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Monday Morning Session December 9, 2019 10:11 a.m.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Looks like we have a quorum, but $I$ will take the roll call. Kim Marinello. MEMBER MARINELLO: Here. DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Mike Sexton. MEMBER SEXTON: Here. DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Doug Preisse.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Here. DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And Brad Sinnott.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Here.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We do indeed have a quorum.

The approval of the minutes. I believe you were sent the November 4th, 2019, minutes of the Board of Elections. Are there any deletions, additions, or corrections? If not, I would accept a motion to approve those minutes.

MEMBER MARINELLO: I move that the Board approve the minutes of the November 4th, 2019 meeting of the Franklin County Board of Elections
as submitted.
CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
(Vote taken.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
same sign.
(No response.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
carries.
The next item on the agenda is the paper ballot allocation for the March 17th primary election. You may recall that the Secretary of State has a directive that requires us -- requires the Board to approve the paper ballot allocation as well as the machine and e-pollbook allocation.

So Carla, if you want to do the paper ballot allocation first.

MS. PATTON: The Secretary of State requires that we do a paper ballot allocation as well as a machine and poll pad allocation no later than 90 days prior to the election in even numbered elections; therefore, Exhibit A is before you. We reviewed 2016 and 2018 voting numbers, and at this point in time prior to the filing deadline we have
to assume that every precinct split is active for this election.

So what we've done is we've taken the numbers from the previous like election with the highest numbers and we've done five percent more than the maximum number of provisional ballots plus another 20 percent of the maximum number of election day ballots being cast in the like election. We then rounded those up to poll pads of 25 for the major parties, and that's what the allocation set before you on the major party ballot allocation column is. For the minor parties for the primary, we will do a pad of 15 ballots for each one of those. This allocation is subject to change with the possible inclusion of ballot on demand printing at the polling locations on election day; but for right now this is the allocation that we present to you for approval.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And if I'm correct, Carla, we have to have the Board approve this on three separate occasions so if it does change we --

MS. PATTON: We will present you with another allocation within 30 days prior to the primary election as well with any updates and
changes.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Any questions for Carla?

MEMBER SEXTON: So how many did we increase for provisionals from when we used 2016 and 2018?

MS. PATTON: So we took the higher of those two elections and took that number plus an additional five percent on top of that, which is required by the Secretary of State's directive.

MEMBER SEXTON: So the higher of the two elections was 2016 or 2018? I assume '16.

MS. PATTON: 2016.
MEMBER SEXTON: Yeah.
MS. PATTON: And then to handle our election paper by choice voters we took the 20 percent of the election day ballots cast to include in that number to handle the paper by choice voters who are --

MEMBER SEXTON: From the general
election?
MS. PATTON: The primary election.
MEMBER SEXTON: Of the primary
election in May?
MS. PATTON: Yes. It's all based on
primary elections, like elections.
MEMBER SEXTON: Okay.
With that, I would move the Board adopt the paper ballot allocation formula on Exhibit A compiled by the board staff for the March 17th, 2020 primary election.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a second?

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in favor signify by saying aye.
(Vote taken.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed, same sign.
(No response.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: The Motion
carries.
The next item on the agenda is voting machine and e-pollbook allocation for the March 17 primary election.

Carla, I'll turn it over to you for that.

MS. PATTON: In front of you you have Exhibit B, the machine and poll pad allocation for this allocation for the number of marking
devices. We are assigning one marking device for every 245 active voters in Franklin County, and that's how you come up with the number under the column 2020 ballot marker assignments. Based off of that, the 2020 ballot counter assignments is one -- at least one for every nine ballot marking devices in a location. For the poll pads, that is based on one poll pad with no less than three for every 800 registered voters in a location. These -- The poll pad allocation is based on the same number of voters we've done in the past. The marking device allocations, we did increase the number of marking devices as we acquired another 694 earlier this month to deploy out for the next election. So that did lower the ratio down to one for every 245 active voters.

And again, this is an allocation that we will have to re-present to you within 30 days. And we will look at some of the issues that are filed for the election to determine if the additional marking devices need to go into certain areas based on issues being presented on the ballot.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay.
CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Looks good.

MEMBER SINNOTT: I move that the Board adopt the voting machine and e-pollbook allocation formula in Exhibit B complied by the board staff for the March 17, 2020 primary election.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a second?

MEMBER SEXTON: Second.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
(Vote taken.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
same sign.
(No response.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
carries.
The next item on the agenda is the two percent cost of living raise for all full-time employees. As you may remember, we're presently constrained by month-to-month budgeting. We would ask the Board for a two percent cost of living raise for the pay periods December 6th and December 20th if the Board is so inclined.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: And when the Board of Commissioners allocated a monthly
appropriation for the month of November and the month of December there were sufficient funds that would allow for the cost of living adjustment.

MEMBER MARINELLO: I move that the Board approve the two percent cost of living pay increase to all full-time Board of Elections staff employed as of January 1st, 2019, retroactive to November 11th and that this increase stands as a one-time increase specific to the upcoming pay periods of December 6th and December 20th, as we are presently constrained by month-to-month budgeting.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a second?

