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1	PROCEEDINGS
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3	MEMBER JAFFE: We can't reach Doug.
4	I think there are some things we can take care of
5	and see if we can find out what is wrong with him.
6	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Okay.
7	MEMBER JAFFE: So why don't we do
8	that.
9	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All right.
10	I will go ahead and take roll.
11	Kim Marinello.
12	MEMBER MARINELLO: Here.
13	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Mike Sexton.
14	MEMBER SEXTON: Here.
15	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Doug
16	Preisse.
17	(No response.)
18	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Josh Jaffe.
19	MEMBER JAFFE: Here.
20	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We have a
21	quorum.
22	I think the first order of business
23	would be to nominate somebody as a temporary
24	chairman.
25	MEMBER MARINELLO: I nominate Josh

1	Jaffe as temporary chairman.
2	MEMBER SEXTON: Second.
3	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
4	moved and seconded to make Josh Jaffe temporary
5	chairman, we will just do a voice. All those in
6	favor of the motion, signify by saying aye.
7	All opposed, same sign.
8	Josh Jaffe is the temporary
9	chairman.
10	The first item on the agenda is
11	provisional ballots. And I believe that we had
12	2004 provisional ballots cast. I will call on Mel
13	Fuhrmann, the Director of the Voter Services
14	Department, to give us a briefing on the
15	provisional ballots.
16	MEMBER JAFFE: Were we going to move
17	the voter challenge to the first item since we have
18	someone here or do we want
19	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I think if
20	we get through this part of
21	MEMBER JAFFE: Got it.
22	MS. FUHRMANN: Good morning. Mel
23	Fuhrmann for voter services.
24	MEMBER JAFFE: Good morning.
25	MS. FUHRMANN: We had a total of

1 2204 provisional ballots cast. Of that amount, 2 2003 we would like to recommend to approve, and we had 188 provisional ballots for which we recommend 3 4 that the Board would reject. 5 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And, Mel, 6 just for clarification, that would leave, is that 7 13 ballots that later on will be asking the Board 8 to -- it requires some additional --9 MS. FUHRMANN: That's right. 10 that amount, we have 13 ballots for board review 11 that concern date of birth issues, and then we have another 13 that we -- that need to be remade. 12 13 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: So we will 14 do that later. 15 I think it will be appropriate to 16 have a motion for the approval of the 2003 17 provisional ballots that Mel and her staff 18 recommend to be counted. 19 MS. HUMMER: For the record, it's my 20 understanding that the Board has received the 21 reasons for the rejection as part of their packet, 22 Exhibit A. 23 I'm happy to read MS. FUHRMANN: 24 those into the record, if you would like.

MS. HUMMER:

They can be adopted

25

1	into the record by virtue of the packet.
2	MS. FUHRMANN: That's right, those
3	are all in Exhibit A.
4	MEMBER JAFFE: We got them.
5	MEMBER SEXTON: 188?
6	MS. FUHRMANN: 188 rejected. And
7	you can see the breakdown there on Exhibit A.
8	MEMBER JAFFE: So the vast majority
9	are just not registered to vote in Ohio?
10	MS. FUHRMANN: That's correct.
11	There were 113 ballots where the voters simply were
12	not registered anywhere in the state.
13	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Maybe for
14	the purposes of the people in the audience and
15	people on virtual, maybe you could go through the
16	categories of those that we are recommending be
17	rejected.
18	MS. FUHRMANN: Sure. Of the 188
19	provisionals that we are recommending for
20	rejection, 113 were not registered anywhere within
21	the state, 23 were voters who were in the wrong
22	precinct and location, we had five voters who
23	failed to provide a valid address, 30 where no ID
24	was provided at all, we had 10 where the voter had
25	already voted, six where there was no birth of date

1	at all, and then we had one where there was no
2	ballot in the envelope.
3	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And that's
4	our 188.
5	MEMBER JAFFE: And all of these
6	people were contacted with the opportunity to
7	resolve whatever the issue was; is that right?
8	MS. FUHRMANN: Yes. On Election Day
9	they are provided with a handout and it tells them
10	what they would need to do to cure.
11	MEMBER JAFFE: Okay.
12	MEMBER MARINELLO: I move that the
13	Board approve the counting of 2003 provisional
14	ballots, and that all provisional ballots deemed
15	valid will be counted and included in the official
16	canvass results for the November 2, 2021 General
17	Election.
18	MEMBER JAFFE: Second.
19	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
20	favor of the motion, signify aye.
21	All opposed, same sign.
22	Motion carries.
23	Next item is the rejection of the
24	188 provisional ballots as recommended by staff.
25	MEMBER SEXTON: Mr. Chairman, I move

1	the Board reject the counting of 188 provisional
2	ballots as identified by category in Exhibit A, and
3	that all provisional ballots rejected will not be
4	counted or included in the official canvass results
5	for the November 2, 2021 General Election.
6	MEMBER JAFFE: Second.
7	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
8	favor of the motion, signify by saying aye.
9	All opposed, same sign.
10	Motion carries.
11	The next item would be for approval
12	to open the 2003 provisional ballots that were
13	recommended for approval.
14	MEMBER JAFFE: I move the Board
15	authorize the staff to extract the approved
16	provisional ballots.
17	MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.
18	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
19	moved and seconded. All those in favor of the
20	motion, signify by saying aye.
21	All opposed, same sign.
22	Motion carries.
23	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Do you want
24	to just briefly explain what you are going to do
25	now with staff?

1 MS. FUHRMANN: Right. So currently, 2 we have all of the voter services staff members and 3 some absentee staff members back in the vaults in 4 the absentee division, which is under double lock 5 and key, and all of the staff members are sitting 6 in bipartisan pairs and they are ready to extract 7 all of the ballots from the envelopes so they can 8 then be run through the counting machine. 9 MEMBER JAFFE: Great. Very good. 10 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Thank you. 11 Then we had, as you mentioned in 12 your report, we had 13 provisional ballots for 13 board consideration. Do you want to go through 14 those, Mel? 15 MS. FUHRMANN: Right. So we had 13 16 provisional ballots before the Board this morning 17 for date of birth issues. So there was some 18 question about the date of birth, whether it was 19 off by a day, a month, or a year, and there is a 20 provision of the Ohio Revised Code that allows the 21 Board to approve those if they so choose. And I'm 22 happy to read that provision of the code into the 23 record, if you would like. 24 MEMBER JAFFE: We do not have those

packets as part of our packet, do we?

