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                 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Good afternoon,
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     Mr. Chairman. I would like to call the Board of
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     Elections meeting to order.
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                 I will do the roll call. Kimberly
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    Marinello.
                 MEMBER MARINELLO: Here.
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                 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Gregory Haas.
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                 MEMBER HAAS: Here.
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                 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Douglas Preisse.
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                 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Here.
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                 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: And Bradley Sinnott.
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                 MEMBER SINNOTT: Here.
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                 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Mr. Chairman, we have
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     a quorum, a full Board. Everybody is here.
                 First item on the agenda would be the
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     approval of the minutes from the May 2, 2016,
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    meeting.
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                 MEMBER HAAS: I move the Board approve
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    the minutes of the May 2, 2016, meeting of the
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     Franklin County Board of Elections.
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                 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second?
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CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

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DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor.

That motion carries.

The second item on the agenda would be the contract for ES&S, the elections system.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I think Zach Manifold is going to talk to us about that.

MR. MANIFOLD: Hello, everyone. So you have in front of you the contract for our upgrade of our election tabulators with ES&S. We have been going through this kind of for a few years where we have been trying to -- been wanting to do this upgrade.

It's really a technology upgrade. A lot more efficiency with 850s compared to the 650s. They run three or four times faster. They reduce a lot of equipment, a lot of overtime, a lot of cost. I think you may have gotten the Cuyahoga County report earlier today. They had done a full kind of study on the cost analysis for them. I think they figured out that they would basically breakeven on the equipment I think after five years because of the reduction in all the costs. I think we'll probably take a little longer, probably like eight years, because we are

already pretty efficient. We don't have three people on each tabulator. We have two people on each tabulator. Some of those costs.

But basically the one key point about this contract is the special note section. I don't know if you guys wanted to look at that. It's down towards the bottom half. It says "ES&S anticipates."

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Where are you looking

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Where are you looking

at?

MR. MANIFOLD: Page -- Sales Order

12 | Agreement page 1.

13 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: The second half of the

14 first page.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Special notes at the very bottom.

MR. MANIFOLD: This is kind of the one sticking point of, you know, why it's taken -- besides getting the funding for the upgrade this has kind of been the sticking point. So the 850s are certified by themselves as stand-alone machines, and then our iVotronic D -- DREs are certified as a stand-alone machine. But when you put them together, because of the iVotronics our voting machines are so

old the Election Assistance Commission, the EAC, they don't test with pre2005 equipment, so this machine can never be tested with that machine because it's too old. Our voting machines are too old. So this has always been a sticking point. So ES&S went to the voting -- the Secretary of State's --

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Board of Voting Machine Examiners.

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MR. MANIFOLD: Which Director Anthony is on the Board, took it to them and kind of showed, hey, we want to put these two things together but there's no way to get them certified through the EAS because the equipment is so old for the machines. And so the Voting Machine Examiners Board asked that ES&S take it to an independent lab and have the testing done of the two systems together.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: So they are building a bridge.

MR. MANIFOLD: They are basically building a bridge to put the two systems together. The testing is ongoing. It's actually being tested right now. They anticipate that they will have it done by July, and then the Voting Machine Examiners Board is supposed to take this up in August and get

it certified for the State after they pass the test.

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So the special note section of the contract kind of lays that out that ES&S anticipates having the 850s -- the 850 iVotronic Voting System certified in the state of Ohio by August 31, 2016, and the -- in the event that ES&S is unable to obtain certification by August 31, 2016, the customer has the option to terminate this agreement upon 10 days' written notice.

So obviously if -- this has taken a long time for us to get to this point and if they don't meet that certification this summer, then we would just stay on our 650 tabulators and not do the upgrade.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: When -- so what's the delivery date and switch out anticipation?

MR. MANIFOLD: So they would let us keep our 650s through the election as well so they are not going to make us send back our current setup so we would have both -- both sets of machines through the fall in case we wanted --

MEMBER MARINELLO: To have a backup.

