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Tuesday Morning Session,
November 21, 2017.

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DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It appears that
we have a quorum, but I will take attendance.

Kim Marinello.

MEMBER MARINELLO: Here.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Mike Sexton.

MEMBER SEXTON: Here.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Doug Preisse.

CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Here.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And Brad
Sinnott.

MEMBER SINNOTT: Here.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We do indeed
have a quorum.

The first item on the agenda is the
approval of the minutes from October 25th, 2017. I
believe everybody was e-mailed the minutes. If there
are any corrections, deletions, additions; if not, I
would take a motion to approve the minutes.

MEMBER MARINELLO: I move that the Board
approve the minutes of the October 25th, 2017,
meeting of the Franklin County Board of Elections.

1 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
2 second?

3 MEMBER SINNOTT: There is.

4 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
5 favor signify by saying aye.

6 (Vote taken.)

7 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
8 same sign.

9 (No response.)

10 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

11 The next item on the agenda is the voter
12 registration challenges, and I will turn that over to
13 Director Leonard.

14 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Board Members, you
15 should have in front of you a packet of the previous
16 challenges. What we have, when we had the meeting on
17 October 25th, we addressed the challenges that were
18 presented by Donna Bogue, and at that time we went
19 ahead and postponed the hearing on those challenges
20 that were presented by Elberta Barnes. As you
21 recall, Miss Barnes' mother had passed away, and,
22 therefore, she was not available to participate in
23 the October 25th hearing. She is present today. The
24 hearing was rescheduled, and if you recall at the
25 last meeting, in addition to the Donna Bogue's

1 challenges, there were two of Miss Barnes' -- Mrs.
2 Barnes' challenges that were addressed based on
3 information presented to the staff. You will see on
4 the list that's listed as Exhibit A, which is a list
5 of all of Miss Barnes' challenges, the second one,
6 Gladys Curry, was addressed because the Board staff
7 had presented information within our voter records
8 that indicated that Miss Gladys Curry had, in fact --
9 that she is, in fact, deceased and that we received
10 information to that effect. And then the other was
11 No. 10 on the list, Michael Curtis, at 3455 First
12 Avenue, that we addressed that challenge at that time
13 because the Board staff did have information that he
14 had, in fact, relocated, and we received information
15 that he had a new address as of 8/17 of this year; so
16 those two of that -- of these 23 challenges were
17 addressed previously; so that remains -- now we have
18 21 challenges, and as I mentioned, Mrs. Barnes and
19 Mr. Joe Barnes are present and they are prepared to
20 present any information regarding the remaining
21 challenges.

22 Well, I should -- before I call them,
23 I'll ask Alicia Healy just to address -- there is one
24 other challenge. The Board staff did have some
25 additional information, and that relates to Colleen

1 Hisle --

2 MS. HEALY: Yes.

3 DIRECTOR LEONARD: -- which was No. 20
4 on your list.

5 MS. HEALY: And I think at the last
6 Board meeting we did mention that we had a National
7 Change of Address that went out February 17th of this
8 year, that the individual had moved to a new address
9 in Pennsylvania, but we did not receive a
10 confirmation stating that.

11 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So what's the upshot
12 on that one? We're talking about Colleen Hisle?

13 MS. HEALY: Yes.

14 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Based solely on that,
15 we're not in a position -- we can't take action
16 solely based on that information, but it's just to
17 inform the Board that staff did do additional inquiry
18 as to that -- into all of them, and as it relates to
19 Miss Hisle, that was the information that the staff
20 found relating to that.

21 So, with that, I guess if the Chairman
22 would like, we could call Mrs. Barnes to present any
23 information as it relates to each of the remaining
24 challenges.

25 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Yeah. I mean, let's

1 proceed the way we did at the last meeting.

2 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Yes.

3 Mrs. Barnes.

4 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Will you please state
5 your name and address for the court recorder.

6 MS. BARNES: Elberta L. Barnes, 3718
7 Second Avenue, Urbancrest, Ohio 43123.

8 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Welcome. Thanks for
9 coming.

10 MS. BARNES: Thank you for waiting.

11 MR. LECKLIDER: Mr. Chairman, she needs
12 to be sworn.

13 (Ms. Barnes was sworn.)

