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1 Monday Afternoon Session,  
2 June 13, 2016.

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4 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Good afternoon,  
5 Mr. Chairman. I would like to call the Board of  
6 Elections meeting to order.

7 I will do the roll call. Kimberly  
8 Marinello.

9 MEMBER MARINELLO: Here.

10 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Gregory Haas.

11 MEMBER HAAS: Here.

12 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Douglas Preisse.

13 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Here.

14 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: And Bradley Sinnott.

15 MEMBER SINNOTT: Here.

16 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Mr. Chairman, we have  
17 a quorum, a full Board. Everybody is here.

18 First item on the agenda would be the  
19 approval of the minutes from the May 2, 2016,  
20 meeting.

21 MEMBER HAAS: I move the Board approve  
22 the minutes of the May 2, 2016, meeting of the  
23 Franklin County Board of Elections.

24 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second?

1 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

2 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor.

3 That motion carries.

4 The second item on the agenda would be  
5 the contract for ES&S, the elections system.

6 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I think Zach  
7 Manifold is going to talk to us about that.

8 MR. MANIFOLD: Hello, everyone. So you  
9 have in front of you the contract for our upgrade of  
10 our election tabulators with ES&S. We have been  
11 going through this kind of for a few years where we  
12 have been trying to -- been wanting to do this  
13 upgrade.

14 It's really a technology upgrade. A lot  
15 more efficiency with 850s compared to the 650s. They  
16 run three or four times faster. They reduce a lot of  
17 equipment, a lot of overtime, a lot of cost. I think  
18 you may have gotten the Cuyahoga County report  
19 earlier today. They had done a full kind of study on  
20 the cost analysis for them. I think they figured out  
21 that they would basically breakeven on the equipment  
22 I think after five years because of the reduction in  
23 all the costs. I think we'll probably take a little  
24 longer, probably like eight years, because we are

1 already pretty efficient. We don't have three people  
2 on each tabulator. We have two people on each  
3 tabulator. Some of those costs.

4 But basically the one key point about  
5 this contract is the special note section. I don't  
6 know if you guys wanted to look at that. It's down  
7 towards the bottom half. It says "ES&S anticipates."

8 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Where are you looking  
9 at?

10 MEMBER MARINELLO: Page what?

11 MR. MANIFOLD: Page -- Sales Order  
12 Agreement page 1.

13 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: The second half of the  
14 first page.

15 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Special notes at the  
16 very bottom.

17 MR. MANIFOLD: This is kind of the one  
18 sticking point of, you know, why it's taken --  
19 besides getting the funding for the upgrade this has  
20 kind of been the sticking point. So the 850s are  
21 certified by themselves as stand-alone machines, and  
22 then our iVotronic D -- DREs are certified as a  
23 stand-alone machine. But when you put them together,  
24 because of the iVotronics our voting machines are so

1 old the Election Assistance Commission, the EAC, they  
2 don't test with pre2005 equipment, so this machine  
3 can never be tested with that machine because it's  
4 too old. Our voting machines are too old. So this  
5 has always been a sticking point. So ES&S went to  
6 the voting -- the Secretary of State's --

7 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Board of Voting  
8 Machine Examiners.

9 MR. MANIFOLD: Which Director Anthony is  
10 on the Board, took it to them and kind of showed,  
11 hey, we want to put these two things together but  
12 there's no way to get them certified through the EAS  
13 because the equipment is so old for the machines.  
14 And so the Voting Machine Examiners Board asked that  
15 ES&S take it to an independent lab and have the  
16 testing done of the two systems together.

17 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: So they are  
18 building a bridge.

19 MR. MANIFOLD: They are basically  
20 building a bridge to put the two systems together.  
21 The testing is ongoing. It's actually being tested  
22 right now. They anticipate that they will have it  
23 done by July, and then the Voting Machine Examiners  
24 Board is supposed to take this up in August and get

1 it certified for the State after they pass the test.

2 So the special note section of the  
3 contract kind of lays that out that ES&S anticipates  
4 having the 850s -- the 850 iVotronic Voting System  
5 certified in the state of Ohio by August 31, 2016,  
6 and the -- in the event that ES&S is unable to obtain  
7 certification by August 31, 2016, the customer has  
8 the option to terminate this agreement upon 10 days'  
9 written notice.

10 So obviously if -- this has taken a long  
11 time for us to get to this point and if they don't  
12 meet that certification this summer, then we would  
13 just stay on our 650 tabulators and not do the  
14 upgrade.

15 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: When -- so what's the  
16 delivery date and switch out anticipation?

