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P R O C E E D I N G S

CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: I would like
to call the Franklin County Board of
Elections meeting to order.

May we have the roll call.

MR. DAMSCHRODER: Mr. Colley?

MR. COLLEY: Here.

MR. DAMSCHRODER: Ms. Marinello?

MS. MARINELLO: Here.

MR. DAMSCHRODER: Ms. Petree?

MS. PETREE: Here.

MR. DAMSCHRODER: And Chairman
Anthony?

CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Here.

MR. DAMSCHRODER: All members
are present, Mr. Chairman.

The first item on the agenda is
the certification of the February 7th,
2006 Special Election. In your packet
there is a summary sheet of the votes as
well as a precinct-by-precinct breakdown
of the results. Everything went very

1 smoothly within the new voting system.

2 I would recommend acceptance for
3 the certification of results.

4 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Any
5 questions?

6 I have got one. I visited some
7 of the polls on election day and folks
8 really seemed to like the machines. They
9 didn't cause any problems to anybody that
10 I talked to. It looked like if that is an
11 indication that we are going to have
12 people being concerned about it, it has
13 not been there.

14 MR. DAMSCHRODER: It was a very
15 successful big toe in the water.

16 MS. MARINELLO: What was the
17 response of the poll workers?

18 MR. DAMSCHRODER: For the poll
19 workers the overwhelming response was very
20 positive. They thought the machines were
21 easier for them to use and set up,
22 particularly the casting of provisional
23 ballots on the electronic machines. They
24 were overwhelmingly in favor of that, so

1 it was a good experience for them.

2 The one thing we very clearly
3 learned was that the education of poll
4 workers is absolutely essential. You will
5 see later on an agenda item that Denny and
6 I recommend some additional training to be
7 brought on in the spring. That will be to
8 organize poll workers beyond the one class
9 required. They got it and we had very few
10 problems in terms of poll worker error.

11 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: One of the
12 things that, if there was any problem --
13 and I don't think it was a big problem --
14 was that folks felt there could have been
15 more privacy. I guess you could figure
16 that out by how you set them up and the
17 placement.

18 The booth used to have a curtain
19 all the way around. Now, it is pretty
20 much out in the open and two blinders come
21 up. It is still private but not the
22 privacy of a booth.

23 MR. DAMSCHRODER: After 30 years
24 of voting behind a curtain, people did say

1 they felt kind of exposed standing there;
2 but when they adjusted the side blinders
3 in close for them, it eliminates the
4 possibility of anybody looking at the
5 ballot.

6 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Nobody was
7 going to be standing behind them anyway.
8 Maybe that was the only real concern about
9 it that I can think of.

10 MR. DAMSCHRODER: We are going
11 to be putting a survey into the field, a
12 mail survey, of all individuals who voted
13 at the polls in New Albany, asking them
14 what they felt, what worked and didn't
15 work, what they liked and didn't like, so
16 we can respond to some of the concerns if
17 there are any in the voter education
18 handbook.

19 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: All the sites
20 were great. They had some great sites in
21 New Albany.

22 MR. DAMSCHRODER: It is
23 definitely a lot easier to find
24 appropriate locations in the suburbs, as

1 compared to other parts of the city.

2 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: They were
3 handicap accessible and well lit.

4 MS. PETREE: Good parking.

5 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: So I would
6 entertain a motion.

7 MS. MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, I
8 move that the results of the February 7,
9 2006 New Albany Plain Local School
10 District Special Election be certified as
11 presented.

12 MS. PETREE: Mr. Chairman, I
13 second.

14 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: All in favor,
15 say aye.

16 MR. DAMSCHRODER: The motion
17 carries.

18 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: We're ready
19 for Candidate Certification.

20 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Okay. A call
21 has been received from Nick Soulas, who is
22 on his way. Everything is pretty
23 straightforward.

24 You will see in your packet of

1 materials a list labeled Local Option
2 Issues filed. It also includes all of the
3 tax questions that were filed with us.

4 There were three local options
5 that were filed in the Columbus 2F,
6 Columbus 4C, and Franklin F that were
7 found to have insufficient signatures.

8 It would be the Staff's
9 recommendation that the Board certify to
10 the ballot all of the tax questions, as
11 well as local options found to have
12 insufficient signatures.

13 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Are there any
14 questions?

15 (No audible response)

16 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: If not, I
17 will entertain a motion.

18 MR. COLLEY: Mr. Chairman, I
19 move that the list of issues and valid
20 local options be certified to the May 2nd,
21 2006 Primary Election ballot as presented.

22 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Is there a
23 second?

24 MS. MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, I

1 second.

2 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: All those in
3 favor, say aye.

4 MR. DAMSCHRODER: The motion
5 carries.

6 You will then find in your
7 packet of the candidate petition filings a
8 legal sheet, listing all the candidates
9 that filed that were found to have
10 insufficient signatures. There is a list
11 entitled Problem Petitions.

12 The first page are pretty much
13 cut and dried issues. Either a circulated
14 statement was not completed --

15 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: You are
16 talking about the problem petitions?

17 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Yes, either
18 insufficient signatures -- they didn't
19 properly execute a circulated statement.
20 In one instance the candidate failed to
21 provide an original signature on the
22 Declaration of Candidacy portion of the
23 petition.

24 For all those items on the first

1 page, Staff would recommend against
2 certification.

3 The two on the second page,
4 Scott Baughman for Republican County
5 Central Committee, Ward 9, and also
6 Charles Morrison, a candidate for
7 Republican County Central Committee
8 Hilliard, Ward 3, both of these
9 individuals, the Declaration of Candidacy
10 appears to have been altered.

