MS. MARINELLO: I move that the Board approve the counting of 931 provisional ballots and the rejection of 8 provisional ballots and that all provisional ballots deemed valid will be counted and included in the official canvass results for the 2015 General Election.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second?

MR. SINNOTT: Second.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor?

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Motion passes.

MR. PAYNE: We have 50 people back there.

We can take a fast recess, and we are ready to run

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MR. SINNOTT: I move that the Board

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No need to do the roll call. We still have Kim, Brad, Greg, Mr. Chairman.

MR. PAYNE: We have one issue for the Board to consider, correct?

MS. HEALY: Yes. When the ballots were being extracted, we had an envelope that contained two ballots, so we were wanting you to consider there are two scenarios we could do. We compared the two ballots, and on the ballots nine of the races were the same, but five of them were different, so we could either remake the ballots, or we could disregard the ballots and just give him credit for voting.

MR. SINNOTT: Alicia, back us up. I thought we are going to get the report on provisional ballots for consideration today. So you had a provisional ballot envelope.

MS. HEALY: Yes.

MR. SINNOTT: The envelope checked out, but you have two different ballots inside the envelope.

MS. HEALY: Correct.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: From the same person?

MS. HEALY: We're not sure what happened. Possibly they did the first one and it should have been voided. We're not sure that there was a void, so there was another one given. Two were given at the same time, folded up both, put it in the envelope, just really not sure.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Nothing in the workbook that showed it was voided?

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MS. HEALY: There was nothing in the workbook about what happened.

MR. PAYNE: I talked to the Secretary of State's legal counsel, and there is no directive or anything that talks to this particular case.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: What should have happened, the poll worker should have voided one or the other.

MR. HAAS: There's no way to tell which one is -- if there was a way to identify them and connect to it the envelope, then I would be in favor of counting one and not the other, but there's no way to tell which one to count. It's really kind of a --

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Could two people

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      have -- two different people stuck a ballot in that
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      envelope?
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                  MR. SINNOTT: I suppose all things could
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     have happened, but it's all conjecture.
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                  MS. MARINELLO: That's kind of hard to --
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                  MR. HAAS: There's no way to tell who is
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     the person.
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                  MR. SINNOTT: My inclination would be to
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      show that this person voted but not to count either
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      one of those ballots.
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                  MS. MARINELLO: Yes. I don't know how
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     you could.
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                  MR. SINNOTT: The envelope was filled out
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     properly, right?
                  MS. HEALY: It is.
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                  MR. HAAS: But you can't identify --
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                  MR. SINNOTT: Relative to the provisional
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      envelope in question, I move that the Board's records
      show that the voter participated in the 2015 General
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     Election but that neither ballot inside the envelope
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     be included in the official count.
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                  MR. HAAS: Second.
                  DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor?
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(Vote taken; motion passes.)

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                  DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Motion carries.
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                  MR. PAYNE: The final issue is the
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      remaking of provisional ballots.
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                  MS. HEALY: Yes, we have 189 remakes.
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                  MR. PAYNE: Do you want to tell the
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      different scenarios?
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                  MR. MANIFOLD: There's essentially two
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      different categories. 185 that when you guys gave
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      them authorization to open, it's the right church,
      wrong pew. You don't know if they got the right
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      ballot styles until you open it and get through it.
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      So there's 185 that got the wrong ballot style but
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      were at the right location.
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                  MS. HEALY: Correct.
                  MR. MANIFOLD: So they need to be remade.
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                  The second category we have four damaged
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      ballots. I think three of them are print --
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                  MR. SINNOTT: When you say "remade" in
      that first scenario, we would redo the ballots so
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      we're counting the votes cast in the races where they
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      were entitled to vote but excluding the others?
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                  MR. MANIFOLD: Yes, correct, the correct
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      ballot style, and it will only -- you can only put
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      the races that they were allowed to vote in.
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                  MR. HAAS: It would exclude the races
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      that they could not vote in?
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                  MR. MANIFOLD: There they should not have
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      been allowed to vote.
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                  And then we have four that were damaged,
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      and I think three of them are actually print
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      problems, and one of them got mangled.
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                  MR. PAYNE: When you say printed wrong,
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      what do you mean?
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                  MR. MANIFOLD: Yes, I will let you see
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      it. When our print shop prints ballots, they have to
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      hit the mark at bottom. The machine has these
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      squares. When the square isn't in the crosshair, the
     machine will not read these ballots, so we would
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      remake these.
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                  On this one, this one is just mangled.
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                  So 189 all together.
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                  MR. SINNOTT: This relates to the
      remaking of provisional ballots?
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                  MR. MANIFOLD: Yes.
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                  MR. HAAS: I move that the Board
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      authorize staff to remake 189 ballots, provisional
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      ballots.
                  MR. SINNOTT: Should the motion include
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the remade ballots be tabulated and included in the 1 official canvass? 3 MR. HAAS: The remade ballots should be 4 tabulated and included in the original canvass. 5 MR. SINNOTT: I second that. 6 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor? 7 (Vote taken; motion passes.) 8 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Motion carries. That's all we have. We have a meeting on 9 10 Monday where we would go over the official canvass and any potential recounts. We have four or five. 11 12 MR. MACKEY: Four or five that are close. 13 MR. SINNOTT: All right. Well, then, 14 Mr. Director, is there any more business to come before the Board? 15 16 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Not really. Last 17 night we did the first ever -- we had a Legacy 18 Trainers Awards Ceremony. I know that's not on the agenda, but I want to let you guys know, and I'll 19 20 pass this out, it was the first time we've ever 21 recognized our poll workers, and Dave and I attended. 2.2 MR. PAYNE: And our trainers. 2.3 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: It was a great event. 24 The facility worked beautifully. We had it catered,

basically a pot luck. And we've got some poll workers that over 35 years of experience, and we handed out the first ever pins and awards. And Kim was also there, and I thought it was a great night and an event we will hopefully do each year.

MR. SINNOTT: I heard really good things about it, and I think we should let Gary Collins know.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: It was a beautiful event, well attended, and it was well deserving of all the trainers that received some type of award.

MS. MARINELLO: It was really great.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Motion to adjourn?

MR. SINNOTT: So moved.

MS. MARINELLO: Second.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor?

(Vote taken; motion passes.)

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: We are adjourned.

(The meeting adjourned at 11:08 a.m.)