17 MR. MANIFOLD: So they would let us keep  
18 our 650s through the election as well so they are not  
19 going to make us send back our current setup so we  
20 would have both -- both sets of machines through the  
21 fall in case we wanted --

22 MEMBER MARINELLO: To have a backup.

23 MR. MANIFOLD: Yeah, to use the other --  
24 have a backup. They are going to leave them here,



1 and we don't have to turn back in the old equipment.  
2 But, yeah, they expect to have it to us by -- we  
3 would have the machines and everything by the end of  
4 August.

5 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So we are not exposed  
6 to be underequipped even if the anticipated  
7 certification from the examining board weren't to  
8 happen.

9 MR. MANIFOLD: Yes, correct. We will  
10 still have everything we have right now.

11 MEMBER MARINELLO: Okay. Which machine  
12 had the moisture problem back there?

13 MR. MANIFOLD: Well, so that's kind of --  
14 that's another reason for the upgrade is, you know,  
15 those machines are very balky about really anything,  
16 moisture, anything. These -- these machines are  
17 taking a picture of each ballot. It's actually, you  
18 know, taking that photo, and so you are not going to  
19 have -- we won't probably have as many remakes. We  
20 won't have -- we shouldn't have that moisture problem  
21 that we've had in the past where we have to keep  
22 coming back to have you guys produce remakes. It  
23 should produce remakes.

24 One of the big selling points, I don't

1 know if you guys know what these are, but this is  
2 what the current election results are often on  
3 election night. These are zip drives which I don't  
4 know if you have seen a zip drive in probably 15  
5 years but this is what -- this is what we download  
6 the results onto on the current machines and then  
7 take them back and upload them.

8 Well, you know, we went to go buy new zip  
9 drives last year and so we found a really good deal  
10 and bought some and then they came in a package and  
11 they were brand new. They are like everything is  
12 new, and then you open them up they were produced in  
13 2000; so, I mean, they are 15 years old. They are  
14 brand new out of a box, but they have been sitting in  
15 a box somewhere for 15 years.

16 And so these things tend to fail so it is  
17 concerning that we run a bunch of ballots and then  
18 you load these up on election night and you cross  
19 your fingers they don't fail because if they gave --  
20 you have to run a whole bunch more ballots and so  
21 that's another reason for the upgrade is just the  
22 technology end of we are going from this to I  
23 think -- I think these will run on a thumb -- like a  
24 thumb drive. You download and take it back and do

1 it.

2 So this is -- like I said, we have been  
3 working on this a lot of years. The Commissioners  
4 approved this in our budget, our capital expenditure  
5 budget, for this year, and so we are just looking to  
6 finally get over the hump.

7 MEMBER MARINELLO: Getting up with the  
8 times. I move the Board authorize the Director and  
9 the Deputy Director to execute a contract with the  
10 ES&S for the purchase of five 850 Vote Tabulators in  
11 the amount of \$477,250.

12 MEMBER SINNOTT: Second.

13 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor.  
14 That motion carries.

15 The next item on the agenda --

16 MR. MANIFOLD: Is it me again?

17 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Yeah, Democracy Live,  
18 it's you again.

19 MR. MANIFOLD: I have Carolyn as well to  
20 answer any IT questions.

21 So, yeah, the Democracy Live contract,  
22 basically we -- when we were -- when we started  
23 meeting with Democracy Live, they do kind of two  
24 things. They do an accessible sample ballot for

1 handicap accessible online. They do a lot of  
2 accessibility issues, and then they also do a UOCAVA  
3 kind of system. And so we have been working with  
4 them probably over the last couple of years on UOCAVA  
5 and testing out their system. We are not doing the  
6 UOCAVA thing yet because we kind of like our system  
7 but this is about creating an accessible sample  
8 ballot for our website.

9 So what happens is if a voter comes to  
10 our website, the website is accessible but the only  
11 thing that doesn't meet the --

12 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: ADA.

13 MR. MANIFOLD: -- ADA requirements is a  
14 sample ballot. If you say you want to see what my  
15 sample ballot looks like, all the different races,  
16 what happens is it loads to PDF which is the PDF of  
17 each -- or a couple thousand different ballot styles  
18 on our website. Well, if you do one of these, what  
19 do they call them, screen readers, the screen readers  
20 go side to side so it would be like --

21 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: So if you want to  
22 listen to it, an audible --

23 MR. MANIFOLD: Yeah. If you are going to  
24 listen for this to read off to you, what it does it

1 says president and then it might say county  
2 commissioner because it's reading side to side  
3 instead of up and down in columns with the races. It  
4 will say president, county commissioner, you know,  
5 judge, and it's going side to side instead of down  
6 reading off names.

7 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: The ballot  
8 wouldn't make any sense to anybody listening to it  
9 audibly.

10 MR. MANIFOLD: So there has been kind of  
11 a big push with the -- at a lot of election  
12 conferences we have been to with ADA requirements and  
13 preventing lawsuits and accessibility issues.

