So it's basically various forms of destroyed ballots. I think one of them caught fire.

MEMBER SINNOTT: And, Zach, what is it that you need to do?

(Laughter.)

MR. MANIFOLD: We just need authority to remake those 37.

MS. HEALY: So the last two, we'll still do them separately, but it's pretty much -- they're two provisional ballots that were possibly cast. We would just need to open and see which one we should count because everything on the provisional is the same on both.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So they cast two provisional ballots.
