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the voter followed the instructions and clearly marked their ballots. The issue why the ballot had to be remade was either printing error on the ballot that rendered the ballot unable to be tabulated by the high speed scanners.

And we particularly had a challenge with the ballot on-demand printers from Vets where the alignment of the timing marks is off just enough such that the ballots won't be scanned, so we had to remake those in teams of democrats and republicans.

But, again, in those cases, the voter's intent is absolutely clear. The voter followed the instructions and marked the ballot, so there's no subjectivity there.

And we would request a motion memorializing that process pursuant to the directive, and I would be happy to answer any questions you would have.

MR. ANTHONY: Mr. Chair, I have none, so I would move that the Board proceed with processing those properly remade ballots, per the recommendations of the Director and Deputy Director that have been remade and the voter has

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Again, it doesn't impact the voter's ability to mark their ballot or for us to be able to determine how the voter marked their ballot, it just determines whether or not high speed scanners can see the voting positions on the page.

And the machines are programmed that if it cannot read the timing marks and cannot, therefore, see the match-up of also where it's expecting to see markings, it will reject that ballot for human inspection.

And in all these cases, timing marks were such that we needed to just remark the ballots. But, again, no determination of voter intent, and there's no subjectivity, just remarking ballots.

It's a lot of paper to run through printers that really aren't designed for that kind of volume. And so what happens is the registration of the ballot, the image on the page, particularly in times when the machine doesn't have time to adequately cool between each ballot, the image on the page gets a little bit crooked. Again, the statutory standard and the standard confirmed by Directive 2008-69 is that the ballot has been marked in a consistent manner. So if a voter, for instance, doesn't necessarily fill in ovals for each contest that the voter's intending to mark, from some other kind of mark, as long as it's the mark that's been made consistently on the ballot, that ballot can be remade for the voter so it can be redone.

We'll mark the first one X001, and let's pass it down the line for you. It's very clear that the voter consistently marked their ballot using check marks; but instead of in the oval where it would be read, they listed it out to the right of the oval by the candidate's name that they were attempting to vote for, it appears.
