I'd like to call the Franklin County Board of Elections March meeting to order. 6 7 Roll call. 8 Kimberly Marinello. 9 MS. MARINELLO: Here. 10 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Gregory Haas. 11 MR. SINNOTT: Here. 15 16 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Mr. Chairman, we have 17 all four Board members present. 18 The first item on the agenda would be the approval of the minutes from our February 2 meeting. 19 MR. HAAS: I move that the Board approve 20 21 the minutes of the February 2, 2015, meeting of the 2.2 Franklin County Board of Elections as submitted. 2.3 MR. SINNOTT: Second. 24 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor say

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Motion carries.

The second item on the agenda, we have challenges before us.

Mr. Walch.

MR. WALCH: Ms. Bicking filed 26 voter registration challenges. Before you you have Exhibit A. Twenty-four of the 26 fall in sort of a category that we are familiar where we do believe that those are no longer usable addresses and that the voter is not residing there, and what we would do in those cases is mark the pollbook accordingly that that voter has to vote from a new address, vote a provisional ballot in a new precinct.

There are two, though, that you can see, that is, 1542 Arlington Avenue on your sheet, James and Helen Guy. This is a very unusual situation where 1542 Arlington Avenue, it's the same street in two different places, very odd situation. Mat Rushay is here. He might be able to describe it better, but these two voters, the 1542 Arlington Avenue address that James and Helen Guy reside at actually is in Marble Cliff. It has a Columbus mailing address, but

it actually is in Marble Cliff, and James and Helen Guy are both at 1542 Arlington Avenue and have been regular voters.

Matt, did I do okay?

MR. RUSHAY: That was right on the money. You did okay.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: I'm confused. What has provoked the examination of these two?

MR. WALCH: There does appear to be a vacant lot at 1542 Arlington Avenue in another section of Arlington Avenue, and it's all the same zip code.

MR. RUSHAY: It's two different zip codes, so Arlington Avenue goes across two different zip codes, and the address that James and Helen Guy live at is in the Marble Cliff zip code, and they are at that address and that is a recognizable address, so our recommendation on that one is no modification be made to that record whatsoever.

1542 Arlington Avenue in Columbus is a vacant lot?

1 we did sort of a conditional certification to the ballot, in checking the actual petitions, 3 Mr. Christian came up, I believe, about 31 signatures 4 short of the required 300 threshold. 5 As we do with every candidate who comes 6 up short on a petition, we went back through and 7 double and triple checked to see if there was 8 anywhere that signatures could be found, and we feel 9 very confident in checking those petitions Dr. Christian's petition came up short of the 300 10 11 required. 12 MR. HAAS: Has Dr. Christian been 13 notified? 14 MR. WALCH: He has. 15 MR. HAAS: So he chose not to come today? 16 MR. WALCH: That is correct. 17 MR. HAAS: I move that the Board deny 18 certification of Johannes Christian as a candidate 19 for Columbus Board of Education on the May 5, 2015, 20 Primary Election ballot due to his petition 21 containing an insufficient number of valid signatures 2.2 necessary to qualify for the ballot. 2.3 MR. SINNOTT: Second.

The next motion is purchase of some

laptops.

MR. WALCH: We are -- Carolyn Gorup is here. We have put out a bid -- correct, Carolyn? -- for purchase of ten laptop computers. The best bid was from MNJ Tech Public Sector, LLC. The amount was for \$16,700. Since that's above the \$10,000 threshold for Bill and I to approve anything, we ask the Board for approval to replace a number of laptops we currently have here at the office and that are quite old and cannot be upgraded out of Windows XP into what we're all using now, which is Windows 7. So it was time to replace a bunch of laptops, is what it was. This was the best bid that we got from the vendors that submitted bids.

MS. MARINELLO: I move that the Board authorize the director and deputy director to open a purchase order in the amount of \$16,700 to MNJ Tech Public Sector, LLC, for the purchase of ten new laptop computers.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second?

1 MR. SINNOTT: There is.

2 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor say

The next item on the agenda we have a maintenance agreement with ES&S for our electronic voting equipment, and it's that time again to ante up to ES&S to the tune of several hundred thousand dollars in order to keep the maintenance of the hardware where it needs to be.

