4	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: I would like to call
5	the Franklin County Board of Elections meeting to
6	order. I'll do the roll call.
7	Kimberly Marinello?
8	BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Here.
9	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Zachary Manifold?
10	BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: Here.
11	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Douglas Preisse?
12	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Here.
13	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: And Brad Sinott?
14	BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Here.
15	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All here and accounted
16	for.
17	The first item on the agenda is the
18	approval to transfer money to the Sheriff's office
19	for election security which includes all three of our
20	locations, here at 280, the Vote Center, and at the
21	warehouse. And, actually, this starts this
22	afternoon. They're going to do a bomb sweep at 5:00
23	and after that we are on. The election will be all
24	set and ready to go for tomorrow morning.

1	Because of budgetary reasons we had to
2	transfer the money over to the Sheriff's office as
3	opposed to how we've done it in the past and so we
4	need to this Board needs to authorize us to move
5	\$130,000 from our account to, I guess, the Sheriff's
6	account.
7	DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: If any of the
8	members do have any questions, Gary Collins and Zak
9	Talarek are here from OMB if you do have any
10	questions about this. This does include for
11	24-hour-a-day, seven-day-a-week patrol of the Early
12	Vote Center to make sure that location is secure at
13	all times.
14	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And Bill suggested,
15	this is different than what we've done in the past,
16	so I'll ask the staff here how we've done it in the
17	past and why we're doing it differently, and if we
18	need to turn to our friends from is it OMB or OBM?
19	MR. TALAREK: OMB.
20	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: OMB.
21	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: In the past the
22	Sheriff would just submit the bill to, I believe, the
23	commissioners or to whomever and the bill would be
24	paid.

1	Now they since we're the party that
2	wants to hire them to do the protection, it has to
3	come out of our budget now. So that's, from my
4	understanding, the process, and it's a very naive
5	understanding of it, but in order to make it happen,
6	we do have the money to make it happen and also this
7	will include, if we have to, if whatever the last
8	three days are, so it includes that, so it includes
9	everything that needs to be included and it's
10	something that we really don't have the luxury of not
11	doing.
12	BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Bill, is this
13	expenditure within the current budget?
14	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Yes, sir.
15	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I guess I believe all
16	that, but since you've suggested yourself it's
17	different, I would invite a representative of OMB
18	just to give us 30 seconds, if you wouldn't mind, on
19	why we're doing it. Is it just the tight budgets?
20	MR. TALAREK: I think that way and also
21	too
22	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I'm sorry, we're
23	creating a public record, if you wouldn't mind
24	MR. TALAREK: Zak Talarek with the Office

1	of Management and Budget. One benefit of doing it
2	this way is that we don't duplicate the expense.
3	Rather than having the Sheriff incur the expenditure,
4	invoice you, and then you processing the invoice;
5	once we move the appropriation, on your side it's
6	done and then the Sheriff's office has the budget to
7	pay for the overtime expenditures. So it's kind of
8	not a duplicating effort this way with the Sheriff
9	incurring the overtime personnel expense, submitting
10	an invoice to you, and then having your office
11	process the invoice and reimburse the Sheriff's
12	office.
13	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: All right. Thanks.
14	BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: Mr. Chairman, I
15	move that the Board authorize the Director and Deputy
16	Director to transfer \$130,000 from the Board of
17	Elections' budget to the Franklin County Sheriff for
18	security during the 2012 General Election.
19	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second?
20	BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.
21	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor,
22	say aye.
23	BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.
24	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: The motion carries.

The next item on the agenda is the Election Day machine allocation formula. You'll see in your packet, Exhibit A, we had to make minor changes in this. I don't know if we highlighted the changes.

6 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: We did not 7 highlight the changes in here, but because of the 8 number of absentee requests that have come in so far, 9 we are permitted, according to the Secretary of 10 State's office, to use that in our allocation 11 formula, so this was done last week. That does 12 include the number of absentee requests.

Obviously, since we did the allocation a month or two ago, we've obviously gotten in a number of registrations also that have moved up the number of registered voters per voting location, but we're able to subtract out the number of people who have requested an absentee ballot be mailed to them.