11 The printing in the case of Mr.
12 Baughman, a portion of the information
13 that was written has been marked out. And
14 in the instance of Mr. Morrison it appears
15 that he originally failed to provide a
16 precinct letter in the space provided, and
17 later he came back in a different color
18 ink and used the Board's precinct code.

19 In the past using the precinct
20 code had not necessarily been a
21 disqualifying action, but Staff did want
22 to bring these two to the Board as being
23 questionable because of that alteration.

24 Mr. Baughman did fail to provide

1 -- in addition to appearing to having an
2 altered petition, he failed to put his
3 precinct letter in the box required, so
4 the Director's recommendation would be
5 against certification for Mr. Baughman
6 because he failed to provide the precinct
7 information.

8 If the Board is not so much
9 concerned about the apparent -- there is
10 no substantive change in the Declaration
11 of Candidacy. It was just that the
12 precinct code was added and appears at a
13 later time.

14 It could be within the Board's
15 discretion to approve that if it so
16 chose. If you want to wait until counsel
17 arrives to vote on these two matters.

18 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Yes, because
19 it sounds to me like what you are telling
20 us is that some of these may have been
21 altered after they were circulated.

22 MR. DAMSCHRODER: It is hard to
23 say exactly when the change occurred, but
24 it is very clear that a change was made at

1 some point. In the instance again of
2 Mr. Baughman the precinct letter was in
3 combination with the Ward No. 9A, and the
4 person scratched out the precinct so only
5 the ward number is left.

6 In the instance of Mr. Morrison
7 it's an entirely different color ink
8 that's used to print the precinct code.

9 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: If we don't
10 approve, they have the right to appeal.

11 MR. DAMSCHRODER: That's
12 correct. They both have the right to
13 appeal the Board's decision or run as a
14 write-in.

15 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Any other
16 questions for Mr. Damschroder?

17 (No audible response)

18 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: So how do you
19 want us to move on this one?

20 MR. DAMSCHRODER: My feeling is
21 that Mr. Baughman's petition should be
22 invalidated.

23 I would say in the instance of
24 Mr. Morrison, in the past the Board has

1 accepted the use of the Board's precinct
2 code but, again, the apparent altering of
3 the public declaration of candidacy would
4 be questionable.

5 I would say in both of these
6 instances I would recommend against
7 certification.

8 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: So should we
9 take them --

10 MR. DAMSCHRODER: What I would
11 recommend, Mr. Chairman, is that we note
12 for the record that the Board take a vote
13 on Baughman and Morrison for the record
14 that they are found to have an
15 insufficiency.

16 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Should we
17 list them all for the record?

18 Should we read them off?

19 MR. DAMSCHRODER: I will give
20 you a list afterwards.

21 The frame of the motion should
22 read as follows: that the Board finds
23 that the following individuals, having
24 filed petitions to be candidates at the

1 May 2nd, 2006 Primary Election, are found
2 to be insufficient. The first is
3 Nickindar Nain Singh, Lauren Patrice
4 Shepherd, Jennifer Scott, Barbara Bryson,
5 Arthur Balis, Michael Murphy, Andre
6 Porter, Peter Wycoff, Scott Baughman, and
7 Charles Morrison.

8 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: And we just
9 need somebody to make that motion?

10 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Yes.

11 MS. PETREE: I so move.

12 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: And a
13 second?

14 MS. MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, I
15 second.

16 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: All those in
17 favor, say aye.

18 MR. DAMSCHRODER: The motion
19 carries.

20 MR. DAMSCHRODER: The next item,
21 Mr. Chairman, because there are two board
22 members who have also submitted petitions
23 for candidacy, we should deal with them
24 separately so that they can abstain.

1 We will refer to Mr. Colley
2 first on the motion from Ms. Petree's
3 certification.

4 MR. COLLEY: I move that Carolyn
5 C. Petree be certified as a candidate in
6 the office as a member of the Republican
7 State Central Committee for the 15th
8 Senate District.

9 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Is there a
10 second?

11 MS. MARINELLO: I second.

12 MR. DAMSCHRODER: We'll have a
13 roll-call vote for this since Ms. Petree
14 is abstaining.

15 Mr. Colley?

16 MR. COLLEY: Yes.

17 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Ms. Marinello?

18 MS. MARINELLO: Yes.

19 MR. DAMSCHRODER: And Chairman
20 Anthony?

21 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Yes.

22 MR. DAMSCHRODER: And Ms. Petree
23 is abstaining.

24 MS. PETREE: I am abstaining.

1 MR. DAMSCHRODER: The motion
2 carries.

3 (Mr. Soulas enters.)

4 MR. DAMSCHRODER: The second
5 motion will be to certify Mr. Colley, and
6 Mr. Colley abstains.

7 MS. PETREE: Mr. Chairman, I
8 move that Michael F. Colley be certified
9 for the office of Member of the Republican
10 State Central Committee from the 16th
11 Senate District.

12 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Is there a
13 second?

14 MS. MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, I
15 second.

16 MR. DAMSCHRODER: This is also a
17 roll-call vote.

18 Ms. Marinello?

19 MS. MARINELLO: Yes.

20 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Ms. Petree?

21 MS. PETREE: Yes.

22 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Chairman
23 Anthony?

24 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Yes.

1 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Mr. Colley
2 abstaining, the motion carries.

3 And then the last would be to
4 certify the ballots of the candidates that
5 were found to have sufficient signatures.

6 MS. MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, I
7 move that the balance of the candidates
8 having submitted petitions for offices to
9 appear on the May 2nd, 2006 Primary
10 Election ballot be certified.

11 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Is there a
12 second?

13 MS. PETREE: Mr. Chairman, I
14 second.

15 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: All those in
16 favor, say aye.

17 MR. DAMSCHRODER: The motion
18 carries.

19 We will post that even yet
20 tonight, an official certified candidates
21 list on the Web site so the public has
22 that.

