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446 are on the recommended list, 19 not certified.

4	MR. SINNOTT: Jeff, you said 465
5	people tried to file and all but 19 are recommended
6	for certification to the ballot?

8	MEMBER SINNOTT: Got it.
9	MR. MACKEY: Which is around
10	3-1/2 percent.
11	MEMBER SINNOTT: Thank you.
12	MR. MACKEY: The staff examined all
13	the petitions and found the candidates listed on
14	Exhibit A to have timely filed and provided valid
15	and sufficient petitions.
16	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Any
17	questions concerning Exhibit A?
18	MEMBER SEXTON: I have a couple of
19	questions I'd like to bring up, first,
20	Mr. Chariman, if that's okay.
21	I'd like to look specifically at
22	four of the candidates, Travis Buskirk, Columbus
23	85,
24	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: These are
25	candidates for central committee?

1	MEMBER SEXTON: Central committee.
2	Monique McCoy 13, Ibrahima Sow
3	46, and Erick Bellomy 49, in the sense that it's my
4	understanding that the petition was not completely
5	filled out at the bottom. I'm referring to this
6	part here. The candidate's name, party, and
7	language are missing from the petition.
8	DIRECTOR LEONARD: The reference is
9	to the bottom of the central committee candidate
10	petition there's a segment that the candidate must
11	fill out at the bottom of the first page.
12	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: These are blank.
13	DIRECTOR LEONARD: It's blank just
14	to give you a sample of the reference he's
15	references.
16	MEMBER MARINELLO: Letting the voter
17	know what they're signing, basically.
18	MR. MACKEY: I don't think
19	Miss McCoy's falls into this. They're supposed to
20	be on legal size paper, but it didn't come out. So
21	the petition for candidate section is cut off at
22	the bottom.
23	MEMBER SINNOTT: Sort of feel like
24	Doug and I walked into the middle of a
25	conversation, that you folks know something about

1	these four that we don't at this point.
2	So there are four candidates for
3	county Democratic Central Committee that the staff
4	is recommending for certification, but there's an
5	issue about the way the bottom of their petitions
6	appear?
7	MR. MACKEY: Correct.
8	MEMBER SINNOTT: You apparently
9	heard about this, too?
10	MR. MACKEY: Recently, yes.
11	MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay. And does
12	anybody have a copy of the four in question?
13	MR. MACKEY: I don't have copies. I
14	have the originals here.
15	MEMBER SINNOTT: Well, shall we see
16	the originals?
17	MR. MACKEY: I don't think
18	Miss McCoy falls in that category. The other three
19	do.
20	MEMBER SINNOTT: So Miss McCoy is
21	here. So she apparently is different.
22	DIRECTOR LEONARD: And it's the
23	bottom of the first page that is the issue or the
24	bottom of each of those first pages. If you look
25	at that form that you were just given, it shows

2	actually looks like. The bottom section is
3	completely cut off.
4	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Well, there's
5	also information missing, at least in this case,
6	Ibrahima Sow's petition, below the signature,
7	although it appears it's supposedly filled in here
8	with address, state, and Zip Code.
9	MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay.
10	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So it's an
11	incomplete petition. Right?
12	MEMBER SINNOTT: I guess that's the
13	question, yes.
14	What's the issue with McCoy?
15	MEMBER SEXTON: I would withdraw
16	that. I thought it was the same thing, but it
17	appears to be no issue with that one. Apparently
18	not. She did hers on legal. So I withdraw my
19	concerns about Monique McCoy, Columbus Ward 13.
20	But on these other three, with
21	reading from the Secretary of State Section 102,
22	General Rules for Verifying Candidate and Issue

State, in the case of a statewide candidate, or the

Petitions, it says, When there is an error or

omission on the petition form, the Secretary of

board of elections, in the case of all other candidates, must determine whether the prospective candidate substantially compiled with the form.

And I think in these three cases these three individual candidates have not.

MR. MACKEY: And the advice from the Secretary of State's handbook in the nominating petition portion is that the question of whether the board may certify a prospective candidate's petition when the nominating petition portion of the form is incomplete is a substantial compliance decision for the board of elections to make in consultation with its legal counsel and the county prosecuting attorney.

