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4	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I will go
5	ahead and take roll.
6	Kim Marinello.
7	MEMBER MARINELLO: Here.
8	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Mike Sexton.
9	MEMBER SEXTON: Here.
10	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Doug
11	Preisse.
12	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Here.
13	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And Josh
14	Jaffe.
15	MEMBER JAFFE: Here.
16	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We have a
17	quorum.
18	The first item on the agenda is the
19	petition certification reconsideration for Roger
20	Dave George. It's really not so much a
21	reconsideration. I'll let Jeff Mackey explain what
22	we have.
23	MR. MACKEY: In the August 16th
24	meeting staff had indicated that the petition for
25	Roger Dave George, a candidate for Canal Winchester

Т	local school district board of education was
2	insufficient. And at that time the staff had found
3	the petition contained only 24 valid signatures
4	when 25 were required. But on September 1st after
5	receiving our letter that he was not certified
6	Mr. George presented himself at our offices and
7	reviewed his petition with staff and was able to
8	identify one individual who signed his petition
9	that we were not able to identify when we were
10	reviewing his petition. So we went in and checked
11	all the records that we had on file for that
12	individual and were able to find that the signature
13	matched eventually. So accordingly, staff now
14	concludes that Mr. George's petition is sufficient
15	and would recommend that the Board certify his
16	candidacy to the 2021 General Election ballot.
17	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Sounds
18	straightforward to me.
19	MEMBER SEXTON: These are all copies
20	of his petition?
21	MR. MACKEY: The part petition in
22	question was the one stamped at the top 1364.
23	MEMBER JAFFE: The back of the first
24	petition, line six, I think, the third signature
25	down.

1	MR. MACKEY: He identified that as
2	Arnetta Davis.
3	MEMBER SEXTON: The one in Canal
4	Winchester?
5	MR. MACKEY: Yeah.
6	We had it as Arnetta Davis at first,
7	but eventually found the document that matched to
8	that. And it's also attached there to the absentee
9	identification envelope for the primary in 2021.
10	MEMBER SEXTON: That's the one that
11	gave us the ballot number?
12	MR. MACKEY: Yes.
13	MEMBER SEXTON: After considering
14	all the evidence and arguments presented by Board
15	staff regarding the validity of signatures
16	previously ruled invalid by the Board of Elections,
17	I move that Roger Dave George has demonstrated that
18	a sufficient number of signatures were filed and,
19	therefore, the name of Roger Dave George is
20	certified to the November 2nd, 2021 ballot as a
21	candidate for Canal Winchester School Board.
22	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.
23	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
24	moved and seconded.
25	All those in favor of the motion

1 signify by saying aye. 2 (Vote taken.) 3 All opposed, DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: 4 same sign. 5 (No response.) 6 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries. 7 8 The next item on the agenda is a 9 voter registration challenge. And I'll call on Mel 10 Fuhrmann in Voter Services to explain what we have. 11 MS. FUHRMANN: Good afternoon. 12 We received a voter challenge from a 13 voter by the name of Bryan Anthony Faletti of 14 7351 Lebanon Avenue in Reynoldsburg, and you have a 15 copy of that voter challenge form in your packet. 16 Specifically, he is challenging Israel Gonzalez 17 Rodriguez of 7351 Lebanon Avenue in Reynoldsburg 18 and Mr. Faletti asserts that Israel Gonzalez 19 Rodriguez no longer resides at that address. 20 you'll see in your packet I've enclosed a copy of 21 the voter registration, most recent voter 22 registration document for Mr. Rodriguez as well as 23 the voting history for Mr. Rodriguez. I will note 24 that Mr. Rodriguez has not voted since May of 2017.

And I've also enclosed the most recent absentee

1	ballot envelope that was returned by Mr. Faletti in
2	October of 2020 who currently does live at
3	7351 Lebanon Avenue. Also enclosed is his most
4	recent voting history. You can see he voted as
5	recently as November of 2020.
6	MS. GIBBONS: We also received today
7	a return to sender from the notice that was sent to
8	Israel Gonzalez Rodriguez.
9	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: At that 7351
10	address?
11	MS. GIBBONS: That's correct.
12	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Which would
13	indicate that he doesn't live there.
14	DIRECTOR WHITE: Mel, the
15	Mr. Rodriguez's voter registration, is the date on
16	his registration 1-19-2013?
17	MS. FUHRMANN: Yes.
18	DIRECTOR WHITE: That's the last
19	time he filed a registration with the Board?
20	MS. FUHRMANN: That's right.
21	DIRECTOR WHITE: Okay. Thank you.
22	MS. FUHRMANN: And Mr. Faletti is
23	currently an active voter on our voter rolls here
24	in Franklin County.
25	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Looks like a