MR. MANIFOLD: Yeah, to use the other -- have a backup. They are going to leave them here,

and we don't have to turn back in the old equipment.

But, yeah, they expect to have it to us by -- we would have the machines and everything by the end of August.

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CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So we are not exposed to be underequipped even if the anticipated certification from the examining board weren't to happen.

MR. MANIFOLD: Yes, correct. We will still have everything we have right now.

MEMBER MARINELLO: Okay. Which machine had the moisture problem back there?

MR. MANIFOLD: Well, so that's kind of -that's another reason for the upgrade is, you know,
those machines are very balky about really anything,
moisture, anything. These -- these machines are
taking a picture of each ballot. It's actually, you
know, taking that photo, and so you are not going to
have -- we won't probably have as many remakes. We
won't have -- we shouldn't have that moisture problem
that we've had in the past where we have to keep
coming back to have you guys produce remakes. It
should produce remakes.

One of the big selling points, I don't

know if you guys know what these are, but this is what the current election results are often on election night. These are zip drives which I don't know if you have seen a zip drive in probably 15 years but this is what -- this is what we download the results onto on the current machines and then take them back and upload them.

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Well, you know, we went to go buy new zip drives last year and so we found a really good deal and bought some and then they came in a package and they were brand new. They are like everything is new, and then you open them up they were produced in 2000; so, I mean, they are 15 years old. They are brand new out of a box, but they have been sitting in a box somewhere for 15 years.

And so these things tend to fail so it is concerning that we run a bunch of ballots and then you load these up on election night and you cross your fingers they don't fail because if they gave -- you have to run a whole bunch more ballots and so that's another reason for the upgrade is just the technology end of we are going from this to I think -- I think these will run on a thumb -- like a thumb drive. You download and take it back and do

it.

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So this is -- like I said, we have been working on this a lot of years. The Commissioners approved this in our budget, our capital expenditure budget, for this year, and so we are just looking to finally get over the hump.

MEMBER MARINELLO: Getting up with the times. I move the Board authorize the Director and the Deputy Director to execute a contract with the ES&S for the purchase of five 850 Vote Tabulators in the amount of \$477,250.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Second.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor.

That motion carries.

The next item on the agenda --

MR. MANIFOLD: Is it me again?

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Yeah, Democracy Live,

18 | it's you again.

MR. MANIFOLD: I have Carolyn as well to answer any IT questions.

So, yeah, the Democracy Live contract, basically we -- when we were -- when we started meeting with Democracy Live, they do kind of two things. They do an accessible sample ballot for

handicap accessible online. They do a lot of accessibility issues, and then they also do a UOCAVA kind of system. And so we have been working with them probably over the last couple of years on UOCAVA and testing out their system. We are not doing the UOCAVA thing yet because we kind of like our system but this is about creating an accessible sample ballot for our website.

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So what happens is if a voter comes to our website, the website is accessible but the only thing that doesn't meet the --

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: ADA.

MR. MANIFOLD: -- ADA requirements is a sample ballot. If you say you want to see what my sample ballot looks like, all the different races, what happens is it loads to PDF which is the PDF of each -- or a couple thousand different ballot styles on our website. Well, if you do one of these, what do they call them, screen readers, the screen readers go side to side so it would be like --

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: So if you want to listen to it, an audible --

MR. MANIFOLD: Yeah. If you are going to listen for this to read off to you, what it does it

says president and then it might say county commissioner because it's reading side to side instead of up and down in columns with the races. It will say president, county commissioner, you know, judge, and it's going side to side instead of down reading off names.

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DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: The ballot wouldn't make any sense to anybody listening to it audibly.

MR. MANIFOLD: So there has been kind of a big push with the -- at a lot of election conferences we have been to with ADA requirements and preventing lawsuits and accessibility issues.

So we have been meeting with them and with the data center. The data center has been in our meetings with -- with this group, and they like the product a lot as well. So it was -- they were -- they -- I don't know if you have anything else. They like the product.