23 The next item in your packet is
24 the request by the candidates having filed

1 petitions for name changes to appear on
2 the ballot. The three are Patricia J.
3 Shaffer, who requests to appear on the
4 ballot as Paddy, P-a-d-d-y, Shaffer,
5 S-h-a-f-f-e-r; James R. Stewart, who
6 desires to appear on the ballot as Jimmy
7 Stewart; and Tracih H. Johnson requests to
8 appear on the ballot as Traci, T-r-a-c-i,
9 and then T-J in the middle, Johnson. Ms.
10 Johnson appeared previously on the 2000
11 general election ballot as TJ Johnson.

12 As you know, court cases approve
13 the use of common derivatives of names to
14 appear on the ballot.

15 To that end the Staff recommends
16 the acceptance of Mr. Stewart's request
17 because Jimmy is a derivative of James and
18 against the name requests from Patricia
19 Shaffer and Tracih Johnson. Again, that
20 Paddy, P-a-d-d-y, would not be a common
21 derivative of Patricia.

22 In the case of Ms. Johnson the
23 use of initials TJ when they are not her
24 full initials would be inappropriate in

1 the same way as Dana G. (Buck) Rinehart.
2 If Ms. Johnson wanted to come back and
3 appear on the ballot as simply TJ Johnson,
4 that would be recommended, but to appear
5 as Tracih TJ Johnson would not be
6 recommended.

7 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Are there any
8 questions?

9 MS. MARINELLO: Why are we
10 rejecting Patricia Shaffer's petition?

11 MR. DAMSCHRODER: The Staff
12 recommendation would be that Paddy,
13 P-a-d-d-y, would not be a commonly known
14 derivative of Patricia, P-a-t-r-i-c-i-a.
15 Something like P-a-t-t-y or P-a-t-t-i-e
16 would, but again that's the Board's
17 decision.

18 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Any
19 questions from the board members?

20 (No audible response)

21 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: I will
22 entertain a motion.

23 MS. MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, I
24 move that the request from James R.

1 Stewart, Democrat candidate for State
2 Representative from the 24th District for
3 his name to appear on the ballot as Jimmy
4 Stewart be accepted as submitted.

5 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Is there a
6 second?

7 MR. COLLEY: I second.

8 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: All in
9 favor, say aye.

10 MR. DAMSCHRODER: The motion
11 carries.

12 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: That means
13 that the other two, we don't have to
14 reject them.

15 MR. DAMSCHRODER: No. We don't
16 have to take a formal action.

17 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: They do have
18 the opportunity to appear?

19 MR. DAMSCHRODER: And they have
20 the opportunity to come back and request
21 some other derivatives.

22 The next item on the agenda,
23 Mr. Chairman, is a request from Mr.
24 Stewart Wright, who is present, as well as

1 some other electors, from the November
2 2005 general election. The Ohio Revised
3 Code contemplates a recount of a statewide
4 question upon the request of five
5 electors, who state that they voted in the
6 election for the issue and that request
7 has to be within a certain number of days
8 of the Secretary of State's certification
9 of the state issue.

10 Due to some confusion emanating
11 from the Secretary of State's Office
12 surrounding the precise date of the
13 certification of the issue, the
14 individuals in question were not able to
15 timely file their request for the
16 recount to, specifically, of State Issue
17 2, the absentee ballots only with the
18 Franklin County Board of Elections.

19 The Deputy Director and I met
20 with Mr. Wright several weeks ago in an
21 effort to find some kind of appropriate
22 solution both for the voters who are
23 interested in having a hand recount of the
24 ballots conducted, as well as from

1 continuing in the Board's tradition of
2 openness and transparency of the results.
3 Being the first time of using the new
4 electronic scanners, it would be a good
5 practice or exercise for us to do that
6 hand recount.

7 One option available to
8 Mr. Wright and company is to make a formal
9 records request for copies of the ballots,
10 pay five cents for the ballots, and then
11 take them and do the recount in their own
12 manner in their own place in their own
13 time.

14 Mr. Wright has filed a public
15 records request with the Board for that
16 purpose, which we asked Mr. Wright to do
17 so it would enjoin the statutory document
18 destruction process, the records retention
19 process.

20 It is the Deputy Director and my
21 recommendation that the Board ask the
22 Director and Deputy Director to conduct a
23 hand inspection of all of the Issue 2
24 absentee ballots cast in 2005 for the

1 purpose, as we mentioned earlier the
2 transparency and proving factor if you
3 will, of testing the veracity of the new
4 system.

5 Mr. Wright is here as well as
6 some other electors, and it would be
7 appropriate to hear from them at this time
8 if the Board so desires.

9 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Before we do
10 that, are there any questions from the
11 Board?

12 (No audible response)

13 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: If not, Mr.
14 Wright, would you like to say a few words?

15 MR. WRIGHT: Thank you very
16 much. I would be happy to answer any
17 questions that the Board may have.

18 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: I believe we
19 understand.

20 MR. WRIGHT: You recognize that
21 there are people that are aware of the
22 machines. The software is not available
23 to be inspected.

24 The year before last, I believe

1 that the State Legislature passed
2 legislation requiring voter verifying with
3 a paper trail. Here we have these optical
4 scan ballots, which are a paper trail.

5 I just wanted to illustrate
6 whether or not we could use the law and
7 actually achieve the hand recount as the
8 law provides. I think it was unfortunate
9 that there was a misunderstanding about
10 when the vote was certified.

11 I had been informed by the
12 Office of the Secretary of State that the
13 same day it was certified it should be up
14 on the Web site. I kept looking for it on
15 the Web site. When it finally appeared on
16 the Web site I was told it had actually
17 been certified on December 20th, but I
18 have never seen any evidence to
19 corroborate that. It seems to me that
20 when certified part of that would be the
21 publication of the fact that it has been
22 certified.