25

1	MS. FUHRMANN: No, we do not have
2	those.
3	MEMBER JAFFE: They are all similar
4	date of birth digit issues?
5	MS. FUHRMANN: That's right. The
6	voter provided a date of birth, but it did not
7	match our record, it was off by either a day, a
8	month, or a year. Or in some instances, the voter
9	may have written 2021 as the year, that's a common
10	mistake also. But all other aspects of the
11	provisional ballot complied with the provisions of
12	the code.
13	And again, there is a provision of
14	the code that allows for approval that I'm happy to
15	read into the record.
16	DIRECTOR WHITE: Please do.
17	MEMBER JAFFE: Yeah.
18	MS. FUHRMANN: All right. "The
19	month and the day of the voter's date of birth on
20	the affirmation statement must match the month and
21	day of the voter's date of birth in the voter
22	registration database, unless one of the two
23	following exceptions apply:
24	One, the voter's date of birth in
25	the database is 1-1-1800; or, two, the Board of

1	Elections finds by a vote of at least three members
2	that the voter has met all of the other
3	requirements of Division (B)(3) of Revised Code
4	3505.183."
5	And that provision of the code has
6	six requirements:
7	One, the provisional voter is
8	registered to vote;
9	Two, the provisional voter is
10	eligible to cast a ballot in the precinct and for
11	the election in which the individual casts the
12	ballot;
13	Three, the provisional voter
14	provided all of the information required, i.e., the
15	printed name, signature, date of birth and current
16	address, and provided identification on election
17	day or during the seven days following the
18	election;
19	Four, if the provisional voter
20	provided their Social Security number, driver's
21	license or state ID number, that number is not
22	different than the number contained in the
23	statewide voter registration database;
24	Five, the provisional voter provided
25	their current address;

1 And six, if the provisional voter 2 has been challenged, they provided information 3 necessary to resolve the challenge during the seven 4 days following the election or the Board resolved 5 the challenge in favor of the voter at a hearing. 6 MEMBER JAFFE: So all 13 of these 7 voters met all of those requirements, and it's up 8 to three of us to decide that they can be counted 9 despite the issue with their date of birth? 10 Yes, sir. MS. FUHRMANN: 11 MEMBER JAFFE: I think Sarah was 12 going to go get the ballots, because I would like 13 to take a look at them before making a decision on 14 that. 15 MS. FUHRMANN: Okay. 16 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: So should we 17 wait for her or what's the preference, move on to 18 remaking of unscanned Election Day ballots and then 19 come back to --20 DIRECTOR WHITE: Why don't we do 21 that. 22 MEMBER JAFFE: Yeah. 23 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Remaking of 24 unscanned Election Day ballots, I will call on 25 Carla Patton. Unless the ballots actually just

1	came in the room.
2	MEMBER JAFFE: Let's take a look at
3	the ballots.
4	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Thank you,
5	Sarah.
6	MEMBER JAFFE: So we don't have the
7	voter record for comparison, does the sticker
8	have no, the sticker does not have
9	MEMBER MARINELLO: Everything is on
10	there except the date of birth?
11	MS. FUHRMANN: That's right.
12	DIRECTOR WHITE: That was determined
13	by bipartisan teams
14	MS. FUHRMANN: That's right.
15	DIRECTOR WHITE: during the
16	provisional review process; is that right?
17	MS. FUHRMANN: Yes.
18	MEMBER JAFFE: All right. It looks
19	like it's marked where the issue was.
20	Quite a few elderly folks.
21	MEMBER MARINELLO: Okay.
22	MEMBER JAFFE: If you guys agree,
23	I'm comfortable erring on the side of not
24	disenfranchising these 13 voters for what appears
25	to be a brain fart.

1	MEMBER SEXTON: These are
2	provisional ballots?
3	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Yes, there
4	were 13.
5	MEMBER SEXTON: So I move the Board
6	approve the counting of 13 additional provisional
7	ballots and the rejection of zero additional
8	provisional ballots, and that all provisional
9	ballots be valid and counted and included in the
10	official canvass results for the November 2nd, 2021
11	Election.
12	MEMBER JAFFE: Second.
13	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All of those
14	in favor of the motion, signify by saying aye.
15	All opposed, same sign.
16	Motion carries.
17	Thank you, Mel.
18	MS. FUHRMANN: Thank you. Did you
19	want to address
20	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Yeah. We
21	need authorization to extract those additional 13
22	provisional ballots.
23	MEMBER MARINELLO: I move the Board
24	authorize the staff to extract the additional 13
25	approved provisional ballots.

1	MEMBER JAFFE: Second.
2	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
3	favor of the motion, signify by saying aye.
4	All opposed, same sign.
5	Motion carries.
6	In the past, we have given
7	authorization to the staff to remake any of those
8	13 additional that needed to be remade.
9	MEMBER JAFFE: Okay. I move the
10	Board author the staff to remark the provisional
11	ballots and that these remade ballots shall be
12	tabulated and included in the official canvass of
13	the results for the November 2, 2021 General
14	Election, the report should be made to the Board
15	later today.
16	MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.
17	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
18	properly moved and seconded. All those in favor of
19	the motion, signify by saying aye.
20	All opposed, same sign.
21	Motion carries. The remaking of the
22	unscanned Election Day ballots, I think that was
23	it. Right, Mel?
24	MS. FUHRMANN: Right. And just to
25	be clear, the 13 date of birth issues were separate

from the 13 -- we had 13 additional ballots that need to be remade because the wrong ballot was given on Election Day. So thank you for that. And I think Sarah has gone to let my staff know that they can begin opening the ballots. So thank you.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Does anybody have any questions? I guess I got confused because the 13 and the 13. So the reopening of the ballots includes the 13 that you approved, as well as 13 additional. And do you want to explain those again?

MS. FUHRMANN: Sure. So there were 13 date of birth issues which you approved, and then there were an additional 13 ballots that we were asking for permission to remake those ballots because they were given — those voters were given the wrong ballot on Election Day; so we are asking permission to remake those 13, just to be clear.

MEMBER JAFFE: It looks like we authorized the staff to remake ballots generally, not specific groups of 13 ballots; so I think we accomplished that.

MEMBER MARINELLO: Are the 13 for the wrong ballots in the Exhibit A included anywhere?

1	MS. FUHRMANN: Yes, they are
2	included in the total, the grand total recommended
3	to accept, which is 2003, that includes the 13
4	remakes.
5	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And the
6	remakes are necessary so that those voters are only
7	voting in the elections which they should and
8	the races which they should have been permitted to
9	vote in.
10	MEMBER SEXTON: We have a total of
11	26 remakes?
12	DIRECTOR WHITE: 13.
13	MS. FUHRMANN: 13 remakes, and 13
14	date of birth issues, which were separate.
15	MEMBER SEXTON: Okay.
16	MEMBER JAFFE: We are not remaking
17	those.
18	MS. FUHRMANN: Correct. I hope that
19	clears up any confusion. It was just a
20	coincidence, in other words, that there were two
21	sets of 13.
22	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Thank you,
23	Mel.
24	The next on the agenda is the
25	remaking of unscanned Election Day ballots.