1	pretty thorough review to me.
2	MEMBER SEXTON: So did Mr. Gonzalez
3	vote in the 2020 election?
4	MS. FUHRMANN: No. Our records show
5	that Mr. Rodriguez last voted in the May primary of
6	2017 and has not voted since that time here in
7	Franklin County.
8	MEMBER SEXTON: Okay.
9	MR. JAFFE: Is that May 2017 or
LO	November 2016? It's sort of hard to read across
L1	the line.
12	MS. FUHRMANN: Let me see. You are
13	correct, Mr. Jaffe. It is November 8th of 2016
L 4	would have been the last time that Mr. Rodriguez
15	voted here in Franklin County.
L6	MR. JAFFE: Absent the challenge
L7	being filed, wouldn't we be checking with him in
L8	the near future as part of the normal process to
L9	see if he's still an active voter?
20	MS. FUHRMANN: Yes.
21	MEMBER SEXTON: All right. Well,
22	with that, I will move that the Board approve the
23	challenge of the right to vote filed by Bryan
24	Anthony Faletti of 7351 Lebanon Avenue,
25	Reynoldsburg, Ohio, against Israel Gonzalez

1	Rodriguez of 7351 Lebanon Avenue, Reynoldsburg,
2	Ohio and that Israel Gonzalez Rodriguez's
3	registration be removed from the Franklin County
4	voter file.
5	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I second the
6	motion.
7	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
8	moved and seconded.
9	All those in favor of the motion
10	signify by saying aye.
11	(Vote taken.)
12	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
13	same sign.
14	(No response.)
15	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
16	carries.
17	The next item on the agenda is the
18	certification of write-in candidates for the
19	November 7th General Election. Or no. It says
20	November 7th, but it's November 2nd.
21	MR. MACKEY: On August 18th we
22	received from Annette Jamiel and Christy Mathys
23	timely declarations of intent to be write-in
24	candidates for the office of village council in the
25	Village of Brice. The staff has reviewed those

1	declarations and found them to be valid and
2	sufficient.
3	MEMBER MARINELLO: I move that the
4	Board certify Annette Jamiel and Christy Mathys as
5	valid write-in candidates for the Village of Brice
6	council members on the November 2, 2021 General
7	Election ballot.
8	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I'll second the
9	motion.
10	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
11	moved and seconded.
12	All those in favor of the motion
13	signify by saying aye.
14	(Vote taken.)
15	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
16	same sign.
17	(No response.)
18	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
19	carries.
20	The next item on the agenda is we
21	have two candidate withdrawals from Worthington
22	City Council.
23	MR. MACKEY: On August 20th we
24	received written notification from Eddie Pauline,
25	candidate for Worthington City Council, that he

wished to withdraw and have his name removed from
the ballot. The deadline to have your name removed
from the ballot was August 24th. So he was within
that timeline.

We also received on the 24th a
written notification from Jennifer Rhodes, also a

written notification from Jennifer Rhodes, also a candidate for Worthington City Council, that she wished to withdraw and also have her name removed from the ballot. Everything appears to be in order for those.

MEMBER SEXTON: Was the second one in this time frame, as well?

MR. MACKEY: Yes. It was on the deadline day.

MR. JAFFE: Where does the deadline to be removed from the ballot come from?

MR. MACKEY: The 70th day before the day of the election, which is the date that we need to certify ballots to overlap counties, if we have any, and the Secretary of State certifies the official form of the ballot and the candidates to us.

MR. JAFFE: All right. Well, I move that the Board accept the requests of Jennifer Rhodes and Eddie Pauline to withdraw as candidates

1	for Worthington City Council and that their names
2	shall not appear on the November 2nd General
3	Election ballot.
4	MEMBER SEXTON: I'll second.
5	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
6	moved and seconded.
7	All those in favor of the motion
8	signify by saying aye.
9	(Vote taken.)
10	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
11	same sign.
12	(No response.)
13	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
14	carries.
15	The next item on the agenda is
16	BlueCrest contract for our Relia-Vote machine.
17	I'll call on Matt Kelly with the Absentee
18	Department to walk us through this.
19	MR. KELLY: Good afternoon,
20	Mr. Chairman and Board members.
21	Before you is the annual contract
22	that we have with our Relia-Vote machine vendor
23	BlueCrest doing business or DMT Solutions Global
24	Corporation doing business as BlueCrest. The main
25	highlights of this agreement I guess would be that

the agreement itself has been already reviewed by
the prosecutor's office, signed off on, and meets
all state and county legal standards and

4 requirements. That was a process that took a few

5 days to go over, but we got that accomplished.