23 I think you will probably
24 certify the Plain Local School District

1 Levy tonight and it will appear on the
2 Franklin County Web site. Then that's a
3 publication that we want notice so
4 everyone knows there is a five-day period
5 that will apply for recount.

6 I think it should have been that
7 way for the Secretary of State, but
8 apparently it wasn't.

9 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Do you want
10 to do the same thing in other counties?

11 MR. WRIGHT: I am a resident of
12 Franklin County.

13 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Is there a
14 group out there?

15 Is anybody doing this in
16 Clairmont County or Pickaway County? If
17 you do it here, you ought to go around and
18 do it in other counties.

19 MS. ANANDA: Yes, we are.

20 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Any questions
21 for Mr. Wright?

22 (No audible response)

23 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Then I will
24 entertain a motion.

1 MS. MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, I
2 move to authorize the Director and Deputy
3 Director to conduct a hand inspection of
4 State Issue 2 ballots only from the 2005
5 General Election for the purpose of
6 testing the veracity of the electronic
7 tabulation system.

8 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Is there a
9 second?

10 MR. COLLEY: I second.

11 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: All those in
12 favor, say aye.

13 MR. DAMSCHRODER: The motion
14 carries.

15 I will coordinate with Mr.
16 Wright to find a mutually acceptable date
17 and time so we can follow the normal
18 procedures for a recount so that Mr.
19 Wright and his committee can establish
20 observers for each of the county stations
21 and we'll observe the normal protocol for
22 a hand recount.

23 MS. PETREE: Will that be done
24 here?

1 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Yes. It will
2 be done here at the Board.

3 MR. WRIGHT: Should I talk to
4 you tomorrow about that?

5 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Yes.

6 MS. ANANDA: Do you have any
7 idea how many people you can accommodate
8 to observe the process?

9 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Traditionally,
10 what we do is we break the ballots down
11 into counting stations, one Republican and
12 one Democrat per station from the Board
13 and we have one observer from your
14 committee of five; and you can appoint
15 additional members beyond your five, but
16 one observer per station.

17 There were, I think, about
18 17,000 or so ballots, absentee ballots,
19 cast last fall. We will want to have
20 enough counting stations to do it in less
21 than a day. We will give you that number
22 well in advance so you can appoint
23 sufficient observers.

24 Is there anything else on that

1 issue, Mr. Wright?

2 MR. WRIGHT: I think we are
3 happy with that.

4 MR. DAMSCHRODER: We will see
5 you tomorrow.

6 MR. WRIGHT: I want to thank you
7 for that.

8 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: You are
9 welcome. We have got to keep it
10 transparent. We want folks to feel good
11 about elections in Franklin County. We
12 don't want folks to think they are not
13 safe and secure and accurate.

14 MR. DAMSCHRODER: The next item
15 on the agenda, Mr. Chairman, is House Bill
16 234 that passed the General Assembly that
17 permits the use of no-fault absentee
18 voting. One of the provisions in that
19 bill is that the Director has to notify
20 any prospective absentee voter who has
21 failed to provide the required
22 identification requirements; the last four
23 digits of the Social Security number,
24 driver's license, any of the permitted

1 identification information.

2 The Director must notify that
3 person by some means of their deficiency
4 and give them a second opportunity to
5 apply. The Secretary of State has
6 recommended that the Board officially
7 adopt some kind of procedure or protocol.

8 The Deputy Director and I are
9 recommending that the Board adopt the
10 policy of sending a letter via first class
11 mail signed by the Director and the
12 Deputy Director, notifying the prospective
13 absentee voter of the deficiency and
14 providing them with another application to
15 complete and return to the Board in an
16 effort to obtain a ballot.

17 Ms. Petree: Would you repeat
18 that?

19 MR. DAMSCHRODER: The new
20 no-fault absentee scenario, instead of
21 having to use one of the 11 narrow
22 reasons -- instead of having to qualify
23 for an absentee ballot in order to run
24 over the age of 62 on a county election

1 day, the general assembly said anyone can
2 cast an absentee ballot as long as on the
3 application and on the return ballot they
4 provide some kind of proof of
5 identification. Date of birth is required
6 and either the last four digits of the
7 Social Security number or the driver's
8 license number. Or in lieu of either of
9 those, they have to provide an actual copy
10 of some other form of identification;
11 government check, utility bill, current
12 address, something along those lines.

13 If the person on their initial
14 application fails to provide that
15 identification requirement, the statute
16 now requires that the Board somehow notify
17 that applicant that their application is
18 deficient, that it does not have the
19 required information, and will not be
20 processed and that the applicant must
21 complete a new application, providing all
22 the information for the ballot to be
23 processed.

24 Looking at both the volume and

1 the materials provided, ideally it would
2 be nice if we could notify the voter by
3 phone. Our applications have historically
4 had a blank for telephone number, and I
5 would say in probably less than five
6 percent of the instances do we get a
7 telephone number.

8 We also have the problem of
9 someone providing a telephone number,
10 whether they are in Iraq or Florida or
11 wherever their ballot is to be delivered.
12 And even fewer provide an e-mail address.
13 So in order to find some kind of equitable
14 manner of notifying voters, the Deputy
15 Director and I recommend the delivery to
16 voters by first class mail.

17 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: I have a
18 couple of questions.

19 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Absolutely.

20 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: One is how
21 big of a problem do you think this is
22 going to be?

23 MR. DAMSCHRODER: My response is
24 going to be two-fold. The response, one,

1 is it depends. In terms of the parties in
2 the different groups that will be
3 recruiting no-fault absentee voters, it
4 depends on the extent to which they push
5 the requirement of identification.