1 MS. PATTON: Good morning. We have 2 received -- we have 27 ballots that were unable to 3 be scanned as part of the unofficial results on 4 election night. Those ballots were unable to be 5 They were either a curbside ballot that scanned. 6 may have been damaged by the stub being torn off 7 incorrectly; therefore, damaging the timing marks 8 on the ballot, there were other ballots that came 9 out of the markers that had a streak that went 10 through the barcodes that were unable to be 11 scanned. And so after researching and validating 12 that none of those ballots were recast properly, we 13 are asking that you allow us to remake those 14 ballots and include them in the official canvass 15 today. 16 MEMBER JAFFE: Makes sense to me. 17 I would move the MEMBER SEXTON: 18 Board authorize the staff to remake 27 unscanned 19 Election Day ballots, and that these remade ballots 20 shall be tabulated and included in the official 21 canvass of the results from the November 2, 2021 22 General Election with a report to be made to the 23 Board later today. 24 MEMBER JAFFE: Second.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE:

It's been

25

properly moved and seconded. All those in favor of the motion, signify by saying aye. All opposed, same sign.

Motion carries.

If we could, the next item on the agenda, if we could move up the voter challenge because we have Sharon Rothermel in the audience, if that's the preference of the Chair and the Board, I think we should do that.

MEMBER JAFFE: Let's do it.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Mel, do you

12 | want to --

MS. FUHRMANN: Sure. So the Board may remember from the last meeting that we had a voter challenge filed by Sharon Rothermel, who I believe is here today, against a voter by the name of Erin Nicole Mills. And they both share the address in our database of 6842 Silverrock Drive in New Albany. And at that time, the Board had voted to table their decision on the voter challenge because they wanted some additional information on Erin Nicole Mills. And that additional documentation is in your packet, and I'm happy to explain what that is.

You will see in your packet a

1	printout from our database that shows that we
2	forced Erin Nicole Mills to cast a provisional
3	ballot this time since her residency was in
4	question. And then there's another piece of
5	documentation that is Ms. Mills' voting history as
6	of 11-16. And you will see that she did not vote
7	in this most recent election. So that is that
8	additional documentation requested on behalf of the
9	Board.
10	MEMBER JAFFE: Okay. As of the last
11	meeting several attempts have been made to contact
12	her, as she has continued to be unresponsive?
13	MS. GIBBONS: That's correct.
L 4	MS. HUMMER: It was sent to the
15	Silverrock address at issue.
16	MS. GIBBONS: We sent it to the
L 7	former address as well, twice.
18	MS. FUHRMANN: Yes. It was sent to
19	both her Silverrock address and her previous
20	address, which is 1685 Fallhaven Drive. And it's
21	my understanding that to date we have not received
22	any response from Ms. Mills.
23	MEMBER JAFFE: Okay. I also recall
24	from the last meeting that we wanted to hear
25	in-person from Ms. Rothermel, and she has joined us

1 today to hopefully speak with us. 2 MS. HUMMER: She should be able to 3 come to the microphone and be sworn in as well. 4 MEMBER JAFFE: Thank you. 5 6 SHARON ROTHERMEL, 7 being by me first duly sworn, as hereinafter 8 certified, and says as follows: 9 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Just 10 generally give an overview, I think. 11 MS. ROTHERMEL: I got an 12 acknowledgement notice of a polling place and 13 precinct in the mail in August at my address but 14 with Erin Nicole Mills' name. And it concerned me; 15 so I called and talked to Erin multiple times, 16 actually. And she said to -- she would check it 17 out, I don't know, she told me to -- I'm getting 18 all nervous here. 19 DIRECTOR WHITE: It's all right. 20 MS. ROTHERMEL: Anyway, there was 21 going to be a hearing but that she didn't expect the woman to show up, and didn't think I probably 22 23 had to either. Then I got another call this last 24 week saying that you wanted some additional 25 information. So I can tell you that I have lived

1	there for 12 years. And the people before me
2	bought it new and lived there until we moved in.
3	And they have currently moved back into our
4	neighborhood into a different condo. So Erin
5	Nicole has never lived on Silverrock Drive. So
6	that's all I know.
7	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Perfect.
8	Does the Board have any questions or prosecutor
9	MS. HUMMER: So, Ms. Rothermel, do
10	you know Erin Nicole Mills at all?
L1	MS. ROTHERMEL: No. And in fact,
12	our neighborhood, it's a condo neighborhood and the
L3	street signs are weird, and there's multiple 6482
L 4	streets in the neighborhood; so I had the condo
15	board president check it out I knew one of the
L6	families that lived at a 6482, but I didn't know
L7	the other two. He checked to see if that one
18	happened to be Erin Nicole Mills, and it wasn't.
L9	He looked back in the rosters and there's nobody in
20	our neighborhood with that name.
21	MS. HUMMER: That's it.
22	MEMBER JAFFE: Okay.
23	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Any other
24	questions?
25	MS. ROTHERMEL: All done?

1	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Yeah. Thank
2	you.
3	MS. ROTHERMEL: Thank you.
4	MEMBER JAFFE: Well, looks to me
5	like Erin Nicole Mills filled out a voter
6	registration form with either the wrong address or
7	some other strange happening. I'm convinced that
8	she does not in fact live at the address she's
9	registered to vote; so I move that the Board
10	approve the challenge of right to vote filed by
11	Sharon Kay Rothermel of 6842 Silverrock Drive, New
12	Albany against Erin Nicole Mills of 6842 Silverrock
13	Drive, New Albany, and that Erin Nicole Mills'
14	registration be removed in the Franklin County
15	voter file.
16	MEMBER SEXTON: Second.
17	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
18	properly moved and seconded. All those in favor of
19	the motion, signify by saying aye.
20	All opposed, same sign.
21	Motion carries.
22	MS. ROTHERMEL: Thank you.
23	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Thank you
24	very much for coming.
25	All right. We have our team taking

the provisional ballots out. So I think the next item on the agenda would be the employee recognition program, and I'm happy to present that. Robin Link from our staff has been proactive. had an employee recognition program, at least in the seven years I have been here, but it only involved a banquet at the end, and it was primarily focused on the trainers of election workers. Link took it upon herself to develop and promote an extensive employee recognition program that will include monthly peer recognition awards. Again, we will have the annual dinner, that I know at least a few of our board members have attended in the past for the distinguished service award. We will have an award for the outstanding precinct election official and monthly employee awards, as well as other awards, as required. We would like to ask the Board for an amount of money not to exceed \$5,000 for these awards and for the dinners. This also, this resolution is required in order to spend these types of money by the Ohio Attorney General, as well as the Auditor of State and our county auditor.

