Colley, Carolyn C. Petree, and Kimberly E. Marinello, and Executive Director Matt Damschroder, taken at the Franklin County Board of Elections, 280 East Broad Street, Columbus, Ohio, on Monday, February 6, 2006, at 2:05 o'clock p.m. 

2 PROCEEDINGS 3 4 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: I'd like to call 5 the Franklin County Board of Elections meeting 6 to order. Roll call. 7 (Roll call conducted by Director 8 Damschroder.) DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: All members 10 are present, Mr. Chairman. 11 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Thank you. 12 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: The first 13 item on the agenda is actually something 14 that's not printed on your agenda, and that is 15 the approval of the minutes from November the 16 29th, 2005, December the 6th, 2005, and 17 December the 22nd, 2005, all of which had been 18 previously distributed to you for your review. 19 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Go ahead. I will 20 entertain a motion to accept those. 21 MS. MARINELLO: So moved. 22 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: All those in --23 is there a second? 24 MS. PETREE: Second.

CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: All those in 1 2 favor? MEMBERS: Aye. 3 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: And motion 4 5 I'll send these down the row for the carries. 6 signatures. 7 The first item on the printed agenda, Mr. Chairman, is to establish a 8 payment schedule between the Board of 10 Elections and our voting machine storage device vendor, SST. This is at the request of 11 12 the Franklin County Auditor, because a payment schedule was not included in the initial 13 invitation to bid, and one has to be 14 15 established at this time. 16 The Deputy Director and I have talked with the vendor. They've actually made 17 18 one delivery of cards last week; we're 19 expecting another delivery today. 20 What we have discussed was -- is 21 paying in full the invoices for the cards 22 we've received to date, receiving an invoice 23 of 20 percent of the balance, and then each 24 individual invoice thereafter would be

1 appropriated less than 20 percent. 2 So we recommend this schedule to you and request a motion and passage. 3 MS. MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, I move 4 5 that the Board of Elections adopt the 6 following payment schedule with its voting 7 machine storage device vendor, SST: 8 One, that any and all invoices for voting machine storage cards delivered on or 10 before the date of this motion be paid in 11 full; Two, that SST is authorized to 12 13 submit and the County Auditor directed to pay 14an invoice equal to 20 percent of the balance 15 of the original purchase price, less any 16 invoices submitted for the payment to date; 17 Three, that all future invoices 18 submitted by SST will reflect a 20 percent 19 credit in recognition of the 20 percent 20 advance payment. 21 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Is there a 22 second? 23 MR. COLLEY: Second. 24 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: All those in

favor, say aye.

MEMBERS: Aye.

DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: And motion carries. And so that the auditor has a record of the action, I'll send it and the signature sheet down on that motion.

Just by way of keeping you all up to date on what's going on, there is a Special Election tomorrow in the Albany-Plain Local School District. Seventeen precincts will be open for that election. We will be using the new ESS touchscreen voting machines for this election.

So far, the process with ESS has gone very smoothly. And last Saturday we had a poll worker training for the election officials who will be in the precincts tomorrow. That training was Saturday morning from 10:00 to about 12:30, 12:45, and from my perspective, that training session went very well.

Renee Clough did a presentation of the bird's-eye view in the process, and we broke all the judges down into small groups and did one-on-one hands-on training with the system.

So we're expecting a successful Election Day tomorrow with the new voting system. If any of you are interested in going out to the precincts to watch, let Denny or I know. We'll either meet you here, drive out, or meet you at a precinct.

MR. WHITE: We will see you at your house around 5:30.

CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: I'm not going to be there then.

(Laughter.)

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DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: We're very pleased with the process. We will be having actual full-time staff in the field tomorrow as well, one full-time staff in each precinct, an election official, just so that, not only can they get additional experience and kind of get a feel for what the voters or poll workers are seeing, but also since they've had a little bit more experience with the machines, it will be helpful to voters.

CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: You know I -- any

· 1 questions? 2 MS. PETREE: Yes. 3 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Yes? MS. PETREE: How many locations? 5 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: Those 6 seventeen precincts are at about nine or ten 7 locations, so it's not very many. 8 MS. PETREE: How many machines? DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: There's going 10 to be three machines in each precinct, so 11 fewer than sixty total machines. 12 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Any other 13 questions? 14 You know, we had an Executive 15 Committee meeting, and a machine was brought 16 over to our party headquarters, and folks 17 played with it and it got a pretty good 18 response; folks kind of liked it, played with 19 it a little bit. And as folks were coming in 20 and out, they got to play with it, and there 21 seemed to be a good response to it. So I 22 would love to see it happen. 23 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: Just so that 24 you all know, the last year before, during the

calendar year, we made some changes, brought Howard Heard from the warehouse, as you'll recall, to do voter education, and hired Lillian Williams to become our public relations manager.