6 My guess is that because those
7 entities are highly interested in the
8 ballot being processed, they will push
9 that information.

10 We have redesigned our
11 application. There is a very clear
12 explanation in the instructions as to what
13 must be provided, and it goes into great
14 detail as to specifically the types of
15 identification required. If the person
16 doesn't feel comfortable or have a
17 driver's license number or doesn't feel
18 comfortable providing the driver's license
19 or the last four digits, the
20 identification requirement portion of the
21 application is set aside and highlighted
22 in extra bold and dark lines and clear
23 explanation.

24 My anticipation is that if the

1 parties and the various other political
2 entities follow suit with the Board and
3 really hype the notification or the
4 importance of providing this information,
5 that it won't be a significant problem.

6 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Is that bill
7 being challenged that you know of?

8 MR. DAMSCHRODER: To my
9 knowledge there is not a legal challenge
10 to House Bill 234, which is the no-fault
11 absentee bill. My guess is there will
12 likely be a challenge to House Bill 3,
13 which does not come into effect until May
14 3rd. And the other provisions don't go
15 into effect until June 1st.

16 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Just thinking
17 out loud, these are absentee ballots so
18 most will probably be done by college kids
19 and elderly and folks outside the country
20 or living in another part of the country
21 for some part of the year. It sounds like
22 to me this is kind of inconvenient for
23 folks. I might be wrong, but I'm thinking
24 it's kind of inconvenient.

1 What would be the cost for us if
2 we mail something out to have it postpaid
3 for them to send it back to us?

4 MR. DAMSCHRODER: The cost would
5 be -- I'm trying to remember what the
6 surcharge is for the business reply. It
7 would be just nominally more, marginally
8 more than the 1st class rate.

9 If the Board wanted to adopt the policy
10 that if the person who fails to properly
11 complete the application is mailed this
12 notice, that the return application is
13 postage paid by the Board, I think it is
14 certainly well within the discretion of
15 the Board to adopt such a policy.

16 If the Board wanted to adopt the
17 policy that the actual ballots themselves
18 were postage paid, it would be within your
19 prerogative to do so. It would probably
20 require a supplemental appropriation from
21 the Commission, but something as simple as
22 the insufficient application, I don't
23 think would be overly burdensome to the
24 budget.

1 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: If we did
2 have a problem one year where it was more
3 than a 39-cent stamp or something --

4 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Actually, last
5 year with the two-page ballot -- and that
6 was one of the frustrating instances,
7 because in some cases the post office
8 delivered it with 37 and in some instances
9 they required additional. Even within the
10 post office there was a question of what
11 to do.

12 State Issue 2, which did fail,
13 would have if enacted by the voters
14 required the ballots to be returned
15 postage paid by the local boards of
16 elections.

17 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: I think we
18 ought to look at that to see what that
19 would cost. I don't want to make a big
20 spender of it.

21 MR. DAMSCHRODER: I can look
22 into it and let the Board know what the
23 expense would have been for the Board say
24 in 2005 and also in 2004 had the ballots

1 been postage paid by the Board coming
2 back.

3 My guess is that if on the other
4 matter of returned applications for
5 insufficient identification, my guess is
6 that that's not going to be an
7 overwhelming number, and so it would not
8 be unduly burdensome for the Board to
9 receive those secondary applications back
10 postage paid if the Board wanted to do
11 that.

12 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Any
13 questions?

14 MS. PETREE: I think that's a
15 good idea.

16 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Maybe if
17 everybody can kind of talk about it a
18 little bit. Two of us think it's a great
19 idea.

20 MS. MARINELLO: I think it's a
21 great idea.

22 MR. DAMSCHRODER: I don't hear
23 any dissension among the ranks.

24 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Can we add

1 that to the motion, or would you feel more
2 comfortable getting some numbers first?

3 MR. DAMSCHRODER: I feel
4 comfortable either way.

5 MS. PETREE: Could I make a
6 suggestion?

7 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Yes, ma'am.

8 MS. PETREE: Why don't we table
9 this and you bring us back information for
10 the March meeting, and maybe we could do
11 this just as a primary program to see what
12 the cost is.

13 MR. DAMSCHRODER: All right. I
14 will come back and report at the March
15 1st-ish meeting, whenever that is
16 scheduled.

17 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Around March
18 2nd. While you were away we set March 2nd
19 at 3 o'clock.

20 MR. DAMSCHRODER: I will report
21 back on the estimated cost for postage
22 paid return ballots, estimating the cost
23 for postage-paid applications that fail to
24 meet the requirements, and also we will

1 provide the revised language for the
2 motion.

3 The next item on the agenda, Mr.
4 Chairman, is the use of the electronic
5 voting machines for casting provisional
6 ballots. Each of the new voting systems
7 from ES&S or Hart is designed to accept
8 the casting of a provisional ballot on the
9 electronic voting machine. The way it
10 works is dramatically dissimilar to the
11 punch card system in that each ballot has
12 a unique number or each application has a
13 unique number.

14 Under the old scenario, as you
15 recall, we had to essentially decommission
16 a voting machine on election day for a
17 provisional voter, tip it down, and allow
18 the voter to go into the booth with a
19 punch card, find the number corresponding
20 with the candidate's name on the screen,
21 punch the card, and pull the cards.

22 With the new electronic machines
23 the voter will still have to fill out the
24 application or what used to be on the

1 envelope, and that application will have a
2 unique number similar to a ballot stub
3 number that the poll worker will enter
4 into the voting machine, then that voter's
5 ballot or selections is associated with
6 that coded number.

7 At no time in the canvas process
8 once we have gone through the applications
9 to decide which ballots can we count and
10 which ones can't we count, at no part of
11 that process are we able to see or know or
12 divine what the selections were.