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
(Vote taken.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed, same sign.
(No response.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
carries.
The next item on the agenda is the Board of Elections parking policy for the March

17th primary. And I'll turn that over to Ed Leonard, Director.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: Because of the reduction in the number of available parking spaces in the Board of Elections complex, we felt it necessary to help alleviate the parking crunch that we're going to experience at the early vote center. Both for the primary election and the general election, we needed to implement a policy that relates to both the employees so that the Director and Deputy Director have the authority to make requirements for the Board employees to park off site and then we would provide a shuttle to shuttle the employees from off-site parking to the Board of Elections site, but also to provide for the ability to limit the parking in front of the Board of Elections building to just voter parking and those conducting official business.

As many of you probably have seen, we have a lot of campaigns that will park a vehicle in the lot during the early vote cycle and just camp out the entire day. That takes up a space for a voter, and this -- with this upcoming 2020 election we simply need to make sure that every space available is available for a voter.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So how do you envision managing that, --

DIRECTOR LEONARD: Again, I --
CHAIRMAN PREISSE: -- denying
campaigns --
DIRECTOR LEONARD: Well, what we wanted to do was to provide a space where they can have at least two spaces --

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Which would be where?

DIRECTOR LEONARD: Somewhere on the lot in front of the building that we would provide designated spaces where anybody can operate. They have to learn to share it, but that would at least provide it. But if there's a vehicle out there with a campaign candidate banner on it, we'd have to ask them to move their vehicle because that's not what the -- it's the vehicle -- the spaces are reserved for voters as opposed to campaigns and candidates and volunteers.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And a lot of campaigns have been doing that willingly anyway, moving. I mean, they're allowed to be out there. We are just asking that their vehicles not be out there.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: This would not in any way constrain their ability to campaign. Well, it would in the fact that they can't park a vehicle outside that hundred foot line, but they could still stand and pass out handbills and literature and so forth.

MEMBER MARINELLO: Is there going to be somebody out there with security?

DIRECTOR LEONARD: We'll have staff out there that will be helping guide voters to vacant parking spaces and that sort of thing. So there will be folks out there. We have sheriff's deputies out there as well to advise. And we've done it in the past where we've had to advise a group that they couldn't take up spaces and they were advised that you either move your tent or the sheriff's deputies are going to move it for you, and they willingly move their tent.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Yeah. I think we would continue to get cooperation from the campaigns.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: And part of the reason for having it at this stage was so that we could advise the campaigns when they file their candidacies on the 18th, when they file their
petitions, that we can have a notice for them so they can be made aware of this as early in the process as possible.

MEMBER SINNOTT: And then the idea is as to board employees, we're going to tell them that during the period that the early vote center is in operation that they're supposed to park not around the board offices but at a remote site and then we will shuttle them down from that remote site to their jobs at the board?

DIRECTOR LEONARD: Right. And for the primary it may not need to be for the entire 28-day period.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Maybe three days.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: It might be a few days when we anticipate the heaviest turnout.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Because of construction around the board offices in recent times, how many parking spots have we lost?

DIRECTOR LEONARD: In this entire complex, we -- 256 were lost with the construction and then we gained back -- I think in total we've lost 165 net. Because there were additional spaces when we re-striped the parking lot that gained us
some additional parking spaces, but a net loss of $I$ believe it's 163 spaces, somewhere in that --

MEMBER SINNOTT: How many parking spots do we gain if we have employees parking in the remote lot?

DIRECTOR LEONARD: It could be anywhere from 130 to 160. So --

MEMBER SINNOTT: Where is that remote lot going to be?

DIRECTOR LEONARD: Right now we made arrangements with Ascension Lutheran, which is kind of catty-corner from our location. It's right next to the Chase Bank, and there's an office building there. They don't utilize their -- There's a rear parking lot to the back that they don't really utilize at all. So that, and then on the weekends we'd be able to utilize JFS parking lot and potentially taxation as well. In the past they made that available to us, the Department of Taxation.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Are we leasing these remote parking locations?

DIRECTOR LEONARD: The Ascension Lutheran, yes. And I forget the cost per day. I can't recall exactly what the cost was. There was
a daily fee that we would pay per, but it wasn't -I'm trying to think. Maybe $\$ 1,500$ for the entire period of early vote if we used it every single day. So it wasn't a huge amount.

MEMBER SINNOTT: And then the state agency allows us to use their parking lot for free? DIRECTOR LEONARD: Correct.

MEMBER SINNOTT: What does it cost, then, to shuttle employees in each day?

DIRECTOR LEONARD: For each shuttle bus it's 655 a day for about a 13-hour day.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: But we're thinking of using only three days.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: Depending the number of days that we use in the primary and the general.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And it's on the other side of the street, right, the other side of Morse?

DIRECTOR LEONARD: Yeah.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's just beyond the fire station.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: And in the general election we did a test to see, you know, how functional that would be and found it to be --
that it worked well for us.
CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I asked the question at a previous meeting that I was concerned that the employees might be walking back and forth; but you suggested then, or one of you did, that they won't do that because it's too far. But it's only about a quarter of a mile, isn't it, or an eighth of a mile?