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The new agreement is actually an agreement that goes -- instead of 12 months it's a 17-month agreement going back to February 1st, 2021 to June 30th, 2021. So there's a portion of the contract that is represented for those dates and then another portion of the contract and you can see on the fee schedule that it's represented from July 1st, 2021 to June 30th, 2022. And the reason we lumped them both together is because the company itself, DMT Solutions Global Corporation, they are on a state term. So we wanted to get our contract back on the state fiscal year. So the portion -the first portion of this 122,000 that's represented by the \$35,931, that represents the first part of -- or I should say the last half of a former contract and takes us then in the second half to the new contract which follows the state fiscal year for a grand total of \$122,166. The contract itself is changing from being based on buying a block of technician hours that we used to

do. And we used to try to figure out technician hours, anywhere from 300 hours to 400 hours for a given year depending on how big the election cycle was. So we are now basing a contract on number of ballots. And so for this contract we have 220,000 ballots that we would include as part of this contract and that will save us dollars in the long run. So that's the only other big change to this contract.

So if you have any questions or if the Director needed to add any information.

DIRECTOR WHITE: Yeah. This is for the Board's perspective. I wanted just to talk a little bit about this company. So we've been with this company which originally was Pitney Bowes and then I believe BlueCrest bought Pitney Bowes.

MR. KELLY: It spun off.

DIRECTOR WHITE: It spun off into BlueCrest that has our Relia-Vote equipment. We've been with them since 2007. So we've actually been with this company 14 years. And during that time we started out with two five-year lease agreements and then in 2017 we purchased the equipment for \$503,000. So since 2007 when you look at the leasing, purchasing, the upgrades and all the

maintenance, we've spent -- or we've invested nearly \$4.2 million into this equipment. And I raise that because I know there has been still some questions about the issue we had last year with sending out the incorrect ballots. And so while that incident was unfortunate, we have had a long relationship with this company. We've invested nearly \$4.2 million into this equipment. equipment has served the voters of Franklin County well in that time. And since that incident has occurred we have changed our practices so that, one, the configuration setup where the scanner was disabled during the ballot insertion that caused the incident, that has been changed. configuration settings have been changed so that can no longer happen. No one here can change it. Our BlueCrest vendor that comes in to assist us can't change it. It can only be changed at headquarters. And secondly, we've updated our auditing procedures so we now instead of auditing every 250th ballot we audit every 66th ballot. And we're now auditing to ensure that the right ballot is in the right envelope for the right voter. were not doing that before. So we believe those changes and the amount of money we've invested that

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1 we are in good shape moving forward to the future. 2 And I wanted to provide that perspective for the 3 Board. 4 MR. JAFFE: Thank you. That was 5 very helpful. 6 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Thank you. 7 DIRECTOR WHITE: Matt, did you have 8 anything to add to that? 9 MR. KELLY: Nope. 10 I have a question about MR. JAFFE: 11 the per ballot pricing. So the term of this new 12 contract before us goes through June of next year? 13 MR. KELLY: Correct. 14 MR. JAFFE: If we don't mail 220,000 15 ballots in that time, what happens to what we paid 16 for as far as the per ballot? 17 MR. KELLY: Well, just like the 18 hours, that if we had unused hours -- we haven't 19 had unused hours for a long time, but if we had 20 unused hours those hours would then carry over to 21 the next contract as a credit. Same thing with 22 This is a more predictive model, I believe. this. 23 With hours, if something really bad happened to the 24 machine and there had to be a two-day shutdown and 25 a swap out where there were a lot of hours being

burned for maintenance of the machine if something really big happened to the machine from a mechanical standpoint, that takes that off the table.

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So just to give you some perspective why we came up with 220,000, that includes the 2,000 ballots from this last special election. It includes 44,000 ballots that we're anticipating we'll be mailing out for this coming fall election, General Election. And that gives us wiggle room to produce 125 to 160,000 ballots and even 165 or 170,000 ballots for the 2022 primary election. So we've built in enough wiggle room where it will be -- I'll be here next year eating my hat if we don't. So we've been conservative about how we're budgeting for this. So I think this is a more predictive model than just throwing a number out there for hours at 300, 400, or 450 hours.

MR. JAFFE: Very good. And Antone preemptively answered my other question, so I'm satisfied.

If there's nobody else, I move that
the Board authorize the Director and Deputy
Director to execute the contract with BlueCrest for
annual on-call maintenance and a license agreement

1	for our Relia-Vote machine in the amount of
2	\$122,166 effective February 1st of this year
3	through June 30th of next year.
4	MEMBER SEXTON: Second.
5	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
6	properly moved and seconded.
7	All those in favor of the motion
8	signify by saying aye.
9	(Vote taken.)
10	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
11	same sign.
12	(No response.)
13	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
14	carries.
15	Well, I know everybody on this Board
16	is aware that we moved from our voter registration
17	system Integrity to Tenex. And I'll turn it over
18	to Antone White real quick just to kind of give an
19	update on that. And then if Jeff Gatwood has any
20	follow-up conversation regarding that, that would
21	be fantastic as well.
22	DIRECTOR WHITE: Thanks, David.
23	I wanted to provide a quick update
24	to the Board on our Tenex project. So it's been I
25	believe a two and a half year process to transition

our voter registration system from our old
Integrity system into our modernized Tenex system.
We actually spent the last two weeks with our
vendor conducting that transition.