This formula that is presented to you in Exhibit A allocates machines currently at one machine for every 165 registered voters, which is better than the 175, one machine for every 175 voters that is prescribed by the Secretary of State's office. So we are already under that threshold, even with using --

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we've got 100 voting machines up at the Early Vote
Center.

3 So this allocation actually, even though 4 it's already better than what we need to do, will get 5 even better as the number of absentee requests go up, 6 as the number of people vote up at the Early Vote 7 Center, et cetera. So we're already better than 8 where we need to be and it will only get better. 9 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: But the effect of this reallocation is that we're reducing machines in some 10 11 places where we've already reduced the number of

12 voters per machine.

13 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Obviously, if there had been a spike in registration, more machines 14 15 are going there. If there's been a huge number of absentee requests for some reason, we may not need as 16 17 many machines in that location. But across the board 18 in general it's allocated -- it's gotten us a better 19 ratio of machines to registered voters, which is a 20 good thing for us.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I don't remember the old number, the old temporary number, but I see 4,414 machines; that's roughly the same.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: It was 4,430 on

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1	the last one. We will find additional usage for the
2	16, between that one and this one, that will make
3	this even better as we move forward.
4	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: And I might add that
5	there will still be a minimum of three machines per
6	location, regardless of the size of the location. So
7	we kept that the same as we did in the current
8	formula, the existing formula.
9	BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: How many machines
10	are actually being moved from the original allocation
11	because of the study of absentee requests?
12	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: My calculation says
13	16, I think.
14	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Sixteen.
15	BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Just 16
16	county-wide.
17	DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: That's correct.
18	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay.
19	BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Is the Board ready
20	for a motion?
21	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Yes. Oh, wait a
22	minute.
23	BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: Is there a
24	minimum? Does anyone know what the minimum ratio is?
I	ADMOTDONIC C OVER THE CALMER OF A COLOR OF A CALL

1 I guess 165 is the maximum, right? 2 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: 175. 3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: We have to do it 4 at least 1 to 175. This ratio right here is at 1 to 5 165. 6 BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: Okay. 7 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: But we have to have 8 three machines at a polling location. 9 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Not necessarily. We set that. 10 11 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Oh. 12 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: We set a minimum 13 of three at any location. Even the smallest location we have, as you can see on here, Valley View Village 14 15 Hall only has 409 registered voters, 33 have already 16 requested an absentee ballot, so we only have 375 17 people, we're going to go ahead and allocate three 18 machines there anyway. We set the formula at a 19 minimum of three. We set the maximum, you know, at a 20 hundred or something like that; we're nowhere near 21 that at any location around the county. 22 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. 23 BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: I move that the Board adopt the revised voting machine allocation 24

1 formula compiled by the Board staff for the 2 November 6, 2012 General Election found in Exhibit A. 3 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second? BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: I'll second. 4 5 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor, 6 say aye. 7 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 8 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: The next item on the 9 agenda, since we have all these holidays coming right during the November election cycle, we are -- our 10 11 employees will have to work Veterans Day. We'll be 12 right in the middle of the provisional vote, 13 tabulation counting period, and we normally have all hands on deck, we have to do a lot of research and a 14 15 whole bunch of Board work in order to get those done 16 by the 17th of November, so we would like to move the 17 November 11th holiday to the Monday before Christmas 18 which would be December the 24th. BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Monday, November 19 20 12th or 11th? 21 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: No; the 11th. We move 2.2 the --23 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Sunday is the 11th. DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Veterans Day this 24

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1 year, November 11th, falls on a Sunday. 2 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Oh, okay. 3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: And the county 4 holiday will be on Monday, November 12th, but either 5 day we're still going to be in the midst of checking 6 provisional ballots. 7 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And we have done this 8 kind of --9 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Yes. 10 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: -- accommodation 11 before, and the timeliness of this happens to be, 12 we're still digesting a lot of material from the presidential election. 13 14 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Yes. 15 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: That's correct. 16 BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Will the Board 17 observe the Columbus Day holiday on October the 8th? 18 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: No. At a meeting prior to this we moved that holiday to right 19 20 before -- the day before Thanksgiving. 21 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Day after 22 Thanksgiving. 23 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Day after Thanksgiving. 24

