5	we have a quorum, but I will take the roll call.
6	Kim Marinello.
7	MEMBER MARINELLO: Here.
8	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Mike Sexton.
9	MEMBER SEXTON: Here.
10	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Doug
11	Preisse.
12	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Here.
13	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And Brad
14	Sinnott.
15	MEMBER SINNOTT: Here.
16	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We do indeed
17	have a quorum.
18	The approval of the minutes. I
19	believe you were sent the November 4th, 2019,
20	minutes of the Board of Elections. Are there any
21	deletions, additions, or corrections? If not, I
22	would accept a motion to approve those minutes.
23	MEMBER MARINELLO: I move that the
24	Board approve the minutes of the November 4th, 2019
25	meeting of the Franklin County Board of Elections

2	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.
3	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
4	favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
5	(Vote taken.)
6	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
7	same sign.
8	(No response.)
9	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
10	carries.
11	The next item on the agenda is the
12	paper ballot allocation for the March 17th primary
13	election. You may recall that the Secretary of
14	State has a directive that requires us requires
15	the Board to approve the paper ballot allocation as
16	well as the machine and e-pollbook allocation.
17	So Carla, if you want to do the
18	paper ballot allocation first.
19	MS. PATTON: The Secretary of State
20	requires that we do a paper ballot allocation as
21	well as a machine and poll pad allocation no later
22	than 90 days prior to the election in even numbered
23	elections; therefore, Exhibit A is before you. We
24	reviewed 2016 and 2018 voting numbers, and at this
25	point in time prior to the filing deadline we have

to assume that every precinct split is active for
 this election.

3 So what we've done is we've taken 4 the numbers from the previous like election with 5 the highest numbers and we've done five percent 6 more than the maximum number of provisional ballots 7 plus another 20 percent of the maximum number of 8 election day ballots being cast in the like 9 election. We then rounded those up to poll pads of 10 25 for the major parties, and that's what the 11 allocation set before you on the major party ballot 12 allocation column is. For the minor parties for 13 the primary, we will do a pad of 15 ballots for 14 each one of those. This allocation is subject to 15 change with the possible inclusion of ballot on 16 demand printing at the polling locations on 17 election day; but for right now this is the 18 allocation that we present to you for approval. 19 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And if I'm 20 correct, Carla, we have to have the Board approve 21 this on three separate occasions so if it does 22 change we --23 MS. PATTON: We will present you 24 with another allocation within 30 days prior to the 25 primary election as well with any updates and

2	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Any
3	questions for Carla?
4	MEMBER SEXTON: So how many did we
5	increase for provisionals from when we used 2016
6	and 2018?
7	MS. PATTON: So we took the higher
8	of those two elections and took that number plus an
9	additional five percent on top of that, which is
10	required by the Secretary of State's directive.
11	MEMBER SEXTON: So the higher of the
12	two elections was 2016 or 2018? I assume '16.
13	MS. PATTON: 2016.
14	MEMBER SEXTON: Yeah.
15	MS. PATTON: And then to handle our
16	election paper by choice voters we took the
17	20 percent of the election day ballots cast to
18	include in that number to handle the paper by
19	choice voters who are
20	MEMBER SEXTON: From the general
21	election?
22	MS. PATTON: The primary election.
23	MEMBER SEXTON: Of the primary
24	election in May?
25	MS. PATTON: Yes. It's all based on

3	With that, I would move the Board
4	adopt the paper ballot allocation formula on
5	Exhibit A compiled by the board staff for the March
6	17th, 2020 primary election.
7	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
8	second?
9	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.
10	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
11	favor signify by saying aye.
12	(Vote taken.)
13	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
14	same sign.
15	(No response.)
16	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: The Motion
17	carries.
18	The next item on the agenda is
19	voting machine and e-pollbook allocation for the
20	March 17 primary election.
21	Carla, I'll turn it over to you for
22	that.
23	MS. PATTON: In front of you you
24	have Exhibit B, the machine and poll pad allocation
25	for this allocation for the number of marking