DIRECTOR LEONARD: I'm not sure of the exact distance, but it's not very far. We've had a couple of people, you know, some of our younger employees, who went ahead and walked that. I walked it on one occasion, as well.

MEMBER SINNOTT: I thought you said the younger employees, Ed.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: Exactly. That's what I said, I'm not so young.

MEMBER SINNOTT: So in summary, what would it cost the taxpayers to do this remote parking plan for board employees during the early vote period?

DIRECTOR LEONARD: If we did it for the entire cycle, it would be about 15,000 to shuttle staff, for the parking and the shuttling of staff.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: If you did it every day. But we're thinking -- I think I did the formula and I think it's $\$ 214$ a day if we only use three days. So I guess we'll determine that. And then what were we thinking? For the 28-day period you said $\$ 1,500$ ?

DIRECTOR LEONARD: For the lot, right.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: For the lot.
MEMBER SEXTON: So what we're deciding today is for the primary election only? DIRECTOR LEONARD: No. This is for the policy in general that then gives us the authority to do it as we need it. So the primary and general.

MEMBER SEXTON: So it gives the authority to the Director and Deputy Director to up to 28 days for either election, primary or general?

DIRECTOR LEONARD: Right.
CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. Work in progress.

MEMBER SEXTON: I move the Board adopt the early vote center parking policy that establishes standards within the Franklin County Board of Elections regarding parking in and around
the early vote center during the 28-day period of in-person absentee voting.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
(Vote taken.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed, same sign.
(No response.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

The next item on the agenda is the TMH Solutions contract with Jo Campbell. DIRECTOR LEONARD: Board members, as you're aware, we have had a project management consultant contract with TMH Solutions for the last year and almost a year and a half. And the project manager, Jo Campbell, has done a great job for us in assisting us in the preparation of the implementation of the new voting equipment and at the same time doing -- working on the Tenex voter registration software, both the whole contracting process, the bid evaluation process. And really now we've -- we entered into that contract this summer and we have begun the implementation
process. And this project management contract would assist us in continuing to work on the implementation of the voter registration software system for 2020.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And you're thinking -- would we go through -- would we use this contract for the full year or -DIRECTOR LEONARD: I wouldn't anticipate that we'll use it for the full year because the implementation -- we expect the implementation of the voter registration software to be accomplished by July of 2020. And there may be additional hours beyond that as we go through the ballots towards election day, but I don't anticipate that we would need it for the full year. And I would -- my hope is that once we implement in July that the number of hours will start to tail off as we get closer to election day. The amount remains -- the hourly rate remains the same from the last contract the Board authorized, and the number of hours --

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: In the last contract it was 2,000 I believe we authorized, and this time it's 1,500 that we're asking for.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: 1,500. Which
would -- based on the current rate of usage of the hours, it would take us through probably October of next year; although, it might be slightly less if she works more hours in the coming -- in the first few months of 2020.

MEMBER SINNOTT: How long has TMH
been providing this service?
DIRECTOR LEONARD: Since May of 2018.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Can we envision a time when we will not need to contract with TMH for this?

DIRECTOR LEONARD: It will end at some point.

## DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: July

 probably.MEMBER SINNOTT: July of 2020?
DIRECTOR LEONARD: It might be a
little bit longer because that's with the implementation, but then I would imagine there will still be some project activity that will take place after the implementation. And that's why I've scaled back the hours from 2,000 to 1,500 .

MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay.
Then I move that the Board authorize

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the Director and Deputy Director to enter into a contract with TMH Solutions with Jo Campbell to continue their service as project manager with the Tenex migration at the hourly rate of $\$ 115$ with hours not to exceed 1,500 and the total amount of the contract not to exceed $\$ 172,500$, the terms of the contract to run from January 1, 2020 through December 31, 2020.

MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
(Vote taken.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed, same sign.
(No response.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
carries.
The next item on the agenda is the UPS, the uninterruptible power supply purchase. And I could let Carolyn explain in detail what it is; but for a novice here, it's a battery backup for all servers and routers and it's one of the critical items that's required by the Secretary of State. We have to have this. So basically if our power supply goes down, there's a short period of
time --
Right, Carolyn?
MS. GORUP: Yes.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: -- that we use it.

MS. GORUP: There's a minimal maybe 30 seconds between the time the power goes out and the generator kicks in, and this keeps everything up and running continuously. That's what the UPS is.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Right.
And on election day we experienced
that very --
MS. GORUP: We had a catastrophic failure.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: This past election?

MS. GORUP: Yes.
CHAIRMAN PREISSE: What happened?
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We had a
power surge.
MS. GORUP: We don't really know why the UPS failed, but it did. And we had to run and unplug it from the UPS and plug it into the wall, and it took a while for everything to come up. But
we've had several occasions where the power has gone off and the UPS has done their job. We had an election day not that long ago that we had a major power outage in the area. And I was one of the last to know because $I$ was sitting back in my office and everything was still running.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: So, again, the importance of the uninterruptible power supply is critical to the operation of the office. The ones that are currently in place are aging, and so it's recommended that we replace those UPS units. We're still in the process of acquiring quotes for the needed replacement. So we will obtain three quotes for replacing five units, and once we receive that quote we'll select the lowest cost vendor and -But we've already spec'd out what we need in terms of the -- what we need for the criteria for those UPS units.