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So if anybody has any questions about our employee recognition program. I think

1	the Director would attest that we have a great
2	group of employees, full-time employees, part-time
3	employees, and seasonal employees, and I think it's
4	absolutely appropriate to recognize our team
5	throughout the year for all of the good work that
6	they do.
7	MEMBER MARINELLO: I agree.
8	MEMBER SEXTON: When is it?
9	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I'm sorry?
10	MEMBER SEXTON: When is the dinner
11	going to be this year?
12	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Some time in
13	January.
14	DIRECTOR WHITE: We are looking to
15	January, probably mid to late January.
16	MEMBER SEXTON: With that, I move
17	the Board pass the resolution creating an employee
18	recognition program that will honor board employees
19	in 2022 for outstanding service, and authorize
20	expenditure of funds not to exceed \$5,000.
21	MEMBER JAFFE: Second.
22	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
23	properly moved and seconded. All those in favor of
24	the motion, signify by saying aye.
25	All opposed, same sign.

1 Motion carries. 2 I think -- I don't want to speak out 3 of turn, but I think it was the wish of the Chair 4 if we could postpone the discussion until later in 5 the day to see if we can get Doug Preisse to talk about the COVID-19. 6 7 MEMBER JAFFE: Yes. I know Doug had 8 some questions about both of those, and I think it 9 probably warrants some discussion. So why don't we 10 see if we can get ahold of Doug. I don't think 11 there's any particular immediacy to either of those 12 items. So is there anything else? 13 MEMBER SEXTON: You are saying after 14 the certification? 15 MEMBER JAFFE: Yeah. We still don't 16 know what the situation is with Doug. 17 MS. HUMMER: For purposes of your --18 there's your courtesy to Doug, and there's your 19 Parliamentary Procedure. You do have a quorum, you 20 do have the ability to proceed and vote, if you so 21 desire. 22 MEMBER JAFFE: Sure. I do not so 23 desire. I'm sorry. 24 Are we waiting for provisional

25

ballots to be counted?

1	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We are. At
2	this point in the process, it would be either
3	appropriate for an adjournment or recess.
4	Typically we recess.
5	MEMBER JAFFE: Why don't we do a
6	recess. That usually doesn't take very long.
7	MEMBER SEXTON: Do we know how long?
8	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I talked to
9	Mel before, it's about 30 minutes to open the
LO	ballots.
11	MS. FUHRMANN: That's right, 30 to
12	40 minutes to extract. And then Sarah and I have
13	to go back and reclassify the 26 ballots that you
L 4	just granted permission for us to reclassify, we
15	have to print out the appropriate labels. So if
16	you don't have any further need for us, I would ask
L7	for permission to do that.
18	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Then we also

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1 Friday Afternoon Session November 19, 2021 2 1:00 p.m. 3 4 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's 1:00, 5 and we are back from recess. And we have a quorum 6 of three members. 7 The first item would have been 8 provisional ballots for consideration, but I'm told 9 by the folks that we have no more ballots for 10 consideration after opening the provisionals. So 11 we will go straight to certification of the 12 November election. And I will turn that over to 13 Carla Patton. 14 MS. PATTON: Good afternoon. You 15 have been provided with the summary results report 16 with groups for Franklin County only. These are 17 the results from just Franklin County as they were 18 cast for the November 2, 2021 General Election. 19 After a bipartisan canvass of all votes cast in the 20 county, whether it was mail, absentee, office, 21 early voting, election day or provisional, these 22 are the vote results we recommend that you certify 23 for the November 2021 General Election. 24 DIRECTOR WHITE: Very good. 25 were the total votes cast?

1	MS. PATTON: Total votes cast for
2	the election was 203,658, for a turnout of
3	23.54% in the county out of 865,220 voters
4	eligible.
5	DIRECTOR WHITE: Thank you.
6	MEMBER JAFFE: Any questions?
7	MEMBER SEXTON: Questions?
8	Seeing none, I move the Board
9	certify and declare as final the official canvass
LO	of the votes cast at the November 2, 2021 General
L1	Election as submitted by staff.
12	MEMBER JAFFE: Second.
13	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
L4	properly moved and seconded. All those in favor of
15	the motion certification, signify by saying aye.
16	All opposed, same sign.
L7	Motion carries.
18	The next item on the agenda is
L9	potential recounts. I don't know, Carla, do you
20	want to start that out?
21	MS. PATTON: Yeah, I will start
22	that. I provided to you a little piece of paper
23	with a couple snippets of a spreadsheet on there,
24	we would ask these are races that are
25	overlapping with other counties, the Westerville

1	City Council race overlaps with Delaware County.
2	And the Canal Winchester City Council race overlaps
3	with Fairfield County. We would ask that you
4	declare the results as set forth on these sheets
5	for this for these races, as both of these races
6	will fall into a recount phase and we need to
7	declare the results prior to declaring a recount.
8	So we would ask that you declare the results as
9	exhibited on that piece of paper that shows you the
10	Westerville City Council race and the Canal
11	Winchester City Council race. You will see the
12	Franklin County votes along with the other
13	counties' votes and then the total votes for each
14	candidate.
15	MEMBER JAFFE: Were the Franklin
16	County portions of these two races not included in
17	the
18	MS. PATTON: The Franklin County
19	portion is in the report that you were provided
20	with that you certified as part of the official
21	canvass.
22	MEMBER JAFFE: Okay.
23	MS. PATTON: But to show our portion
24	versus the other county portion, we wanted to break
25	it out so you could see, and then you have the

1 total votes that incorporate those counties. 2 MEMBER JAFFE: Is it because we are 3 the most populous county --4 MS. PATTON: We are the most 5 populous for both of these cities, yes. 6 DIRECTOR WHITE: Carla, point of 7 clarification. My understanding, there's other 8 potential recounts here. Are we going over those 9 later? 10 MS. PATTON: There are other 11 potential recounts, but these are the two that 12 include other counties as a part of that 13 jurisdiction. 14 DIRECTOR WHITE: Thank you. 15 MEMBER SEXTON: I would assume on 16 these, at least Canal Winchester and Westerville, 17 that in front of me, that the orange ones -- or 18 yellow ones are the --19 Right. So both of the MS. PATTON: 20 races are vote for four races. And so the three 21 candidates in each of the races that are 22 highlighted with the total votes in yellow, those 23 are the winners, and then there's two candidates on 24 each race that are highlighted in orange. 25 are the two candidates up for that last seat on

1	both councils, and those votes fall within the
2	margin of recount, once we add everything together.
3	So the declared winner in Westerville will be
4	Coutanya Coombs, and the declared winner in the
5	Canal Winchester race would be Patrick Shea.
6	DIRECTOR WHITE: For the fourth
7	seat
8	MS. PATTON: For the fourth seat in
9	each race, yes.
LO	MEMBER JAFFE: So what in particular
11	is the initial action the Board needs to take with
12	respect to these two? We certify at least our
13	portion
L4	MS. PATTON: Make a motion to
15	declare the results of those races as final, and
16	including all results within the subdivision.
۱7	MEMBER JAFFE: Okay. That's not the
18	reason for the
19	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I think with
20	their previous motion, they certified all races,
21	and which would include those, and my understanding
22	it's just an explanation of the races.
23	MS. PATTON: You need to declare the
24	winners.
25	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Oh, okay. I