MS. GORUP: They like the product. The voter will still only have to come to our website and log in and then there will be a link to send them to the Democracy Live and that link will know what ballot they need to see.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Zach, Democracy Live is 1 2 a for profit or not for profit? What is Democracy 3 Live? 4 MS. GORUP: I don't know. I know they 5 have been working with DOD on -- on the UOCAVA, and they have gotten a lot of grants from them, but I 6 7 don't know. 8 MR. MANIFOLD: Yeah, I am not sure 9 either. 10 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: They have been working with who? 11 12 MS. GORUP: Department of Defense. 13 MR. MANIFOLD: They do a lot of DOD 14 contracts, and I know they have some grant funding, 15 but I don't know. 16 MEMBER SINNOTT: So Democracy Live is a 17 vendor of software, and it is selling us a product 18 that we will attach to our sample ballot such that if 19 you -- if you cannot read, you can click onto a link, 20 and it will be -- and it will be transferred over to

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correct?

MEMBER SINNOTT: And at that point then

a website maintained by the Democracy Live; is that

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     you will have the sample ballot for your voting place
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     to read to you.
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                 MR. MANIFOLD: That's correct. It will
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     look like -- the voter wouldn't know they actually
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     have left -- they built -- it looks like it's --
                 MS. GORUP: I don't know --
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                 MR. MANIFOLD: -- our setup.
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                 MS. GORUP: -- if they will know, but it
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     takes them to a version of the sample ballot that's
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     screen reader friendly.
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                 MEMBER SINNOTT: How is somebody without
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     sight obtaining access to a sample ballot now in
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     Franklin County?
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                 MS. GORUP: Well, they could get the
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     sample ballot that we put out there and get somebody
     to read it to them.
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                 MR. MANIFOLD: Yeah. That's the only way
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     they would be able to currently.
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                 MS. GORUP: Their screen reader would
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     tell them sample ballot, but when they clicked on it,
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     what would be read to them would not make any sense.
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                 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Today.
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                 MS. GORUP: Today.
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                 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: If we have visually
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impaired people come to the early vote, is it staff that walks them through, or they can bring a family member?

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We have audible ballots.

6 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: We have audible 7 ballots.

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MR. MANIFOLD: The machines are actually set up. We set them up and they put on the headsets and they can -- they can do it all on their own.

MEMBER SINNOTT: How long will this contract last?

MR. MANIFOLD: I am not looking at it, but I believe it's a five-year contract.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It is. The first year is \$35,000. After that, it's a \$6,000 a year upgrade so that they can load the ballots, that type of thing.

MS. GORUP: Maintenance.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: And I might add that the Department of Justice is taking a strong look at all boards. As a matter of fact, they had an agreement with the Secretary of State or had discussion with the Secretary of State about making

online access, ADA accessible. And, right now, we are not ADA accessible, and I don't believe the other counties are either, but they reached an agreement to allow them to start working on it. And we just want to be ahead of the game on this and make them ADA accessible because that's the next big thing that's coming down. Not only does polling places have to be ADA accessible but our website has to be ADA accessible.

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DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I was going to say our ADA compliance at the 385 voting locations is better than anybody in the country. I mean, we have photos. We have -- we have everything. We meet with the Secretary of State's Brett Harbinger, who is the ADA compliance person, and literally we are clearly the best in Ohio. And other people are taking our ADA compliance nationally.

So this will be kind of the last step right now where we're in noncompliance and, again, we will be the first ones in the state of Ohio to use this.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Is somebody else in Ohio using the Democracy Live ballot?

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Not right now.

They are talking to everybody but.

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2 MEMBER SINNOTT: How did we find

3 Democracy Live, or did it find us?

MR. MANIFOLD: Because we did -- we did a test with them through -- with the Department.

MS. GORUP: UOCAVA voters.