13 The process of counting the
14 provisional ballot is very simple. There
15 is a screen by precinct that shows all of
16 those numbers, all the application numbers
17 entered in the machines. You simply click
18 yes or no on each one of those. If that
19 is accepted, the votes we cannot see are
20 added into the canvas.

21 With the advent of the voter
22 verified paper audit trail this becomes a
23 little bit more prickly, because on that
24 voter verified paper audit trail it

1 records for the voter to verify. It
2 prints everything. It prints that
3 application number. Because of that,
4 there is the possibility that either
5 through mishandling of the applications
6 and the paper trail in the office or
7 through a redacted public records request
8 it could be determined how a provisional
9 voter voted regardless of whether the
10 ballot was ultimately accepted.

11 The Secretary of State's office
12 has recommended against the use of
13 electronic machines for use in provisional
14 voting and is recommending the use of
15 paper ballots for provisional voting. Our
16 concern with the use of paper ballots with
17 provisional voting is the same reason that
18 we were concerned with using the precinct
19 count optical scan, in that because so
20 many precincts are split precincts there
21 would be a high rate of voters casting the
22 wrong ballot.

23 Because the Secretary of State
24 has ruled that, you know, even if you were

1 in the right precinct and the wrong split,
2 your provisional ballot does not count.

3 Our view is that by continuing
4 to use the electronic machines for the
5 provisional balloting, there will be ease
6 of use of poll workers, ease of use for
7 the provisional voter, and added
8 protection in terms of warning against
9 over votes and under votes, as well as a
10 near guarantee that their ballot will be
11 counted if otherwise valid due to voting
12 the right split in the right precinct.

13 At this time there is not a
14 directive or law that says we can't use
15 the electronic machines for provisional
16 voting. It's just a recommendation from
17 the Secretary of State.

18 I will tell you that the poll
19 workers from the February special to the
20 man and woman said their favorite part of
21 the voting system was using the system to
22 cast provisional ballots.

23 From that standpoint what our
24 recommendation is as the Deputy Director

1 and Director is that we continue our
2 planned use of electronic machines for
3 provisional voting and adopt strict
4 policies for handling of the applications
5 and the voter verified paper trails within
6 the office and also a revision to our
7 public records policy, stating the
8 redaction of the application number from
9 the applications if viewed or requested.
10 That way there is not an instance where
11 either Staff or public will be able to
12 compare applications from the paper trail
13 and know how a person voted. That's a lot
14 of background.

15 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Any questions
16 for Matt?

17 (No audible response)

18 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: I will
19 entertain a motion.

20 You did a good job of
21 explaining.

22 MS. PETREE: Mr. Chairman, I
23 move that the Board authorize the Director
24 and Deputy Director to permit the use of

1 direct recording electronic voting
2 machines with voter verifiable paper audit
3 trail devices for the purpose of
4 provisional voting and to prohibit the
5 simultaneous possession of or
6 accessibility to the executed applications
7 for provisional ballot and the
8 corresponding voter verified paper audit
9 tapes and move to amend the Board's public
10 records policy required by Section 3501.13
11 to read that prior to the public
12 inspection or duplication for public
13 distribution of the executed applications
14 for provisional ballots that the coded
15 application number used to identify the
16 ballot shall be fully redacted from public
17 view or use.

18 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Is there a
19 second?

20 MS. MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, I
21 second.

22 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: This covers
23 our legal muster?

24 MR. DAMSCHRODER: It does.

1 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Are there any
2 questions?

3 (No audible response)

4 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: All those in
5 favor, say aye.

6 MR. DAMSCHRODER: The motion
7 carries.

8 The next item, Mr. Chairman, as
9 you recall the Board is producing a poll
10 worker training video. This is just a
11 business transaction in terms of
12 authorizing entering into the contract
13 with them for the purpose of production
14 and accepting it.

15 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: They did that
16 before, didn't they?

17 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Right. They
18 did the Gate Keepers of Democracy video.

19 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: I will
20 entertain a motion.

21 MR. COLLEY: Mr. Chairman, I
22 move that the Board authorize the Director
23 to accept the proposed terms and
24 conditions and to enter into a contract

1 with Brainstorm Media for the purposes of
2 producing a poll worker training video.

3 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Is there a
4 second?

5 MS. MARINELLO: I second.

6 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Any other
7 questions?

8 (No audible response)

9 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: All those in
10 favor, say eye.

11 MR. DAMSCHRODER: The motion
12 carries.

13 Our next motion, Mr. Chairman,
14 is to adopt a payment schedule with the
15 International Foundation for Election
16 Systems (IFES) that is working with us as
17 a consultant to help develop the poll
18 worker training materials and curriculum
19 for the new voting system. The payment
20 schedule will be 25 percent upon the
21 initial date of resolution by the Board of
22 Commissioners which has passed and 50
23 percent upon the submission of all the
24 curriculum materials not to be later than

1 the first day of class.

2 At that point the vast majority
3 of the project will be completed and then
4 the remaining 25 percent following the
5 election upon the submission of their
6 after-election report and analysis of the
7 program.

8 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: How many
9 folks will have training?

10 MR. DAMSCHRODER: We are looking
11 at training about 4,500 poll workers for
12 the primary election. It's a lot of
13 folks.

14 IFES, the folks that we have
15 hired as consultants, have been great
16 already and bring a great deal of national
17 and international experience of
18 poll-worker training to the table with
19 them.

20 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: I will
21 entertain a motion.

22 MS. MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, I
23 move that the Board authorize the
24 following payment schedule with the

1 International Foundation for Election
2 Systems (IFES): 1) twenty-five percent of
3 the total upon receipt of invoice
4 submitted on or after date of resolution
5 by the Board of County Commissioners
6 approving said contract; 2) fifty percent
7 upon receipt of invoice submitted on or
8 after the date of the first precinct
9 election training class, signifying final
10 submission and acceptance of all training
11 curricula and materials; and 3)
12 twenty-five percent of total upon receipt
13 of invoice submitted on or after the date
14 of submission of the post-election
15 evaluation report.