1 gotcha. We have to declare a winner in order to 2 have a recount. 3 MS. PATTON: You have to declare the 4 results showing the winners. 5 MEMBER JAFFE: Okay. For the 6 particular purpose of the two multi-county city 7 council races where three candidates are clearly 8 declared winners, the fourth candidate is within 9 the recount margin, I move that we declare Dennis 10 Blair, Megan Reamsnyder, Michael Heyeck and 11 Coutanya Coombs winners in Westerville City 12 Council, and as part of the same motion can I also 13 move that we declare that Laurie Amick, Jill Amos, 14 Ashley Ward and Patrick Shea are the winners in the 15 Canal Winchester City Council race. 16 MEMBER SEXTON: I will second. 17 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been 18 moved and seconded. All those in favor of the 19 motion, signify by saying aye. 20 All opposed, same sign. 21 Motion carries. 22 MS. PATTON: So as a result of 23 declaring those two races, as you can see on the 24 side there, you see a margin for each race for 25 Westerville City Council the margin 59.65. And how

the margin is determined is you take the number of votes received by the declared winner, as well as all candidates, the votes for candidates that were after, lower than that declared winner. So we took the fourth place, fifth place and sixth place, actually seventh place numbers, added them together and then multiplied that by one half of one percent to come up with a margin of automatic recount. margin is 59.65 in Westerville. The difference between candidates four and five was 58 votes; so therefore, falls within the recount. Same thing with Canal Winchester candidates. Vote totals for candidates four, five, six and seven were added together, the margin of difference was 22.67 votes, the difference between the fourth and fifth place candidates was eight, which was well within that recount range as well.

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In addition to these two races, we also had a Local Option in Columbus 28-D, as in delta, that race resulted in a tie vote. So those three races we will need to select some precincts or locations that we will need to hand recount.

In addition to that, we will need to set the date for those recounts. And also included in the recount is an anticipated recount coming

Т	from the Secretary of State for a district that
2	overlaps from Madison County into Franklin County
3	for the Madison-Plains Local School District Board
4	of Education.
5	DIRECTOR WHITE: Carla, point of
6	clarification. On the tie vote in the Local Option
7	race, does the Board need to declare a winner?
8	MS. PATTON: No. In a Local Option
9	race, a majority affirmative vote on issues is
10	required for passage; therefore, a majority
11	affirmative vote was not reached; therefore, the
12	issue failed as a tie vote.
13	DIRECTOR WHITE: Thank you.
14	MEMBER JAFFE: Is a mandatory
15	recount triggered in that case?
16	MS. PATTON: Yes.
17	MEMBER JAFFE: Okay.
18	MS. PATTON: The margin of error
19	would be two votes in that case but
20	MEMBER JAFFE: Zero, yeah.
21	MS. PATTON: zero is well within
22	the margin.
23	MEMBER JAFFE: Okay. So we now need
24	to select voting locations or is there something we
25	need to do beforehand to approve these recounts?

1 MR. MACKEY: First step is to order 2 the recount of each of those. 3 MS. PATTON: I will say because 4 there are multi-county races here, the Secretary of 5 State will order, ultimately, the recounts for 6 Westerville City Council and Canal Winchester City 7 Council. However, we do need to -- we have the 8 ability to set the date for the Columbus 28-D Local 9 Option recount. 10 In the past weeks, in MR. MACKEY: 11 anticipation of the Secretary ordering those other 12 recounts, we can go ahead and set a date for those, 13 too. 14 MS. PATTON: And make our selections 15 in anticipation of that order. 16 MEMBER JAFFE: Is that Blendon 17 Township Trustees ultimately outside of 18 the margin --19 So also the MS. PATTON: Yes. 20 inclusion of the provisional ballots and all other 21 ballots that were not included in the unofficial 22 results, that race ended up with the margin of 23 error being, had to be seven votes or less to be in 24 the recount, and it ended up with a nine vote 25 difference; therefore, it falls outside of the

1	automatic recount.
2	MEMBER JAFFE: Okay. So for the one
3	Franklin County only race, which is the Local
4	Option Columbus 28-D is within the half of a
5	percent that triggers an automatic recount, I move
6	that the Board order a recount in that contest for
7	Local Option Columbus 28-D.
8	MEMBER SEXTON: Second.
9	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
10	moved and seconded. All those in favor of the
11	motion, signify by saying aye.
12	All those opposed, same sign.
13	Motion carries.
14	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Did we need
15	to set a date for that also at this time? And we
16	would recommend Monday, November 29th.
17	MR. MACKEY: Yeah, we have to
18	conduct a recount for any recounts that we order
19	within 10 days of certification. So the 10th day
20	would be the 29th, that would be the last day to do
21	it.
22	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And would we
23	think that that would start at 10:00 a.m.?
24	MR. MACKEY: That's fine.
25	MEMBER MARINELLO: I move that the

1	recount in the contest for Local Option 28-D only
2	be conducted by voting location, and that the
3	recount is scheduled for Monday, November 29th,
4	beginning at 10:00 a.m., at the office of the
5	Franklin County Board of Elections, 1700 Morse
6	Road, Columbus, Ohio.
7	MEMBER JAFFE: Second.
8	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
9	moved and seconded. All those in favor of the
10	motion, signify by saying aye.
11	All opposed, same sign.
12	Motion carries.
13	Thank you, Carla.
14	DIRECTOR WHITE: Carla, I'm sorry.
15	Do we have to take up Blendon Township?
16	MS. PATTON: No, there's no
17	automatic recount for the Blendon Township; so no
18	action required in that.
19	MR. MACKEY: If you would like to go
20	ahead and do, in anticipation of the motion for the
21	other two, draw
22	MEMBER JAFFE: It's three now,
23	Madison-Plains was not the most populous.
24	MR. MACKEY: Sorry. But because in
25	that race there are only two voting locations, and

1	we have to choose at least two voting locations to
2	hand count, we don't have to actually draw voting
3	locations for that one, because there's only two;
4	so we just hand count everything in Madison-Plains.
5	MEMBER SEXTON: So we include
6	Madison-Plains?
7	MR. MACKEY: Yes, for scheduling
8	purposes you could include that.
9	MEMBER MARINELLO: All right. The
10	results of the election for Canal Winchester City
11	Council, for Westerville City Council, for
12	Madison-Plains Local School District levy are
13	within the percentage required to trigger an
14	automatic recount. In the event that the Secretary
15	of State orders a recount in this district, I move
16	that the recount in the contest of Westerville City
17	Council be conducted by voting location, and that
18	the recount is scheduled for Tuesday,
19	November 30th, beginning at 10:00 a.m., at the
20	office of the Franklin County Board of Elections,
21	1700 Morse Road, Columbus, Ohio.
22	MEMBER JAFFE: Second.
23	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
24	properly moved and seconded. All those in favor of
25	the motion, signify by saying aye.

