4 1 Monday Afternoon Session, 2 August 15, 2016. 3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Good afternoon. 4 5 Thank you. Chairman Preisse has indicated that he 6 will not be here today, so I will go ahead and take 7 roll call. Kimberly Marinello. 8 9 MEMBER MARINELLO: Here. DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Greg Haas. 10 11 MEMBER HAAS: Here. 12 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And Brad 13 Sinnott. 14 MEMBER SINNOTT: Here. 15 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It looks like we 16 have a quorum. Typically we designate someone as a 17 chairman. In past practice it's been Mr. Sinnott, 18 but --19 MEMBER SINNOTT: I will serve. 20 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Fantastic. 2.1 Okay. Great. The first item on the agenda is the 22 approval of the minutes from the July 15th and August 23 1st meetings of the Franklin County Board of 24 Elections. I think they were sent to you and you had 25 an opportunity to look at them.

MEMBER MARINELLO: Yes. Mr. Chairman, I move the Board approve the minutes of the July 15th, 2016, and August 1st, 2016, meetings of the Franklin County Board of Elections.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Second.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in favor say aye.

(Vote taken.)

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those opposed, same sign.

The filling of a vacancy in party nomination is next. I think Jeff Mackey will be leading us through that.

MR. MACKEY: Previously the Board had heard from the Republican candidate for the 18th State House of Representatives' District that she would be withdrawing from that race, and then on Thursday it looks like the subcommittee of the Franklin County Republican Party of the 18th House District met and nominated David — or not nominated, but certified David P. Todd to fill the vacancy in that nomination that existed. I received that on Friday, which was timely. I believe the deadline was today to take care of filling vacancies and

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nominations, so we do have that indication from the party.
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MEMBER SINNOTT: Very well. Having received from the Franklin County Republican Party the Certification of Selection of Candidate to Fill Vacancy in Party Nomination, as prescribed by Revised Code Section 3513.31, I move that the Board accept the name of David P. Todd to replace Whitney Smith in the race for State Representative, 18th District, full term, commencing 1/1/2017.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a

The next item on our agenda is the provisional ballots for consideration, and our supervisor in the Provisional Ballot Department is Alicia Healy. She'll walk us through that.

MS. HEALY: Okay. You should have a

copy of the provisional count for the August 2nd election. There was a total of 576 provisional ballots cast. Out of those, 485 of those were good, and as you can see underneath, the 001 Approved, and then we have the 002, the NEOCH was 1. Out of those 576, 49 were rejected. We have a 006, which is a form that's incomplete, we had 4 of those; 200 not registered, there were 33; 450, they voted absentee or signed the poll book, 2; Signature Mismatch, 3; no ID, 2; and the 650, which they did not have the 12B attached, so they voted at the wrong location, we had 5.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And the next item on there, there were eight that we have to have the Board review; is that correct?

MEMBER SINNOTT: If memory serves me, we have traditionally looked for a match in the two signatures before counting the ballot. Is that right?

HEALY: Uh-huh. 15 MEMBER SINNOTT: Shall we --16 MEMBER HAAS: I move that Exhibit 8 be 17 opened and reviewed and report back. 18 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in 19 favor of the motion signify by saying aye. 20 (Vote taken.) 2.1 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those 22 opposed, same sign. 23 Motion carries. 24 Thank you, Alicia, for that good report. 25 So when we started, when she started her report, we started with 485 provisional ballots that were deemed appropriate and to be counted, and if my counting is correct here, we added 3 to that, and so that would make that number 488. Then the ballots that were rejected, we started out with 49, and again we added 3 to that to be rejected, so that number becomes 52. And then we had 2 ballots that you asked the staff to open, and we'll have a motion, I believe, later on where we are opening -- you instructed the staff to open ballots and report back to you potentially at our next meeting, so would you want these done the next meeting or would you want these two today?

In my experience and I believe our counsel from the Prosecutor's Office agrees that we defer to the city in those instances, when they tell us something like that.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I think it -- at this point, I think it's probably --

MR. MACKEY: So if there is no election,

I'm not sure that the petitions mean anything.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We've not certified -- or we've not verified those petitions?
We are just simply taking them -- took them in and time stamped them; is that correct? We've not

MR. MACKEY: No. We did look at the signatures.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We did look at the signatures?