Both Lillian and Howard were working very diligently in scheduling demonstrations with the voting machines, with outreach opportunities. Howard has spent much of the last, probably, month up in the New Albany-Westerville area doing demonstrations at the local libraries, churches, and has a pretty good schedule that we've actually now posted to the Web site of his different locations he's going to be at. The schedule goes out into the summer.

And Denny and I have a demonstration scheduled for the Dispatch Editorial Board coming up the last week of February.

MR. WHITE: If you have any areas, groups that you can help us identify where you think that it would be good to have Howard and Lillian go out, or anybody else, and do a demonstration, we welcome suggestions or other

1 scenarios. 2 I think the more we get out now and being proactive on educating the voters on the 3 4 machines will pay ten times the dividends on 5 Election Day, where we can educate them and 6 inform them now and resolve all their issues 7 and questions now. So any groups, church groups, social groups, clubs, we want to get them out there. 9 10 MS. PETREE: What about the Columbus 11 Bar Association? 12 MR. WHITE: That'd be great. Any 13 suggestions you have. We are just trying to be real 14 15 proactive on educating the public, the users 16 of the machines, prior to Election Day. And 17 as I said, they're on their own out there 18 trying to identify a place. We're thinking maybe some of the college universities, lunch 19 20 hour go and set up, anywhere you'll find 21 people. 22 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: Where there's 23 a crowd.

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Any other questions or comments?

CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Not about this.

But I did have a -- wondering where we were
going to be at on the recently passed voter
legislation dealing with voter ID and all
that. How are we going to deal with that when
folks come in without an ID, without a picture
ID?

DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: Great question. Actually, Denny and I have talked about that issue earlier today. There's a couple things that have taken place recently.

House Rule 234 became effective a couple weeks ago; that's the no-excuse absentee voting that, although it's effective for this election, there haven't been very many voter-requested absentee ballots for tomorrow's special.

We've developed new forms for that.

With the no-fault absentee, the respective absentee voter has to provide their date of birth and either the last four digits of their Social Security number or their driver's license number, or a copy of a current utility bill, government check, military ID, or

something along those lines. We will be adjusting our Web site to provide that information, and we're working with staff on educating them on the system.

House Bill 3 passed, which is the big issue in terms of voter identification at the polls. That section of the statute is not really effective until after the primary.

One of the things that Denny and I discussed this morning is, as you know from previous conversations, we're planning -- we're already planning a very robust voter education campaign centered around the use of the new machines, both for the primary and for the general.

What we'd like to do is go back to the Commissioners to ask for additional funding to enhance the public education campaign for the fall, so that it includes the voter educator -- the identification requirement.

You may have noticed that there was an editorial in the Dispatch yesterday that kind of talked about this, and I really keyed

in on one sentence from that, and that was, that in the opinion of the Dispatch, that voter disenfranchisement was not likely to take place simply on the basis of voter identification, that the requirement had come into place but the disenfranchisement was most likely just simply because longtime voters didn't know they needed to bring an ID with them.

And so, to me, that means that education is going to be very key in reminding folks in that last ten-day window, you need to bring a driver's license with you or your utility bill or something. If they show up for the vote at the polls and they don't have that, they can still vote a provisional ballot. But my feeling is, every penny we spend educating folks to bring their ID with them to the polls will pay dividends in terms of provisional ballots cast.

CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Now, what about, you know, we send out voter registration cards -- a card, after you register to vote you get a little card in the mail. That can't be used

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as a voter ID? 1 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: No, it can't. 2 3 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Okay. That's 4 what I thought. Is there any way that we 5 could -- what can we do to -- well, part of 6 the problem is if you don't have utility 7 bills. 8 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: Right. 9 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: You live with somebody, you don't pay a utility bill, and 10 you haven't -- there are a few folks that 11 12 haven't gotten a Social Security card also. 13 And there are folks who don't have a government job and can't go by their 14 15 government check. But we do send out a voter 16 registration ID card. MR. WHITE: That doesn't suffice. 17 18 That's bizarre. 19 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Yeah, is there 20 any way that we could -- wow, I don't know the 21 answer to that whole question. 22 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: Well, like I 23 said -- go ahead. 24 MS. MARINELLO: If they have the