In the past when we have experienced incomplete nominating petition sections we have gone ahead and certified, which is why I included them here. And also, I think there's more like that over there on the Exhibit A right now. If we are going to exclude those, I would need time to try and figure out which ones those are.

MEMBER MARINELLO: It looks like a critical part of the petition because the voter won't know what he's signing for. According to the language that was cut off, the voter wouldn't know

1	that he's certifying that he is a qualified
2	elector, political party, would be a good
3	candidate, and all of that. It's critical.
4	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Well
5	MEMBER SINNOTT: Tim, what does
6	the prosecutor's office have any advice for us?
7	MR. LECKLIDER: First I've heard of
8	it. I haven't been consulted prior to this or seen
9	the documents. If you'd like to recess, I'd be
10	happy to do all that.
11	MEMBER SINNOTT: We probably do want
12	to treat similarly situated people the same.
13	And Jeff, you're saying you think
14	that in the approved list there may be a number of
15	other people other than the three that Chairman
16	Sexton just mentioned?
17	MR. MACKEY: I'm pretty certain
18	there are more.
19	MEMBER SINNOTT: And that's true
20	because you think that we have regularly accepted
21	petitions in the past that didn't have the petition
22	for candidate section completed?
23	MR. MACKEY: Correct.
24	MEMBER SINNOTT: Do you have a sense
25	of how many others are in the same situation?

1	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I think we have
2	to if we've been told by a staff member that
3	MEMBER MARINELLO: It says it's
4	printed on legal size paper so that nothing is cut
5	off. Of course
6	MR. MACKEY: There are instructions
7	if they use our website that say that. The
8	petition doesn't say this anywhere I don't think.
9	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Indeed, this
10	supposedly complete blank form is on standard size
11	letter paper.
12	DIRECTOR LEONARD: Right. I printed
13	that for your sake. I went to the Secretary of
14	State's website and printed it and
15	MR. MACKEY: If you make the correct
16	set of adjustments on a PDF printer you can get it
17	on a letter-size form.
18	DIRECTOR LEONARD: Right.
19	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Well, we want the
20	opinion of our counsel who is asking for time to
21	look at this. So I don't know that we need to
22	recess if we just pause and skip this one and go on
23	to the next item, unless it's a matter where we
24	need your complete attention.
25	MEMBER SINNOTT: Well, I don't think

1	we can do list A and B until we have this question
2	resolved because people will presumably be moving
3	from the approved list to the non-approved list if
4	we decide the question that way.
5	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Let's move on to
6	other matters. I think we can pass on this for the
7	moment.

I wouldn't think so, but --6 DIRECTOR LEONARD: We can certainly 7 hold off on A and B, but C pertains to local 8 options. 9 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Okay. Ι 10 would have thought --11 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Carla can speak 12 to it. 13 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Okay. 14 Carla. 15 MS. PATTON: In front of you you 16 have Exhibit C which is questions and issues recommended for Board approval. Contained on that 17 18 list are all the local option petitions that were 19 filed. These petitions were timely filed with the 20 Board of Elections by the deadline and were 21 reviewed by staff and found to be sufficient in the 22 number of signatures required as well as the 23 information contained on the face of the petition. 24 Same with all the local questions, they were timely

filed and we recommend that the issues set forth in

5	MS. PATTON: Everything was reviewed
6	by the local counsel and everything met the minimum

10	Board certify to the March 17, 2020, Primary
11	Election Ballot the issues and local options listed
12	on Exhibit C and that these issues and local
13	options were timely filed and found to be valid and
14	sufficient.

16	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
17	favor of the motion signify by saying aye.
18	(Vote taken.)

25	agenda, the Board-granted personal holiday leave.

Typically, in the past, at least since I've been here, and I know it happened many years before, the Board would grant in some cases four holiday days to take between the Christmas holiday and the new year. This year because we just finished up with the November general election and we have a March 17th primary, we thought that if the Board was so inclined two days would probably be more appropriate just because we do have work to get done.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: Operationally it's just difficult for us to accommodate four vacation days or four administrative days for every staff member, but two within the time window that's set forth would be operationally something we could manage and would recommend.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Yeah.

