 now and 19,000 at the beginning of the year.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Do they know you're likely to go back to them so they're giving the best

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deal possible on the whole?
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MS. COTTON: Yes.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: We did discuss that with them.

BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: Do we feel comfortable with next year's budget? Have we already started work on that?

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: We have just begun working on that, but we will definitely -
BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: Because I know it's a lot smaller in that off year.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: -- include in there the means by which to do this.

MS. COTTON: And it might be one of those things where we can reassess after the General Election at the end of November, first of December, before the books actually close, of getting the additional ones ordered.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Yeah, you may, from practical experience, have suggestions to make after putting this through its paces.