16 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Is there a
17 second?

18 MR. COLLEY: I second.

19 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: All those in
20 favor, say aye.

21 MR. DAMSCHRODER: The motion
22 carries.

23 The next item on the agenda, as
24 Denny and I have looked at both what other

1 counties have done in terms of poll-worker
2 training and both also what we did for the
3 February special, we determined that
4 instead of requiring poll workers to sit
5 through four or five hours of training
6 classes that we were better off breaking
7 the classes up into two different
8 sessions.

9 The first session would be a
10 general plenary session where we talk
11 about the administration operations of the
12 precinct, the poll book, and the stuff to
13 tape to the wall; and the other section of
14 the first class would be a hands-on
15 demonstration in small groups with the
16 machine.

17 The second class that we are
18 composing would be a required class that
19 would bring the poll workers back during
20 the weekend before the election. We would
21 have multiple locations across the county
22 with voting machines and training
23 personnel where the poll workers would
24 come back and, one more time, do the

1 hands-on portion with the machines, open
2 the polls, vote a few voters through in a
3 test scenario, and close the polls, so
4 again they can have that last-minute
5 refresher hands-on opportunity.

6 Other counties for doing a
7 longer training class have adopted a
8 higher rate of pay. Fairfield County did
9 \$25 last year. Delaware County, I
10 believe, is going to do \$25 this year.

11 Our existing pay schedule is \$15
12 for one class. We are asking the Board to
13 adopt the second mandatory training class
14 for the primary election and also
15 authorize the Director and Deputy Director
16 to seek from the County Commissioners
17 supplemental appropriations in the amount
18 of \$81,320 to cover that additional
19 poll-worker training class.

20 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Have they
21 been told this?

22 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Denny and I
23 wanted to wait until we had the Board's
24 authorization before we approached the

1 commissioners.

2 MS. PETREE: So that would be
3 \$15?

4 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Yes. The
5 compensation would be \$15 for each class
6 and both would be mandatory.

7 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: How long are
8 these classes?

9 MR. DAMSCHRODER: The Special
10 Election training class would be about two
11 and a half hours, and we have covered very
12 little of the administrative procedures.
13 The hands-on portion was probably
14 indicative of what it would be like for
15 the primary small groups of three or four
16 with one trainer. So to ask folks to sit
17 through three or four hours of training
18 regardless of age or any other factors is
19 a long time of sitting through a training
20 class. Breaking it up this way gives them
21 two opportunities for hands-on with the
22 machines. In our follow-up session with
23 the poll workers after the Special
24 Election they all said that they

1 understood the system, the materials were
2 helpful, but they would have liked another
3 opportunity to get their hands on the
4 machines.

5 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Two hours
6 each time?

7 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Probably the
8 first class would be about two hours. The
9 second, because it would be kind of a come
10 anytime during these hours, would probably
11 be more of a half hour or 45 minutes kind
12 of thing to get hands-on open and close.

13 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: About the
14 minimum wage.

15 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Unfortunately,
16 that's what we paid at the Gate Keepers of
17 Democracy.

18 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: All right.

19 Well, any questions of Matt?

20 (No audible response).

21 MR. DAMSCHRODER: I broke it up
22 to give Mr. Chairman an opportunity to
23 make a motion this time.

24 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: I move that

1 the Board authorize the Director to seek
2 supplemental appropriations in the amount
3 of \$81,320 for the purposes of providing
4 precinct election officials with an
5 additional \$15 for attending a second
6 mandatory training course on the new
7 voting machines and that \$6,800 of the
8 supplemental appropriation shall be used
9 to replenish current poll worker
10 compensation funds depleted as a result of
11 the February 7th, 2006 Special Election
12 and further that the Board deems the
13 increased compensation as proper and
14 necessary expenses of the Board.

15 Is there a second?

16 MS. PETREE: Mr. Chairman, I
17 second.

18 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Any
19 questions?

20 (No audible response)

21 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: All those in
22 favor, say aye.

23 MR. DAMSCHRODER: The motion
24 carries. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

1 The next item on the agenda is,
2 as you will recall, the Secretary of State
3 required the purchase of a minimum number
4 of 4,208 voting machines from our chosen
5 vendor ES&S. I don't have all the exact
6 numbers here in front of me, but it was
7 approximately \$14 million in total costs
8 of which 12-point-something came from the
9 HAVA funds, leaving a balance of
10 \$894,014.00 for the County. This was an
11 anticipated, planned, and appropriate
12 expense.

13 We have asked the Secretary of
14 State if the Secretary of State has a
15 proposed payment schedule for this and
16 they do not. They have a payment schedule
17 for their 12-point-something, but they
18 said there was nothing contractual for us
19 to follow in terms of a payment schedule
20 for our share, and the Auditor won't
21 release the funds until we resolve
22 something.

23 We are recommending that we just
24 pay that in a lump sum, and actually you

1 will notice we are not to exceed the
2 County's obligated \$894,000. In the
3 credits negotiated with ES&S it is
4 actually less than that.

5 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: This has
6 already been --

7 MR. DAMSCHRODER: The
8 Commissioner has appropriated the full
9 \$894,000. It is in our budget right now.

10 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: I will
11 entertain a motion.

12 MS. PETREE: Mr. Chairman, I
13 move that the Board authorize the Director
14 to pay in full any invoice submitted by
15 Election Systems & Software in an amount
16 not to exceed the county's obligated
17 \$894,014 balance due for the purchase of
18 4,208 direct recording electronic voting
19 machines.