22	and not be open to the public.
23	MEMBER SINNOTT: I move that the
24	Board offices remain open for staff only, not to
25	the general public, on Presidents' Day, Monday,

1 have that dedicated space, dedicated parking. 2 We've conducted our Practice Makes Perfect sessions 3 from the Piedmont facility and now we're also 4 extending this. This lease will allow us to extend 5 through 2020 and allow us to also store some 6 equipment at the Piedmont facility in addition to 7 conducting the poll worker training at the Piedmont 8 facility. 9 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And some of that training happens during early vote. 10 11 don't want training folks here to take up spots for 12 people that might need those spots to early vote. 13 That's the rationale. 14 DIRECTOR LEONARD: And see if 15 there's anything else relating to that. 16

there's anything else relating to that. It's pretty straight forward. It's been a good arrangement with the City of Columbus and it gives us all the access that we need. And so we recommend that we extend that by way of this license extension, license amendment.

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MEMBER SEXTON: I authorize the
Director and Deputy Director to enter into a
license agreement for the building located at
750 Piedmont Avenue for the purposes of training
poll workers and the storage of voting equipment

1 MEMBER SINNOTT: I don't know what 2 was intended here. 3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Why don't 4 you give an update, Antone, as to the background 5 check. 6 MR. WHITE: Certainly. 7 As you know, at the last -- or two 8 board meetings ago the Board adopted the criminal 9 background check policy which was part of the 10 Secretary of State's directive. I believe it was 11 08-2019. And so the Board adopted the criminal 12 background check policy which required full-time 13 staff members of the Board to submit to a background check. Subsequent to that adoption of 14 15 the new policy, we had a total of 43 or 44 board 16 members who did submit to a background check. 17 You mean employees? MEMBER SINNOTT: 18 MR. WHITE: Strike what I said. 19 Board employees who submitted to a background 20 check. And since that time we have received a 21 total of 37 background checks back to the Board. 22 DIRECTOR LEONARD: The remaining 23 background checks are employees who had to have 24 their fingerprints rescanned for some reason, but

all employees who had executed the authorization to

conduct background checks have submitted to the
Conduct background checks have submitted to the
background chicks and they're underway or fully
completed and reports are back.
CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Very well.
MEMBER SINNOTT: Candidate
certification.
DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Do you want
to go to certification of candidates, Jeff?
MR. MACKEY: Okay. I found three
more if you guys would like to take a look at
those.
MEMBER MARINELLO: Same issue with
both?
MR. MACKEY: Two are the exact same
issue. The third, that section was there but was
not filled out.
MEMBER MARINELLO: Same issue.

Central Committee, Columbus Ward 3; Nathan

28; and Kathy Harter, Republican County Central

2	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So we would have
3	to I'm sorry. The three that we've discussed
4	before, are they in Exhibit A?
5	MR. MACKEY: Yes, all six of these
6	are in Exhibit A.
7	DIRECTOR LEONARD: You'd have to
8	amend Exhibit A or approve it as amended, but you'd
9	have to amend Exhibit A if you chose to disqualify
10	the candidates that have been identified.
11	MEMBER SINNOTT: And so that I get
12	this right, before we hear from Tim, so Jeff, what
13	the staff has been doing through the years when it
14	has noticed that the petition for candidate has not
15	been completed is it's been overlooking that and
16	still including the candidate on the certified for
17	the ballot list?
18	MR. MACKEY: Yes. And I believe to
19	start that, that was brought to the Board at some
20	point.
21	MEMBER SINNOTT: But you don't
22	remember when?
23	MR. MACKEY: No.
24	MEMBER SINNOTT: I've never
25	considered this subject to my recollection.

