The next item on the agenda is we have to do a post-election audit. Karen Cotton is here to walk us through the procedure to do the post-election audit. We're looking at having the audit start on December the 17th, so we have to make that motion and then we have to roll the dice and pick — roll the dice on locations and pick which county offices that we're going to include in the audit, but I'll let Karen walk us through that. Karen Cotton.

MS. COTTON: More noteworthy than the official audit is the fact that we have no official recounts, mandated recounts where the percentage of win or loss is within one-half of 1 percent. So that's one of the reasons we were kind of going for the 17th of December, anticipating that there was a possibility of having one or two recounts that were mandatory, but we do not have any; all of the results got greater in number.

We have three ten-sided dice here and I'm going to throw the dice unless one of the Board

members would like to throw the dice. The red dice is the number 100, then the white is the second digit, and then the third dice. We have 475 locations in Franklin County. So we have an Excel document on the computer here, we have the SMART Board hooked up.

As we throw the dice, anything between 100 -- 1 and 475 is a valid throw. Jeff is going to input that number, it's going to give us the LID number that's associated with that precinct designation or that number designation, voting location designation that we have. It's going to bring up the public count in that precinct and it's going to give us a running total of the percent.

We have to do an audit of 5 percent of the total votes cast. Of course with the higher number of votes being cast at this election, we audit a higher number of these.

So would you like to throw the dice or -DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: If I might

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: The next item on the agenda, as you all know, we've been looking for several years to consolidate our facility and move from this location which is getting awfully crowded for us. As you know, last year we rented out a building across the street for the PEO staff and we have a warehouse that we also rent over on Alum Creek Drive. This location, we've outgrown it.

Two years ago we had the Commissioners look into finding us a location where we could combine all of our operations. They put a bid out on the street if you guys recall. Three companies responded to the bids.

We have started running out of time. The 2016 election is creeping on us pretty fast. So we changed the -- what we put the bid out for to just include the Early Vote Center. And so the Morse -- 1700 Morse Road site won the bid for the Early Vote Center and we put the Early Vote Center out at the Morse Road site. And that was one of the sites that was part of the original three sites that we had

looked at for the combined move if you all kind of recall.

2.

What the next steps are, we still need a location and we probably — and we should be looking to move before the next presidential election and the only way that can happen is for us to send a letter to the Commissioners, advising them that we are interested in moving, combining our operations and moving them into a better facility than this one.

Also, if you recall, the Commissioners did a usage study of all of their buildings and one of the things was that they wanted us out of this building as well because they wanted to expand the health department into this building.

And there was talk of us moving over into the new justice center, not the new one, but the old one, which is currently being renovated, it had a lot of asbestos and other stuff in it. And then that fell through because it would not be a good location for a vote place, the Board of Elections, because of our election cycle, we would pretty much tie up traffic, there would be nowhere to park, so we would have a lot of other issues, so that got thrown off the table too which is again why we started looking

for a facility.

And we chose the northeast corridor because we have done a lot of research and that corridor has about 60 percent of the voters in Franklin County, maybe a little bit more. And one of the things that we were looking at was what would be — how it would be perceived as the Early Vote Center.

We all think it went pretty well up there. It had the parking. Of course we've seen 75,000 folks come up there and the place did get packed, but had we — had that been our facility, we would have rearranged stuff a lot differently. There was still a lot of space in the back of that place and on the side of it.

So, you know, we need to move on this.

You know, now is the time to move on it. I fear that if we wait, then, you know, we will find ourselves in another position.

BOARD MEMBER MARINELLO: That's a long time for that building to be sitting there, waiting for us.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: So we cannot enter into a lease. We cannot buy a building. So we have

to direct the Commissioners to do what we would like them to do. At least do a study on it or at least help us out on this, that we're still interested in combining our operations.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Based on your conversations with -- who was it down there?

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: I spoke with Don Brown and Bill Flaherty.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: When we ask the

Commissioners to study whether 1700 Morse Road would

be a suitable location, what is your understanding

that we're actually asking them to do? To commission

an additional study that they, you know, on top of

that facility's use plan or the study that we did a

few years ago? I mean, what's your understanding of

what kind of study they would pursue and what kind of

ongoing input would we all have as that's developed

and analyzed and digested?

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: You know, I would like for them to pursue it. I have no idea what that building costs, you know, if it was to be purchased. I have no idea how they would go about, you know, that whole process of how the county does capital improvements. I mean, currently we're not paying any

rent here; this is a county-owned building.