1 last numbers of their Social Security, then 2 they have to do a provisional? 3 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: If they don't have the last four of their Social, they have 4 to cast a provisional ballot. Now, there's 5 6 also a provisional that was floating around, 7 I'll have to check to see whether it was 8 actually passed, was that a voter could fill 9 out an affidavit, basically attesting to who they are and that they do not have or have 10 11 access to any forms of identification. 12 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: So they'd just 13 have to vote on a provisional? DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: 14 Yes. 15 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Okay. 16 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: But then you 17 come down to the issue of county provisional, 18 you still have to have your driver's license 19 or your Social and you're date of birth. 20 So, but one thought, Mr. Chairman, 21 on your comment about the identification cards 22 is, we have been talking about changing the 23 format of that card, and as a part of that, we

could, as part of that education fees, include

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1 information with that card, and some of the 2 newly registered can change their address and do all the mailings to include that new 3 4 identification card information so folks are receiving information. 5 6 MR. WHITE: And I thought --7 MS. PETREE: Mr. Chairman, Matt, if 8 I would come in to vote --9 THE REPORTER: I'm sorry, I can't 10 hear you. MS. PETREE: If I would come in to 11 12 vote and I don't have a picture ID with me, 13 you ask me my last four numbers of my Social Security number and I give those to you, how 14 15 do you verify that? 16 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: We don't. Which is why, as one of the positions that our 17 18 association of elections officials took, was 19 that a lot of -- most of the requirements for 20 identification in this bill were really meaningless, because there's no way to verify 21 22 that information. 23 You would just simply -- there's 24 nothing that prevents someone from walking

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1 into the polling locations and say the last 2 four digits of his social are 1234, because we 3 have no way to verify it or check it. You 4 would have no way of checking if the voter ID 5 is valid. So it somewhat becomes an exercise 6 in futility. 7 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: But without a 8 photo ID, it's a provisional ballot? 9 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: Without a 10 photo ID or a copy of a utility bill, government check, or stating the last four 11 digits of your Social, yes. 12 13 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Okay. 14 MR. WHITE: But correspondence from 15 the government to you with your address, that 16 doesn't count? 17 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: No. They 18 left out passports, military ID, and voter 19 identification cards from the Board of 20 Elections. 21 MS. PETREE: Military ID doesn't 22 count either? 23 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: That's 24 correct.

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1 MS. PETREE: That's too bad, because 2 that is a picture ID. DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: Exactly. 3 4 MR. WHITE: What about a parking 5 ticket? 6 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: Probably not. 7 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Okay. This is a go. That is almost a good go, actually. 8 MS. PETREE: So this isn't effective 10 until next May? DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: This will 11 12 actually go into effect after the main 13 election. MS. PETREE: After the main 14 election. 15 16 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: So we don't 17 have to worry about it for the primary. 18 MR. WHITE: And they don't have to 19 be current either; I could give them an electric bill from 2000? 20 21 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: Well, the law 22 says it's supposed to be from your current 23 residential address. But, again, you know, 24 like Bill said, you could be living somewhere,

. 1 you know, like a parent, older parent living 2 with a child, the adult child is the one that 3 has the utilities in their name. CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Well, my 4 5 utilities are in my name because I pay it. 6 MR. WHITE: Social Security card, 7 does that count as an ID? DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: Yeah, because 9 it would have the last four of your social. MR. WHITE: Say I show a valid 10 11 driver's license? 12 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: When you have 13 your Social Security card, they're okay. MR. WHITE: Okay. So Social 14 15 Security card. 16 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: And my quess 17 is, from talking to folks at the Common Cause, 18 League of Women Voters, that this will 19 probably be litigated, and I'm sure the 20 Secretary of State will be issuing some kind of directive. 2.1 22 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Before November? DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: At some 23 24 point, after the main primary, to help guide

1 us on this issue. 2 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Because it's 3 still not over. DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: 4 Yeah; there 5 really are a lot of open ends, and it's 6 subject to interpretation. 7 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: One other thing 8 from being contained in the agenda here, the Elections Science Institute did what -- what 10 was the result of their testing in the voting 11 system? 12 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: There's some 13 things that we can say on the record and some 14 things that we will go into Executive Session 15 to discuss. 16 But for the record, they are not 17 quite finished with their full test. They are 18 reviewing several million lines of source 19 They have reviewed the hardware for the code. 20 voting system and are planning on recommending 21 some procedural, some changes in procedure to 22 the Board that will help further protect the 23 system from any possible attacks from voters

who would try to do something.