14 DIRECTOR LEONARD: And I guess I should
15 ask at the beginning, if at any point that Mr. Joe
16 Barnes is going to be testifying and, if so --

17 MS. BARNES: (Shook head negatively.)

18 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Okay. I just wanted
19 to make sure, because if that was the case, he might
20 as well be sworn in at the same time.

21 Thank you very much. Just go ahead and
22 do -- I don't know if you've been provided the same
23 list the Board is operating from.

24 MS. BARNES: Well, I have a copy of the
25 ones that I challenged, and that's what I have. I

1 don't know if I have a list with that, but --

2 DIRECTOR LEONARD: We can give her a
3 copy of Exhibit A so she is following in the same
4 order that the Board is following.

5 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: The first one is
6 John Wallace.

7 MS. BARNES: I want to say some things
8 before I start. Is that okay?

9 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Yes, you may.

10 MS. BARNES: Okay. I want to thank the
11 Board for their time and consideration for waiting on
12 me. I did want to be there, but you know the
13 circumstances, and I wanted to say that I've been a
14 resident there all my life, and I know that there's
15 been loopholes and different situations with the
16 voting in Urbancrest, and I position myself as a
17 Christian and -- in other words, I have to do what I
18 know is right. We all are family out there, and I
19 know that you guys probably have no way of knowing
20 what is -- who is doing whatever, and if no one
21 challenges it, it won't -- it cannot be corrected, so
22 that's all I'm here for, is just to get the books
23 updated and corrected and detur fraudulent activity
24 in the voting, and I say that because there was a
25 resident that voted right before me that I know lives

1 somewhere else, and he voted this time provisional.
2 He voted before in front of me, not this time, but
3 that's -- I just wanted to say why I am here. It's
4 not to criticize anyone, care about how the vote
5 went. It's just to do what's right, and that's one
6 thing that my mom often told me, Elberta, just do
7 what's right, no compromising, and God will do the
8 rest, so I have to do what's right.

9 MEMBER SINNOTT: Miss Barnes, why don't
10 you tell us what you know.

11 MS. BARNES: Okay. I'm done with that.

12 MEMBER MARINELLO: We appreciate it.
13 Thank you.

14 MS. BARNES: Thank you for listening.
15 As far as -- okay, John Wallace. This is a church.
16 This building is a church and -- the first one is a
17 church, and he does not live there, so...

18 MEMBER SINNOTT: 3567 First Avenue,
19 Grove City is a church?

20 MS. BARNES: Urbancrest, yes, uh-huh.

21 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: On that
22 particular challenge, I called -- actually, Mr.
23 Wallace called here because he received our letter
24 indicating that there was a challenge, and he
25 indicated that -- he told me he does live at the

1 church. He has another residence, but that's where
2 he gets his mail. That's where he lives. I asked at
3 the time, if I spoke to the pastor of the church,
4 would he confirm that you indeed live there, and he
5 said well, you're killing two birds with one stone
6 because I am the pastor, so -- that's just to
7 clarify, so I --

8 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Is he a pastor, do
9 you know?

10 MS. BARNES: Yes. He says he -- yes, he
11 is the pastor. He says he's a pastor, yes. I
12 can't -- I mean, I can't imagine him saying that.
13 Yes, he's a pastor. The reason is that -- I'm done.

14 MEMBER SINNOTT: Mr. Wallace is not here
15 today; correct?

16 (No response.)

17 MEMBER SINNOTT: But, David, you took a
18 phone call from Mr. Wallace?

19 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Right.

20 MEMBER SINNOTT: He was responding to a
21 mailed --

22 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: The letter.

23 MEMBER SINNOTT: -- notice that there
24 was a challenge to his residency?

25 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Correct.

1 MEMBER SINNOTT: And he told you that he
2 lived at the church?

3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: He said that he
4 spends most of his time and lives at the church. He
5 did acknowledge that he had another residence that
6 was not in Urbancrest, but that he considers the
7 church his home and that's where he resides.

8 MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay.

9 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Is it a functioning
10 church?