14 So we have been meeting with them and  
15 with the data center. The data center has been in  
16 our meetings with -- with this group, and they like  
17 the product a lot as well. So it was -- they were --  
18 they -- I don't know if you have anything else. They  
19 like the product.

20 MS. GORUP: They like the product. The  
21 voter will still only have to come to our website and  
22 log in and then there will be a link to send them to  
23 the Democracy Live and that link will know what  
24 ballot they need to see.

1                   MEMBER SINNOTT: Zach, Democracy Live is  
2 a for profit or not for profit? What is Democracy  
3 Live?

4                   MS. GORUP: I don't know. I know they  
5 have been working with DOD on -- on the UOCAVA, and  
6 they have gotten a lot of grants from them, but I  
7 don't know.

8                   MR. MANIFOLD: Yeah, I am not sure  
9 either.

10                  CHAIRMAN PREISSE: They have been working  
11 with who?

12                  MS. GORUP: Department of Defense.

13                  MR. MANIFOLD: They do a lot of DOD  
14 contracts, and I know they have some grant funding,  
15 but I don't know.

16                  MEMBER SINNOTT: So Democracy Live is a  
17 vendor of software, and it is selling us a product  
18 that we will attach to our sample ballot such that if  
19 you -- if you cannot read, you can click onto a link,  
20 and it will be -- and it will be transferred over to  
21 a website maintained by the Democracy Live; is that  
22 correct?

23                  MS. GORUP: Yes.

24                  MEMBER SINNOTT: And at that point then

1 you will have the sample ballot for your voting place  
2 to read to you.

3 MR. MANIFOLD: That's correct. It will  
4 look like -- the voter wouldn't know they actually  
5 have left -- they built -- it looks like it's --

6 MS. GORUP: I don't know --

7 MR. MANIFOLD: -- our setup.

8 MS. GORUP: -- if they will know, but it  
9 takes them to a version of the sample ballot that's  
10 screen reader friendly.

11 MEMBER SINNOTT: How is somebody without  
12 sight obtaining access to a sample ballot now in  
13 Franklin County?

14 MS. GORUP: Well, they could get the  
15 sample ballot that we put out there and get somebody  
16 to read it to them.

17 MR. MANIFOLD: Yeah. That's the only way  
18 they would be able to currently.

19 MS. GORUP: Their screen reader would  
20 tell them sample ballot, but when they clicked on it,  
21 what would be read to them would not make any sense.

22 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Today.

23 MS. GORUP: Today.

24 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: If we have visually

1 impaired people come to the early vote, is it staff  
2 that walks them through, or they can bring a family  
3 member?

4 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We have audible  
5 ballots.

6 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: We have audible  
7 ballots.

8 MR. MANIFOLD: The machines are actually  
9 set up. We set them up and they put on the headsets  
10 and they can -- they can do it all on their own.

11 MEMBER SINNOTT: How long will this  
12 contract last?

13 MR. MANIFOLD: I am not looking at it,  
14 but I believe it's a five-year contract.

15 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It is. The first  
16 year is \$35,000. After that, it's a \$6,000 a year  
17 upgrade so that they can load the ballots, that type  
18 of thing.

19 MS. GORUP: Maintenance.

20 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: And I might add that  
21 the Department of Justice is taking a strong look at  
22 all boards. As a matter of fact, they had an  
23 agreement with the Secretary of State or had  
24 discussion with the Secretary of State about making



1 online access, ADA accessible. And, right now, we  
2 are not ADA accessible, and I don't believe the other  
3 counties are either, but they reached an agreement to  
4 allow them to start working on it. And we just want  
5 to be ahead of the game on this and make them ADA  
6 accessible because that's the next big thing that's  
7 coming down. Not only does polling places have to be  
8 ADA accessible but our website has to be ADA  
9 accessible.

10 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I was going to  
11 say our ADA compliance at the 385 voting locations is  
12 better than anybody in the country. I mean, we have  
13 photos. We have -- we have everything. We meet with  
14 the Secretary of State's Brett Harbinger, who is the  
15 ADA compliance person, and literally we are clearly  
16 the best in Ohio. And other people are taking our  
17 ADA compliance nationally.

18 So this will be kind of the last step  
19 right now where we're in noncompliance and, again, we  
20 will be the first ones in the state of Ohio to use  
21 this.

22 MEMBER SINNOTT: Is somebody else in Ohio  
23 using the Democracy Live ballot?

24 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Not right now.