	10
1	devices. We are assigning one marking device for
2	every 245 active voters in Franklin County, and
3	that's how you come up with the number under the
4	column 2020 ballot marker assignments. Based off
5	of that, the 2020 ballot counter assignments is
6	one at least one for every nine ballot marking
7	devices in a location. For the poll pads, that is
8	based on one poll pad with no less than three for
9	every 800 registered voters in a location.
10	These The poll pad allocation is based on the
11	same number of voters we've done in the past. The
12	marking device allocations, we did increase the
13	number of marking devices as we acquired another
14	694 earlier this month to deploy out for the next
15	election. So that did lower the ratio down to one
16	for every 245 active voters.
17	And again, this is an allocation
18	that we will have to re-present to you within
19	30 days. And we will look at some of the issues
20	that are filed for the election to determine if the
21	additional marking devices need to go into certain
22	areas based on issues being presented on the
23	ballot.
24	MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay.
25	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Looks good.

1	MEMBER SINNOTT: I move that the
2	Board adopt the voting machine and e-pollbook
3	allocation formula in Exhibit B complied by the
4	board staff for the March 17, 2020 primary
5	election.
6	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
7	second?
8	MEMBER SEXTON: Second.
9	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
10	favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
11	(Vote taken.)
12	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
13	same sign.
14	(No response.)
15	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
16	carries.
17	The next item on the agenda is the
18	two percent cost of living raise for all full-time
19	employees. As you may remember, we're presently
20	constrained by month-to-month budgeting. We would
21	ask the Board for a two percent cost of living
22	raise for the pay periods December 6th and
23	December 20th if the Board is so inclined.
24	DIRECTOR LEONARD: And when the
25	Board of Commissioners allocated a monthly

1	appropriation for the month of November and the
2	month of December there were sufficient funds that
3	would allow for the cost of living adjustment.
4	MEMBER MARINELLO: I move that the
5	Board approve the two percent cost of living pay
6	increase to all full-time Board of Elections staff
7	employed as of January 1st, 2019, retroactive to
8	November 11th and that this increase stands as a
9	one-time increase specific to the upcoming pay
10	periods of December 6th and December 20th, as we
11	are presently constrained by month-to-month
12	budgeting.
13	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
14	second?
15	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.
16	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
17	favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
18	(Vote taken.)
19	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
20	same sign.
21	(No response.)
22	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
23	carries.
24	The next item on the agenda is the
25	Board of Elections parking policy for the March

17th primary. And I'll turn that over to Ed
 2 Leonard, Director.

3 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Because of the 4 reduction in the number of available parking spaces 5 in the Board of Elections complex, we felt it 6 necessary to help alleviate the parking crunch that 7 we're going to experience at the early vote center. 8 Both for the primary election and the general 9 election, we needed to implement a policy that 10 relates to both the employees so that the Director 11 and Deputy Director have the authority to make 12 requirements for the Board employees to park off 13 site and then we would provide a shuttle to shuttle 14 the employees from off-site parking to the Board of 15 Elections site, but also to provide for the ability 16 to limit the parking in front of the Board of Elections building to just voter parking and those 17 18 conducting official business.

As many of you probably have seen, we have a lot of campaigns that will park a vehicle in the lot during the early vote cycle and just camp out the entire day. That takes up a space for a voter, and this -- with this upcoming 2020 election we simply need to make sure that every space available is available for a voter.

1	14 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So how do you
2	envision managing that,
3	DIRECTOR LEONARD: Again, I
4	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: denying
5	campaigns
6	DIRECTOR LEONARD: Well, what we
7	wanted to do was to provide a space where they can
8	have at least two spaces
9	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Which would be
10	where?
11	DIRECTOR LEONARD: Somewhere on the
12	lot in front of the building that we would provide
13	designated spaces where anybody can operate. They
14	have to learn to share it, but that would at least
15	provide it. But if there's a vehicle out there
16	with a campaign candidate banner on it, we'd have
17	to ask them to move their vehicle because that's
18	not what the it's the vehicle the spaces are
19	reserved for voters as opposed to campaigns and
20	candidates and volunteers.
21	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And a lot of
22	campaigns have been doing that willingly anyway,
23	moving. I mean, they're allowed to be out there.
24	We are just asking that their vehicles not be out
25	there.