It's just a matter of we don't want to delay in getting those, so we're just asking for authority for the Director and Deputy Director to purchase these UPS units at a cost not to exceed 80,000 total. So right now an additional -- one of the first quotes was about 15,000 , so we want to make sure that if for some reason it's a little bit
higher that we have the authority up to 80,000 for the five units.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Is there anything to the installation of these units or is it just buying the equipment?

DIRECTOR LEONARD: That's part of the reason we wanted to make sure that we had a little bit of extra in terms of delivery costs, but it's my understanding it includes installation.

MS. GORUP: It does not include installation.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: Does not. I'm sorry.

MS. GORUP: But we have an electrician that has done PM on it who is very reasonably priced who will take care of installation.

MEMBER SINNOTT: So will the 80 grand cover both the product and the installation? DIRECTOR LEONARD: Or will they be separate expenses?

MS. GORUP: They will probably be separate expenses because we're not purchasing them from All Electric.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: We may need to
come back for additional for that unless the Board wants to authorize an additional amount, but we can come back and ask for ratification of the expense. We can let the Board know how much we anticipate that installation cost, and if it exceeds the $\$ 10,000$ authority that we currently have then we can come back to the Board and ask for you to ratify the decision at the next -- the December 23rd board meeting.

MS. GORUP: I anticipate that the installation would be significantly less.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Less than ten grand, Carolyn?

MS. GORUP: Yeah, for the installation.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay.
MEMBER SEXTON: I move the Board authorize the Director and Deputy Director to purchase the necessary uninterruptible power supply equipment in an amount not to the exceed $\$ 80,000$.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
(Vote taken.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
same sign.
(No response.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

The next item on the agenda is the Legacy of Trainer awards dinner. Over the last four years we have had at the end of year or the beginning of the following year we've had a dinner here at the Board of Elections to recognize our trainers and other employees of the Board of Elections. And we would like to ask the Board -- I know Kim has been there on a number of occasions and can attest to the morale that it builds and that it's a good event. I think this year, Steve, we may be considering a dinner right after work maybe that would allow more of our employees here at the Board of Elections to attend rather than going home and coming back.

MEMBER MARINELLO: Good idea.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: So it will be more inclusive. And then going forward, we anticipate having an employee recognition dinner where it includes everybody, poll workers. We wouldn't invite all of them, but we would have different -- you know, we might award a couple of
our poll workers, we might have staff, different departments where we would award different members of the staff. So --

MEMBER MARINELLO: That's separate down the road?

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: That would be separate down the road, but I think we're transitioning and we might be announcing that at this Legacy of Trainers.

MEMBER MARINELLO: It's a really good event.

I move that the Board accept a resolution authorizing the staff to hold a Legacy of Trainer awards dinner in late January 2020 at the Franklin County Board of Elections and the Board authorizes that the cost of the Legacy of Trainer not to exceed the amount of $\$ 2,500$.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a second?

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
(Vote taken.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed, same sign.
(No response.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

The next item on the agenda -- and it's in your packet -- is the certification of candidate recounts. There was no change in the recounts of the four races that we counted, and so what we would ask for is an unchanged amended -amendment to the abstract of the results.

Is there any -- is Jeff in here or --

MS. PATTON: No, he's not.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: He's not.
Carla, do you want to talk? Is there anything that we should mention about that?

MS. PATTON: So we hand counted the five percent and then scanned those so everything matched, which based on that we were able to scan through the rest of the ballots through the tabulation equipment. After doing all that, there was no changes, as David explained, to any of the races that were recounted.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And those four races were Worthington --

MS. PATTON: Worthington City

Council, Urbancrest Village Council, Prairie Township Fiscal Officer, and the Hilliard City School District Board of Education race.

MEMBER SEXTON: So I see that the Worthington race remained obviously unchanged, but just the comment that we had three candidates that were one vote apart?

MS. PATTON: That is correct.
MEMBER SEXTON: And on the
Urbancrest race, was that the one where the tie --
MS. PATTON: That was the race where it was a tie for the official count. A coin toss was performed at the official certification in which I believe Deborah Larkins Jackson was the winner of that coin toss; therefore, the results of the coin toss are confirmed based on the results of the recount, still remaining a tie.

MEMBER SEXTON: So with that, I move the Board certify the unchanged amended abstract of the results from the candidate recount conducted on Monday, December 2nd and Tuesday, December 3rd, as listed on Exhibit C.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a second?

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
(Vote taken.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed, same sign.
(No response.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
carries.
There are a couple of items on the agenda which include a background check update, seasonal employee pay raise adjustment potentially, and then a full-time employee merit pay potentially.

Does the Board desire to go into executive session for any or all of those items?

MEMBER SINNOTT: Well, we should -pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 121.22 (G) 1 and 3, I move that the Franklin County Board of Elections go into executive session to consider the appointment, employment, dismissal, discipline, promotion, demotion, or compensation of a public employee.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a second?

MEMBER SEXTON: Second.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in favor -- Or I'm sorry. This requires a roll call. Kim Marinello.