1 They are talking to everybody but.

2 MEMBER SINNOTT: How did we find  
3 Democracy Live, or did it find us?

4 MR. MANIFOLD: Because we did -- we did a  
5 test with them through -- with the Department.

6 MS. GORUP: UOCAVA voters.

7 MR. MANIFOLD: UOCAVA voters through DOD  
8 grandfathering.

9 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: They came before the  
10 Board of Voting Machine Examiners with a UOCAVA  
11 product, and they have come before the Board of  
12 Voting Machine Examiners with this kind of ballot. I  
13 first met them at a conference probably six or seven  
14 years ago or longer. And we started talking about --  
15 you know, first started talking about the UOCAVA and  
16 then we started talking about the ADA accessible and  
17 they have been doing ADA accessible. That was their  
18 mainstay was ADA accessible even back then. And we  
19 didn't go with it back then because we didn't realize  
20 that we were going to be forced to do this at some  
21 point so.

22 Their other product for UOCAVA voters,  
23 our -- our system works a lot faster and better than  
24 what their system did. We did try four election

1 cycles. We will not be using their system to -- for  
2 the remaking of UOCAVA ballots. I think we do a much  
3 better job than that but this we couldn't do a good  
4 job at.

5 MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay.

6 MS. GORUP: I would like to mention I  
7 believe it was North Carolina recently had a judgment  
8 against them for their sample ballots not being ADA  
9 compliant.

10 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: So you do risk a  
11 fine.

12 MS. GORUP: Slap on the hands at the  
13 least.

14 MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay. Well, I think I  
15 move that the Board authorize the Director and the  
16 Deputy Director to execute a contract with the  
17 Democracy Live for the purchase of software for an  
18 ADA compliant, audio-enabled sample ballot in the  
19 amount of \$35,000.

20 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second?

21 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

22 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor.  
23 That motion carries.

24 The next item on the agenda we have a

1 couple of challenges before us. Who is handling  
2 those? Mary?

3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I am going to  
4 introduce Mary Hackett. Mary Hackett is -- I was  
5 going to say brand new to the Board. You are brand  
6 new to me, right? But you have been at the Board of  
7 Elections and thought you retired.

8 MS. HACKETT: I did retire.

9 MEMBER MARINELLO: Make that clear.

10 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: So we had Renee  
11 Klco who is out on medical disability, and we felt  
12 that we needed a temporary Manager of Voter Services,  
13 and Mary has done a great job. Now, I will say that  
14 maybe later on we will have to finalize her, so you  
15 need to do a very good job at this point in order to  
16 earn their trust, Mary.

17 MS. HATCHETT: The first challenge is  
18 made by Norman L. Hall who resides at 583 South 5th  
19 Street. He's challenging the right to vote of Devon  
20 Dockery. Mr. Dockery registered through OOC which is  
21 the Ohio Organizing Collaborative on April 6, 2016,  
22 at 583 Fifth Avenue. Research in our office  
23 concluded that 583 Fifth Avenue is not a valid  
24 address -- address on either East or West Fifth

1 Avenue.

2 The Board of Elections sent an  
3 acknowledgment notice to Mr. Dockery at 583 South 5th  
4 Street, the residence of Mr. Hall, who stated that no  
5 one named Devon Dockery lives or has ever lived at  
6 538 South 5th Street.

7 So with 583 Fifth Avenue being an invalid  
8 address and 538 South 5th Street being the residence  
9 of Mr. Hall since 2005, it is our recommendation that  
10 Mr. Devon Dockery be canceled.

11 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: And he is the second  
12 one on the -- on your list.

13 MS. HATCHETT: The second challenge is  
14 made by Robert A. --

15 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Hold on.

16 MEMBER MARINELLO: Should we do them  
17 separately?

18 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: We need to do them  
19 separately.

20 MEMBER MARINELLO: I move the Board -- I  
21 move the Board approve --

22 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: See if they have got  
23 any questions.

24 MEMBER SINNOTT: Mary, so our situation

1 we had one similar to this within the last couple of  
2 months, and I think we disposed of in a different  
3 way, but I believe I like your suggestion more. So  
4 we have Mr. Hall who is reporting to us that he does  
5 live at 538 South 5th Street.

6 MS. HATCHETT: Correct.

7 MEMBER SINNOTT: And he doesn't know  
8 anything about a Devon Dockery who is registered to  
9 vote at that address.

10 MS. HATCHETT: Devon Dockery came in with  
11 the address of 583 Fifth Avenue. And our records  
12 there is no 583 East or West. I think you  
13 researched.

14 MR. MACKEY: Maybe Matt did.

15 MS. HATCHETT: There is no 538 Fifth  
16 Avenue so in order for us to even send an  
17 acknowledgment we made the address fit and sent it to  
18 the 583 South 5th Street address because there is no  
19 583 Fifth Avenue either East or West.

20 MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay. So there is no  
21 583 Fifth Avenue which is the registration address  
22 for Mr. Dockery.

