5	DIRECTOR WHITE: We'll get the			
6	meeting started.			
7	Welcome to our August 17th special			
8	meeting for Franklin County Board of Elections.			
9	I'll start with rollcall.			
10	Kim Marinello.			
11	MEMBER MARINELLO: Here.			
12	DIRECTOR WHITE: Mike Sexton.			
13	MEMBER SEXTON: Here.			
14	DIRECTOR WHITE: Chairman Preisse.			
15	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Here.			
16	DIRECTOR WHITE: Josh Jaffe.			
17	MEMBER JAFFE: Here.			
18	DIRECTOR WHITE: We do have a			
19	quorum.			
20	First item on the agenda is the			
21	approval of minutes of the May 25th, 2022 special			
22	meeting, June 29th, 2022 special meeting, and			
23	July 5th, 2022 regular board meeting. I believe			
24	those meeting minutes were distributed prior to			
25	today. Any questions or comments?			

1	CHAIRMAN	PRETSSE:	None here.
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- 2 MEMBER JAFFE: This is Josh Jaffe.
- 3 I move that the Board approve the minutes of the
- 4 May 25 special meeting, the June 29 special
- 5 meeting, and the July 5 regular board meeting, all
- 6 2022, of the Franklin County Board of Elections as
- 7 submitted.
- 8 MEMBER MARINELLO: Kim Marinello. I
- 9 second.
- 10 DIRECTOR WHITE: All those in favor
- of the motion, signify by saying aye.
- 12 (Vote taken.)
- DIRECTOR WHITE: All those opposed,
- 14 same sign.
- 15 (No response.)
- 16 DIRECTOR WHITE: Motion carries.
- 17 The next item on our agenda is the
- 18 provisional ballot report for the August 2nd, 2022
- 19 special primary election. I'll call on Sara
- 20 Ziemba, our voter services supervisor, to provide
- 21 that report.
- 22 MS. ZIEMBA: All right. Good
- 23 morning, everyone. My name is Sara Ziemba. I'm
- 24 the supervisor in the voter services department
- 25 here at the Franklin County Board of Elections, and

- 1 it's my pleasure today to give the provisional
- 2 report for the August 2nd, 2022 primary election.
- 3 You should all have Exhibit A in your packet, and
- 4 that's a detailed total and breakdown of all of the
- 5 different categories that I'll talk about today.
- 6 First of all, I would like to just
- 7 say thank you to the Board for hiring Travis
- 8 Simmons to join us as the manager in voter
- 9 services. He jumped right in with the provisional
- 10 processing on election day and right after. He's
- 11 done a great job so far, so thank you, Travis, for
- 12 jumping in head first on that. And I just want to
- thank, also, our voter services full-time seasonal
- 14 staff. We had poll worker trainers who helped us
- out and we also had absentee seasonal staff who
- 16 helped us out during this process, and they all did
- 17 a great job.
- 18 Additionally, before Travis came, I
- 19 had full-time staff members in the department,
- 20 Debbie Johnson and Rebecca Marsurek, who helped out
- 21 being my democratic counterpart during the early
- 22 vote provisional process, so I appreciate their
- 23 help as well.
- 24 For the August 2nd, 2022 primary
- 25 election, the Franklin County Board of Elections

- 1 staff worked together in six bipartisan teams to
- 2 process 923 total provisional ballots that were
- 3 cast during the early vote period and on election
- 4 day. Every provisional ballot that's cast is
- 5 always evaluated using the steps set forth in
- 6 Chapter 8 of the Secretary of State's election
- 7 manual. After initial reviews by our teams, every
- 8 ballot is double and then triple checked by
- 9 bipartisan teams to make sure that everything is
- 10 accurate and quality controlled in the weeks
- 11 following election day. Additionally, this
- 12 election, our teams had an extra task of manually
- 13 searching through the paper poll books that we used
- 14 for election day signatures to make sure that a
- 15 provisional voter who cast a provisional ballot in
- their current residence didn't go back to their old
- 17 address where they would have appeared on the paper
- 18 poll books and signed in and vote on the machines
- 19 there. So it's an extra step, but it's one that's
- 20 important that we took to make sure that every
- 21 voter that cast a provisional ballot that I will
- 22 tell you about later only cast one ballot for this
- 23 August 2nd primary.
- 24 Additionally, we were able to,
- 25 because of the smaller number of provisionals this