So my thinking was that the county would look into the feasibility of purchasing that building because of what they want to do with this building and what they would like to do with us in the future. And in that corridor they already have Job and Family Services across the street, so that facility lends itself to making that corridor like a county magnet.

I don't know if "study" is the right word, but I would like for them to, it might be the right word, look into it and tell us if it's something that they want to do, if they want to pursue it. I mean, we cannot — the most we can do is ask them to pursue it and then see where they stand on it.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Uh-huh.

BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Bill, is there any other consolidation location under consideration?

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Not at this time.

Back in 2009 or maybe 2010, when we started looking at this, there was three sites and I have no idea where these sites are now in the scheme of things.

I do know that based on what we've seen at the Early Vote Center, that that site on Morse

Road would work better than the other two sites would, because the one site was the old Max and Erma's site and had we chose that site I think we would have had major traffic backups because that's a dead-end road that goes down to that site. I mean, we already blocked Morse Road off at the Early Vote Center.

I think the same thing would have happened to the Sinclair site too. That site may or may not still be, you know, available, but that site, too, had a real narrow road that went down to it and I think that would pose a problem with the type of traffic we've seen on the 32 days, 35 days of early voting.

Now, will this place hold our facility and early voting and the warehouse? I believe it could. It would have to be retrofitted for our needs like they did this building. They came in and gutted this place and designed it for the things that we needed and that takes a while. It took us two years to move here from Mound Street, by the time we talked about it, to the time we moved.

So is it ready for us to move in tomorrow? No, it's not. We wouldn't take the place

```
like it is. They would have to do some design work and have to reconfigure that place to meet all of our needs.
```

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: I don't mean to interrupt, Bill. I think it would be tough just at the old Kohl's store location to do us, the warehouse, and an Early Vote Center. I'm not sure how I see that would work. But if they, you know, I don't know what the option is on the other parcels that are in that same, you know, little plaza there. You know, whether that's available to the county or not as additional space too.

I mean, the footprint of the Kohl's store, as it stands right now, I think we could probably fit us and the warehouse in, but I think the that the, you know, the Early Vote Center, doing it there also would be extremely difficult as it stands right now without any additional space on there. But I think it could work for our location and the warehouse, but with the Early Vote Center, I mean, we filled the Early Vote Center on its own a few days without our operation being up there at all, really.

BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: I wonder if what we want to do is ask the Commissioners to study

venues that would allow for a consolidation of the Board's operations with consideration given to 1700 Morse Road as well as any other site that would be --

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Yeah, I think that will probably work. One of the things that concerns me is that if we make it, you know, we could be here in 2015 and still haven't done anything. I mean, we've been down that road already where we want to find a site to consolidate and then we had to change midstream because time started running out.

You know, the -- we're not sure what's going to happen with the election laws, whether we're going to be able to have multiple early vote centers. You know, there's some discussion that that could happen. If we could have multiple ones, that could be one site for early vote and then we could have a smaller site in another part of the city. So there's some stuff still up in the air that we don't have a crystal ball except we've been hearing it may or may not happen, but I don't know.

But what I know for sure is if we can't -- this place is not going to work for us because by 2016 even, and during the gubernatorial election,

we're going to be busting out the seams and there's no place else for us to move here. Already the tenants here are getting, I mean, we take up every available space in this building for a whole year preparing for an election.

I mean, we just received something from PFM that wanted to know if we could let up some of the space that we gobble up every year to allow some of the other tenants to have meeting space and we can't. We need the space because the election is just, I mean, we use up every bit of the place. And once we move 340 Gay Street back over here, we're going to take up even more space.

BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: When do you think that will happen, Bill?

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: I'm hoping that -- I would love to see them, the Commissioners, vote on it or at least say okay, we like that site, we're going to make it happen, and even if that happens I don't see us moving in until maybe '14. I think it will take us two years to get moved into a location.

BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: When do you think the current 340 East Gay operation can move back here?

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: They're moving back here January 1.

BOARD MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR WALCH: We're in the process of doing that now.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: We do -- we may or may not have an option on that property, but, you know, we may try to compress everyone here instead of leasing that again. But we still haven't, you guys have to make that determination if it looks like it's not going to work. We just need to take a -- we need to, you know, get it started.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I agree with that. I became convinced, a couple years -- three years ago when we first talked about it, it made sense to try to pull those three operations together.

The only thing I think we maybe ought to do though is I would recommend we amend this to say 1700 Morse Road and/or other locations. I think we ought to, you know, I could conceive in my head that that place, it seemed to me it did work for early voting quite well, traffic jams and all the other, we already had a post-election meeting about the site and how to improve logistics, et cetera.