MEMBER MARINELLO: Yes.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Michael
Sexton.
MEMBER SEXTON: Yes.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Doug
Preisse.
CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Yes.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And Brad
Sinnott.
MEMBER SINNOTT: Yes.
Motion carries. We're in executive
session.
(Recess for executive session at approximately 10:40 a.m.)
(Back on the record at approximately 11:30 a.m.)

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I believe I need a motion to move out of executive session.

MEMBER MARINELLO: I move that the Franklin County Board of Elections adjourn from executive session, and that no votes or official actions were taken during the executive session.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a second?

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second. DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Roll call. Kim Marinello.

MEMBER MARINELLO: Yes.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Mike Sexton. MEMBER SEXTON: Yes.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Doug
Preisse.
CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Yes.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And Brad
Sinnott.
MEMBER SINNOTT: Yes.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We're out of executive session.

The first item on the agenda is the seasonal employee pay adjustment.

Director, do you want to speak to that briefly?

DIRECTOR LEONARD: As we -- The motion you have or the item is to adjust our seasonal salary scale. We did a slight adjustment in 2018; but, again, I think given the work that our seasonal staff does at the Board of Elections
that it is warranted that we increase the scale. The thought was to increase the base of the salary scale for each step on the salary scale by $\$ 2$, which would then take the initial first step on the salary scale -- so a brand new seasonal employee would earn 12.73 an hour and then each step after every four elections the employee would move to the next step of the salary scale and that rate would be increased by $\$ 2$ as well.

MEMBER SEXTON: I move that the Board accept the Board of Elections seasonal employee pay adjustments as listed on Exhibit D effective January 6 of 2020.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
(Vote taken.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
same sign.
(No response.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
carries.
The next item on the agenda is the full-time employee merit pay raise.

Director, you want to talk to that?

DIRECTOR LEONARD: The exhibit that we presented to you is Exhibit E. In that exhibit it provides for the same hourly rate increase for all employees who have worked with the Board of Elections for the entire year of 2019. The Commissioners have the funds in our budget to provide a merit increase for our employees, and the merit increase is for the employees that are listed in that chart. The hourly amount is identical for all of them, but obviously for some employees that percentage amount would be more with the idea that some of our lower paid employees will get more than one and a half percent. But that provides an increase for those folks -- for our full-time staff on that list.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Then I move that the Board accept the Board of Elections employee merit pay raises on an hourly basis as listed on Exhibit E, which I will now give to David Payne, which is different from the Exhibit $E$ that was originally circulated --

DIRECTOR LEONARD: Yes.
MEMBER SINNOTT: -- quite slightly,
which shall be effective retroactive to January 18 pay period of 2019.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: And that last adjustment was based on the number of pay periods for 2019.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a second?

MEMBER SEXTON: Second.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
(Vote taken.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed, same sign.
(No response.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
caries.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: The next item on the agenda is the 2020 communications plan. I'll turn that over to the chairman.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: The Board at the past meeting received the memo of November 18th and then did a presentation at the meeting of

November 22nd that outlined the rationale and justification set forth in the memo, and so that's where we are today.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Right.
And do we understand that there may
be someone in the audience who wishes to address the Board on the communications plan issue?

MS. WATSON: Yes. I do.
MEMBER SINNOTT: You also ought to explain the time constraint.

MR. PREISSE: Yes.
In the interest of the length of the meeting and adopting the habits of the county commissioners and the city council, loosely, but not too loosely, we'd like to you limit public comment to three minutes.

MS. WATSON: I'm good with that. CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Yes. Good.

Okay. Please join us.
And if you would, for the record and the stenographer, state your name and title.

MS. WATSON: First let me say I bring you greetings from the oldest and the boldest civil rights organization in America. I'm Nana Watson, your NAACP president, and we have been joined today by the Columbus Urban League and the Baptist Ministry Alliance.
(Brief recess for reporter
clarification.)
MS. WATSON: Those groups are here
this morning requesting that you release resources under your funding option three for voter education and paid media initiatives in association with the single primary and full general elections messaging for voter education programming. You did not release those funds in 2019. The NAACP requested that and we're asking that you vote on that today and release it.

And on a side note, I want you to know this summer $I$ contacted Mr . Sinnott and Mr. Preisse to talk about our issues with that. It was a very short conversation. You assured me, the NAACP, that you would get back with us. You did not do that. And that's very troubling to the NAACP that you did not keep your word.

As you know, we are a non-partisan organization. We do not endorse candidates, we endorse issues. And again, our request is that you release the funds under funding option three. And if you can't do that today, we're going to request that the Secretary of State break the tie. And I'm sure none of you want to be accused of voter suppression. Thank you so very much.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Thank you.
For the record, I'd like to state
that you and I never did speak.
MEMBER SINNOTT: That's not true.
Actually, we reached you together by phone and you were unable to speak at that time.

MS. WATSON: That's right.
MEMBER SINNOTT: It is also true that if we never had oral communication it's very easy to reach Mr. Preisse and --

MS. WATSON: I'm sorry?
MEMBER SINNOTT: I said if we didn't have oral communication of the sort that you wanted, it is very easy to reach Mr . Preisse and me by email or regular mail.