11 MS. BARNES: Yes. He has -- he rents
12 out -- he has very few members, but he rents it out
13 to different churches, and they never stay, so --
14 and then -- I mean, you know, it's set up as a
15 church. I don't see that there's anything to --

16 MEMBER SINNOTT: Why don't we -- why
17 don't we withhold disposition on Mr. Wallace until we
18 hear about the other cases. Okay.

19 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Under the
20 circumstances, I second that approach.

21 MEMBER SINNOTT: Miss Barnes, why don't
22 you -- why don't you go on down through the list.

23 MS. BARNES: Okay. Gladys Curry is
24 deceased.

25 Stephanie Larkins --

1 MEMBER SINNOTT: Pardon me. Let's pause
2 a minute. Do we have confirmation from staff that
3 Miss Curry is dead?

4 MS. BARNES: I do. I have it.

5 DIRECTOR LEONARD: And we resolved that
6 at the last meeting with the deceased documentation.

7 MEMBER SINNOTT: Very good. I was
8 asking. All right. Miss Larkins and the others.

9 MS. BARNES: Stephanie Larkins, that's
10 her parents' house. She doesn't live there.

11 Maurice Quinichett, that's his mother's
12 house. He doesn't live --

13 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I'm sorry to
14 interrupt. Director and Deputy Director and fellow
15 Members, how did we proceed through the list last
16 time and how do we digesting these one by one?
17 What's our approach here?

18 DIRECTOR LEONARD: The last time we did
19 go through one by one, and then there were some that
20 we were able to take as a group, but those who were
21 residing at the Extended Stay hotel, we were able to
22 take ten, I believe, ten challenged voters, and we
23 took those as a group. Aside from those, I believe
24 we addressed them one by one.

25 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Is that what we're

1 proposing to do here? Because if Mrs. Barnes goes
2 through this whole list -- what's our suggestion for
3 a plan of attack here? Let's go through --

4 MEMBER SINNOTT: It looks to me as
5 though we have two classes of people being
6 challenged, those who purportedly have moved or
7 otherwise don't live at the address at which they're
8 registered, and then we have a category of people who
9 purportedly are registered at vacant property.

10 What I would be interested in knowing is
11 how is it, Ms. Barnes, as to the people who you say
12 don't live where they're registered, how do you know
13 they don't live where they're registered?

14 MS. BARNES: Which one?

15 MEMBER SINNOTT: We're talking now -- if
16 you take a look at what we're calling Exhibit A,
17 everyone from Stephanie Larkins down to Steven Toles,
18 we're informed by this exhibit that the reason for
19 your challenge is that they have moved or they don't
20 live at their registered address.

21 MS. BARNES: Uh-huh.

22 MEMBER SINNOTT: How do you know that to
23 be true?

24 MS. BARNES: Because I live out there,
25 and there is -- there's only -- they're not there.

1 They're not there. They once lived there, and then
2 two of them is my property where my nephew lives, and
3 he no longer lives there, and I wanted his name off
4 the books so no one could use his name or do
5 anything. And then my other nephew, he has a house
6 built. My other little cousin, he has a house built.
7 I mean, some of them are family members. It didn't
8 matter whether they were or not. I just wanted it
9 cleared up so we won't be having problems. So I
10 don't know -- I have -- my addresses I can tell you.
11 They're not there any longer.

12 MEMBER SINNOTT: When you say your
13 addresses, these are properties --

14 MS. BARNES: Okay. They said --

15 MEMBER SINNOTT: Let me finish my
16 question to you and then you can speak.

17 MS. BARNES: Okay.

18 MEMBER SINNOTT: When you say "my"
19 properties, are you talking about properties that you
20 own?

21 MS. BARNES: Yes. I lived at --

22 MEMBER SINNOTT: Which ones would those
23 be?

24 MS. BARNES: Nathaniel Collins at 3742
25 Second Avenue.

1 MEMBER SINNOTT: Any others?

2 MS. BARNES: Forrest Nobleton, he's
3 not -- I don't know if he's on --

4 DIRECTOR LEONARD: He is on this list at
5 15.

6 MS. BARNES: Forrest Nobleton.

7 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Do you own that
8 property?