1	DIRECTOR LEONARD: This would not in
2	any way constrain their ability to campaign. Well,
3	it would in the fact that they can't park a vehicle
4	outside that hundred foot line, but they could
5	still stand and pass out handbills and literature
6	and so forth.
7	MEMBER MARINELLO: Is there going to
8	be somebody out there with security?
9	DIRECTOR LEONARD: We'll have staff
10	out there that will be helping guide voters to
11	vacant parking spaces and that sort of thing. So
12	there will be folks out there. We have sheriff's
13	deputies out there as well to advise. And we've
14	done it in the past where we've had to advise a
15	group that they couldn't take up spaces and they
16	were advised that you either move your tent or the
17	sheriff's deputies are going to move it for you,
18	and they willingly move their tent.
19	MEMBER SINNOTT: Yeah. I think we
20	would continue to get cooperation from the
21	campaigns.
22	DIRECTOR LEONARD: And part of the
23	reason for having it at this stage was so that we
24	could advise the campaigns when they file their
25	candidacies on the 18th, when they file their

	16
1	petitions, that we can have a notice for them so
2	they can be made aware of this as early in the
3	process as possible.
4	MEMBER SINNOTT: And then the idea
5	is as to board employees, we're going to tell them
6	that during the period that the early vote center
7	is in operation that they're supposed to park not
8	around the board offices but at a remote site and
9	then we will shuttle them down from that remote
10	site to their jobs at the board?
11	DIRECTOR LEONARD: Right. And for
12	the primary it may not need to be for the entire
13	28-day period.
14	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Maybe three
15	days.
16	DIRECTOR LEONARD: It might be a few
17	days when we anticipate the heaviest turnout.
18	MEMBER SINNOTT: Because of
19	construction around the board offices in recent
20	times, how many parking spots have we lost?
21	DIRECTOR LEONARD: In this entire
22	complex, we 256 were lost with the construction
23	and then we gained back I think in total we've
24	lost 165 net. Because there were additional spaces
25	when we re-striped the parking lot that gained us

	17
1	some additional parking spaces, but a net loss of I
2	believe it's 163 spaces, somewhere in that
3	MEMBER SINNOTT: How many parking
4	spots do we gain if we have employees parking in
5	the remote lot?
6	DIRECTOR LEONARD: It could be
7	anywhere from 130 to 160. So
8	MEMBER SINNOTT: Where is that
9	remote lot going to be?
10	DIRECTOR LEONARD: Right now we made
11	arrangements with Ascension Lutheran, which is kind
12	of catty-corner from our location. It's right next
13	to the Chase Bank, and there's an office building
14	there. They don't utilize their There's a rear
15	parking lot to the back that they don't really
16	utilize at all. So that, and then on the weekends
17	we'd be able to utilize JFS parking lot and
18	potentially taxation as well. In the past they
19	made that available to us, the Department of
20	Taxation.
21	MEMBER SINNOTT: Are we leasing
22	these remote parking locations?
23	DIRECTOR LEONARD: The Ascension
24	Lutheran, yes. And I forget the cost per day. I
25	can't recall exactly what the cost was. There was

	18
1	a daily fee that we would pay per, but it wasn't
2	I'm trying to think. Maybe \$1,500 for the entire
3	period of early vote if we used it every single
4	day. So it wasn't a huge amount.
5	MEMBER SINNOTT: And then the state
6	agency allows us to use their parking lot for free?
7	DIRECTOR LEONARD: Correct.
8	MEMBER SINNOTT: What does it cost,
9	then, to shuttle employees in each day?
10	DIRECTOR LEONARD: For each shuttle
11	bus it's 655 a day for about a 13-hour day.
12	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: But we're
13	thinking of using only three days.
14	DIRECTOR LEONARD: Depending the
15	number of days that we use in the primary and the
16	general.
17	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And it's on the
18	other side of the street, right, the other side of
19	Morse?
20	DIRECTOR LEONARD: Yeah.
21	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's just
22	beyond the fire station.
23	DIRECTOR LEONARD: And in the
24	general election we did a test to see, you know,
25	how functional that would be and found it to be