14 1 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Day after 2 Thanksgiving. 3 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Which is what we -- we 4 have been doing this for as long as I can remember. 5 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: We did it earlier 6 in the year with President's Day, I think, because we 7 were leading up to the primary election then, so we 8 did it with President's Day. 9 BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Is the 4th of July still on July 4th here? 10 11 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Yes, sir. 12 (Laughter.) 13 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: No, I think one time we moved that -- no. I'm kidding. 14 15 (Laughter.) 16 BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Just don't buy 17 any presents for anybody. 18 (Laughter.) 19 BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, I 20 move that the Board office be closed to the public on 21 Monday, November 12th, 2012, but that employees come 22 to work for their regular schedule. For working a 23 holiday, the Board will instead close on Monday, 24 December 24th.

1	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second?
2	BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Second.
3	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor,
4	say aye.
5	BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.
6	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Motion carries.
7	The next item on the agenda is a mailing
8	to voters who have not voted an absentee ballot or
9	who have not voted at the Early Vote Center.
10	Possibly a week or two weeks before the election we
11	would like to send a notice to those individuals,
12	advising them as to where their polling location will
13	be for Election Day, and we would send that out the
14	week before so that folks can get it so that they
15	will know where their voting location is.
16	And I forgot the cost. I don't have the
17	cost in my head for that.
18	DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Well, there's a
19	couple of things with the cost of this. We have
20	gotten a quote on we estimated that this would be
21	around 450,000 pieces of mail. We got a quote for
22	around \$22,000, I think it was 22,700, somewhere in
23	that neighborhood for the printing.
24	The question that still remained was

1	exactly what rate this mailing would mail at and that
2	is a question I haven't gotten an answer, a clear
3	answer to yet, to have this more, you know, authorize
4	the Director and I to proceed with this. I've heard
5	anywhere from 11.8 cents to 35 cents a piece to mail
6	them. Well, obviously, on a 450,000 piece mailing
7	that's quite a difference in expenditure there, but
8	the cost of producing it was about \$22,700 for the
9	printing of such a mailing.
10	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: In the estimate of
11	450,000, give or take, I take it is based on our
12	estimate of turnout and Early Vote backed out of it,
13	and then it's not a household, it's an individualized
14	number as well.
15	DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: That's correct.
16	That was based on looking at all active voters in the
17	file, minus anybody who had requested an absentee
18	ballot by mail or had come to the vote center as of
19	the date we would cut it off. Obviously, we need to
20	cut it off at some date.
21	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. So it is active
22	voters; it is not likely voters.
23	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: No.
24	DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: No.

1	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: It's modeled on hard
2	data not on estimates of who may or may not vote.
3	And you were helping me remember earlier
4	that in the primary all voters in Franklin County at
5	that time were sent a reminder postcard of where they
6	were to vote in the primary.
7	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: That's correct.
8	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Which is the same for
9	the general, unless we change it, which we did in
10	some precincts, a handful of precincts, or they moved
11	or they're a new registrant, but in each of those
12	three cases they still would have gotten a reminder
13	card; is that right?
14	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: That's correct.
15	DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: That's correct.
16	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: And the theory behind
17	this, too, since that was a primary election, most
18	folks probably didn't bother to look at it because we
19	sent it out during the primary election cycle. The
20	thought behind this was that we would send another
21	out to remind folks one more time where the voting
22	location is for the general election.
23	BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Bear with me for a
24	moment because I'm learning the subject. So all

1 450,000 voters who would receive this written 2 notification have already received a written 3 notification this year as to where they vote. It's 4 going to be a second mailing. 5 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Yeah. 6 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Basically. But those 7 who voted absentee will not get it. So we will back 8 out everybody who actually voted an absentee ballot 9 or showed up at the vote center which is the same thing as an absentee ballot. 10 11 BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: And we know now 12 that printing would be around 22,000, but there's a 13 big cost range we're looking at on the mailing. DIRECTOR ANTHONY: That's correct. 14 And 15 we don't know what that number will be. We estimated 16 about 450,000 out of almost a little over 700,000 17 registered voters. So that number, I have no idea 18 where that number may end up at. It may end up being 19 500,000, it may end up being 350,000 depending on how 20 many folks take advantage of early voting. 21 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And the later we do 22 it, the better we are from a cost standpoint because 23 we're continually backing people off the roll because they've showed up to vote early or they requested a 24