9 MS. BARNES: Yes.

10 DIRECTOR LEONARD: And for the sake of
11 the Members, I did confirm with the Auditor's website
12 that she does own both of those properties.

13 MEMBER SINNOTT: Are those the only two?

14 MS. BARNES: Yes.

15 MEMBER SEXTON: So these 16 or so,
16 you're saying that two of them --

17 MS. BARNES: I have two of them that
18 have homes that were bought on the Auditor's site --
19 I mean, they're living somewhere else.

20 MEMBER SEXTON: And that would be --

21 MS. BARNES: Those are family members
22 too, Michael Curtis and Maurice Quinichett.

23 MEMBER MARINELLO: What number is
24 Michael Curtis?

25 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: You're saying that

1 Michael Curtis and Maurice Quinichett are -- those
2 are not properties you own.

3 MS. BARNES: No.

4 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: You say that you've
5 noticed on the Auditor's website that they own --

6 MS. BARNES: I know that they own other
7 homes. They have moved out from their parents, and
8 they own a home.

9 MEMBER MARINELLO: That was resolved,
10 Michael Curtis, anyway.

11 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Right. Yes.

12 MS. BARNES: And Maurice Quinichett,
13 he's in the same scenario and he voted this time.

14 MEMBER SINNOTT: Did you say Mr.
15 Quinichett is a relative of yours?

16 MS. BARNES: Yes.

17 MEMBER SINNOTT: What blood relation is
18 he?

19 MS. BARNES: My mother that just passed,
20 she was a Quinichett.

21 MEMBER SINNOTT: Is that a cousin or a
22 nephew or --

23 MS. BARNES: Cousin.

24 MEMBER SINNOTT: That's a cousin.

25 DIRECTOR LEONARD: I did confirm the

1 fact that Mr. Quinichett does own a property in Grove
 2 City outside the boundaries of the Village of
 3 Urbancrest.

4 MEMBER SINNOTT: So as to these people
 5 who appear on Exhibit A as "moved" or "doesn't live
 6 there," we sent a letter to each one informing him or
 7 her that there was a challenge to their registration?

8 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Yes.

9 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: That is correct.

10 MEMBER SINNOTT: Did we receive a
 11 response from any of them?

12 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Suzanne.

13 MS. BROWN: No.

14 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Other than Mr.
 15 Wallace.

16 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Other than Mr.
 17 Wallace.

18 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Are those returned
 19 service letters?

20 MS. BROWN: Those are sent first-class
 21 mail.

22 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: They're sent
 23 first-class mail.

24 MS. BROWN: As required by statute.

25 DIRECTOR LEONARD: They would have been

1 sent the notice for the October 25th hearing, and
2 once that was postponed, they would have been sent a
3 second notice for this November 21st hearing.

4 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Well, do we want to
5 go through each of these? I don't know that an
6 individual description of I know this person has
7 moved, I know this person doesn't live here, in light
8 of anything further than we just heard --

9 Make a suggestion, Counselor.

10 MEMBER SINNOTT: Yeah. Well, first, to
11 the staff, do we have any precedent for the situation
12 where there is a challenge filed with the Board, the
13 Board sends notice to the challenged voter, the
14 challenged voter doesn't respond? How has the Board
15 disposed of those cases in the past?

16 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Suzanne, in the
17 letter it indicates that they do not need to come to
18 this hearing; correct?

19 MS. BROWN: The person being challenged?

20 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Yes.

21 MS. BROWN: There's a copy of the -- it
22 gives their rights to them.

23 DIRECTOR LEONARD: That they have the
24 right to appear before the Board and present evidence
25 to -- so the challenge can be denied, that they have

1 the right to testify or call or subpoena witnesses
2 and be represented by counsel, but they choose not to
3 be here either, so --

4 MEMBER SINNOTT: All right. So my
5 question is what have we done in the past where the
6 situation was a challenge, a letter notifying the
7 voter of the challenge, and no response from the
8 voter?

9 DIRECTOR LEONARD: I have very limited
10 foundation upon which to --

11 MEMBER SINNOTT: Anybody have a
12 recollection?

13 MS. BROWN: We have canceled voters in
14 the past and then we started red flagging them as
15 provisional voters if they -- instead of canceling
16 them, marking them as provisional voters if they
17 showed up to vote.

