1 Tuesday Morning Session, 2 November 20, 2012. 3 4 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Good morning, 5 everyone. I'd like to call the Franklin County Board 6 of Elections meeting to order and do the roll call. 7 Kim Marinello. 8 BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Here. 9 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Zachary Manifold. 10 BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: Here. 11 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Douglas Preisse. 12 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Here. 13 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Brad Sinnott. 14 BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Yes. 15 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: We're all here and 16 accounted for, Mr. Chairman. 17 The first item on the agenda is the 18 remaking of absentee ballots. I'll let Todd Wedekind 19 explain what that process will be. 20 MR. WEDEKIND: We have 260 absentee 21 ballots and 76 Election Day ballots that we had to 22 remake due to things such as this (indicating). 23 These are some examples of the kind of ballots we 24 have to remake because these don't go through the

scanners. So those are remade, and then the Election Days.
```

Sample of some of the Election Days, the problem we run into is when the poll workers tear off the ballots from the stubs, they tear off quite a bit of the ballot with it and that part of the ballot is required to scan. So we have to remake those ballots as well, and for the official that's what we have, 260 absentees and 76 Election Days.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: And those will be remade in teams of Democrats and Republicans?

MR. WEDEKIND: That's correct.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Any questions?

BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: We have the agreement of bipartisan staff that there are 260 absentee ballots and 76 Election Day ballots that need to be made?

MR. WEDEKIND: That's correct, yes.

BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Then I move that the Board authorize the staff to remake 260 absentee ballots and 76 Election Day paper-by-choice ballots and that these remade ballots be tabulated and included in the official canvass.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second?

1 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor.

BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All right. And then the next item on the agenda is provisional ballots.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Wait a minute.

Sorry, Bill, excuse me for just one moment.

We do have two absentee ballots that our teams looked over and I guess could not come to a determination on that we are bringing to the four of you today to make a determination on.

Is that correct, Todd?

MR. WEDEKIND: Yes. We have two ballots and we'll pass them around. These are for you guys. This is a situation where they filled in the write-in bubble and then wrote in a presidential candidate, but you guys have to determine the intent on these.

It's not a double-bubble situation where they filled in the bubble for the candidate and then the write-in bubble and write it in, they just wrote in the write-in bubble and they wrote in a candidate for president. So the Board has to make a determination on those, whether to count those, what the voter intent actually is on those.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: What's the difference between 20545 and 29751? You just haven't processed that many?

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: There's a number of them that we know our recommendation will be to reject them, but, because we have this 2,438 from other counties that we still don't know yet, we know that 20,545 are the ones we've examined and we believe to be valid and would ask the Board for authorization to determine the validity on those ballots.

And then at our meeting tomorrow afternoon that we will have we will present to you our findings on the remainder of the ballots once we hear back from the counties in question that we can determine additional validity. Obviously, a vast number of those will be valid once we hear from the other counties, we just can't make that determination yet.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Is that just the checking registration status?

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: Checking registration and making sure that they did not, in fact, vote in the other county either. So at

tomorrow's meeting we will bring before you the validation of additional provisionals which will then give us the total count, and then we will also ask for approval on the rejection for the ones that are needing to be rejected once we have that final number available.

But to get us along in the process we are asking for you to validate the 20,545 that our bipartisan team has deemed valid at this time.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: And you saw the table set up on the other side of that room there. Once we get the okay, we'll fill those tables and start extracting ballots.

BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: Renee, do you have any -- I know we'll have the final numbers tomorrow. Do you have any preliminary numbers on maybe the top couple categories for rejection out of the 27,300 or something that are done with the 2400 remaining? Do you have --

MS. KLCO: Our biggest category are people who are not registered in the state.

BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: Is it a large -- do you have any number on how many of the 27,000 that you have?

1 MS. KLCO: About 2700. Our second 2 biggest category would be voted in the wrong precinct 3 and the wrong polling location. BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: How big is that? 5 Do you have a number for that? 6 MS. KLCO: Just over 1800. 7 BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: Okay. 8 MR. WEDEKIND: So in accordance with 9 Secretary of State directives we will not -- we will not begin counting anything until after you have 10 11 determined the validity of all or rejection of all 12 provisional ballots, but in an effort to allow us to begin the process with 20,000 of them, we wanted to 13 go ahead and get your authorization on the validity 14 15 of those 20,000 today so that we can begin opening them and scanning them in, but we will not tabulate 16 17 them until such time as we have the final number. 18 BOARD MEMBER MANIFOLD: Mr. Chairman, I move that the Board accept the staff recommendation 19 20 for the validation of 20,545 provisional ballots as 21 submitted. 22 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second? 23 BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Yes.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor?

BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: So holler down the hallway and tell them to get started.

MS. KLCO: We also have a total of 193 NEOCH ballots, those are people who voted in the right location but got the wrong precinct or the wrong ballot.

MR. WEDEKIND: It's the last item on the agenda.

MS. KLCO: And they will also need to be extracted and remade.

MR. WEDEKIND: Because they are the correct polling location but the wrong precinct but fall under the NEOCH provision, we know that these are ballots that will need to be remade because we can only count the ballots — the races for which they are actually eligible to vote.

So we know that the ballot that's in there will need to be remade in some way because of this exception, so that's why we're asking for authorization to move forward proactively with the remainder of those 193 ballots.

BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, I move that the Board authorize the staff to remake 193

provisional ballots that were cast in the correct polling location but the wrong precinct. These ballots shall be remade in such a way that they can only be counted for those contests for which the voter was eligible to vote.
