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ballot allocation as well as a voting machine and

E-Pollbook allocation. We're actually required to

do it twice. So when we have you in on

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November 4th to open the polls, we'll ask you to do this again.

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So Carla, you want to do the paper ballot allocation?

MS. PATTON: Yes.

In front of you you should have On that you'll see each individual Exhibit A. precinct listed within the election to come up with the allocation. This is for election day and provisionals. We did the -- we looked at the ballots cast from the last two like elections. So looking back to the '17 and '15 general elections. And we took the higher of the turnout. provisionals, we looked at provisionals and then added another five percent on top of that. And then we took the ballots cast total on election day and added another 20 percent on top of that to come up with the allocation that you see before you. And we rounded them up to pads of 25. So we -this election we're looking at printing 86,150 ballots to send out to the polls on election day. DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And then we're required to keep those, right, for --MS. PATTON: Anything that comes

back voted or unvoted we are required to hold for

1	60 days before we can destroy them for this
2	election.
3	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Remind us, this
4	formula is prescribed to us or is this
5	MS. PATTON: This is a prescribed
6	formula from the Secretary of State.
7	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Any
8	questions or comments or concerns? If not, I'd
9	entertain a motion.
10	MEMBER MARINELLO: I move that the
11	Board adopt the paper ballot allocation formula in
12	Exhibit A compiled by the board staff for the
13	November 5, 2019, general election.
14	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
15	second?
16	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.
17	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
18	favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
19	(Vote taken.)
20	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
21	same sign.
22	(No response.)
23	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
24	carries.
25	Carla, you might as well stay up

there. We're doing voting machine and electronic pollbook allocation.

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MS. PATTON: So Exhibit B, it contains the total number of marking devices, whether it be a tabletop or a kiosk device, the number of DS200 ballot counters, and the number of poll pads to be assigned to each location. number of markers is assigned based on for every 320 active voters in the location. The counters are based on the number of markers that are available at the location. So if you had seven or more marking devices, then we have two DS200 counters. If you have 15 or more marking devices, then you have a third DS200 counter. The poll pads are based on one poll pad for every 800 registered voters in a location with a minimum of three at any So with this allocation we're given location. looking at sending out 2,394 marking devices, 501 counters, and 1,298 poll pads. You also have a column on there for the blank ballot card to use in the marking devices. And again, similar to the paper allocation, we went back to the vote turnout from highest like election and padded that with an additional 20 percent to come up with the total of 335,775 ballot cards being sent out.

1 different voting system. They are not staying with 2 ES&S. They're going to a different system. 3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Typically, 4 these machines are anywhere from \$4,000 to \$5,000. 5 They would sell them to us for \$500 apiece. We 6 could use them as replacement parts. More likely 7 we'll use them in our training, but we are approved 8 to use them actually at the polls if we need to. 9 DIRECTOR LEONARD: And we did 10 confirm with ES&S that these would be suitable for 11 And in terms of the changes, there's nothing 12 that's changed to the point that we wouldn't be 13 able to utilize them. 14 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Is that an 15 earlier model of --16 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: This is our model, but it's basically the --17 18 What did you say, 2013? 19 DIRECTOR LEONARD: 2014 model. So 20 it's the same equipment. There isn't anything that 21 would prevent us from utilizing it in the field on 22 election day. They're the same equipment. So what 23 it would allow us to do is the 25 that we would be 24 purchasing from Carroll County would allow us to 25 put more of our current equipment out in the field

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1	and use the ones that we're getting from Carroll
2	County to use as backup, to use as training
3	equipment.
4	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: If I
5	remember correctly, the only difference I think is
6	in the wheels. I think they have probably stronger
7	wheels now, but not a big difference.
8	MEMBER SINNOTT: Can we predict how
9	long the machines we're buying from Carroll County
10	will be useful?
11	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I think they
12	said 15 years at the beginning, so
13	DIRECTOR LEONARD: Another ten
14	years.
15	MS. PATTON: And they have been well
16	maintained by the county as well as by the support
17	staff from ES&S with any maintenance required on
18	those.
19	MEMBER SINNOTT: You've actually
20	seen the machines?
21	MS. PATTON: I spoke with the
22	manager and have gone over all the maintenance that
23	they have done, and everything has been up to par
24	and
25	DIRECTOR LEONARD: And for a price

1	of \$500 when these normally I think the state
2	term was \$4,600 apiece, if I remember correctly.
3	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: What was
4	interesting I thought, too, was Carroll County when
5	they bought these machines they bought 25 and they
6	actually bought more than they needed. There's
7	quite a bit of difference between Carroll County
8	and Franklin County.
9	MEMBER MARINELLO: I move the Board
10	authorize the purchase of 25 DS200 tabulators from
11	the Carroll County Board of Elections for \$500 each
12	for a total of \$12,500.
13	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
14	second?
15	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.
16	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
17	favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
18	(Vote taken.)
19	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
20	same sign.
21	(No response.)
22	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
23	carries.
24	The next item on the agenda today is
25	what we do each month. We are still on a