MR. MACKEY: (Nods head.)

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Okay. So they're okay in that regard?

MR. MACKEY: Actually, I don't know that for certain.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All right.

MEMBER SINNOTT: David, let me tell the members of the board and staff and public that my office has consulted with the City of Upper Arlington on this subject, so I will refrain from participating in the discussion or any related voting.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I think it would be appropriate to hear from counsel. I know Jeff said that he conferred with you and you had a thought on the subject.

MR. LECKLIDER: Well, Jeff is correct in that, I think as probably you all are aware, as a general policy this Board has deferred to the municipality's interpretation of its own charter. In this case, as I think you're aware, the City of Upper Arlington has taken the position that its charter does not allow for an election under these particular circumstances; so that being the case, the -- the petitions that have been filed, they're -- I don't want to say they're meaningless. You might find a little bit more politically correct term, I guess, but there's no basis for their filing. Therefore, there's no basis for any protest being filed, and there's nothing more to be done, frankly, with respect to the Board of Elections. There's no Board

action required under the circumstances.

MEMBER HAAS: Do we need to act to defer to the city? Do we need to take any action to defer to the city?

MR. LECKLIDER: No. And just an additional comment, I mean typically, I think in most cases, and again many of you have more actual experience on the ground, so to speak, this has occurred more often than that in respect to the City of Columbus and their interpretation of their city charter, and I think you would agree that the Board has deferred in those instances, and I think a couple of examples, you know, just in the last couple of years we deferred to the City of Columbus' interpretation of their city charter.

MEMBER HAAS: But we don't need to proactively defer?

MR. LECKLIDER: That's correct.

MEMBER HAAS: Okay.

MR. LECKLIDER: And then just one more comment, that the reason for the deferral is the city has written its charter and so the city is presumed to be expert with respect to that meaning of that charter, and that's the reason for your deferral.

can I ask if there's anybody here today that wants to take issue with our counsel's interpretation?

 UOCAVA Voters – A UOCAVA voter's board of elections must provide notice to the voter in the same manner in which the voter requested transmission of the ballot by the board to the voter (i.e., by e-mail, facsimile, or by mail, if application was made by mail or in person).

A completed <u>Form 11-S</u> must be received by the board of elections by the 7th day after an election, ⁷³ or be post-marked by the 7th day after the election and received by the board of elections by the 10th day after the election, in order to cure the voter's defective absentee ballot identification envelope and have the ballot included in the official canvass, which may begin on the 11th day following the election.

B. Counting Absentee Ballots

In order for an identification envelope to be opened and the absentee ballot to be counted, the absentee voter must provide the following information on the absentee ballot ID envelope:⁷⁴

- 1. Name;75
- 2. Residence Address, which must match the address at which the voter is registered. 76 Ohio law does not permit an absentee ballot identification envelope to be used as a voter registration form, change of name form, or change of address form. If the address on the absentee ballot identification envelope indicates that the voter's registration information is out of date and that the voter would be required to vote a provisional ballot, the absentee ballot cannot be counted:
- 3. Date of Birth—The birthdate is considered complete if the month and day match the month and day as reflected in the statewide voter registration database, the birthdate in the statewide voter registration

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database is January 1, 1800, or the board of elections has found by the vote of at least three members that the voter has completed satisfactorily all of the other required information (i.e.; name, residence address, signature, and identification);⁷⁷

- 4. Signature;78 and
- 5. Proper Identification:79
 - The voter's driver's license number;80
 - The last four digits of the voter's Social Security number;⁸¹ or
 - A copy of a current and valid photo identification, a military identification, or a current (within the last 12 months) utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck, or other government document (other than a notice of voter registration mailed by a board of elections) that shows the voter's name and address.⁸²

Ohio law requires all absentee voters to place their ballot in the ID envelope and seal the envelope. The board of elections must clearly indicate that the ballot must be sealed within the ID envelope in order to count. If the board receives an absentee ballot that is not sealed in its identification envelope, the board must seal the envelope. If the ballot is not inside the identification envelope, avoid looking at the markings on the ballot, and place the ballot in the identification envelope and seal it.

All absentee ballots returned by the close of polls on Election Day, whether returned in person or by mail, must be included in the unofficial results if the ballots meet all other requirements of law.