MR. MANIFOLD: UOCAVA voters through DOD grandfathering.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: They came before the Board of Voting Machine Examiners with a UOCAVA product, and they have come before the Board of Voting Machine Examiners with this kind of ballot. I first met them at a conference probably six or seven years ago or longer. And we started talking about -- you know, first started talking about the UOCAVA and then we started talking about the ADA accessible and they have been doing ADA accessible. That was their mainstay was ADA accessible even back then. And we didn't go with it back then because we didn't realize that we were going to be forced to do this at some point so.

Their other product for UOCAVA voters, our -- our system works a lot faster and better than what their system did. We did try four election

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cycles. We will not be using their system to -- for
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     the remaking of UOCAVA ballots. I think we do a much
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    better job than that but this we couldn't do a good
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     job at.
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                 MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay.
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                 MS. GORUP: I would like to mention I
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    believe it was North Carolina recently had a judgment
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     against them for their sample ballots not being ADA
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     compliant.
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                 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: So you do risk a
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     fine.
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                 MS. GORUP: Slap on the hands at the
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     least.
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                 MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay. Well, I think I
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    move that the Board authorize the Director and the
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     Deputy Director to execute a contract with the
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     Democracy Live for the purchase of software for an
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    ADA compliant, audio-enabled sample ballot in the
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     amount of $35,000.
                 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second?
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                 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.
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                 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor.
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                 That motion carries.
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                 The next item on the agenda we have a
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couple of challenges before us. Who is handling those? Mary?

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DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I am going to introduce Mary Hackett. Mary Hackett is -- I was going to say brand new to the Board. You are brand new to me, right? But you have been at the Board of Elections and thought you retired.

MS. HACKETT: I did retire.

MEMBER MARINELLO: Make that clear.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: So we had Renee Klco who is out on medical disability, and we felt that we needed a temporary Manager of Voter Services, and Mary has done a great job. Now, I will say that maybe later on we will have to finalize her, so you need to do a very good job at this point in order to earn their trust, Mary.

MS. HATCHETT: The first challenge is made by Norman L. Hall who resides at 583 South 5th Street. He's challenging the right to vote of Devon Dockery. Mr. Dockery registered through OOC which is the Ohio Organizing Collaborative on April 6, 2016, at 583 Fifth Avenue. Research in our office concluded that 583 Fifth Avenue is not a valid address -- address on either East or West Fifth

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The Board of Elections sent an acknowledgment notice to Mr. Dockery at 583 South 5th Street, the residence of Mr. Hall, who stated that no one named Devon Dockery lives or has ever lived at 538 South 5th Street.

So with 583 Fifth Avenue being an invalid address and 538 South 5th Street being the residence of Mr. Hall since 2005, it is our recommendation that Mr. Devon Dockery be canceled.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: And he is the second one on the -- on your list.

MS. HATCHETT: The second challenge is made by Robert A. --

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Hold on.

MEMBER MARINELLO: Should we do them

17 | separately?

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: We need to do them separately.

MEMBER MARINELLO: I move the Board -- I
move the Board approve --

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: See if they have got any questions.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Mary, so our situation

we had one similar to this within the last couple of months, and I think we disposed of in a different way, but I believe I like your suggestion more. So we have Mr. Hall who is reporting to us that he does live at 538 South 5th Street.

MS. HATCHETT: Correct.

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MEMBER SINNOTT: And he doesn't know anything about a Devon Dockery who is registered to vote at that address.

MS. HATCHETT: Devon Dockery came in with the address of 583 Fifth Avenue. And our records there is no 583 East or West. I think you researched.

MR. MACKEY: Maybe Matt did.

MS. HATCHETT: There is no 538 Fifth

Avenue so in order for us to even send an

acknowledgment we made the address fit and sent it to

the 583 South 5th Street address because there is no

583 Fifth Avenue either East or West.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay. So there is no 583 Fifth Avenue which is the registration address for Mr. Dockery.

MS. HATCHETT: So we didn't send anything to that address.