1	Tim, is there anything from the law
2	that you would draw to our attention?
3	MR. LECKLIDER: Yes. But first, if
4	I could just see one example of an alleged
5	deficient My understanding from discussion is
6	that these petitions have been printed off in a
7	form that cuts off a part of the petition. And
8	particularly
9	MEMBER SINNOTT: That's true in five
10	instances. I think in the sixth it was there but
11	it was not completed.
12	MR. LECKLIDER: Right. And I've got
13	a copy here.
14	MR. MACKEY: This has the whole
15	petition.
16	MR. LECKLIDER: That's what it
17	should look like, and this is an example of one
18	that is cut off.
19	DIRECTOR LEONARD: That petition
20	portion of it is cut off at the bottom.
21	MR. LECKLIDER: Okay.
22	DIRECTOR LEONARD: Same here, it's
23	cut off. So the argument being this is the portion
24	that the voter that the voter is told that
25	MR. LECKLIDER: I'm sorry. So why

wouldn't -- in this instance, are these typically a double-sided document or are they --

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MR. MACKEY: They are designed to be on legal paper, front to back.

MR. LECKLIDER: So this -- and this has -- in each instance the circular statement is missing?

MR. MACKEY: Yes.

MR. LECKLIDER: Okay. Well, based upon the direction provided by the Secretary of State and the case notes in the relevant Ohio Revised Code, Section 3513.07, it appears clear that both the Supreme Court and appellate courts in Ohio have confirmed what Mr. Mackey has told the Board, that only substantial compliance is required. Now, there are other portions in the statutes as you know where strict compliance is required, but in this particular instance I would only point out to you -- and again, this is ultimately a matter of Board discussion. And I mean, I don't think there's a distinct definition for what constitutes substantial compliance. It's a decision you're going to have to make regarding whether the candidate in question substantially complied with the form. I would point out to you,

however, that in the document and in the actual filed petitions that I've looked at that the candidate is required to indicate their name and I'm assuming in each instance they did under the declaration of candidacy and they also need to indicate their political party in question. And again, I'm assuming that in each instance they have. So that's the same information that is asked for at the bottom of the form that's being cut off. So that -- I guess that's something to be -- take into consideration.

Now, the case notes that are in this printed edition of the Ohio Revised Code, I'm not seeing any case exactly on point. The cases that are reported in here have to do with omission of a month and day of an election, for example; but they do explicitly mention the standard of substantial compliance. And in each of these cases the court asks the question whether there was a claim of fraud or deception on the part of the candidate in question. So I guess I would examine it in that context.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Well, I've not reflected on this before today. And I would accept that there ought to be a substantial compliance

	standard. But as I look at the petition form, what
	I believe has been omitted from the petition that
	was placed in front of all the electors asked to
	sign was the statement as to what the voter was
	attesting to. It's quite odd. The language that
	appears under the titled petition for candidate is
	what the signatory is affirming through his or her
	signature. So in the absence of that appearing on
	the document that the voter is being asked to sign,
	there's nothing that the voter is certifying
	through his or her signature. It really becomes,
	then, quite an odd document as it was circulated.
1	People were being asked to sign to attest to
	something, but the thing to which they were
,	attesting was absent from the document.
	MEMBER MARINELLO: Totally agree.

 Mr. Chairman, Members of the Franklin County Board of Elections,

First, I would like to say it has been a pleasure to serve the people of Franklin County for 7 years. I have learned so much about the election process. I believe it was the Providential hand of God that has truly been involved and has blessed me through the opportunity to be employed here. When I reflect on the many challenges we have faced and the difficulties we have had to overcome just in my Department, I realize I have been so fortunate to be surrounded by some of the hardest working and good hearted people, especially the Voter Services Staff. My experience with all the Staff of the Board of Elections has not only been rewarding, but in fact awe-inspiring when I observe each year the amazing performance of the massive task of conducting the elections for this urban County. Thank you all for giving me the opportunity to share this experience with you.

I would like to address the Board of Elections regarding Directive 2019-08 of the Ohio Secretary of State which this Board had agreed to adopt and execute. The specific provision requiring a criminal background check including acquiring an image of one's fingerprint I consider objectionable. In my opinion, it is an affront to the sensibilities of every good and patriotic citizen of this State, and a gross infringement of our liberties in violation of the law.