1	19 that it worked well for us.
-	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I asked the
-	question at a previous meeting that I was concerned
4	that the employees might be walking back and forth;
- 5	but you suggested then, or one of you did, that
6	
-	they won't do that because it's too far. But it's
7	only about a quarter of a mile, isn't it, or an
8	eighth of a mile?
9	DIRECTOR LEONARD: I'm not sure of
10	the exact distance, but it's not very far. We've
11	had a couple of people, you know, some of our
12	younger employees, who went ahead and walked that.
13	I walked it on one occasion, as well.
14	MEMBER SINNOTT: I thought you said
15	the younger employees, Ed.
16	DIRECTOR LEONARD: Exactly. That's
17	what I said, I'm not so young.
18	MEMBER SINNOTT: So in summary, what
19	would it cost the taxpayers to do this remote
20	parking plan for board employees during the early
21	vote period?
22	DIRECTOR LEONARD: If we did it for
23	the entire cycle, it would be about 15,000 to
24	shuttle staff, for the parking and the shuttling of
25	staff.

	20
1	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: If you did
2	it every day. But we're thinking I think I did
3	the formula and I think it's \$214 a day if we only
4	use three days. So I guess we'll determine that.
5	And then what were we thinking? For the 28-day
6	period you said \$1,500?
7	DIRECTOR LEONARD: For the lot,
8	right.
9	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: For the lot.
10	MEMBER SEXTON: So what we're
11	deciding today is for the primary election only?
12	DIRECTOR LEONARD: No. This is for
13	the policy in general that then gives us the
14	authority to do it as we need it. So the primary
15	and general.
16	MEMBER SEXTON: So it gives the
17	authority to the Director and Deputy Director to up
18	to 28 days for either election, primary or general?
19	DIRECTOR LEONARD: Right.
20	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. Work in
21	progress.
22	MEMBER SEXTON: I move the Board
23	adopt the early vote center parking policy that
24	establishes standards within the Franklin County
25	Board of Elections regarding parking in and around

	21
1	the early vote center during the 28-day period of
2	in-person absentee voting.
3	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.
4	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
5	favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
6	(Vote taken.)
7	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
8	same sign.
9	(No response.)
10	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
11	carries.
12	The next item on the agenda is the
13	TMH Solutions contract with Jo Campbell.
14	DIRECTOR LEONARD: Board members, as
15	you're aware, we have had a project management
16	consultant contract with TMH Solutions for the last
17	year and almost a year and a half. And the project
18	manager, Jo Campbell, has done a great job for us
19	in assisting us in the preparation of the
20	implementation of the new voting equipment and at
21	the same time doing working on the Tenex voter
22	registration software, both the whole contracting
23	process, the bid evaluation process. And really
24	now we've we entered into that contract this
25	summer and we have begun the implementation

	22
1	process. And this project management contract
2	would assist us in continuing to work on the
3	implementation of the voter registration software
4	system for 2020.
5	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And you're
6	thinking would we go through would we use
7	this contract for the full year or
8	DIRECTOR LEONARD: I wouldn't
9	anticipate that we'll use it for the full year
10	because the implementation we expect the
11	implementation of the voter registration software
12	to be accomplished by July of 2020. And there may
13	be additional hours beyond that as we go through
14	the ballots towards election day, but I don't
15	anticipate that we would need it for the full year.
16	And I would my hope is that once we implement in
17	July that the number of hours will start to tail
18	off as we get closer to election day. The amount
19	remains the hourly rate remains the same from
20	the last contract the Board authorized, and the
21	number of hours
22	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: In the last
23	contract it was 2,000 I believe we authorized, and
24	this time it's 1,500 that we're asking for.
25	DIRECTOR LEONARD: 1,500. Which