- 1 time, get a jump start on assigning voter history
- 2 credit for the 26,000-plus voters who voted on
- 3 election day on the machines as regular voters, and
- 4 so that was our first time using the Tenex system
- 5 to assign voter history credit manually. We're
- 6 still working on finishing that up, but the team
- 7 did a great job and multiple departments helping
- 8 out a bit, and we just want to thank everybody who
- 9 helped us out with that 'cause it is a large task
- 10 to do.
- 11 And so to begin, voter services
- 12 recommends that the Board move to accept 820
- 13 provisional ballots and to reject 9- -- sorry, 97
- 14 provisional ballots. We also have six additional
- 15 provisional ballots that will require Board review.
- 16 And you can refer to Exhibit A on your packet for
- 17 the totals for each category as I give a brief
- 18 overview.
- 19 So for the first category of the
- 20 grand total recommended to accept, we confirm that
- 21 all 820 of the provisional ballots we recommend to
- you to be accepted contain all of the required
- 23 items on the provisional ballots affirmation
- 24 envelope. As outlined in Ohio Revised Code 3505,
- 25 for a provisional ballot to be accepted by the

- 1 Board, there are six required items. The first one
- 2 is that that voter has to be a registered voter in
- 3 Franklin County or anywhere in the State of Ohio
- 4 for 30 days prior to the election and the voter
- 5 also must provide on their provisional affirmation
- 6 statement the following required items, the voter's
- 7 printed name, valid signature, date of birth,
- 8 current residential address, and an acceptable form
- 9 of identification. Usually, voters will give the
- 10 last four of their social or their Ohio Driver's
- 11 License or state ID number. And I can confirm that
- 12 each of these 820 ballots that we recommend for
- 13 acceptance today were thoroughly researched by our
- 14 bipartisan processing teams, and we are happy to
- 15 confirm that each of the individuals are registered
- 16 to vote in Franklin County or somewhere in the
- 17 State of Ohio, and that every ballot affirmation
- 18 statement contained the required information, and
- 19 we, therefore, recommend those to you to be
- 20 accepted today.
- 21 DIRECTOR WHITE: So barring any
- 22 questions, we'll be looking for a motion to approve
- 23 those 820 provisional ballots.
- 24 (No response.)
- 25 MEMBER SEXTON: Mr. Chairman, this

- 1 is Michael Sexton. I move the Board approve the
- 2 counting of 820 provisional ballots, that all
- 3 provisional ballots deemed valid will be tallied
- 4 and included in the official canvass results for
- 5 the August 2nd, 2022 primary election.
- 6 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Doug Preisse.
- 7 Second.
- 8 DIRECTOR WHITE: It's been properly
- 9 moved and seconded. All those in favor of the
- 10 motion, signify by saying aye.
- 11 (Vote taken.)
- 12 DIRECTOR WHITE: All those opposed,
- 13 same sign.
- 14 (No response.)
- 15 DIRECTOR WHITE: Motion carries.
- So now you'll talk about the
- 17 rejections?
- 18 MS. ZIEMBA: Yes.
- 19 DIRECTOR WHITE: Okay.
- 20 MS. ZIEMBA: So for the next
- 21 section, we'll go on Exhibit A through the 97
- 22 ballots that we recommend that the Board rejects
- 23 today, and I'll explain the deficiencies that each
- 24 ballot had or group of ballots had for why we are
- 25 recommending that you reject those today.

1	So the very first category we have
2	are 63 provisional ballots where the voter was not
3	registered anywhere in the State of Ohio to vote
4	for 30 days prior to the election. As one of the
5	central tenets to being eligible to count the
6	ballot, the voter has to be registered somewhere in
7	the State of Ohio 30 days prior. It's in Ohio
8	Revised Code 3505.183. And each of those 63
9	ballots initially were checked over by one
10	bipartisan team. After that bipartisan team, they
11	do three searches in our county-wide database to
12	try and find the voter. If they don't find them in
13	our county database, they then search the statewide
14	voter registration database, which is maintained by
15	the Secretary of State, and has information from
16	all of the counties in Ohio. If after three more
17	searches they don't find them anywhere in the
18	state, then the initial team puts them aside as not
19	registered.
20	After that, we have another team go
21	through, do another set of searches both in the
22	county database and the statewide database, and
23	after those six searches, again so that was 12
24	total searches, if they still can't be found, then
25	we come to the conclusion to tell you today that