As an American I am particularly blessed to be the beneficiary of such an amazing and great heritage. In a word, it is LIBERTY! It is stated no better than in our Declaration of Independence:

We hold these truths to be self-evident; that all men are created equal. That they are endowed by their creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness, that to secure these rights governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed.

But it is also stated in the fundamental organic law of Ohio. Our Bill of Rights to the Ohio Constitution says:

All men are, by nature, free and independent, and have certain inalienable rights, among which are those of enjoying and defending life and liberty, acquiring, possessing, and protecting property, and seeking and obtaining happiness and safety.

All political power is inherent in the people. Government is instituted for their equal protection and benefit, and they have the right to alter, reform, or abolish the same, whenever they may deem it necessary;

Government does not grant rights. It exists only to protect our Godgiven rights, the sacred rights of the people. Alexander Hamilton put it this way:

The sacred rights of mankind are not to be rummaged for, among old parchments, or musty records. They are written, as with a sun beam, in the whole volume of human nature, by the hand of the divinity itself; and can never be erased or obscured by mortal power.

When we, as free and independent individuals, form a society, we enter into a compact with each other and form a civil body politic or commonwealth. Our common agreement is called a constitution. By it we form a government to frame, enforce, and adjudicate such laws we deem necessary to promote our safety and happiness, to which we mutually submit. We invest in that government only such limited powers we consider appropriate, all the while retaining our sovereign powers as free persons. We delegate, but do not relinquish, a portion of our sovereignty to government for expressed purposes. These purposes are carefully defined in our constitutions, and clear restrictions are put upon these powers delegated to government.

One of these clear restrictions is stated in the 14th Amendment of the Ohio Constitution:

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and possessions, against unreasonable searches and seizures shall not be violated; and no warrant shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, particularly describing the place to be searched and the person and things to be seized.

So there exists around each citizen a sphere of sovereignty that is protected by this and other provisions of our Bill of Rights from encroachment, infringement, usurpation, and violation by government. Often referred to as Right to privacy, it cannot be emphasized too much, that this prohibition is directed, not at our fellow citizens but squarely at the government. It is the power of the state that it is specifically attempting to restrict. The state (that is, the government of the state) is not to be surveilling, investigating, scrutinizing, compiling and keeping files filled with all kinds of personal data, on its citizens.

You may object, "The state cannot keep criminal records??" We are not criminals! We are citizens. You work for us, the People of Ohio; and we do not permit you to investigate us, monitor us, and treat us as criminals. We are a free people. Our Bill of Rights is what distinguishes us as Americans. As for me, I need not give up my seat on the bus to some other class, some higher class of person. And I will not give up my precious, sacred Bill of Rights to some high minded bureaucrat, be he elected or appointed, who tells me that he means well, that he has good intentions, that he knows what's best for me.

Daniel Webster, the great Senator and defender of the Constitution, warned us of just that kind:

Good intentions will always be pleaded for every assumption of

authority. It is hardly too strong to say that the Constitution was made to guard the people against the dangers of good intentions. There are men in all ages who mean to govern well, but they mean to govern. They promise to be good masters, but they mean to be masters.

You, as agents of the State, mean to investigate, keep and disseminate to unspecified institutions personal data files on Board of Elections members, directors, and employees all in the name of some murky threat to our free and trustworthy election systems. Is there a criminal conspiracy of Americans seeking to penetrate our election systems on behalf of a foreign power? Show me the evidence. If there are foreign entities seeking to hack our data systems, tell us who the culprits are, and by all means take action to secure our systems, but don't aim your efforts, your controls, your draconian directives, funded by the people's money, at the good, honest, conscientious people who conduct our elections. We are not the threat!

And how long will it be before the state seeks to compel every citizen to consent the same encroachments upon their liberties, and to concede that they *may* be a criminal, before you permit them to be a poll worker or even to vote? My race did not always have full enjoyment of American rights. Most of us were in bondage, chattel slaves in the land of liberty! But it was not to be. By the Providential mercy of God, the foul stain of slavery was not to be fixed upon the American Republic. By war and the 13th Amendment we were freed. In His good time, the Almighty sundered the chains and broke every yoke. Glory be to His Name! By the 14th Amendment, we gained our citizenship, and by the 15th we secured the right to vote. Then there were the Black codes, literacy tests, poll taxes, and all manner of threats, intimidation, and violence. But now after a long struggle we have come to enjoy the full expression our rights—all of them—under

the Constitution. And now are we to go backward and start giving up our rights just to be able to participate in the election process as good and responsible citizens ought?