So just to give the Board a bit of a timeline here, on August 20th, which was a Friday, we put Integrity into read-only mode. So at that time the staff could no longer enter data into the Integrity system. We could still pull reports or still look at information, but we couldn't enter information within the system. On the 21st and the 22nd of August we then conducted data migration. So at that time the data from the Integrity system was migrated over to the Tenex system, and that was over a weekend.

Beginning on Monday, the 23rd, we had staff on site from Tenex, we had a project manager that came on site, and at that time we conducted user validation of the data that was transferred into the new Tenex system and then we conducted staff training and we held various staff trainings throughout that week. The trainings went very well. They were very successful. And our Board of Elections super users are folks who have been working with the system and playing with it

and practicing with it over this two and a half year period. Many of them led these trainings.

And with the assistance of Tenex staff we found that to be very beneficial to have one of our own training other staff here in the office. And so that went over very well.

On August 26th, which was a

Thursday, we then did what I'm calling -- what we
called a soft cut over. So we turned the system on
and it was connected to the state system, and at
that time we could see transactions coming back and
forth and we looked at them to make sure that the
transactions were coming back and forth
appropriately. Staff from our Voter Services team
processed some transactions to see them go back and
forth. That went successful. We continued that
activity into Friday, the 27th, and then at noon on
the 27th we turned the system on fully for the
entire staff at the Board of Elections and we've
been live in it ever since Friday the 27th at noon.

So this has been a project that's been a long time coming, but it does significantly modernize the way in which we operate here at the Board of Elections. We're excited about the relationship with Tenex and we're excited about the

new system.

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I don't know, Jeff, if you wanted to add any perspective to that. Jeff has been integral in helping us transition into this new system. And it's been Jeff Gatwood, our entire staff. And then I would be remiss if I didn't thank our partners at the Ohio Secretary of State as well as the Franklin County Data Center. Both of those entities have been really great partners in helping us transition.

MR. GATWOOD: Yeah. I fully agree with you on that. A lot of things we just said we couldn't have done without partnerships of the Data Center and the SOS. And the other thing that was really key to the success of this was all the engagement we got from the various departments. So voter services, absentee, PEO group. Because of that engagement they were ready to go from day one. So it really was beneficial. And it's not always easy to get the engagement of the departments because people have their full-time jobs to do and this is really a full-time job in itself. So kudos to the staff on being able to pull that off.

DIRECTOR WHITE: Thank you, Jeff.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Very good to

hear.

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DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Jeff is kind of understated on this because he -- at the same time we're moving to Tenex he has to keep Integrity up and going and he did a masterful job of doing I think this last that. It wasn't always easy. Labor Day weekend is the first weekend he's had in months upon months upon months of being able to sit back and kind of relax and not have to do something here at the Board of Elections. I know the Board and the staff is extremely grateful for all your efforts, Jeff. We brought you in just in the nick of time. We kind of had a joke that if for whatever reason Tenex didn't work we brought him in a day too late, and if it worked we brought him in just in the nick of time. So thank you.

And then, Carla, we were -everybody knows we had to do an audit of our 15th
Congressional District primary. Do you want to
just give a real brief overview of the audit and
how it went?

MS. PATTON: So we hand counted 1,268 ballots, which was just over five percent, as you recall from the August 16th Board Meeting of the five LIDs that we had drawn. We're happy to

1	report that we had a 100 percent accuracy in the
2	way that votes were tabulated to our hand count.
3	So we're comfortable in saying that the results
4	that were certified are one hundred percent
5	accurate.
6	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And there
7	wasn't any pressure other than the watchful eyes
8	that we had with the Secretary of State.
9	MS. PATTON: No pressure. We had
10	the Secretary of State here to observe us. We had
11	four teams hand counting the ballots back there.
12	They all took a break while the Secretary was then
13	giving his press conference. But everything went
14	well and we believe the Secretary is very pleased
15	with what he saw here.
16	MS. GIBBONS: And that is true. He
17	was.
18	DIRECTOR WHITE: I believe that's
19	all we have today unless there is any other
20	business.
21	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I move we
22	adjourn.
23	MEMBER MARINELLO: I second.
24	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
25	favor, signify by saying aye.