- 1 they are not registered, cannot be found as
- 2 registered in the State of Ohio, and, therefore,
- 3 recommend that those 63 provisional ballots are
- 4 rejected today for not being registered.
- 5 The next category are eight
- 6 provisional ballots that fell under the wrong
- 7 precinct and location category, and these ballots
- 8 came from voters who showed up to vote at a
- 9 location on election day, they provided an address
- 10 that was not in the location where they showed up
- 11 to vote, and so they -- there's no possible way
- 12 they received the correct ballot for where they
- 13 vote. And according to Ohio law, Revised Code
- 14 3503, again, when an individual registers in Ohio,
- 15 they are placed within a precinct based upon their
- 16 residential address and is eligible to vote in that
- 17 precinct. Because Ohio law requires a voter to be
- 18 a resident of the precinct in which they offered a
- 19 vote, a provisional ballot cast in the wrong
- 20 precinct cannot be counted.
- 21 And so these eight voters showed up
- 22 to vote, received ballot that was not matching the
- 23 precinct where they put on their affirmation
- 24 statement, they were in the wrong location, voted
- 25 the wrong ballot, and, therefore, we recommend that

- 1 the Board reject those eight ballots today for
- 2 voting in the wrong location.
- 3 The next category are six
- 4 provisional ballots where the voter failed to
- 5 provide a valid current address. One of the
- 6 required items for the provisional affirmation
- 7 statement is that a voter has to provide a valid
- 8 current residential address in Franklin County in
- 9 the precinct where they appear to vote. And these
- 10 six voters, for various reasons, the majority of
- 11 them have provided P.O. Boxes, which is not a valid
- 12 residential address. We had people put down
- 13 business addresses. Again, you can't be registered
- 14 at a place of business, it has to be residential.
- 15 And a couple of them put down addresses that were
- 16 not Franklin County, they were in a different
- 17 county. So when they come here to vote in the
- 18 precincts where they showed up, they, again, didn't
- 19 provide a valid residential address for that
- 20 ballot, and, therefore, we recommend that the Board
- 21 reject those six voters.
- The next category on the list are 12
- 23 provisional ballots where the voter failed to
- 24 provide any form of identification. Again,
- 25 providing a form of identification on the

- 1 provisional affirmation statement is one of the
- 2 required elements to be able to count the ballot as
- 3 a good provisional ballot, and these 12 voters,
- 4 after a seven-day period where they had the
- 5 opportunity to come in and cure their provisionals
- 6 if they did not provide an ID on election day, they
- 7 still did not come into the Board of Elections
- 8 after seven days and provide a valid form of
- 9 identification, and so, therefore, these 12 voters
- 10 are missing one of required elements, and we
- 11 recommend that the Board reject those provisionals
- 12 as well.
- 13 Additionally, just sort of as a
- 14 note, every provisional voter, when they cast their
- 15 provisional ballot, they're given a notice where it
- 16 gives them information on what to do after you cast
- 17 your provisional. There's a hotline number on
- 18 there, there's information about coming into the
- 19 Board to cure your provisional ballot if you didn't
- 20 put ID on it, so the voters are given this
- 21 information. Additionally, there's a hotline
- 22 number they can call, and on the hotline number, it
- 23 gives them the same information. So even after all
- 24 of that, these 12 voters, again, still were missing
- 25 ID, so we recommend they be rejected.