You say, "We are trying to prevent fraud." Prevent fraud by spying on the law-abiding? We who labor to conduct free and fair elections are not fraudsters; but we are investigated as criminals before we have done any wrong. Meanwhile, those non-citizens who were allowed to vote illegally in previous elections were only caught and investigated after the fact, and then only some of them. Were you able to utilize your scrutinizing powers to go back and expunge their votes? Were you?

No, our election systems are not at risk from the good citizens who work at the Boards of Elections. If that were so, where is the rash of arrests of corrupt election employees that is sweeping the country? Why haven't I heard about it on the nightly news?

The integrity of our elections systems is established by the good and upright character of the free citizens at our Boards of Elections. It is strengthened by the bipartisan composition of these boards, and is reinforced by the countless mechanical checks and balances utilized to ensure the accuracy of the results. And mind you that this is all done under state and local control. Long passed are the days of Reconstruction and segregation when federal intervention was needed to ensure that Black Americans could vote. We don't need the Federal government interfering in and seeking to control our state and local elections; and we don't need the infringements of our rights which, no doubt, have come at their bidding. Far be it that we undermine freedom to produce free elections. How can we violate our principles to establish them?

You may object, "What law are we in violation of? How is this Directive a violation of law?" There is not one provision of the Ohio

Constitution or the election laws of this State found in Title 35 of the Ohio Revised Code which authorizes these measures. The Secretary of State is not authorized to require every Board of Elections official to undergo a criminal background check and have their personal data and records including fingerprints kept and disseminated by the State. If such provision existed you would read it to me. Even in the Ohio Election Official Manual, whenever there is a reference to background checks, noticeably absent are any citations to the Ohio Revised Code, as there are for the other sections of the manual. If it were a mandatory and legally authorized requirement, I would not be asked to sign a consent form, which appears to grant permission to the State to collect, sequester, and disseminate my personal information, but which also relinquishes my rights and absolves the State from any liability or responsibility for the reckless use or dissemination of such information. The consent form I have been asked to sign contains the following statement:

I voluntarily and knowingly release and discharge the Ohio Attorney General's Office, BCI&I and their employees from all claims and liability related to this authorized criminal record review and dissemination.

Under what kind of delusion would any citizen sign such a statement? It is such an insult to a free American. I grieve for my co-workers who don't fully comprehend what they are doing. No, I will not voluntarily give up my right to be free from unreasonable search and seizure of my person or my effects, nor will I concede that the Secretary of State may exercise powers that are not authorized by the Ohio Revised Code.

Again I must ask why are you aiming your so-called security measures at the staff of the Board of Elections? Where is the evidence of election tampering among us? Where are the convictions of this type? In all my time at this board, I have not heard of even

one case of my co-workers being accused or found guilty of tampering with machines, changing vote count, falsifying results, manipulating voter data, or anything that could be considered election fraud. You claim you are trying to stop it before it happens? So you impose all manner of controls and spying upon the lawabiding citizen. It is not the purpose of the government to stop crime before it happens, not in a free society. Its purpose is to apprehend and punish those who have broken the law.

Already the State assigns each of us a number, and retains a photograph and a few personal data items. Now you want to compile in a file all our potential criminal history, and our fingerprints. But I know it will not stop there. Next you will demand facial imaging, a retinal scan, other forms of biometric data, a blood sample, a DNA sample. Eventually even these will not be enough. To really ensure security we must have a microchip inserted in our bodies, perhaps in our right hand or forehead.