23 MS. HATCHETT: So we didn't send anything  
24 to that address.

1 MEMBER SINNOTT: So you sent something to  
 2 583 South 5th Street where Mr. Hall says no one here  
 3 by that name.

4 MS. HATCHETT: Correct.

5 MEMBER SINNOTT: Got it. Thank you.

6 MEMBER MARINELLO: I move that the Board  
 7 approve the challenge of the right to vote filed by  
 8 Norman A. -- Norman Hall.

9 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Actually I think  
 10 you want to probably deny the -- I'm guessing.

11 MEMBER MARINELLO: He's the challenger.  
 12 I want to approve the challenger, right?

13 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Yeah.

14 MS. HATCHETT: You want to grant the  
 15 challenge that the registration be canceled.

16 MEMBER MARINELLO: Yes.

17 MEMBER SINNOTT: It will be approve and  
 18 remove then.

19 MEMBER MARINELLO: Yeah.

20 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: You know what you are  
 21 doing.

22 MEMBER MARINELLO: Okay. I move that the  
 23 Board approve the challenger of right to vote filed  
 24 by Norman Hall at 583 South 5th Street, Columbus,

1 Ohio 43206 against Devon Dockery of 583 South 5th  
2 Street, Columbus, Ohio 43206 and that Devon Dockery's  
3 registration be removed in the Franklin County voter  
4 file.

5 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

6 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor.

7 Motion carries.

8 MS. HATCHETT: The next challenge is made  
9 by Robert A. Liebert who resides at 3020 Scioto  
10 Estates Court. He is challenging the right to vote  
11 of Joseph M. Graves. Mr. Graves registered to vote  
12 through the Bureau of Motor Vehicles on April 7,  
13 2016, at 3020 Scioto Estates Court.

14 Per the Franklin County Auditor property  
15 reports Mr. Liebert is the owner of the property at  
16 3020 Scioto Estates Court and states that Mr. Graves  
17 is unknown to him and his family and has never lived  
18 at 3020 Scioto Estates Court.

19 We contacted the Bureau of Motor  
20 Vehicles, and they researched Mr. Graves' record to  
21 see if they had made an error in entering his  
22 information. They found no such error in their data  
23 entry. Mr. Graves has never voted and this was his  
24 first time to register to vote. It's also our



1 recommendation that he be canceled.

2 MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay. Mr. Graves does  
3 have a driver's license showing his address as 3020  
4 Scioto Estates Court?

5 MS. HATCHETT: That I do not know. I  
6 know that the Bureau of Motor Vehicles at times has  
7 made error in data entry and such. That was the  
8 information he gave to them so I don't know whether  
9 that is true or false.

10 MEMBER SINNOTT: Mr. Liebert says there  
11 is no Mr. Graves at his address.

12 MS. HATCHETT: Correct.

13 MEMBER SINNOTT: All right. I move that  
14 the Board approve the challenge of right to vote  
15 filed by Robert Liebert of 3020 Scioto Estates Court,  
16 Columbus, Ohio 43221 against Joseph Graves  
17 purportedly of the same address and that Mr. Graves'  
18 registration be removed in the Franklin County voter  
19 file.

20 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second?

21 MEMBER HAAS: Second.

22 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor.  
23 That motion carries.

24 MS. HATCHETT: The final challenge is by

1 William DeMora who is challenging the right to vote  
2 of Whitney Ellen Smith. Ms. Smith resides at 524  
3 South 4th Street. An online registration through the  
4 Secretary of State's Office was processed here at the  
5 Board of Elections on June 7, 2016, updating her  
6 address from 757 South Wall Street to 524 South 4th  
7 Street. Our recommendation is to deny this  
8 challenge.

9 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. We understand  
10 Whitney is here --

11 MS. SMITH: Yes.

12 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: -- and would like an  
13 opportunity to address this matter.

14 MS. SMITH: If you would like me to.

15 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Mr. DeMora is too.

16 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: He is hiding in the  
17 back. Does either party wish to address the Board?

18 MS. SMITH: If you have any questions, I  
19 am happy to, but it seems pretty clearcut to us so.

20 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I think I saw a hand  
21 up in the back.

22 MS. SMITH: I updated my address so.

23 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Would you like, Bill?

24 MR. DeMORA: Yeah, absolutely.

1 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Please come forward.

2 MR. DeMORA: Should I stand up here?

3 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I think it would be  
4 easier up here for the stenographer and if you will  
5 state your name and address for the record.

6 MR. DeMORA: William DeMora, 100 Warren  
7 Street, Columbus, Ohio 43215. When I filed the  
8 complaint, I was in possession of multiple legal  
9 documents that were filed with both the City Clerk's  
10 Office and this Board of Elections. One, Form  
11 2014RP, which I submitted, a form filed by the Office  
12 of the Clerk shows Whitney Smith at 711 Mohican Way,  
13 Westerville, Ohio 43081 who received a check for  
14 circulating petitions for \$6,571. One address.