1	The next category that we have are
2	voters who have already voted. We had five
3	provisional ballots fall under this category, and
4	these are voters who, when we went to process their
5	provisional ballots, we found that in some way or
6	another, they had already cast another ballot, and,
7	obviously, every voter gets one vote per person.
8	For these ballots, they had already cast a vote in
9	the early vote center and then they cast a
10	provisional on election day, and then one of them
11	had an absentee ballot that was returned and
12	accepted and approved, and so we recommend that
13	that provisional ballot be rejected as a second
14	vote.
15	Again, a note on these individuals,
16	our voter fraud clerk, Jim, will be interviewing
17	all of them following the election, and then any
18	pertinent results from those interviews will be
19	given to the directors and the Board following his
20	investigation. So that was five voters that had
21	already voted, so we recommend to reject their
22	second vote, which is the provisional.
23	And our last category today is three
24	provisional ballots where the voter failed to
25	provide a date of birth on the envelope affirmation

- 1 statement. And unlike the ones that I'll have for
- 2 review here in a minute, these provisional voters
- 3 did not provide any attempt at a date of birth.
- 4 And so if the field is completely blank, there
- 5 isn't anything in the Revised Code or the manual
- 6 that would allow the Board to accept them, and so,
- 7 therefore, they're missing one of the required
- 8 items, and, therefore, we recommend that you reject
- 9 those three provisional ballots for not having a
- 10 date of birth filled in on the statement.
- 11 And I can take any questions.
- 12 MEMBER MARINELLO: I have a
- 13 question. On the date of birth missing, do they
- 14 have an opportunity to cure that too?
- MS. ZIEMBA: No. Unfortunately,
- 16 it's just the ID that they're allowed to cure after
- 17 the election. It's a little bit different than an
- 18 absentee envelope in that sense, where provisionals
- 19 then can just bring in an ID.
- 20 MEMBER MARINELLO: Thank you.
- 21 MEMBER JAFFE: On the wrong precinct
- 22 and location, what steps do we take with poll
- 23 workers on election day to direct them to the right
- 24 location?
- 25 MS. ZIEMBA: Sure. Absolutely. So

- 1 on election day, our poll workers -- if a voter
- 2 comes up to the roster table and provides an
- 3 address and a name that they don't find in the poll
- 4 books, they're sent over to the provisional table,
- 5 and there, the provisional judge, the paper judge
- 6 will look them up in the street guide, make sure
- 7 they actually should be in that precinct voting,
- 8 and if they're not, they'll give the voter the
- 9 information where they should go.
- 10 And sometimes voters, for whatever
- 11 reason, they decide they don't want to go to the
- 12 location where they're supposed to be. It could be
- they don't have time, it's late in the day, they
- 14 just say give me a ballot. I want to vote right
- 15 here, right now. And so our poll workers are
- 16 trained to tell them you need to go to this
- 17 location, they'll write out the exact location for
- 18 them, give them a slip to say where you would go,
- and sometimes it just happens where the voter says
- 20 I don't care, so yeah. And at that point, we're
- 21 not going to turn anybody away, so they'll give
- 22 them a ballot and let them vote there.
- 23 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: It was a good,
- 24 very thorough report. Thank you.
- 25 MEMBER MARINELLO: I move the Board

- 1 reject the counting of 97 provisional ballots as
- 2 identified by category in Exhibit A, that all
- 3 provisional ballots rejected will not be counted or
- 4 included in the canvass results for the
- 5 August 2nd, 2022 primary election.
- 6 MEMBER JAFFE: Josh Jaffe. Second.
- 7 DIRECTOR WHITE: It's been properly
- 8 moved and seconded.
- 9 All those in favor of the motions,
- 10 signify by saying aye.
- 11 (Vote taken.)
- 12 DIRECTOR WHITE: All those opposed,
- 13 same sign.
- 14 (No response.)
- 15 DIRECTOR WHITE: Motion carries.
- So now we'll be looking for a motion
- 17 to extract the ballots that you just approved, the
- 18 820, and then we have bipartisan teams waiting in
- 19 our vault, I believe, to begin the extraction
- 20 process so we can tabulate those ballots.
- 21 MEMBER SEXTON: Mr. Chairman,
- 22 Michael Sexton. I move the Board authorize the
- 23 staff to extract the approved provisional ballots.
- 24 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Doug Preisse.
- 25 Second.