18 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Which is what we did
19 the last time.

20 MS. BROWN: Right.

21 DIRECTOR LEONARD: We just post the
22 challenges -- we flagged them, so that they voted
23 provisional at that address.

24 MS. BROWN: They would have to give
25 their new address.

1 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Right.

2 MS. BROWN: But we didn't cancel them.

3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Can I ask a
4 question? Just on sending them a letter?

5 DIRECTOR LEONARD: No. The only other
6 one we had -- in my time here that we did was Miss
7 Eichenberger, I believe it was, where she had the
8 documentation from the court. It was just within the
9 last few months, that she had documentation from the
10 court that said he doesn't live here anymore and he's
11 supposed to stay away from the marital residence, and
12 that's the only one I had, but based solely on a
13 letter not being responded to.

14 MEMBER SINNOTT: That was an appreciably
15 different situation.

16 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Exactly.

17 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Let me ask -- we
18 haven't resolved it, I think we're working at that
19 yet, but did you mention, Mrs. Barnes, that somebody
20 in this just past election voted, that you have on
21 the list here --

22 MS. BARNES: Yeah.

23 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: -- voted in
24 Urbancrest?

25 MS. BARNES: Yes. Maurice Quinichett,

1 and I don't know -- I did not have Vincent Wallace --

2 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Did not have what,
3 please?

4 MS BARNES: Vincent Wallace on the list,
5 but I do know that he voted at a residence that is
6 not his, and I have also Larry Starr and Leo Webb, I
7 have proof that the lady that lives in that house
8 now, her lease that states those two don't live
9 there.

10 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Did they vote?

11 MS. BARNES: I don't know. Like I have
12 said, some of them might have, but --

13 DIRECTOR LEONARD: No. I would like to
14 interject. The only two on this list of challenged
15 voters who did, in fact, challenge their right to
16 vote, as of the last meeting, the Board chose to
17 postpone the meeting until after the election. As a
18 result of that decision, all these challenged voters
19 that Mrs. Barnes has challenged were flagged to vote
20 provisional ballot. The only two that actually did
21 were Stephanie Larkins and Maurice Quinichett. All
22 the others did not cast their ballot.

23 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And did they -- they
24 voted provisionally where they would have voted based
25 on these addresses?

1 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Correct.

2 MEMBER MARINELLO: So wouldn't it be
3 just those two we need to deal with, because you're
4 not going to cancel --

5 DIRECTOR LEONARD: The others would
6 be -- I mean, we're not going to cancel them, but
7 we -- it would remain that they would remain flagged
8 for -- as provisional.

9 MEMBER MARINELLO: Yes.

10 DIRECTOR LEONARD: If the Board chooses
11 to uphold the challenge. If the Board chooses not to
12 uphold the challenge, the individuals wouldn't be
13 flagged anymore.

14 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: What's the
15 disposition of these two voters' ballots, Stephanie
16 Larkins and Maurice Quinichett?

17 DIRECTOR LEONARD: As to the challenge,
18 the Board will -- the staff would recommend that
19 those two provisional ballots get approved. They are
20 the amongst the group that the Board staff will
21 present shortly to be recommended for approval,
22 because they are, in all other respects, correctly
23 executed.

24 MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay. If I may, Ms.
25 Barnes --

1 MS. BARNES: Yes.

2 MEMBER SINNOTT: -- now you said
3 something interesting a moment ago. You said you had
4 some proof that two of the individuals on Exhibit A
5 don't live where they're registered to vote?

6 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I think you were
7 talking about Leo and Larry.

8 MS. BARNES: Yes.

9 MEMBER SINNOTT: What proof do you have?

10 MS. BARNES: The current tenant's rental
11 agreement, that live at that address.

12 MEMBER SINNOTT: So have you submitted
13 this to the Board before today?

14 MS. BARNES: No.

15 MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay. And what you're
16 saying is that you've obtained a copy of a lease that
17 shows that someone other than the registered voter
18 has a right to occupy the residence?