MR. PREISSE: I just want to state for the record -- and then I will look forward to spending as much time as we can together as soon as we can -- when you suggest I didn't keep my word, I never made any that I recall commitment, statement, or any kind of communication of a word that $I$ needed to keep. So I'm delighted and look forward very soon to getting together and would love to do that. And if you've got have a pen, I'll give you my cell phone right now.

MS. WATSON: No. I just need to
clarify that I did have a conversation. It was on
the phone with the both of you. You said you would get back and you did not. So that to the NAACP is you didn't keep your word, but we can have a conversation. I'm here on behalf of the NAACP to request that you release the funds.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Well, and we welcome you here today and again in the future and we're delighted you're here and appreciate your comment. We're not scheduled to have a vote on the matter today, and there's plenty of time for continued communication from the public, from leaders of important institutions such as yourself, and we'll keep the conversation going.

MS. WATSON: How will we do that?
Will you reach out to me or would you rather that I reach out to you?

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Well, I've offered my cell phone. If you give me yours right now, I'll call you this afternoon.

MS. WATSON: 614-824-8525.
CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Thank you.
MS. WATSON: Uh-huh.
MEMBER SINNOTT: Miss Watson, your organization supports an expenditure of how much in taxpayer money for television ads, radio ads,
newspaper ads, and related production?
MS. WATSON: I think that's under your option three --

MEMBER SINNOTT: Yes.
MS. WATSON: -- in the
communications plan. I do not have those figures before me, but it is option three. And Mr. Leonard, maybe you can --

DIRECTOR LEONARD: The figure in option three under the proposal is a total of \$660,250.

MEMBER SINNOTT: 668,000 for those items?

DIRECTOR LEONARD: I said 660.
MEMBER SINNOTT: 660. Okay.
CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Thank you very much.

MS. WATSON: Thank you.
MEMBER SEXTON: Just to clarify, Mr. Chairman, I thought we were in agreement that we were going to have a vote today. So I spoke with Mr. Sinnott at the last meeting that we simply put the four options on the table, we had presented them, and that we were going to meet today to discuss --

MEMBER SINNOTT: My recollection -MEMBER SEXTON: Why would we --

MEMBER SINNOTT: My recollection, too, is that the Board never made a motion related to the document that was presented to the Board on November 18 under the title "communication plan" and that we would vote on that motion today. CHAIRMAN PREISSE: The motion is not out or order, but it was not my understanding that we were certain to vote on that. If somebody makes a motion --

MEMBER SEXTON: I just wanted to
clarify that. I thought that was the understanding.

MS. HYKES: Could I speak, as well? CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Three minutes, if you would, please. Identify yourself for the stenographer.

MS. HYKES: Thank you. I'm Barb
Hykes. I'm here as the president of the League of Women Voters of Metropolitan Columbus, an organization that has spent the past 100 years helping to make democracy work. Thank you to the Board members. Thank you, Director Leonard, for allowing me to speak.

I also want to thank you for your participation with the League of Women Voters the past couple of years in educating Girl Scouts about their civic responsibilities and enabling them to learn how to vote.

I was at a middle school wrestling match last week waiting for my grandson to get to take the mat, and to begin the event they played the National Anthem. That caused me to reflect. Wow. Wouldn't it be great if we made as much of a fuss about publicity for voting and voting as we do making sure that everyone stands for the National Anthem. Both of those are very emblematic of our democracy: the flag, the National Anthem, and the right to vote. We need to make our voices heard about the right to vote.

I'm here today to ask you to take that challenge, to publicize the elections for this year. We know that there's going to be tons of candidate advertising; there's not a doubt about that. What doesn't come up in the candidate advertising, though, is where to vote, how to vote, when to vote. One of the questions I've been asking people I've talked to is what is the last day to register to vote. And since we have an
early primary this year, I've gotten a lot of wrong answers. And it's critical that people know when they have to be registered by in order to be able to vote.

They also need to know things like how to get an application for an absentee ballot or when they can get an application for absentee. Here in your lobby the other day I noticed a little Xerox piece of paper that said, oh, by the way, if you turn in that application before the end of the year it doesn't really work for next year's election, you need to turn it in -- I don't think that's obvious to a lot of people. They need the information. They need to know what provisional voting is about and when provisional voting is appropriate.

There was a beautiful letter to the editor complimenting the Board for one of our disabled voters being able to vote curbside; but they only found out they could vote curbside after coming to the polling place, realizing they couldn't get into it, going home, contacting the Board, and then finding that they could have gone in and asked for curbside voting. So, you know, these are things the public needs to know about.

Very importantly, they need reassurance also. They need reassurance their votes are going to count, they need reassurance that there's not going to be interference in our election. They're hearing and seeing lots of things about cyber attack this and cyber attack that. They need reassurance that the Board has taken measures to prevent cyber attacks from affecting their vote. Again, knowing that candidate advertising is just going to saturate the TV, the Board of Elections could be that calm voice helping people to exercise their right to vote.