1	DIRECTOR WHITE: It's been properly
2	moved and seconded. All those in favor of the
3	motion, signify by saying aye.
4	(Vote taken.)
5	DIRECTOR WHITE: All those opposed,
6	same sign.
7	(No response.)
8	DIRECTOR WHITE: Motion carries.
9	All right. The next item is
LO	the we have, I believe, six additional ballots
L1	for provisional ballots for consideration?
12	MS. ZIEMBA: That's right.
13	DIRECTOR WHITE: Okay.
L 4	MS. ZIEMBA: So the these are
15	different than the three ballots where they didn't
16	have anything on the envelope in the date of birth
17	field. These six voters did attempt to provide a
18	date of birth for us, however, it was inconsistent
19	with what we have on our database and on the
20	statewide database.
21	The good news is is that there is a
22	provision in Ohio Revised Code that will allow you
23	as the Board, to accept or reject these provisional
24	ballots with a vote of three or more members, and

I'll just read to you what it says in there.

25

1	So, basically, the exception is is
2	that if an affirmation statement contains the
3	voter's date of birth, but the month and day are
4	different from the month and day in the statewide
5	voter registration database, the Board must reject
6	the provisional ballot unless the voter's date of
7	birth in the database is 1-1-1800, or if the Board
8	of Elections finds by a vote of least three of its
9	members that the voter has met all other
10	requirements of the division RC3505.183.35.
11	And so in that case, as long as
12	everything else on the provisional ballot
13	affirmation statement matches what we have on the
14	system in the database, that the voter is
15	registered to vote 30 days before the election and
16	that they haven't cast another ballot at some time
17	during the early vote or absentee voting period,
18	with your vote, you can vote to approve these.
19	And I'll go over just real quick.
20	We've circled the date of birth field. We had one
21	where they had the wrong day, two or, sorry,
22	three where the year was wrong, and two that had
23	the wrong month and day, and in most of these
24	cases, it was an issue of the voter transposed
25	numbers where if their birthday was 1-1, they put

- 1 10-10 or the opposite. If it was, like, 1946, they
- 2 wrote 64 for the birth year, so it was just simple
- 3 things. And, literally, everything else on the
- 4 envelope, the name, the ID, the address, signature,
- 5 everything else checked out with what we have on
- 6 our database and at the statewide database as well.
- 7 So barring anything, you know, other
- 8 than the date of birth transposition and
- 9 inconsistency, these would have been approved.
- 10 Everything else was okay with them, so we would
- 11 recommend that you take a vote to accept these six
- 12 ballots.
- 13 I'm happy to answer any questions.
- 14 MEMBER JAFFE: I have a question.
- 15 Four of them look like they wrote their date of
- 16 birth as January 1. Was the year in each of those
- 17 cases correct?
- MS. ZIEMBA: Yes. Yeah.
- 19 MEMBER JAFFE: Okay.
- 20 DIRECTOR WHITE: Is there a motion
- 21 to approve those ballots?
- 22 MEMBER JAFFE: There's no other
- 23 questions. This is Josh Jaffe. I will move that
- 24 the Board approve the counting of six additional
- 25 provisional ballots and the rejection of none of

- 1 them, and that all of the provisional ballots
- 2 deemed valid will be counted and included in the
- 3 official canvass results for the August 2nd, 2022
- 4 primary election.
- 5 MEMBER MARINELLO: Kim Marinello.
- 6 Second.
- 7 DIRECTOR WHITE: It's been properly
- 8 moved and seconded. All those in favor of the
- 9 motion, signify by saying aye.
- 10 (Vote taken.)
- 11 DIRECTOR WHITE: All those opposed,
- 12 same sign.
- 13 (No response.)
- 14 DIRECTOR WHITE: Motion carries.
- 15 Now we need a motion to extract
- 16 those ballots.
- 17 MEMBER SEXTON: Mr. Chairman,
- 18 Michael Sexton. I move the Board authorize the
- 19 staff to extract the additional six approved
- 20 provisional ballots.
- 21 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Doug Preisse.
- 22 Second.
- 23 DIRECTOR WHITE: It's been properly
- 24 moved and seconded. All those in favor of the
- 25 motion, signify by saying aye.