1 All opposed, same sign. 2 Motion carries. DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Jeff, do you 3 4 want to --5 MR. MACKEY: Go ahead and draw those 6 locations now. 7 DIRECTOR WHITE: Jeff, would you 8 explain for the people on Zoom and the Board what 9 the process is, what we are going to do? 10 Yep. We have to MR. MACKEY: 11 randomly select voting locations, such that we 12 choose voting locations that include at least 5% of 13 the vote cast in each election. So we are going to 14 use the web tool RANDOM.ORG to randomly order our 15 locations, and we will add those to our handy 16 spreadsheet that tells us when we hit the 5% mark. 17 Canal Winchester comes first 18 alphabetically. Canal Winchester race, there are 19 three locations, No. 101 to 103. 101, 102, 103, we 20 will add that in here. 21 Three, two, one are the order, 22 starts -- that's well over, as I mentioned before, 23 we have to choose at least two locations. We will 24 do both 103 and 102 with 3,013, and 2,042 for the 25 Canal Winchester race.

1	Whitehall we have 12 locations.
2	Six, five, and 11 are the first three. See how
3	that does. 105.
4	DIRECTOR WHITE: Yes.
5	MR. MACKEY: We are already over 5%
6	so that will do us.
7	So in Westerville, we will hand
8	recount 2046 and 2037. Save this.
9	And as I explained for the
10	Madison-Plains one, there's only two locations, so
11	we will just hand count both.
12	We will get to do this again here in
13	a second for the audit portion.
14	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: So the next
15	item on the agenda is the post-election audit. We
16	are required to do an audit of the 15th
17	Congressional District, as well as two county-wide
18	offices. And I believe we had seven judicial races
19	county-wide and we need to select two of those.
20	DIRECTOR WHITE: Two contested
21	races.
22	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Two
23	contested races. What's the pleasure of the Board
24	in the way we select those two? We can do
25	RANDOM.ORG or we can select just by agreement

1	amongst the Board.
2	MEMBER JAFFE: I'm content with the
3	random selection.
4	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I think each
5	judicial race was listed one through seven.
6	MR. MACKEY: I think you guys have a
7	list of the judicial contests currently in order by
8	full-term commencing date, I numbered them there.
9	I go one through seven here. First two will be the
10	first two.
11	MEMBER JAFFE: Very good.
12	MR. MACKEY: That is Judge of
13	Franklin County Municipal Court, full-term
14	commencing January 1, 2022, and Judge of the
15	Franklin County Municipal Court, full-term
16	commencing January 2, 2022.
17	MEMBER JAFFE: Does the staff have a
18	recommendation on when the audits will begin?
19	DIRECTOR WHITE: The audit has to
20	take place immediately after the Board certifies
21	the results of the recount. So the Board certifies
22	the results of the recount at its December 6th
23	meeting, we would then begin audits on
24	December 7th.
25	MEMBER JAFFE: Is there any reason

we would not expect to certify the results of the recount on December 6th?

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DIRECTOR WHITE: I don't believe so.
We should be able to present those recount results
at the next board meeting on December 6th.

MEMBER JAFFE: Well, that would make sense to plan to start the audit December 7th.

MEMBER SEXTON: Okay. Mr. Chairman, following the certification of any recounts, I move that the Board conduct a post-election audit of the 2021 General Election; the audit be conducted by voting location; that the audit will be of the contests for Representative to Congress for the 15th Congressional District, for Judge of the Franklin County Municipal Court full-term commencing 1-1-2022, and for Judge of the Franklin County Municipal Court full-term commencing 1-2-2022; that the audit will begin December 7th until completed; and that the audit will be conducted in accordance with the Secretary of State Directive 2012-56; and that the audit will be conducted at the office of the Franklin County Board of Elections, 1700 Morse Road, Columbus, Ohio.

MEMBER JAFFE: Second.

1	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
2	moved and seconded to conduct a post-election
3	audit, all those in favor of the motion, signify by
4	saying aye.
5	All opposed, same sign.
6	Motion carries.
7	And now we need to select those,
8	correct, Jeff?
9	MR. MACKEY: Correct. I think we
10	have 114 locations involved in the Congressional
11	District of 101 to 214 on my selection here.
12	First one, 3061, 3058, 2002, 2003,
13	1050, 1292, 2040, 5028, and 202, 5001.
14	We will do the same thing for the
15	county-wide races here. 323 voting locations in
16	the entire county so 101 through 423.
17	DIRECTOR WHITE: We have a problem
18	with the spreadsheet here we go.
19	Does the Board wish to wait for this
20	or go on to other agenda items?
21	MS. HUMMER: I think you can move on
22	to other agenda items and come back to that.
23	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: So it looks
24	like we are waiting for the RANDOM.ORG to come back
25	up, and we will get back to that, but in the

meantime, I think the final item on the agenda
would be the discussion of the COVID-19 testing
policy, as well as the COVID-19 vaccination
incentive program. And I will turn that over to
Director White.

DIRECTOR WHITE: Well, I was going

DIRECTOR WHITE: Well, I was going to present to the Board the COVID-19 testing policy and incentive program for the Board staff. My understanding that we may want to postpone any discussion on the testing policy at this time.

MEMBER JAFFE: Let's go ahead and take them both up.

DIRECTOR WHITE: Take them both up.
All right.

Good afternoon. In your Board materials today for your consideration is to adopt two programs, both the COVID-19 testing policy, as well as the COVID-19 incentive program. First, I will discuss the COVID-19 testing policy.

The policy that's being presented today for Board consideration closely mirrors the policy that the Franklin County Board of Commissioners adopted for all Board Commission agencies on September 10th. The Board of Commissioners then put that policy into effect for

their commission agencies on October 18. Part of the reason we are introducing this policy for Board of Elections staff is that we know that efforts to reduce the spread of COVID-19 have worked, but we know that the spread continues.

As Board of Elections employees, much of our work requires us to work on site and in-person; as such, we believe providing a healthy and safe working environment is paramount to ensuring this office can continue to perform its critical duties.

Now, antidotally, we know much of our workforce is vaccinated. While obtaining a vaccination is a personal choice, and we do respect that, we believe that adopting this policy will help continue to ensure the safety of all employees that must regularly work on site and in-person.

This new policy requires weekly testing of unvaccinated employees, that includes full-time, part-time and seasonal. Any vaccinated employees that show proof of a COVID-19 vaccination record card will be exempt from testing, and any short-term election workers and precinct election officials are also exempt from this policy.