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1 But on the whole, what ESI heads 2 found is that the system is secure, that it is a well engineered system, and ESS has 3 4 continued to assure us that any issues that ESI does find, they will resolve for future 5 releases of the software or firmware. 7 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Do we have a new meeting schedule? DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: Steve 10 Hertzberg's mom has been in and out of the hospital for the last couple of months, and so 11 12 it's kind of put at least the local meeting process up in the air, because he has not been 13 -- he's only been out to Columbus once in the 14 1.5 last three months. 16 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: I've got a couple 17 of folks on that committee asking. 18 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: Yeah. And as 19 the local child, he's kind of entrusted with 20 her care. 21 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: As he should be. 22 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: So he's been 23 focused on that recently. But I talked to him 24 a couple of times in the last couple of weeks.

1	He's still committed to caring on the process;
2	the study process with ESS has continued on
3	during that process, during that time frame.
4	That's just the local issues we're
5	working on as the advisement committee has
6	slowed in his absence.
7	CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Okay.
8	MS. PETREE: Mr. Chairman?
9	CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Yes, ma'am.
10	MS. PETREE: Did you say the BEPO or
11	ESS?
12	A. I said that's what I meant to
13	say. I just had visions of just bad things in
14	my head.
15	All right. We can continue with the
16	agenda items.
17	DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: The last
18	item, Mr. Chairman, is actually, because
19	tomorrow is election
20	(Interruption in proceedings.)
21	CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Go ahead.
22	DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: Rather than
23	adjourning today, we should make a motion to
24	recess subject to the call of its chairman.

1 That way if the Board has to meet tomorrow in 2 an emergency session to deal with an Election 3 Committee matter, we're still in session. Let's just say, briefly, that in 4 5 terms of coming to future meetings, we can 6 have a meeting on February the 22nd -- and 7 we'll communicate those to you through Suzanne as well. On February 22nd, we need to certify candidates and issues to the second primary and special elections ballot, and that will be 10 11 following the 16th final deadline. 12 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: That's the 13 earliest we could meet? 14 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: That's 15 actually kind of the latest we can meet. 16 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Okay. 17 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: Also, I'll be 18 leaving that night to Albuquerque to do a 19 presentation for an Elections Center seminar. 20 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: So you would 21 prefer an early meeting on that day? 22 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: You know, we 23 can probably -- my preference would be kind of 24 a late morning meeting on the 22nd.

1 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: I could -- do you 2 think it would be a long meeting? DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: My plan is to 3 streamline it, as we have in the past, so we 4 5 can do things in big groups. 6 MS. PETREE: What day is that? 7 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: I said Wednesday. 8 MS. PETREE: On Wednesday? CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Yeah. 9 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: Well, we'll 10 play it by ear. I'll have Suzanne call 11 12 everybody later this week and get schedules, 13 if we have to maybe have it the day before or 14 whatever, on those various schedules. 15 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: We are ratifying 16 our contract, so we're actually voting on the 21st, 22nd, and 23rd. So, I mean, I can get 17 18 away. But I can do it before the 22nd too. 19 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: Okay. 20 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: If you guys are 21 ready to go ahead. 22 DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: All right. 23 I'll have Suzanne call everybody and get it 24 scheduled. So the 22nd is the last day we

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1	could do it.
2	CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Okay.
3	DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: And then the
4	Secretary of State is expected to issue
5	appointments to board members on March the
6	1st, which means either the Board would then
7	have to meet either Thursday the 2nd or Friday
8	the 3rd or Monday the 6th for its
9	reorganization meeting.
10	CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: What dates are
11	those?
12	DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: March 2, 3,
13	or 6.
14	MR. WHITE: Thursday, Friday, and
15	Monday.
16	CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Okay.
17	DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: Of March.
18	CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Do you need those
19	now?
20	DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: No. I'll
21	have Suzanne call everybody with dates and
22	times that work.
23	CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Okay. All right.
24	DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: Other than

1	that, we can entertain a motion.
2	MS. MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman.
3	CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Yes, ma'am.
4	MS. MARINELLO: I move that the
5	Franklin County Board of Elections stand in
6	recess subject to the call of its chairman for
7	the Tuesday, February 7, 2006, New
8	Albany-Plain Local School District Special
9	Election pursuant to Section 3505.30 of the
10	Ohio Revised Code.
11	CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Is there a
12	second?
13	MS. PETREE: Second.
14	CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: All those in
15	favor, say aye.
16 ·	MEMBERS: Aye.
17	DIRECTOR DAMSCHRODER: And the
18	motion carries, and we stand in recess. Thank
19	you.

22	adjourned at 2:30 o'clock p.m.