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MEMBER SINNOTT: So you sent something to
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     583 South 5th Street where Mr. Hall says no one here
     by that name.
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                 MS. HATCHETT: Correct.
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                 MEMBER SINNOTT: Got it. Thank you.
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                 MEMBER MARINELLO: I move that the Board
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     approve the challenge of the right to vote filed by
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     Norman A. -- Norman Hall.
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                 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Actually I think
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     you want to probably deny the -- I'm guessing.
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                 MEMBER MARINELLO: He's the challenger.
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     I want to approve the challenger, right?
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                 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Yeah.

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     challenge that the registration be canceled.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor.

Motion carries.

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MS. HATCHETT: The next challenge is made by Robert A. Liebert who resides at 3020 Scioto Estates Court. He is challenging the right to vote of Joseph M. Graves. Mr. Graves registered to vote through the Bureau of Motor Vehicles on April 7, 2016, at 3020 Scioto Estates Court.

Per the Franklin County Auditor property reports Mr. Liebert is the owner of the property at 3020 Scioto Estates Court and states that Mr. Graves is unknown to him and his family and has never lived at 3020 Scioto Estates Court.

We contacted the Bureau of Motor

Vehicles, and they researched Mr. Graves' record to

see if they had made an error in entering his

information. They found no such error in their data
entry. Mr. Graves has never voted and this was his

first time to register to vote. It's also our

recommendation that he be canceled.

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MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay. Mr. Graves does have a driver's license showing his address as 3020 Scioto Estates Court?

MS. HATCHETT: That I do not know. I know that the Bureau of Motor Vehicles at times has made error in data entry and such. That was the information he gave to them so I don't know whether that is true or false.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Mr. Liebert says there is no Mr. Graves at his address.

MS. HATCHETT: Correct.

MEMBER SINNOTT: All right. I move that the Board approve the challenge of right to vote filed by Robert Liebert of 3020 Scioto Estates Court, Columbus, Ohio 43221 against Joseph Graves purportedly of the same address and that Mr. Graves' registration be removed in the Franklin County voter file.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second?

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor.

That motion carries.

MS. HATCHETT: The final challenge is by

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William DeMora who is challenging the right to vote
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     of Whitney Ellen Smith. Ms. Smith resides at 524
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     South 4th Street. An online registration through the
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     Secretary of State's Office was processed here at the
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     Board of Elections on June 7, 2016, updating her
     address from 757 South Wall Street to 524 South 4th
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     Street. Our recommendation is to deny this
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     challenge.
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                 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. We understand
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     Whitney is here --
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                 MS. SMITH: Yes.
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                 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: -- and would like an
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     opportunity to address this matter.
                 MS. SMITH: If you would like me to.
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                 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Mr. DeMora is too.
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                 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: He is hiding in the
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     back. Does either party wish to address the Board?
                 MS. SMITH: If you have any questions, I
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     am happy to, but it seems pretty clearcut to us so.
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                 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I think I saw a hand
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     up in the back.
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                 MS. SMITH: I updated my address so.
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                 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Would you like, Bill?

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CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I think it would be easier up here for the stenographer and if you will state your name and address for the record.

MR. DeMORA: William DeMora, 100 Warren Street, Columbus, Ohio 43215. When I filed the complaint, I was in possession of multiple legal documents that were filed with both the City Clerk's Office and this Board of Elections. One, Form 2014RP, which I submitted, a form filed by the Office of the Clerk shows Whitney Smith at 711 Mohican Way, Westerville, Ohio 43081 who received a check for circulating petitions for \$6,571. One address.

As you stated, her registration address when I filed this was 757 South Wall Street. And then she filed a petition as a circulator at 524 South 4th Street of which she was not a registered voter when I filed my petition.