1	(Vote taken.)			
2	DIRECTOR WHITE: All those opposed,			
3	same sign.			
4	(No response.)			
5	DIRECTOR WHITE: Motion carries.			
6	Thanks, Sara.			
7	MS. ZIEMBA: Thank you.			
8	DIRECTOR WHITE: Excellent report.			
9	It's been past practice of the Board			
10	to give the Board staff authority to remake any			
11	ballots in case when we when the staff extracts			
12	a ballot, if there's a ballot that's not able to be			
13	run or tabulated or it needs to be remade in			
14	bipartisan teams, the Board has authorized the			
15	staff to do that with a report to be made to the			
16	Board later, if that's been the case in the past.			
17	So if the Board would see fit to give that			
18	authority today, we'd like to see that happen.			
19	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Good idea.			
20	MEMBER MARINELLO: Kim Marinello. I			
21	move that the Board authorize the staff to remake			
22	provisional ballots, and that these remade ballots			
23	shall be tabulated and included in the official			
24	canvass of the results of the August 2nd, 2022			
25	primary election with the reports being made to the			

- 1 Board.
- 2 MEMBER JAFFE: Josh Jaffe. Second.
- 3 DIRECTOR WHITE: It's been properly
- 4 moved and seconded. All those in favor or the
- 5 motion, signify by saying aye.
- 6 (Vote taken.)
- 7 DIRECTOR WHITE: All those opposed,
- 8 same sign.
- 9 (No response.)
- 10 DIRECTOR WHITE: Motion carries.
- 11 The next item on our agenda is the
- 12 certification of local questions and issues for the
- 13 November 8th, 2022 general election, and for that,
- 14 I'll call on Jeff Mackey, the manager of our
- 15 petition and campaign finance department to give a
- 16 report.
- MR. MACKEY: You have before you
- 18 Exhibit B, which includes 26 local questions and
- 19 issues that were submitted to the Board to be
- 20 included on the November 8th general election
- 21 ballot. They have been reviewed by staff in the
- 22 prosecutor's office and are sufficient for
- 23 inclusion.
- 24 MEMBER SEXTON: Mr. Chairman,
- 25 Michael Sexton.

1	DIRECTOR WHITE: Hang on, Mike.			
2	MS. HUMMER: Do these include the			
3	ones we received that were filed on the 10th?			
4	MR. MACKEY: This is just the local			
5	tax questions and charter amendments.			
6	MS. HUMMER: Not local options?			
7	MR. MACKEY: Not local options.			
8	MS. HUMMER: Okay. We're good.			
9	MEMBER SEXTON: Mr. Chairman,			
10	Michael Sexton. I move the Board certify the			
11	November 8th, 2022 general election ballot, the			
12	local questions and issues listed on Exhibit B, and			
13	that these questions and issues were filed timely			
14	and found to be valid and sufficient.			
15	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Doug Preisse.			
16	Second.			
17	DIRECTOR WHITE: It's been properly			
18	moved and seconded. All those in favor of the			
19	motion, signify by saying aye.			
20	(Vote taken.)			
21	DIRECTOR WHITE: All those opposed,			
22	same sign.			
23	(No response.)			
24	DIRECTOR WHITE: Motion carries.			
25	Next item on the agenda is the			

- 1 certification of local options for the
- 2 November 8th, 2022 general election.
- 3 MR. MACKEY: Is there discussion now
- 4 on -- okay.
- 5 MS. HUMMER: There are at least four
- 6 that were submitted on August 10th that we are
- 7 still reviewing. Are those noted on here?
- 8 MR. MACKEY: They are not noted
- 9 independently, no.
- 10 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Are they listed
- 11 on here?
- MR. MACKEY: They're listed on here,
- 13 yeah.
- 14 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: They are?
- MS. HUMMER: And I've only reviewed
- 16 one of them. I can -- I'm working on it, but they
- 17 were submitted on August 10th. Can we -- we're
- 18 going to recess, right?
- 19 DIRECTOR WHITE: Can we table this
- 20 one, then?
- 21 MR. MACKEY: Yeah.
- 22 DIRECTOR WHITE: We'll table this
- 23 item and then we can -- we can come back to the
- 24 post-recess. Is that fair?
- MS. HUMMER: That's fair.

1	CHAIRMAN	PREISSE:	Okay.
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- 2 DIRECTOR WHITE: Does that impact
- 3 the next agenda item, Jeff?
- 4 MR. MACKEY: I mean, it could if

- 6 think we are back from recess.
- 7 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Out of recess.
- 8 DIRECTOR WHITE: So I will call up
- 9 Jeff Mackey, so we'll continue on the certification
- 10 of local options.