Not everyone had the experience that I did. I had a grandmother who was not able to vote until after four of her children had been born. And that is a woman who was there the first election after the 19th Amendment passed. And believe me, you did not come to dinner at her house on election day without a sticker on your shirt; otherwise, you were probably not going to be seated at the table.

Voting is important. We need to get that message out. We need to reenforce that message, and it's a precious right. Please help us inform our electorate. Please release the funds to
do the communication plan so that our voters know where, when, how, and why they should be voting. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Thank you very much.

MEMBER MARINELLO: Thank you.
MEMBER SEXTON: Mr. Chairman, we'll
save our speeches if you'd like and move straight to the motions here.

I would make the first motion. I move that the Director and Deputy Director move forward with the implementation of the 2020 communication plan as presented by the Director in his memo of November 18th, 2019, and that the Director and Deputy Director are authorized to execute the contracts, expend funds appropriated for fiscal year 2020 by the Board of County Commissioners in substantial conformance with the paid media budget outlined in funding option four of the Director's November 18th, 2019, memo in the amount of $\$ 512,000$.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a second?

MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Take roll
call?
MEMBER SINNOTT: Yeah. There should be discussion.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Is there
discussion?
MEMBER SINNOTT: Mike, you
generously offered not to engage in a long speech, but were there a few things you'd like to say in support of your motion? I do have a few observations made of the motion.

MEMBER SEXTON: I'll let you go first and I may have another motion after this.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Thank you.
So the motion calls for spending $\$ 512,000$ of Franklin County taxpayer money on television, radio, and print ads that would, according to the presentation that we heard at the last board meeting, advise people that there is an internet and in order to obtain information about how and where to vote in Franklin County someone ought to go to the internet for that information. Before the internet, the voter would discover that there is great information being provided by this board already at public expense on those very subjects. This needs to be put in some
context. The average household income in our community is a little less than $\$ 60,000$. So what this proposal calls for is spending on TV ads, radio ads, and print ads to tell people that there's an internet and you can get information about how to vote and where to vote off of the internet by taking the total household income for eight or nine Franklin County households and devoting that amount in taxpayer money to that purpose. I do not see that as being a sound expenditure of taxpayer money.

It's also true that we should always be concerned as a board of elections about the uniform administration of elections in Ohio. We should not have 88 different election processes in this state. We need to have a uniform administration of elections. What the Franklin County Commissioners are doing through this -- I'll call it -- lavish spending proposal is proposing that we spend hundreds of thousands of dollars under one version of the plan, nearly a million dollars, to get out the vote in heavily Democratic Franklin County. That is a partisan action.

If the General Assembly were to propose that there be a get-out-the-vote publicly
financed drive in Clermont, Butler, and Warren Counties, we would all see that as being a part of the partisan plan. This is a part of the partisan plan.

Then, finally, it is troubling that this plan is being generated by candidates for public office, two of whom will be on the ballot in 2020. For very good reasons we do not turn to those who participate as candidates in the election process and ask them what should the election process be. That is a determination to be made by the Secretary of State and the Board of Elections. It is of no more relevance what the three county commissioners who are candidates for public office every four years think about the administration of elections in Franklin County than what Donald Trump or Elizabeth Warren thinks about that subject. It is the Board of Elections that has the exclusive authority and responsibility to shape the election process in Franklin County working in concert with the instructions from the Ohio Secretary of State. For all of those reasons, I vote -- or will vote in a moment when the discussion ends "no" on the pending motion.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Any other
discussion?
MEMBER SEXTON: Sure. Well, thank you.

First, I don't think this is a partisan plan. I mean, we've been working on this plan for a long time. I sat down as well as Kim Marinello and the Deputy Director. We met with Deputy Director David Payne on August the 30th. I've seen no plan from our Republicans on this side of the aisle. We've obviously been going through this all year.

Further, I don't think it's too much to ask. I think this plan option is 60 cents per voter in Franklin County if the commissioners are willing to fund it and I think it's a good plan. Overall, the goal is to -- this plan simply is not to inform voters that there's an election November 3rd, 2020; the goal is much more comprehensive. Consequently, there are multiple messages that we need to communicate to the voters in 2020 informing and encouraging voters to vote earlier or to utilize the early vote and by absentee mail, informing voters about registering and updating their voter registration, informing voters about their voter ID requirements,
encouraging voters to verify voting locations in advance of election day, and primary election day is moved to March 17th. And with that, I'd like to -- I think Kim would like to make some comments.

MEMBER MARINELLO: Yeah. Our main
job is to educate voters. I mean, we need to reduce the amount of provisional ballots because everyone I've ever talked to voting provisional is unsure their vote even counted. And the only way to do that is through voter education, and we have resources to do it.

In the beginning of the last presidential there were 6,000 rejected provisional ballots just because they didn't have the right information, they weren't registered, they had the wrong ID, they were at the wrong place. More education could take care of that.

This is our job, not the political parties or the candidates or third-party groups. It's our job to educate the voters. And with this day and age now with the foreign countries wanting to stir things up, we've just got to -- you know, and voters can be confused, we've got to get the correct information out there and we have the resources to do it.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: And Mr. Sinnott,
I just --
MEMBER SINNOTT: I'm sorry. We really -- I don't think we're entertaining comment from staff and members of the public at this point. There's a motion pending, which is to be discussed by the Board members.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Did you have a comment on Kim's numbers?