Will all these measures then stop crime, stop fraud, stop cheating. Will they ensure our security? They will not. Then what is the purpose of these encroachments on our liberties? The purpose is control; these are the designs of our would-be rulers which seek to intimidate us into compliance, to condition us to servitude, to put us in continual fear, always looking over our shoulder because of the omnipresent watchful eye of the state. All the while government grows more remote, more powerful, more irresistible in its advance. Well, it stops here. Benjamin Franklin said, "Those who give up essential liberty for temporary security deserve neither liberty nor security." I will not be among those who fall prey to such a delusion. Our American rights must not be sacrificed for this delusion of security. I pray that all my fellow citizens will realize this and join with me.

The question has been posed: Do I have a RELIGIOUS objection to

this policy? To that I answer YES, it is a deeply religious objection. In Galatians 5:1 the Scripture says,

It was for freedom that Christ set us free; therefore, keep standing firm and do not be subject again to a yoke of slavery.

I was born in Richmond, Virginia, the former capitol of the Confederacy. I must again invoke the memory of my ancestors. They were not taught to read, and in most cases were strictly forbidden from learning to read. They were not given Bibles, and if they were caught trying to learn to read the Bible—and they were caught trying to do just that—they were beaten severely. They did not enjoy the freedom of speech—they spoke when they were permitted to speak—or of the press, or of assembly, or to petition the government for a redress of grievances. They could not worship God according to the dictates of their conscience.

They could not pursue their own happiness; they did what they were told to do. They could not own property; they were property. They were denied the right to bear arms for their mutual and self defense. They could not lock their doors and be secure in their meager dwellings. They could not demand a warrant before allowing one to enter; their masters could kick open their door at any time, and search their space and seize their persons. There was no presentment and indictment by a grand jury before they were charged with crimes. If they were accused and punished twice for the same offense, who was there to object? If they were compelled to witness against themselves, could they refuse? Could they find solace in being granted a trial by a jury of their peers? No they could not.

It was never explained to them what law they were accused of breaking. They were not subject to laws; they were subject to men. They could not call witnesses in their favor, or have the assistance of counsel for their defense. They could not post bail, for they had no money; and they had no safety against cruel and unusual punishments. They were regarded as persons so that the slave states could gain more Representatives in Congress, but they could not vote; and they were non-persons when it came to the protections of the due process of law. Their life belonged to others, their liberty was utterly suspended, and their property did not exist. THEY WERE CHATTEL SLAVES—MERE PROPERTY.

But when freedom came, they danced, they sang, they lifted up their hands to their great Deliverer in the heavens. They bowed low and worshipped. They praised God that they were now Americans, free and equal citizens of this Republic, and that those Sacred Rights, our Bill of Rights, was now theirs. And it is now mine.

Do I consider freedom as part of my religion? I most certainly do. Do I consider these Rights as the tenets of my faith? You better believe it. I wish that all Americans believe as I do! Shall I allow these rights to be infringed upon, whittled away, and ultimately erased without objection? Forbid it Almighty God! Shall I voluntarily sign away my birthright for a mess of pottage? If I were to do so, I could not lift up my head to my forefathers without shame. If I give up my heritage of Liberty to the Usurper, how can my children rise up and call me blessed?

Then you may insist, "We are not forcing you to do these things; you don't have to work for the Board of Elections." True enough, but you are forcing me to stop participating in the process of conducting free elections, which I consider an extension, or part in parcel, of my citizenship, my natural right, and my civic duty.

Remember, "All political power is inherent in the people. Government is instituted for their equal protection and benefit, and they have the

right to alter, reform, or abolish the same, whenever they may deem it necessary." You work for us, not we for you. Perhaps it's time to change not the form of our government, but the form of those governing.

Finally, I have enjoyed serving the people of Franklin County in the 7 years that I have worked at this Board of Elections. I am grateful to be free and to be an American, in this special Nation which was built, as John Quincy Adams states, "upon the foundation of the Redeemer's mission on earth." And that mission was revealed by our Lord Jesus Christ when He took the scroll and read from the Prophet Isaiah,

The Spirit of the Lord GOD is upon me,
Because the LORD has anointed me
To bring good news to the afflicted;
To bind up the broken hearted,
To proclaim liberty to captives,
And freedom to those who are bound.