MR. PREISSE: Tell us a little more about that.

MR. WALCH: This is an ongoing contract we have with ES&S, who is our vendor for our electronic touch screen voting devices, the Ivotronics. This is an ongoing hardware maintenance agreement that's been in a contract for a couple years and it calls for an extension. This amount that's on here is not an increase in any way from last year's. It's the exact same amount from the last time this was updated, so there was no increase in it either. With the aging equipment, we certainly feel this is necessary.

MR. HAAS: How many more years do we have on this?

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DIRECTOR ANTHONY: As long as we have the machines. We have an option of renewing this. I think these are four-year contracts.

MR. WALCH: This amount here is an ongoing amount in the contract that's already in place.

MS. MARINELLO: Aren't they supposed to come and address us about the last glitch?

MR. WALCH: Yes. We did get a response from them. I haven't had a chance to follow up back with Delaware County, which is one of the things I wanted to do prior to them coming in, and I haven't had a chance to do that before, but we will still do that. The staff here has read over the response that we got from ES&S. I believe we are satisfied with the response as to what happened in that instance, and they already put items in place that we feel very confident will prevent it from happening again.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: But it also shows us the vulnerability that we have in our 650s that we need to certainly think about replacing them with the latest version, so it it something to seriously

consider. As soon as possible we should think about replacing those 650s.

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But anyway, ES&S, the Ivotronics, we are going to have them for a while, Ms. Marinello.

There's nothing at this time to replace them, so, I mean, there is nothing in place to replace them, so as of now, we have to do everything we can.

MS. MARINELLO: To keep moving on.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: To keep them going.

We haven't had any problems with them, knock on wood, so they have been good, hard-working machines, and we keep the maintenance up. Our guys kind of keep them serviced, and they're always here servicing them, so it's something that we're going to have to do until we can get something better. Whatever that is, we don't know.

MR. WALCH: We actually just put them through a kind of a preventive maintenance right after the 1st of the year. The word we got back with the fellow who helps us with the machines at this point they are in fairly good condition. One of the biggest worries he had was actually the carts we transport them on. Those get banged around a little bit, but, fortunately, over the years since we

consolidated the number of voting machines, we have spare carts that we have been able to, for lack of a better word, cannibalize for parts and things like that, so he glad to hear we were in very good shape, as it turns out, about the carts. We get wheels that pop off and joints that break and things of that sort on those carts, but we think we're in good shape there because of having extras on that.

just in terms of at least initial discussion in terms of the personnel issue, but also the follow-up to our last meeting, a few things I think are more executive-session oriented and request the chair for an opportunity to discuss maybe in executive session.

Is it a legal and personnel matter?

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MR. HAAS: Yes. There's a personnel issue that's on the agenda which we actually don't need to go into executive session on, but in terms of some of the legal communication issues and follow-up from our last meeting, I would like to take a few moments in executive session.

MR. PREISSE: Okay.

MR. WALCH: Counsel, is that enough of a reason for going into executive session? I know there's only specific reasons we can give.

MR. LECKLIDER: Is it potentially an imminent legal action?

MR. HAAS: A holdover -- nothing that I think that requires action by the Board, but certainly some questions about communication and some of the issues from our last meeting.

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MR. PREISSE: What is our threshold?

1 MR. HAAS: Anything legal. It's not 2 anything we're going to vote on. 3 MR. SINNOTT: We got to keep this inside the law on this one. I think that's why we're 4 5 looking over to you. How much description do we need 6 to provide to the public to explain why we are going 7 into executive session? 8 MR. LECKLIDER: I will ask Board Member 9 Haas to enlighten me what it was at our last meeting. 10 MR. HAAS: I think there were a number of 11 issues that we discussed. I don't want to --12 obviously, don't want to visit any of the decisions 13 we made specifically. But, you know, it's my

That's not a gray area. I don't really understand the confusion on this. I also think that we are within our bounds in terms of any personnel issue to discuss in executive session.