15 As you stated, her registration address  
16 when I filed this was 757 South Wall Street. And  
17 then she filed a petition as a circulator at 524  
18 South 4th Street of which she was not a registered  
19 voter when I filed my petition.

20 Also I did an Auditor search. 524 South  
21 4th Street, the owners are Shawn and Jean Rogers who  
22 are receiving an owner occupied tax credit for that  
23 house and neither of them are registered voters at  
24 that house. The voter at the time was Daniel

1 Benjamin Bronshire and nobody else when I filed this  
2 complaint last week which is why I filed the  
3 complaint is that I had three different addresses for  
4 Ms. Smith, and I have a document that shows Ms. Smith  
5 is not the owner of a house that's getting a tax  
6 credit for owner occupied dwelling. So that's why I  
7 filed my complaint.

8 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Hang on, Bill, in case  
9 anybody has any questions, please.

10 MR. DeMORA: Okay. Does anybody have any  
11 questions or anticipate any?

12 MEMBER SINNOTT: No.

13 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay.

14 MS. SMITH: Should I?

15 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: If you would like to,  
16 we would be delighted.

17 MS. SMITH: Yeah, no, definitely.

18 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Please state your name  
19 and address for the record.

20 MR. WHITT: My address is 524 South 4th  
21 Street, Columbus, Ohio. Basically the timeline is  
22 happening here November 4, 2015, I filed for a change  
23 of address for voter registration from the  
24 Westerville address, the 711 Mohican Way address.

1 That was on an older document and changed it to my  
2 Wall Street address. Just to clarify I have only  
3 been registered at three addresses my entire life.

4 And then December of 2015 -- actually,  
5 I'm sorry, March 15 I voted at my Wall Street address  
6 properly. Late March I moved from my Wall Street  
7 address to 524 South 4th Street. My lease on my Wall  
8 Street address officially ended April 1, and then I  
9 switched my voter registration to my 524 South Wall  
10 Street address. So it's three addresses and that's  
11 the timeline. South 4th Street, 524 South 4th  
12 Street.

13 MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay. Whitney, make  
14 sure I understand the time. So November 4, 2015, you  
15 changed your residence from Westerville to Wall  
16 Street.

17 MR. WHITT: Correct.

18 MEMBER SINNOTT: And how long did you  
19 live on Wall Street?

20 MR. WHITT: Until April 1 is when my  
21 lease was up.

22 MEMBER SINNOTT: Where did you move after  
23 that?

24 MS. SMITH: 524 South 4th Street which is

1 where I currently live and am currently registered to  
2 vote.

3 MEMBER SINNOTT: When did you change your  
4 address on the Board's records?

5 MS. SMITH: Last Wednesday -- or last  
6 Tuesday, I believe the 7th.

7 MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay. Mary, what is  
8 your recommendation?

9 MS. HATCHETT: Our recommendation is to  
10 deny this challenge since it was challenging her  
11 address. She is registered at 524 South 4th Street  
12 so to keep her registration at 524 South 4th Street.

13 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. Any other  
14 questions?

15 MR. DeMORA: So, Mr. Price, that  
16 timeline, she filed this document with the State in  
17 Columbus and she was not -- her voting address was  
18 still the Wall Street address so -- and she put down  
19 her residence being the South 4th Street address so  
20 how is that not an elections -- violation of signing  
21 an address to fill out a petition circulator  
22 statement when you don't register to vote?

23 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I don't know but I  
24 don't think it's pertinent to a challenge to

1 registration. I see a head nodding.

2 MS. HATCHETT: That's my understanding.

3 MEMBER SINNOTT: Well, I move that the  
4 Board deny the challenge of right to vote filed by  
5 William DeMora of 100 Warren Street, Columbus, Ohio  
6 against Whitney Ellen Smith of 575 South Wall Street,  
7 Columbus, Ohio, and that Whitney Ellen Smith's  
8 registration be preserved in the Franklin County  
9 voter file.

10 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second?

11 MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.

12 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor.  
13 Motion carries.

14 The next item on the agenda is a -- is a  
15 legacy of trainers resolution. Phil, are you giving  
16 that?

17 MR. PURKEY: Yes, sir.

18 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Phil Purkey is a  
19 trainer for the Precinct Election Officials.

20 MR. PURKEY: Hello. Good afternoon.

21 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Welcome.

22 MR. PURKEY: Last year we created a  
23 legacy trainers organization within the trainers for  
24 the Franklin County Board of Elections to promote

1 participation from poll workers to be trainers and  
2 part of -- part of that was that we had a dinner for  
3 awards that we gave to several folks that earned  
4 lifetime achievement awards and trainer of the year.