1	month-to-month budgeting. So what we're asking for
2	is the Board it approve a two percent cost of
3	living increase for the time period going back to
4	September 16th and resulting in the October 11th
5	and the October 25th pay periods.
6	MEMBER SINNOTT: I move that the
7	Board approve a two percent cost of living pay
8	increase to all full-time Board of Elections staff
9	retroactive to September 16th and that this
10	increase stand as a one-time approval for an
11	increase specific to the upcoming pay periods of
12	October 11th and October 25th as we are presently
13	constrained by month-to-month budgeting.
14	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
15	second?
16	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.
17	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
18	favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
19	(Vote taken.)
20	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
21	same sign.
22	(No response.)
23	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
24	carries.
25	Oftentimes we have two federal

1	holidays at least that come during some of our
2	busiest times, and those are Columbus Day and
3	Veterans Day. And what we would be asking on the
4	first item is that we remain open for staff only on
5	Columbus Day so that we can work, and we replace it
6	with Friday, November 29th, which is the day after
7	Thanksgiving. Initially the Secretary of State had
8	asked that's during early voting had asked
9	counties if they were going to stay open for early
10	voting. We said we were, but a majority of
11	counties said they were not and we have to have
12	uniform voting hours across the state. So
13	everybody needs to close on Columbus Day for early
14	voting, but we have a lot to do to get ready for
15	DIRECTOR LEONARD: The registration
16	process and so on.
17	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So the 14th is in
18	the early voting window?
19	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Early voting
20	starts tomorrow.
21	DIRECTOR LEONARD: The Secretary of
22	State sent down a not a directive, but
23	essentially had notified the boards not to be open
24	for early centers on October 14th.
25	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So he has asked

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1	that there be uniformity and anticipates all the
2	boards will comply?
3	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Yes.
4	MEMBER SEXTON: With that, I move
5	that the Board offices will remain open for staff
6	only and not to the general public on Columbus Day,
7	Monday, October 14th, and will instead close on
8	Friday, November 29th.
9	MEMBER SINNOTT: Second.
10	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
11	favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
12	(Vote taken.)
13	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
14	same sign.
15	(No response.)
16	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
17	carries.
18	Again, the next item is Veterans
19	Day, which is November 11th. And we will be
20	working through provisional ballots and certifying
21	the November 5th election. What we'd like to do is
22	close on December 24th, which is Christmas Eve, but
23	we are likely to get a bunch of petitions. So what
24	we would like is if the Director and the Deputy
25	Director deem it practical that we would close on

1	Christmas Eve; but if we have to work that day in
2	order to get all the petitions done in time, we
3	would like to be able to do that.
4	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And then we'd
5	close another day?
6	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We would
7	presumably close another day that we haven't
8	defined yet.
9	DIRECTOR LEONARD: Or propose
10	another day to ask that it be closed. But right
11	now we would anticipate requesting approval to
12	close on the 24th, but if we determine that the
13	Deputy Director and I determine we can't, then
14	we'll come back to the Board.
15	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We'll be
16	really popular.
17	DIRECTOR LEONARD: Yeah.
18	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Everybody has an
19	incentive to get their work done, as is always the
20	case.
21	MEMBER SINNOTT: I move that the
22	Board offices remain open to the general public on
23	Veterans Day, Monday, November 11th, and instead
24	tentatively close on Tuesday, December 24th, if the
25	Director and Deputy Director deem that practical.

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1	MEMBER SEXTON: Second.
2	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
3	favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
4	(Vote taken.)
5	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
6	same sign.
7	(No response.)
8	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
9	carries.
10	And then, finally, the 2020 employee
11	healthcare. And I apologize for getting this on
12	the agenda late. Every year the Board is to
13	approve the employee healthcare. In 2019 the rates
14	were 140 per month for a single employee. It's 312
15	a month for an employee with a spouse or a domestic
16	partner. Those same rates carry over to 2020, so
17	there is no increase, which doesn't always happen.
18	So there's no change, but we do need to approve it.
19	DIRECTOR LEONARD: It still requires
20	Board approval.
21	MEMBER KIMBERLY MARINELLO: I move
22	that the Board approve the employee healthcare
23	contribution rates of \$140 per month for employees
24	without a spouse/partner and \$312 per month for
25	employees with a spouse/partner.

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1	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.
2	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
3	favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
4	(Vote taken.)
5	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
6	same sign.
7	(No response.)
8	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
9	carries.
10	MEMBER SINNOTT: I move we adjourn.
11	MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.
12	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
13	favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
14	(Vote taken.)
15	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
16	same sign.
17	(No response.)
18	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
19	carries. We are adjourned.