Also I did an Auditor search. 524 South 4th Street, the owners are Shawn and Jean Rogers who are receiving an owner occupied tax credit for that house and neither of them are registered voters at that house. The voter at the time was Daniel

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Benjamin Bronshire and nobody else when I filed this
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     complaint last week which is why I filed the
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     complaint is that I had three different addresses for
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    Ms. Smith, and I have a document that shows Ms. Smith
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     is not the owner of a house that's getting a tax
     credit for owner occupied dwelling. So that's why I

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                 MR. WHITT: My address is 524 South 4th
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     Street, Columbus, Ohio. Basically the timeline is
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     happening here November 4, 2015, I filed for a change
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     of address for voter registration from the
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     Westerville address, the 711 Mohican Way address.
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That was on an older document and changed it to my Wall Street address. Just to clarify I have only been registered at three addresses my entire life.
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And then December of 2015 -- actually,

I'm sorry, March 15 I voted at my Wall Street address

properly. Late March I moved from my Wall Street

address to 524 South 4th Street. My lease on my Wall

Street address officially ended April 1, and then I

switched my voter registration to my 524 South Wall

Street address. So it's three addresses and that's

the timeline. South 4th Street, 524 South 4th

Street.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay. Whitney, make sure I understand the time. So November 4, 2015, you changed your residence from Westerville to Wall Street.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Where did you move after that?

MS. SMITH: 524 South 4th Street which is

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     address on the Board's records?
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                 MS. SMITH: Last Wednesday -- or last
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     Tuesday, I believe the 7th.
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                 MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay. Mary, what is
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     your recommendation?

As our practice is to make pads of 25, it's our recommendation that for each ballot style we supply a pad of 25 provisional ballots, and as this is a Special, there is no paper on demand option.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Will we be having some for the provisional ballots?

MS. GORUP: The 25 that we send out will

be for provisional ballots.

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DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And additionally we have runners here and receive calls throughout the day so if somebody did or felt they were going to exceed the 25, we would send a runner with another packet.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Sounds reasonable.

MEMBER SINNOTT: I move that the Board adopt the paper ballot allocation of one pad, 25 ballots, per location for the August 2, 2016, Special Election.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second?

MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor.

Motion carries.

MS. GORUP: Machine allocation, that's Exhibit A. Back in 2009 we had discretion as to how many machines we would send out, and we sent out one machine per precinct assigned to the location with there not being less than three.

Unfortunately we don't have that option. We are required to assign the machines at a rate of one machine for every 175 voters. We could go down to as low as two machines, but our practice is to

send a minimum of three machines in case something breaks down.

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The exhibit shows based on the active voters, based on the 175 voter rate in the Primary, we sent one machine for every 135 voters. And in cases where the difference between the Primary and the Special would be one or two machines, rather than take those machines out of the cart and store them someplace we are going to go ahead and send them out to the polling location. And those are designated by the asterisk on the right-hand corner, right-hand column.

And there are some highlighted locations. Those are locations where we assign more than one precinct but not all the precincts are involved in this location.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: What does that mean?

MS. GORUP: Like we have -- if you go to
the very bottom, Noor Islamic Center, normally we
have seven precincts in that location. This election
I believe it's five. The others are not city of
Columbus precincts that are normally assigned.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Oh, I see.

MS. GORUP: It's just an indication that

if the numbers look funny to somebody.

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DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is it fair to say this is an extremely generous allocation of voting machines?

MS. GORUP: Yes. And it will be amended as we are still making changes. Just before I came back a couple of the park locations are moving to their shelter house, and we are having churches who have a problem with vacation Bible school using the location. So they are working to figure out where to put these voters. So next month there would be an amended plan, but we would basically be using the 175 voters per machine formula.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay.

MEMBER MARINELLO: I move that the Board adopt the voting machine allocation formula in Exhibit A compiled by the Board staff of the August 2, 2016, Special Election.

MEMBER HAAS: Second.

DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor.

In the Primary of 2016 machines were allocated based on one machine for every 135 voters, In the 2016 August Special we are using one machine for every 175 voters. In Locations where the number of machines is only one or two less than the Primary number, the Primary number is used.