5 Last year it was attended by a couple of  
6 the Board members and the Directors and received good  
7 support, and this year we would like to do it again  
8 and upgrade it a bit. Last year we did a potluck for  
9 about 40 people, 40 to 50 people, and this year we  
10 are looking to upgrade due to having -- wanting to  
11 include the families and other Board employees such  
12 as managers and other folks within the Board, kind of  
13 want to expand it. So that's more of -- it's for  
14 employee recognition so.

15 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: And was it last year?

16 MR. PURKEY: It was last November.

17 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Last November. This  
18 facility really lends itself. Maybe you ought to  
19 think about leasing the space out for bar mitzvahs,  
20 weddings, and events because they had the room set up  
21 really nice and the venue or -- it was a really nice  
22 venue, and the event I thought was -- was well done.  
23 It was well attended and those folks who got awards  
24 were just really grateful for it, and I thought it



1 was a good way for us to treat our, you know, folks  
2 out there on the front -- on the front line.

3 We also ran this past the Office of  
4 Budget and Management or Management and Budget,  
5 whichever way it goes, the Budget Office because we  
6 wanted to make sure that we could as -- as the  
7 business of the county actually pays for an awards  
8 banquet and we were told that, yes, we could if the  
9 Board approved it and if it included employee  
10 recognition as part of it. So the Commissioners have  
11 allowed County Agencies that have employee  
12 recognition and other folks recognition banquets and  
13 such as long as our Board signed off on it and that  
14 is why this is before you today.

15 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I would just like  
16 to say one thing too. Phil, when did you come  
17 onboard? You have not been here quite a year, right?

18 MR. PURKEY: July 7.

19 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: This was his  
20 brain child so I would just like to say kudos to you  
21 for last year's employee recognition and legacy  
22 trainers, and I would wholeheartedly back this  
23 resolution.

24 MEMBER MARINELLO: I agree and I attended

1 it and I did like the potluck food though. It was  
2 good.

3 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: That's why your name  
4 is there to move it.

5 MEMBER MARINELLO: And I move that the  
6 Board accept Resolution 16-001 authorizing the staff  
7 to hold a Legacy of Trainer Awards Dinner to be held  
8 on Wednesday, November 16, 2016, at the Franklin  
9 County Board of Elections and the Board also  
10 authorizes that the cost of the Legacy of Trainers  
11 Dinner not to exceed the amount of \$2,500.

12 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second?

13 MEMBER SINNOTT: There is.

14 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor.  
15 That motion carries.

16 Thank you, Phil.

17 MR. PURKEY: Thank you.

18 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: We have a candidate  
19 withdrawal.

20 MR. MACKEY: Thursday, May 26, we  
21 received a notice from Larry L. Malone, Jr.,  
22 Democratic candidate, 16th Ohio Senate District that  
23 he wished to withdraw from the race. Democratic  
24 party has until Monday, August 15, to replace him if

1 they would so wish to do that. It's been our  
2 practice to accept the withdrawals of that nature.

3 MEMBER HAAS: I move that the Board  
4 accept the notice of withdrawal submitted by Larry  
5 Malone as a nominated candidate for State Senate,  
6 16th District, Democrat, full-term commencing  
7 January 1, 2017.

8 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

9 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor.  
10 Motion carries. Thank you, Jeff.

11 Now, it's time for paper allocation and  
12 voter machine allocation. Carol.

13 MS. GORUP: Well, we will do the easy one  
14 first, paper ballot allocation. If we go back to  
15 2009, the last time we had a citywide issue on the  
16 ballot, the most provisional ballots we received in  
17 any single precinct was 19. As our practice is to  
18 make pads of 25, it's our recommendation that for  
19 each ballot style we supply a pad of 25 provisional  
20 ballots, and as this is a Special, there is no paper  
21 on demand option.

22 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Will we be having some  
23 for the provisional ballots?

24 MS. GORUP: The 25 that we send out will

1 be for provisional ballots.

2 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And additionally  
3 we have runners here and receive calls throughout the  
4 day so if somebody did or felt they were going to  
5 exceed the 25, we would send a runner with another  
6 packet.

7 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Sounds reasonable.

8 MEMBER SINNOTT: I move that the Board  
9 adopt the paper ballot allocation of one pad, 25  
10 ballots, per location for the August 2, 2016, Special  
11 Election.

12 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second?

13 MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.

14 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor.

15 Motion carries.

16 MS. GORUP: Machine allocation, that's  
17 Exhibit A. Back in 2009 we had discretion as to how  
18 many machines we would send out, and we sent out one  
19 machine per precinct assigned to the location with  
20 there not being less than three.

21 Unfortunately we don't have that option.  
22 We are required to assign the machines at a rate of  
23 one machine for every 175 voters. We could go down  
24 to as low as two machines, but our practice is to

1 send a minimum of three machines in case something  
2 breaks down.