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1 absentee ballot. 2 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Right. 3 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Right. And it won't 4 be effective unless we send it out probably a week 5 before Election Day. 6 BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Do you think 7 that's enough time? 8 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: It should be enough 9 I mean it's something that we don't think time. 10 should be sent out in two weeks. It should be sent 11 out closer to November 6th. 12 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Remind me, too, I 13 should know this, but in our electronic advertisement that's out there, are we reminding voters how they 14 15 can access the website to find out where their 16 polling location is? 17 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Yes, sir. 18 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So there's some of that information. 19 20 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: You can go on our 21 webpage and you can do a number of things. You can 22 find out where your voting location is, you can find out driving directions to the Early Vote Center. 23 Those are the two major --24

1 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Track the status 2 of your absentee ballot --3 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Right. 4 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: -- to make sure 5 we got your request, when we mailed your ballot out, 6 when your ballot came back. Those are all things 7 that are trackable on our website. 8 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: You're suggesting we 9 have a further discussion which we're having. Nothing to vote on today. 10 11 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: No, I don't have the 12 cost, but it will be something that we probably 13 should -- we may have to have a special meeting because if we're going to do it, we ought to decide 14 15 to do it and figure out what the cost would be. 16 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: All right. Good 17 discussion. Good questions. Need more information. 18 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: The next item on the 19 agenda and I'm going to let Dana talk about this 20 because you had the conversation. 21 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: And, again, if 22 any of the members of the Board have questions on 23 this, Zak Talarek from OMB can help us out. Zak, correct me if anything I'm about to say isn't 24

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accurate. 1 2 But due to some changes in the law, 3 because the Board of Elections is its own entity, and 4 we opt to use the health benefits program prescribed 5 by the county, we have to go into this program 6 agreement, this cooperative program agreement, and 7 formalize our already existing relationship with the 8 county for providing health benefits to our 9 employees. 10 So due to some law changes at the federal 11 level? 12 MR. TALAREK: No. 13 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: No. MR. TALAREK: This was actually --14 15 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Zak Talarek. 16 MR. TALAREK: The General Assembly, last 17 year, amended the statute that the county's benefits 18 are offered under, Section 9.833 of the Revised Code, 19 that requires a political subdivision that 20 participates to have a written agreement. 21 And working with Nick Soulas at the 22 Prosecutor's office, it was determined that the Board 23 of Elections would qualify as a political subdivision as part of your ability to have contracting 24

22 1 authority. There's a couple of other agencies at the 2 county as well that are going through this as well as 3 some outside entities that participate in the 4 county's benefits cooperative. DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: And this is 5 6 basically formalizing what we already do with the 7 county. 8 MR. TALAREK: And have been doing for 9 years. 10 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: -- and have been 11 doing for years; formalizing it. 12 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: There's no change in 13 the --14 MR. TALAREK: None at all. 15 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: In the operations and this is something Nick's handled --16 17 MR. ANDERSON: Correct. 18 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: -- not you, Harold. 19 MR. ANDERSON: Although, I handled it 20 when I was with SWACO, we had the same issues with 21 the county, so I've been on both sides of the coin on 2.2 that. 23 BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Counsel is 24 agreeable to the form of the agreement?