- 12 received 25 local options, and Exhibit C reflects
- 13 22 local options that were determined to be timely
- 14 filed, valid and sufficient, which resulted in 30
- 15 separate questions because sometimes a petition has
- 16 both a weekday question and a Sunday question on
- 17 it. They get more than the sum total, and they are
- 18 all reviewed and recommended for inclusion at the
- 19 November general election.
- 20 MEMBER JAFFE: And the four that had
- 21 not been reviewed?
- MR. MACKEY: They're going to be on
- 23 Exhibit D. No, I'm sorry. Those were all reviewed
- 24 now.
- 25 MEMBER JAFFE: Oh, then no issues

- 1 with any of those?
- 2 MR. MACKEY: No issues.
- 3 MEMBER JAFFE: Okay. If there's no
- 4 questions, I'll move the Board certify to the
- 5 November 8th, 2022 general election ballot the
- 6 local options listed on Exhibit C, and that these
- 7 local options were filed timely and found to be
- 8 valid and sufficient.
- 9 MEMBER MARINELLO: Kim Marinello. I
- 10 second.
- 11 DIRECTOR WHITE: It's been properly
- 12 moved and seconded. All those in favor of the
- 13 motion, signify by saying aye.
- 14 (Vote taken.)
- DIRECTOR WHITE: All those opposed,
- 16 same sign.
- 17 (No response.)
- 18 DIRECTOR WHITE: Motion carries.
- Now we'll move onto the rejection of
- 20 local options.
- 21 MR. MACKEY: I did misspeak. Two of
- 22 the ones that she reviewed are actually on here,
- 23 but they were on here before.
- 24 MEMBER JAFFE: Okay.
- 25 MR. MACKEY: So there are three

- 1 local options that were timely filed but have not
- 2 been found to be valid and sufficient. The first
- 3 one there is Columbus 4A, they did not submit
- 4 enough valid signatures. I think they did -- they
- 5 submitted 172 signatures, they needed 123 valid
- 6 signatures, but we only found 100 valid signature,
- 7 so we're short.
- 8 And then the last one, Franklin D,
- 9 they only needed 50 signatures 'cause it was only a
- 10 Sunday question, and they submitted 66, but we
- 11 found only 32 of those to be valid, so they were
- 12 short.
- 13 And then Westerville 1D there, the
- 14 Life in the Ville, after reviewing the petition,
- there was some discrepancies and an omission,
- 16 especially on the Sunday sales question where they
- 17 did not indicate that they were for the correct
- 18 license type, and after meeting back with the
- 19 prosecutor's office, determined that we should not
- 20 move forward with placing that issue on the ballot
- 21 either.
- 22 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. Any
- 23 questions?
- 24 MEMBER JAFFE: No.
- 25 MEMBER SEXTON: Mr. Chairman,

- 1 Michael Sexton. I move that the Board does not
- 2 certify to the November 8th, 2022 general election
- 3 ballot the local options listed on Exhibit D, and
- 4 that these issues and local options were found to
- 5 be invalid and insufficient.
- 6 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Doug Preisse.
- 7 Second.
- 8 DIRECTOR WHITE: It's been properly
- 9 moved and seconded. All those in favor of the
- 10 motion, signify by saying aye.
- 11 (Vote taken.)
- 12 DIRECTOR WHITE: All those opposed,
- 13 same sign.
- 14 (No response.)
- 15 DIRECTOR WHITE: Motion carries.
- Thank you, Jeff.
- 17 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Thanks, Jeff.
- 18 DIRECTOR WHITE: Next item on the
- 19 agenda is the certification of the August 2nd --
- 20 or, excuse me -- yeah, August 2nd, 2022 primary
- 21 election. For that, I'll call on Carla Patton,
- 22 manager of our operations department.
- MS. PATTON: Good afternoon. Carla
- 24 Patton, the manager, election operations. I have
- 25 provided you with the official results for Franklin