3           The exhibit shows based on the active  
4 voters, based on the 175 voter rate in the Primary,  
5 we sent one machine for every 135 voters. And in  
6 cases where the difference between the Primary and  
7 the Special would be one or two machines, rather than  
8 take those machines out of the cart and store them  
9 someplace we are going to go ahead and send them out  
10 to the polling location. And those are designated by  
11 the asterisk on the right-hand corner, right-hand  
12 column.

13           And there are some highlighted locations.  
14 Those are locations where we assign more than one  
15 precinct but not all the precincts are involved in  
16 this location.

17           CHAIRMAN PREISSE: What does that mean?

18           MS. GORUP: Like we have -- if you go to  
19 the very bottom, Noor Islamic Center, normally we  
20 have seven precincts in that location. This election  
21 I believe it's five. The others are not city of  
22 Columbus precincts that are normally assigned.

23           CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Oh, I see.

24           MS. GORUP: It's just an indication that

1 if the numbers look funny to somebody.

2 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is it fair to say  
3 this is an extremely generous allocation of voting  
4 machines?

5 MS. GORUP: Yes. And it will be amended  
6 as we are still making changes. Just before I came  
7 back a couple of the park locations are moving to  
8 their shelter house, and we are having churches who  
9 have a problem with vacation Bible school using the  
10 location. So they are working to figure out where to  
11 put these voters. So next month there would be an  
12 amended plan, but we would basically be using the 175  
13 voters per machine formula.

14 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay.

15 MEMBER MARINELLO: I move that the Board  
16 adopt the voting machine allocation formula in  
17 Exhibit A compiled by the Board staff of the  
18 August 2, 2016, Special Election.

19 MEMBER HAAS: Second.

20 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All those in favor.  
21 That motion carries.

22 The next item on the agenda is Executive  
23 Session, but I would like to move one thing out of  
24 that and that's Mary Hackett. If you guys don't

1 mind, take her out of the Executive Session.

2 Mary Hackett, can you stand up? I called  
3 Mary Hackett. It is a personnel matter, but I  
4 could -- Mary Hackett, we brought her onboard to  
5 cover for Renee Klco who is out on disability leave  
6 for the Voter Services Department. Renee is going to  
7 be out between now and September 1, and Mary has  
8 agreed to come in and work during that time period so  
9 we have some continuity going into this Special  
10 Election and at the rate of \$37 an hour.

11 Mary retired from the Board of Elections.  
12 She actually worked in this Department for many, many  
13 years. Probably last five or six years was in the  
14 PEO Department. So she's been -- so she's very --  
15 she has intimate knowledge of our operations here,  
16 and she came ready to start work. She knows what  
17 she's doing.

18 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So we've heard.

19 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Huh?

20 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: That's what we've  
21 heard.

22 MS. HATCHETT: Thank you.

23 MEMBER MARINELLO: So appreciate you  
24 stepping in like that. That's great.

1 MEMBER SINNOTT: Yes.

2 MEMBER MARINELLO: Do we want to make  
3 this motion now or do we wait?

4 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: You can make it now or  
5 have some discussion.

6 MEMBER SINNOTT: Inasmuch as this is a  
7 personnel matter, why don't we preserve for ourselves  
8 the opportunity to discuss it in Executive Session.

9 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: All right. We can do  
10 that. I am just trying to keep her from coming back.

11 MEMBER SINNOTT: Well, pursuant to  
12 Revised Code Section 121.22(G)(1), (3), and (5), I  
13 move that the Franklin County Board of Elections go  
14 into Executive Session to consider the appointment,  
15 employment, dismissal, discipline, promotion,  
16 demotion, and/or compensation of a public employee  
17 and perhaps advice of legal counsel.

18 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

19 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Kim Marinello.

20 MEMBER MARINELLO: Yes.

21 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Gregory Haas.

22 MEMBER HAAS: Yes.

23 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Douglas Preisse.

24 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Yes.



1 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Bradley Sinnott.

2 MEMBER SINNOTT: Yes.

3 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: We now stand in  
4 Executive Session. The only person that stays is  
5 legal.

6 (Recess taken.)

7 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Motion to come out of  
8 Executive Session.

9 MEMBER HAAS: I move the Franklin County  
10 Board of Elections adjourn from Executive Session and  
11 that no votes or official actions were taken during  
12 the Executive Session.

13 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Is there a second?

14 MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.

15 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Kim Marinello.

16 MEMBER MARINELLO: Yes.

17 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Gregory Haas.

18 MEMBER HAAS: Yes.

19 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: Douglas Preisse.

20 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Yes.

21 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: And Bradley Sinnott.

22 MEMBER SINNOTT: Yes.

23 DIRECTOR ANTHONY: We are now out of  
24 Executive Session.