1 MR. ANDERSON: Yes. 2 BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: And there's no 3 substantive change. CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Any questions or 4 5 comments further from the Board? 6 BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: Mr. Chairman, I 7 move that the Board authorize the Director and Deputy 8 Director to execute the Intergovernmental Agreement 9 with the Franklin County Administrator for the Board to be part of the Franklin County Cooperative Health 10 11 Benefits Program. 12 BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Second. 13 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor, 14 say aye. 15 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 16 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: It was seconded by 17 Kim. 18 The next item on the agenda, you have in your packet a copy of our budget update for your 19 20 perusal; take a look at it. It's a lot to look at 21 right now. You can kind of look at it and at our 22 next meeting you can ask questions. 23 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: We're not getting an update, we're merely looking at --24

1	DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: That's correct,
2	Mr. Chairman. It was just to provide you this. At
3	this point we still have about \$3.3 million of what
4	was allocated to us this year. We are doing, I
5	think, a fairly good job at this point of staying
6	within our budget. We are into our high season now,
7	though, obviously, where we do have much more staff
8	on board and things of that sort, but we feel
9	confident that we'll get through the rest of the year
10	with the money we have allocated to us, but this was
11	for your perusal.
12	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I didn't get one.
13	DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: You didn't get
14	one?
15	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Oh, you didn't get
16	one?
17	DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: We will get you
18	one, Mr. Chairman.
19	BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: I may be sitting
20	on the Chairman's copy.
21	DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Ah.
22	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: There it is. Okay.
23	I've got it. Good.
24	DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: I know I passed

1 out four of them to somebody. 2 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Very good. 3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: If we might also 4 just quickly, we delivered absentee voting machines 5 up to the Early Vote Center today. There are a 6 hundred machines ready to go for tomorrow and the 7 beginning of early voting. We had a very good event 8 on Friday to unveil the Early Vote Center. 9 BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: How many press representatives were present for that? 10 11 DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Five or six. We 12 had all three TV stations, The Columbus Dispatch, WOSU. Anybody else on Friday? 13 MR. PISCITELLI: On Friday, all three TV 14 15 stations, The Dispatch, WCBE, and WOSU radio. 16 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Do we have quests in 17 the parking lot already? 18 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: We will this evening. 19 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And the Sheriff 20 knows --21 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Yes. 22 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: -- and it's going to 23 be safe and nobody's going to be --24 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: I was informed that at

1	5:00 there will be some port-o-johns delivered and
2	about, I was told, 100 to 150 folks would be camping
3	out to be the first in line tomorrow morning. So I'm
4	going to go by there after I leave here and check on
5	it to see if in fact we have 100 campers out there
6	this evening. I'm not camping out.
7	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: You know, our concern
8	is for their safety, but everybody else's if they're
9	sleeping on the parking lot ground
10	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Yes.
11	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: what have you.
12	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Our
13	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: The Sheriff, when do
14	they begin?
15	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Today.
16	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So they'll be there
17	through the night.
18	DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Right. They will be
19	there 24/7 after the bomb sweep. They will not leave
20	until the polls close.
21	BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Wow.
22	DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: We have escorts
23	every night that will bring our staff, for any paper
24	ballots that are done at the early vote site, to

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1 escort them down so that those can be secured here at 2 our office every evening. So we will have very 3 strong security at the Early Vote Center. 4 One other very quick thing. We are on 5 track for tomorrow with the beginning of absentee 6 voting tomorrow. All absentee ballot applications 7 that we have received in at this point for mail 8 absentee balloting have been processed and will be 9 going in the mail tomorrow. 10 Our staff has been working around the 11 clock to make sure that every request that has come 12 in up to this time is going out tomorrow. So 13 tomorrow we'll be dropping about 120,000 pieces of mail with ballots on them. 14 15 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Good. 16 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: So it begins. 17 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: All right. 18 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: And just so you guys know that I multitask, I painted the 100-foot line --19 20 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: What happened to that 21 painter you found? 22 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: That guy --23 (Laughter.) CHAIRMAN PREISSE: He didn't show up? 24

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1 (Laughter.) 2 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: I panicked and decided 3 I better get out there and help paint the line. 4 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Good work. 5 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: So it's not going to 6 be perfect, but it will be yellow. 7 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Is it a little closer 8 on the Democrat side? 9 (Laughter.) 10 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Kind of waves. 11 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Very well. Is that 12 it? DIRECTOR ANTHONY: That's all we have, 13 Mr. Chairman. Adjournment is in order. 14 15 BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, I move to adjourn. 16 17 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second? 18 BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: Second. DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor? 19 20 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 21 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: We stand adjourned. 22 (Thereupon, the proceedings concluded at 23 3:49 p.m.) 24