Just a few highlights of the policy

before you today. One, unvaccinated employees are required to submit proof of a negative COVID-19 test to human resources by 5:00 o'clock every Thursday. We do have COVID-19 proctored self-administered home tests that will be made available to an employee at no charge through our human resources department, or an employee can seek a COVID-19 test from another healthcare provider.

Any unvaccinated employee who becomes fully vaccinated after the policy takes effect would be exempt from testing requirements, as long as they provide proof of that vaccination. Unvaccinated employees that do not comply with the COVID-19 testing policy are not eligible for telework, for our telework policies. And the employees who fail to comply with this policy would be subject to discipline.

If adopted, this policy would be added to our employee handbook.

And pending any questions, I would ask for adoption of this policy. I'm happy to talk about the incentive program, if you want to pack them together.

MEMBER JAFFE: Go ahead and go over the incentive program, too.

DIRECTOR WHITE:

4 incentive program.

Now, the COVID-19 incentive program, the purpose of the program is to increase the number of unvaccinated employees or to motivate employees to get vaccinated sooner than they otherwise would have. This incentive program will provide \$1,000 to fully vaccinated employees.

The program was announced by the Franklin County Board of Commissioners for all Board of Commissioner agencies on October 26th with the ability of non-Board of Commissioner agencies to participate pending leadership approval. The funds for this program will be provided through the Board of Commissioners as part of the American Rescue Plan Act.

All employees, full-time, part-time and seasonal who worked during the 2021 General Election and grossed a minimum of \$1,000 are eligible to participate in this program. Again, short-term election workers and precinct election officials are not eligible for this program. To be eligible and receive this incentive, an employee

must have received two doses of the Moderna or 1 2 Pfizer vaccines and one dose of the Johnson & 3 The initial disbursement of the \$1,000 Johnson. 4 will be made on December 30, 2021, and the second disbursement of \$1,000 will be made on February 11, 5 The incentive is a taxable source of income. 6 2022. 7 So that's my briefing on these two 8 I'm happy to answer any questions. programs. 9 MEMBER JAFFE: On behalf of Chairman 10 Preisse, who is sick and not able to be with us, I 11 want to communicate a concern that he had upon 12 reviewing the incentive policy, in particular. 13 going to paraphrase what he said, because it was a 14 little less diplomatic than I am inclined to be. 15 He's concerned about paying people to do the right 16 thing, in his words, and what precedent that might 17 create the next time we have an issue like this in 18 terms of people voluntarily seeking out 19 vaccinations in a future pandemic, for example, if 20 we create the expectations that they will be 21 financially-induced to do that. 22 MS. HUMMER: The one thing I would 23 say with regard to that, if I could. 24 DIRECTOR WHITE: Please.

MS. HUMMER:

Is the narrow scope of

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this particular incentive is completely tied to the funds provided by the federal government to be used specifically for this pandemic. So that is the nexus for this particular incentive program.

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MEMBER JAFFE: Sure. I don't think his concern was a legal one so much as what expectation are we creating if employees -- if we find ourselves in a similar situation in the future.

DIRECTOR WHITE: And I would say to that, MEMBER JAFFE, to address that concern, I think the Board has in past incentivized employees, you know, annually, whether it be through cost-of-living adjustments or performance pay; so I look at this as just another part of compensation for an employee who -- for employees, particularly, ones who have to work here regularly. We here at the Board of Elections, while we do have a telework policy, we have had some employees take advantage of, the majority of our work has to be conducted on site and in-person, and we recognize that. So this is just another way to incentivize our employees who are really frontline workers, and having to be here and work in-person. So we think that it would make sense to do that.

1 MS. HUMMER: And the other aspect of 2 that, to just add to that, is that your current 3 health benefits program for the county does include 4 a wellness incentive program, where they are either monitoring compensation provided for certain steps 5 6 throughout the wellness, hitting those items. 7 MEMBER MARINELLO: So it's basically 8 the same thing. 9 MS. HUMMER: Very similar. 10 MEMBER JAFFE: Thank you for 11 addressing those concerns. 12 I'm actually, at this point, 13 comfortable moving on the vaccination incentive 14 program. If we want to take that up and then talk 15 about the testing program afterward, do you think 16 that would be appropriate? 17 MS. HUMMER: Admissible. 18 MEMBER JAFFE: Okay. I move the 19 Board adopt the COVID-19 vaccination incentive 20 program, with the purpose of decreasing the number 21 of unvaccinated employees and/or motivating 22 employees to get vaccinated sooner than they 23 otherwise would have. 24 MEMBER MARINELLO: Second. 25 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been

1 properly moved and seconded. All those in favor of 2 the motion, signify by saying aye. 3 All opposed, same sign. 4 Motion carries. 5 MEMBER JAFFE: All right. I do have 6 some questions about the testing program. Which 7 strikes me as distinct from the vaccination 8 incentive program for a couple of reasons is it's 9 an ongoing board policy rather than a one-time 10 incentive, and it sort of, in my mind is 11 unprecedented, for lack of a better word, intrusion into employees' private lives and medical privacy. 12 13 So I do think it warrants some further discussion. 14 I did want to ask, do we ask for any 15 other private or protected health information from 16 employees at the Board of Elections? 17 MS. HUMMER: If I may. 18 DIRECTOR WHITE: Please. 19 MS. HUMMER: Every county agency has 20 an HR department whereby employees will submit 21 information regarding health-protected information. 22 There is a protocol in place for where that 23 information goes, how it's protected and kept. 24 MEMBER JAFFE: Sure. 25 MS. HUMMER: And that process and

1 procedures have been communicated to the 2 administration here that it would be no different. MEMBER JAFFE: Do we at present ask 3 4 employees to provide in a blanket way that type of 5 information? 6 DIRECTOR WHITE: We ask for doctors 7 notes, we ask for FMLA information to process that 8 if you request FMLA. 9 MS. HUMMER: Doctors certifications 10 are often filled out with protected health 11 information and kept. 12 MEMBER JAFFE: Okay. Well, that's 13 helpful. I did want to raise a couple timely 14 issues as well, I think. I don't know if everyone 15 saw the Ohio House yesterday passed a piece of 16 legislation that would prohibit employers from 17 requiring proof of vaccination, I believe, is the 18 way that that legislation is phrased. Now, that's 19 not law yet, it just moved to the Ohio House. 20 that would become law, would this policy be in 21 conflict with that? 22 It's my understanding MS. HUMMER:

MS. HUMMER: It's my understanding that because this is not a requirement that you provide proof, but it's a testing requirement, if you don't have the proof, you are to test. So you

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56 1 are not required to show your proof of vaccination, 2 but rather there's an alternative to it. 3 MEMBER JAFFE: Okay. 4 MS. HUMMER: Without having gone 5 through word-by-word, I think because there's an 6 alternative, you are not making every employee 7 submit proof of vaccination irrespective of an 8 alternative testing protocol, I believe this policy 9 would be upheld. 10 MEMBER JAFFE: Similarly, I believe 11 at the national level, the Occupational Safety and 12 Health Administration has recommended or I think 13 actually mandated a very similar testing or vaccination policy that was within the last couple 14 15 weeks stayed by the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals, 16 and I understand that will now be considered on the 17 merits by the Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals here 18 in Ohio. That may relate to the federal 19 government's ability to mandate such policies 20 rather than employer's individual ability --21 I believe that is MS. HUMMER: 22 correct. 23 MEMBER JAFFE: So you don't think

there will be an issue with that?