- 1 County only for the August 2nd, 2022 primary
- 2 election. On this report, we have reviewed all the
- 3 ballots that were cast for the election and have
- 4 counted those that were deemed valid based on the
- 5 motions made earlier today.
- 6 So in this report, you have the
- 7 results as they appeared from the election night as
- 8 well as the inclusion of the 825 provisional
- 9 ballots. There was one ballot that was not marked
- 10 at all. There was no marking on the ballot card.
- 11 It was put in blank, so that is why there is one
- 12 less ballot being counted. That voter will still
- 13 get credit, though, for voting as well as the 72
- 14 additional absentee ballots that were received
- 15 after the election in a timely fashion. With that,
- 16 60,216 ballots were cast in the August 2nd primary
- 17 election, which is a turnout of 6.92 percent in the
- 18 county.
- 19 As I said, after a bipartisan review
- of all these ballots casts, these are the results
- 21 that we present to you and ask that you certify.
- 22 There are no recounts based on these results. If

- 7 other questions, Mr. Chairman, Michael Sexton, I
- 8 move that Board certify and declare as final the
- 9 official canvass for the votes cast in the
- 10 August 2nd, 2022 primary election as submitted by
- 11 staff on Exhibit E.
- 12 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Doug Preisse.
- 13 Second.
- 14 DIRECTOR WHITE: It's been properly
- 15 moved and seconded. All those in favor of the
- 16 motion, signify by saying aye.
- 17 (Vote taken.)
- DIRECTOR WHITE: All those opposed,
- 19 same sign.
- 20 (No response.)
- 21 DIRECTOR WHITE: Motion carries.
- 22 Thank you, Carla.
- I think the final item on our agenda
- 24 is to set the date for the post-election audit, and
- 25 then we'll have to draw the precincts for that

- 1 audit. So we can get a motion to -- Mr. Sexton.
- MEMBER SEXTON: Mr. Chairman,
- 3 Michael Sexton. I move the Board set the
- 4 post-election to begin Thursday, August 30th, 2022
- 5 until completed, and that the audit be conducted in
- 6 accordance with the Secretary of State Directive
- 7 2019-30 and be held at the Franklin County Board of
- 8 Elections, 1700 Morse Road.
- 9 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Dog Preisse.
- 10 Second.
- 11 DIRECTOR WHITE: It's been properly
- 12 moved and seconded. All those in favor of the
- 13 motion, signify by saying I'll aye.
- 14 (Vote taken.)
- DIRECTOR WHITE: All those opposed,
- 16 same sign.
- 17 (No response.)
- 18 DIRECTOR WHITE: Motion carries.
- 19 So then at this time, Jeff Mackey
- 20 will do a random selection of the locations that
- 21 will be used for the audit. So, Jeff, if you could
- 22 take a moment to explain to the Board our process.

- 16 to start entering over here.
- Over here, it says we need 1,042
- 18 votes to get to the five percent. Start doing the
- 19 sequence here, 142, 122, 107 are the first three.
- 20 Let's see how that goes. All right. So we have
- 21 hit five percent, right? So I'll do one more
- 'cause we have to choose at least -- was it 122,
- 23 Carla?
- MS. PATTON: Yes.
- 25 MR. MACKEY: So we're well over our

- 1 five percent mark there. The locations are
- 2 LID 5026 and LID 3032. So 5026 was Ephesus Seventh
- 3 Day Adventist Church. 3026 was -- 3032 was
- 4 Hastings Middle School. So we'll pull the ballots
- 5 from those two voting locations and audit those on
- 6 the date that you set there.
- 7 MEMBER JAFFE: Very good.
- B DIRECTOR WHITE: Thank you, Jeff.
- 9 Any questions?
- 10 (No response.)
- 11 DIRECTOR WHITE: Is there any other
- 12 business for the Board today?
- 13 MEMBER MARINELLO: When's our next
- 14 meeting?
- DIRECTOR WHITE: Our next meeting --
- 16 Erin, do you have a date for our next meeting?
- 17 MS. GIBBONS: It will be on
- 18 September the 6th.
- 19 DIRECTOR WHITE: That would be the
- 20 day after Labor Day. That's Tuesday after Labor
- 21 Day?
- MS. GIBBONS: Yep. Day after Labor
- 23 Day.
- DIRECTOR WHITE: 3:00?
- MS. GIBBONS: Yep.