MEMBER SINNOTT: Well, if I may, I'll do this very briefly. I would like an opportunity to respond to what the two board members just said.

First of all, I believe we're in agreement -- and we can review the transcript of the last meeting of the Board -- it was agreed at that time that television advertising, a radio spot, an effective print ad is not going to explain to a voter how to vote and where to vote. The only thing that you can do through these very short messages on those subjects is tell the voter that there is an internet and you can obtain from the Board of Elections information by visiting the internet or by contacting the Board by telephone. A great many people do that. So there is no
detailed, meaningful voter education that's going to be accomplished through a 15 or 30 -econd television ad. That's an illusion.

Chairman Sexton pointed out that there has not been yet considered by the Board a 2020 communications plan that Chairman Preisse and I have worked on. You may recall that there was a communications plan presented to the Board in 2019 for that year. I'm pleased to report that on this date in early December of 2019 we will be able to circulate to the Board a 2020 communications plan that outlines what the Board of Elections presently has underway by way of communication with the public about when to vote, how to vote, and where to vote. It makes the observation that right now that taxpayers are spending almost a quarter of a million dollars, taxpayers in Franklin County, on that subject and that does not take into account what the Secretary of State will be spending from Ohio taxpayers to deliver to every registered voter in the state of Ohio an application for an absentee ballot that will provide every single registered voter with an opportunity to vote from home if that is what the voter chooses to do. That is a substantial public expense that is now being funded
by all Ohio taxpayers.
And relative to provisional voting, of course, if a voter is qualified to vote and casts a provisional ballot, then that ballot is counted. I believe in 2016, the last presidential election, there were 23,340 provisional ballots cast. 3,480 of those were rejected. 2,237 were rejected because the would-be voter wasn't registered to vote, and another 133 were rejected because the would-be voter was trying to vote twice. That's the overwhelming majority of the provisional ballots that were rejected. In terms of the number of ballots that were cast provisionally that were not accepted but were excluded for a reason other than someone wasn't registered to vote in the first place or was trying to vote twice, that actually works out to be less than one-fifth of one percent. I can't see spending hundreds of thousands of dollars of taxpayer money on TV ads and radio ads to address something that 99.8 percent of our Franklin Countians are able to do successfully. It's just not an efficient use of taxpayer money.

Take a roll call?
CHAIRMAN PREISSE: There's a motion
and a second. There's been discussion. Let's call the roll.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Kim
Marinello?
MEMBER MARINELLO: Yes.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Mike Sexton?
MEMBER SEXTON: Yes.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Doug
Preisse?
CHAIRMAN PREISSE: No.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Brad
Sinnott?
MEMBER SINNOTT: No.
CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Is there another
motion?
MEMBER SEXTON: Yes, I have another motion.

Mr. Chairman, I move that the Director and Deputy Director move forward with the implementation of the 2020 communication plan as presented by the Director in his memo of November 18th, 2019, and that the Director and Deputy Director are authorized to execute contracts and expend funds appropriated for fiscal year 2020 by the Board of County Commissioners in substantial
conformance with the paid media budget outlined in funding option three of the Director's November 18th, 2019, memo in the amount of $\$ 660,250$.

MEMBER MARINELLO: I second.
CHAIRMAN PREISSE: There's a motion
and second.
MEMBER SINNOTT: It sounds as though
that was essentially the motion we just voted on except now the number has risen to $\$ 660,000$. CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I think we've had robust discussion. If there's no other discussion, let's call the roll.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Kim
Marinello?
MEMBER MARINELLO: Yes.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Mike Sexton?
MEMBER SEXTON: Yes.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Doug
Preisse?
CHAIRMAN PREISSE: No.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Brad
Sinnott?
MEMBER SINNOTT: No.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there any

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other --
CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I'd like to just state for the record, as Brad mentioned, there's a robust amount of communication that the Board of Elections -- our Board of Elections and the Secretary of State's office currently engage in, much of which is outlined in the draft communication plan for 2020 that we have and will distribute. And this discussion is not happening in a vacuum. There's a heck of a lot that goes on on a daily basis by the good bipartisan staff employees here at the Board 365 days a year.

So I appreciate your comments. MEMBER SEXTON: I'd just like to comment that I think I received a copy of that at 9:51 a.m. this morning. Our plan has been out there for -- you know, since November 18th. I think it was 16 pages. I looked through it a little bit, looked at the summary, and there did not seem to be any -- You're right about some of the stuff that our staff is doing. I think our staff does a great job. I think we're going to obviously have one of the highest voter turnouts we've ever seen in Franklin County and we need to adjust for the advertising accordingly.

MEMBER SINNOTT: To be clear, Michael, there's no suggestion that we ought to be acting on the Republican communication plan today. We are still in the month of December of 2019. There is no panic to this. So if the Board is so inclined, we have ample time to implement the Republican plan if that's what the Board chooses to do.

I move to adjourn.
MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
(Vote taken.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
same sign.
(No response.)
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: The motion
carries. We are adjourned.