MS. HUMMER:

I do not.

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1	MEMBER JAFFE: Another sort of
2	practical question, the policy describes
3	fully-vaccinated employees as being exempt from the
4	testing requirement if they show proof of that
5	vaccination. I think at this point, at least,
6	under the incentive program, we are defining fully
7	vaccinated as one dose of the J&J or two doses of
8	Pfizer or Moderna, given the situation with booster
9	shots and that kind of thing, do we anticipate
10	redefining what fully vaccinated means to include
11	additional shots or sticking with
12	MS. HUMMER: I think at this point,
13	the county has not changed that definition. We
14	don't anticipate that.
15	MEMBER JAFFE: And if that were to
16	come up, would it be up to the Board specifically
17	to change the definition as it relates to our
18	policy?
19	MS. HUMMER: Right.
20	DIRECTOR WHITE: On that point, I
21	did ask that question of county administration, and
22	that's the answer I received, that the definition
23	is currently the two shots of the Moderna, Pfizer
24	or one shot of J&J.
25	MS. HUMMER: Your decision today is

based on the policy that's in front of you, any change to that policy would come before you.

DIRECTOR WHITE: Correct.

MEMBER JAFFE: Okay. There was something else that came up, I think, late last night related to workers' compensation and this policy that I think raised maybe more concerns than it addressed. It indicates that the Board has an obligation to protect its employees from infection by each other with COVID, such as, if somebody does get, contracts COVID through their work here, we would be liable under workers' comp.

MS. HUMMER: That's an open question that we have seen in the workers' compensation law. And what we were, and what we have been trying to do is anticipate issues regarding that. And put the Board and its employees in the best place in terms of addressing that. And if it was raised with regard to exposure, if it did go to a workers' compensation clause, what do you have in place to address that as the management entity.

MEMBER JAFFE: I think I have a particular concern then there about how much is enough to, for us to do as a management entity to protect employees from -- I was looking at the CDC

guidance on breakthrough infections, and it's clear people who have been vaccinated are still able to contract COVID and still can be contagious and spread it to others, including other vaccinated people. If we take the testing requirement at face value as a way to detect an outbreak and prevent it from spreading throughout the entire office, should we not consider whether testing vaccinated employees as well would be appropriate?

DIRECTOR WHITE: That's a fair

question.

MS. HUMMER: I think it's based on reasonableness. I mean, what we are seeing is that throughout, you know, nationally, that the vaccinated employees are protected. It is when exposed to non-vaccinated employees that do not have an indication of being positive for COVID that potential for a vaccinated employee to contract COVID occurs. So what we have in place is what we considered the most reasonable policy, the least intrusive policy to address the safety of the employees.

DIRECTOR WHITE: And I think, too, because of administrative issues that we have discussed, in terms of how do we manage the testing

of 150 employees at any given time.

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2 MEMBER JAFFE: Right.

MS. HUMMER: And we want to encourage employees -- to be frank, we want to encourage employees as much as we can to become vaccinated. And we have all heard the debate of issues regarding employees who are vaccinated being treated exactly like the non-vaccinated. And you are creating incentives to get people vaccinated, you are hoping people get vaccinated so that the exposure is reduced.

MEMBER JAFFE: Sure. I think the incentive program we just adopted is an excellent mechanism to provide an inducement positively to get people to become vaccinated. I was interested to observe and pleased to see that the testing program, both at the commission level and before us, has changed somewhat since we first saw it in September, I think it was. At that point, it was clear that it was intended to be the stick version of the incentive; whereby, the testing program was almost punitive, it required employees to be tested twice a week, and required them to pay out-of-pocket for the testings, and required them to take the test outside of work hours. So all of

those things have been changed in the current policy making it much less punitive. I was glad to see that.

MS. HUMMER: And the county is providing, I think, rapid tests that are being used throughout all county agencies to again make it easier and quicker for employees.

DIRECTOR WHITE: Within what we have acquired, those rapid tests, we have them available for employees here, should the policy pass, that we give out at no charge.

MEMBER JAFFE: So I think, even with those changes, making the policy less punitive than it was originally, it's still clear that it's less a testing policy and more another vaccination incentive program, with the incentive being not having to go through the weekly testing rigamarole. I gathered that was an attempt to skirt actually enforcing a vaccine mandate, and it sounds like your legal opinion is it would be enough of a distinction to survive any sort of legal challenge or the Ohio legislature taking some kind of action in that regard.

MS. HUMMER: If it isn't, we will be right here to tell you about it.

1	MEMBER JAFFE: I think that
2	represents all of my questions.
3	MS. HUMMER: Thank you very much.
4	Very thoughtful questions.
5	MEMBER MARINELLO: I move that the
6	Board adopt the COVID test policy in order to
7	protect the health of the Board of Elections
8	employees, as well as the public.
9	MEMBER SEXTON: I will second.
10	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
11	properly moved and seconded. Is there a need for a
12	roll call or just a voice vote?
13	MS. HUMMER: Just voice.
14	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
15	favor of the motion, signify by saying aye.
16	MEMBER SEXTON: Aye.
17	MEMBER MARINELLO: Aye.
18	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
19	same sign.
20	MEMBER JAFFE: No.
21	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
22	carries 2-1.
23	I think we need to get back to the
24	continued selection of our recount, or our audit.
25	MR. MACKEY: We had an error on the

1	spreadsheet we are using to calculate our 5% rule;
2	we have addressed that now. We will be selecting
3	the list here. 372, 366 is the next one.
4	Still have an issue with the mid
5	numbers. We have got 2152, 5021, 6008, 2026, 2075,
6	2014, 2176, 4032, 4025, 1060, 2213, 3035, 4007,
7	4024, and then 1165 for the county-wide races.
8	That concludes that portion.
9	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And we
10	already did the 15th.
11	MR. MACKEY: Yep.
12	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Great.
13	Unless there's any other items that the Board would
14	like to take up or discuss, I believe adjournment
15	would be in order.
16	MEMBER MARINELLO: I move to
17	adjourn.

19	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
20	favor of adjournment, signify by saying aye.