20 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Is there a
21 second?

22 MS. MARINELLO: I second.

23 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: All those in
24 favor, say aye.

1 MR. DAMSCHRODER: The motion
2 carries.

3 The last item on the public
4 agenda before executive session, Mr.
5 Chairman, also has to do with voting
6 machines. The general assembly last year
7 in passing House Bill 66 said that
8 counties who are purchasing electronic
9 voting machines, using a portion of the
10 state's or HAVA funds must purchase those
11 machines at a ratio of 1 to 175 registered
12 voters and that the snapshot of the
13 calculation or the 175 registered voters
14 is taken, using the registration snapshot
15 on Jan 1, 2005 minus some factor divined
16 by the Secretary of State as to an
17 estimated historic average purge rate.

18 The Secretary of State wants
19 somewhere between 5 and 9 percent. Then
20 House Bill 3 came along and reiterated
21 that what House Bill 66 said you have to
22 do, you have to do.

23 What that means for us in
24 regular terms is that we have purchased an

1 initial amount of 4,208 voting machines,
2 and that to comply with the law we must
3 purchase an additional 339 machines. This
4 was because of the passage of House Bill
5 66 last year. In the draft language of
6 House Bill 3 the commissioners were made
7 aware of the possibility of this
8 additional expense in several memoranda
9 sent prior to the budget process, as well
10 as at the Board's budget hearing before
11 the commissioners.

12 It is my understanding that
13 almost \$1.1 million that this would
14 entail, while it's not appropriated to the
15 Board of Elections already, it is
16 earmarked within the commissioners'
17 reserves for this fiscal year. It would
18 be appropriate that the Board in the event
19 that the House Bill 3 was passed, and the
20 legal counsel did say that what the law
21 says, the law says. This is the formality
22 of both acquiring the machines and seeking
23 supplemental appropriation to pay for
24 them.

1 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Why wouldn't
2 HAVA have picked up the tab?

3 MR. DAMSCHRODER: HAVA picked up
4 the 12-point-whatever million of the total
5 package. The issue, frankly, that the
6 other ES&S counties find themselves in is
7 that the HAVA funds divided among the 88
8 counties by the Secretary of State were
9 divided based upon the Debold price for
10 voting machines, and the ES&S machines had
11 a higher-per-unit price; and so part of
12 when we made our decision to purchase what
13 we viewed was a better machine came the
14 decision to locally bear a larger portion
15 of the price.

16 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Thank you.

17 Any other questions for Matt
18 before we make a motion?

19 (No audible response)

20 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: All right. I
21 move that the Board authorize the Director
22 and Deputy Director to seek supplemental
23 appropriations in the amount of
24 \$1,061,192.04 for the purposes of

1 acquiring an additional 339 direct
2 recording electronic voting machines from
3 ES&S pursuant to Section 514.03(B) of
4 House Bill 66 and Section 3506.22(C) of
5 the Ohio Revised Code, effective May 2,
6 2006 and to enter into a contract on
7 behalf of the Board of Elections for the
8 purchase of said voting devices and to
9 further authorize the following payment
10 schedule: 1) twenty-five percent of the
11 total due upon submission of invoice
12 following passage of Board of
13 Commissioners resolution providing the
14 supplemental appropriation; 2) fifty
15 percent of the total due upon submission
16 of invoice following complete delivery of
17 all required voting devices; and item 3)
18 twenty-five percent of the total due upon
19 submission of invoice following
20 one-hundred percent per unit passage rate
21 of acceptance testing conducted by the
22 Board of Elections.

23 Is there a second?

24 MR. COLLEY: I second.

1 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Any
2 questions?

3 (No audible response)

4 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: All those in
5 favor, say aye.

6 MR. DAMSCHRODER: The motion
7 carries.

8 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: We move into
9 Executive Session?

10 MR. DAMSCHRODER: All for the
11 purpose of discussing personnel matters.

12 MS. PETREE: I move that the
13 Board go into Executive Session.

14 MS. MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, I
15 second.

16 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: May we have
17 a roll-call vote.

18 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Mr. Colley?

19 MR. COLLEY: Yes.

20 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Ms. Marinello?

21

22 MS. MARINELLO: Yes.

23 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Ms. Petree?

24 MS. PETREE: Yes.

1 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Chairman
2 Anthony?

3 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Yes.

4 MR. DAMSCHRODER: We are in
5 Executive Session.

6 (Adjournment to Executive
7 Session)

8 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: I move that
9 we come out of Executive Session. No
10 votes were taken. No official business
11 was conducted.

12 Is there a second?

13 MS. MARINELLO: I second.

14 MR. DAMSCHRODER: We'll have a
15 roll-call vote.

16 Mr. Colley?

17 MR. COLLEY: Yes.

18 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Ms. Marinello?

19 MS. MARINELLO: Yes.

20 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Ms. Petree?

21 MS. PETREE: Yes.

22 MR. DAMSCHRODER: Chairman
23 Anthony?

24 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Yes.

1 We are back on the record in
2 Public Session.

3 Is there any further discussion
4 on the record relative to health insurance
5 benefits?

6 (No audible response)

7 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: If not, I
8 will entertain a motion.

9 MS. MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, I
10 move that the Board adopt the \$50 per
11 month spousal health insurance premium
12 contribution plan adopted by the County
13 Commissioners for the members of this
14 Board and its employees effective April 1,
15 2006.

16 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: Is there a
17 second?

18 MR. COLLEY: I second.

19 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: All those in
20 favor, say aye.

21 MR. DAMSCHRODER: The motion
22 carries. We will communicate that to the
23 Staff.

24 Other than that, Mr. Chairman,

1 there is no other formal business to come
2 before the Board at this time.

3 CHAIRMAN ANTHONY: I move for
4 adjournment.