	23
1	would based on the current rate of usage of the
2	hours, it would take us through probably October of
3	next year; although, it might be slightly less if
4	she works more hours in the coming in the first
5	few months of 2020.
6	MEMBER SINNOTT: How long has TMH
7	been providing this service?
8	DIRECTOR LEONARD: Since May of
9	2018.
10	MEMBER SINNOTT: Can we envision a
11	time when we will not need to contract with TMH for
12	this?
13	DIRECTOR LEONARD: It will end at
14	some point.
15	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: July
16	probably.
17	MEMBER SINNOTT: July of 2020?
18	DIRECTOR LEONARD: It might be a
19	little bit longer because that's with the
20	implementation, but then I would imagine there will
21	still be some project activity that will take place
22	after the implementation. And that's why I've
23	scaled back the hours from 2,000 to 1,500.
24	MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay.
25	Then I move that the Board authorize

ī	
1	24 the Director and Dorutu Director to opter into a
1	the Director and Deputy Director to enter into a
2	contract with TMH Solutions with Jo Campbell to
3	continue their service as project manager with the
4	Tenex migration at the hourly rate of \$115 with
5	hours not to exceed 1,500 and the total amount of
6	the contract not to exceed \$172,500, the terms of
7	the contract to run from January 1, 2020 through
8	December 31, 2020.
9	MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.
10	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
11	favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
12	(Vote taken.)
13	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
14	same sign.
15	(No response.)
16	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
17	carries.
18	The next item on the agenda is the
19	UPS, the uninterruptible power supply purchase.
20	And I could let Carolyn explain in detail what it
21	is; but for a novice here, it's a battery backup
22	for all servers and routers and it's one of the
23	critical items that's required by the Secretary of
24	State. We have to have this. So basically if our
25	power supply goes down, there's a short period of

1	time
2	Right, Carolyn?
3	MS. GORUP: Yes.
4	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: that we
5	use it.
6	MS. GORUP: There's a minimal maybe
7	30 seconds between the time the power goes out and
8	the generator kicks in, and this keeps everything
9	up and running continuously. That's what the UPS
10	is.
11	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Right.
12	And on election day we experienced
13	that very
14	MS. GORUP: We had a catastrophic
15	failure.
16	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: This past
17	election?
18	MS. GORUP: Yes.
19	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: What happened?
20	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We had a
21	power surge.
22	MS. GORUP: We don't really know why
23	the UPS failed, but it did. And we had to run and
24	unplug it from the UPS and plug it into the wall,
25	and it took a while for everything to come up. But

1 we've had several occasions where the power has 2 gone off and the UPS has done their job. We had an election day not that long ago that we had a major 3 4 power outage in the area. And I was one of the 5 last to know because I was sitting back in my 6 office and everything was still running. 7 DIRECTOR LEONARD: So, again, the 8 importance of the uninterruptible power supply is 9 critical to the operation of the office. The ones 10 that are currently in place are aging, and so it's 11 recommended that we replace those UPS units. We're 12 still in the process of acquiring quotes for the 13 needed replacement. So we will obtain three quotes 14 for replacing five units, and once we receive that 15 quote we'll select the lowest cost vendor and --16 But we've already spec'd out what we need in terms 17 of the -- what we need for the criteria for those 18 UPS units.

So right now an additional -- one of 24 the first quotes was about 15,000, so we want to 25 make sure that if for some reason it's a little bit

23	separate expenses because we're not purchasing them
24	from All Electric.

That caused me to reflect. 10 Wouldn't it be great if we made as much of a Wow. 11 fuss about publicity for voting and voting as we do 12 making sure that everyone stands for the National 13 Anthem. Both of those are very emblematic of our 14 democracy: the flag, the National Anthem, and the 15 right to vote. We need to make our voices heard 16 about the right to vote. 17 I'm here today to ask you to take 18 that challenge, to publicize the elections for this 19 year. We know that there's going to be tons of 20 candidate advertising; there's not a doubt about 21 that. What doesn't come up in the candidate 22 advertising, though, is where to vote, how to vote, 23 when to vote. One of the questions I've been 24 asking people I've talked to is what is the last 25 day to register to vote. And since we have an

1	46 early primary this year, I've gotten a lot of wrong
2	answers. And it's critical that people know when
3	they have to be registered by in order to be able
4	to vote.
5	They also need to know things like
6	how to get an application for an absentee ballot or

9	Xerox piece of paper that said, oh, by the way, if

2	reassurance also. They need reassurance their

4	that there's not going to be interference in our
5	election. They're hearing and seeing lots of
6	things about cyber attack this and cyber attack
7	that. They need reassurance that the Board has
8	taken measures to prevent cyber attacks from
9	affecting their vote. Again, knowing that
10	candidate advertising is just going to saturate the
11	TV, the Board of Elections could be that calm voice
12	helping people to exercise their right to vote.

15	vote until after four of her children had been

So what 2 3 this proposal calls for is spending on TV ads, 4 radio ads, and print ads to tell people that 5 there's an internet and you can get information 6 about how to vote and where to vote off of the 7 internet by taking the total household income for 8 eight or nine Franklin County households and 9 devoting that amount in taxpayer money to that 10 I do not see that as being a sound purpose. 11 expenditure of taxpayer money. 12 It's also true that we should always 13 be concerned as a board of elections about the 14 uniform administration of elections in Ohio. We 15 should not have 88 different election processes in 16 this state. We need to have a uniform administration of elections. What the Franklin 17 18 County Commissioners are doing through this -- I'll 19 call it -- lavish spending proposal is proposing 20 that we spend hundreds of thousands of dollars 21 under one version of the plan, nearly a million 22 dollars, to get out the vote in heavily Democratic 23 Franklin County. That is a partisan action. 24 If the General Assembly were to 25 propose that there be a get-out-the-vote publicly

financed drive in Clermont, Butler, and Warren
 Counties, we would all see that as being a part of
 the partisan plan. This is a part of the partisan
 plan.

5 Then, finally, it is troubling that 6 this plan is being generated by candidates for 7 public office, two of whom will be on the ballot in 8 2020. For very good reasons we do not turn to 9 those who participate as candidates in the election 10 process and ask them what should the election 11 process be. That is a determination to be made by 12 the Secretary of State and the Board of Elections. 13 It is of no more relevance what the three county 14 commissioners who are candidates for public office 15 every four years think about the administration of 16 elections in Franklin County than what Donald Trump or Elizabeth Warren thinks about that subject. 17 It 18 is the Board of Elections that has the exclusive 19 authority and responsibility to shape the election 20 process in Franklin County working in concert with 21 the instructions from the Ohio Secretary of State. 22 For all of those reasons, I vote -- or will vote in 23 a moment when the discussion ends "no" on the 24 pending motion.

7	I have worked on. You may recall that there was a
8	communications plan presented to the Board in 2019
9	for that year. I'm pleased to report that on this
10	date in early December of 2019 we will be able to
11	circulate to the Board a 2020 communications plan
12	that outlines what the Board of Elections presently
13	has underway by way of communication with the
14	public about when to vote, how to vote, and where
15	to vote. It makes the observation that right now
16	that taxpayers are spending almost a quarter of a
17	million dollars, taxpayers in Franklin County, on
18	that subject and that does not take into account

20	Ohio taxpayers to deliver to every registered voter
21	in the state of Ohio an application for an absentee
22	ballot that will provide every single registered

2 And relative to provisional voting, 3 of course, if a voter is qualified to vote and 4 casts a provisional ballot, then that ballot is 5 I believe in 2016, the last presidential counted. 6 election, there were 23,340 provisional ballots 7 3,480 of those were rejected. 2,237 were cast. 8 rejected because the would-be voter wasn't 9 registered to vote, and another 133 were rejected 10 because the would-be voter was trying to vote 11 twice. That's the overwhelming majority of the 12 provisional ballots that were rejected. In terms 13 of the number of ballots that were cast 14 provisionally that were not accepted but were 15 excluded for a reason other than someone wasn't 16 registered to vote in the first place or was trying 17 to vote twice, that actually works out to be less 18 than one-fifth of one percent. I can't see 19 spending hundreds of thousands of dollars of 20 taxpayer money on TV ads and radio ads to address 21 something that 99.8 percent of our Franklin 22 Countians are able to do successfully. It's just 23 not an efficient use of taxpayer money. 24 Take a roll call? 25 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: There's a motion