19 MS. BARNES: I have a copy of the lease
20 of the current renters -- renter, where the other two
21 that are on the book should not be listed there.
22 It's showing that they should not be listed there.
23 She could validate that, because they don't live with
24 her.

25 MEMBER SINNOTT: Is she here?

1 MS. BARNES: No. She just gave me this.

2 MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay. You have a
3 statement from her?

4 MS. BARNES: No, but --

5 MEMBER SINNOTT: Do you have any other
6 proof that speaks to these voters you've challenged,
7 the ones that "moved" or "doesn't live there"
8 category?

9 MS. BARNES: Stacy Shepherd, she has
10 lost her house and someone else is occupying it. I
11 have that.

12 MEMBER SINNOTT: What do you have?

13 MS. BARNES: Auditor's, and, see, what I
14 wanted to tell you, I live out there, so I know these
15 people.

16 MEMBER SINNOTT: I know that you have a
17 belief, and many times it's hard to articulate how it
18 is that you know what you believe you know, but it's
19 really what we're asking you.

20 MS. BARNES: I understand.

21 MEMBER SINNOTT: What proof do you have
22 that these people don't live where they say they
23 live?

24 MS. BARNES: I did not have time to get
25 statements from them and get it notarized for all

1 these. My main thing is -- because a lot of them
2 had -- didn't even vote. I just don't want them -- I
3 want them off the books if they're not there, the
4 ones that are gone. I did not put my mom down, but
5 she should be off the books now.

6 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: You were about to say
7 you had some evidence in the Stacy Shepherd
8 situation?

9 MS. BARNES: Yeah, because there is an
10 African family that lives in there now, and Stacy
11 lost the house, because they have that house, and the
12 Auditor's site showed that, that, you know, she had
13 it and now it's occupied by different owners, and
14 they're there.

15 DIRECTOR LEONARD: So you're indicating
16 a transfer record from --

17 MS. BARNES: Yes.

18 DIRECTOR LEONARD: -- the county
19 Auditor's office showing that Stacy Shepherd doesn't
20 own the property anymore.

21 MS. BARNES: Right.

22 MEMBER SINNOTT: Miss Barnes, maybe it
23 would make sense for you at this point to deliver to
24 the Board what documents you have that prove your
25 challenges, in your estimation. Could you do that?

1 MS. BARNES: You want to do it now or at
2 a later date?

3 MEMBER SINNOTT: Well, we need to do it
4 now.

5 MS. BARNES: Okay.

6 MEMBER SINNOTT: Because we're going to
7 decide this in some way.

8 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: How many such pieces
9 of proof or seeming proof do you have for each -- how
10 many different addresses do you believe you have some
11 evidence, some material evidence that somebody else
12 has the property?

13 MS. BARNES: Seven. I didn't know the
14 process, because I -- if they did not vote, I could
15 have done this at a later date just to get it cleaned
16 up, but I didn't know, if I challenged it, I wanted
17 to go on through with it, not to hold you up because
18 it's not a voting issue, just to clear up the books.

19 MEMBER SINNOTT: Why don't you bring
20 those things to me?

21 MS. BARNES: (Indicating.)

22 MEMBER SINNOTT: Thank you.

23 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Do you want to
24 verbally --

25 MEMBER SINNOTT: Not right now. I want

1 to see what she has.

2 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay.

3 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Mr. Chairman, are any
4 of those relating to Maurice Quinichett?

5 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Yes.

6 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Because I did print
7 out the information regarding the property he owned
8 in -- he owns in Grove City.

9 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I think that's what
10 she's got here as well.

11 DIRECTOR LEONARD: She's got that?
12 Because there's the one notation on it was that he's
13 receiving the two and a half percent owner-occupied
14 credit, which would be a reflection that he actually
15 is living there and receiving that owner-occupied
16 credit.

17 Mr. Chairman, I just wanted to point out
18 that if the Board chooses, it can deliberate in
19 private if it wants to. Because this is a
20 quasi-judicial proceeding, case law indicates that
21 the Board can convene in, I guess, executive session
22 for the purpose of deliberating.

23 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. Noted. Thank
24 you.

25 MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay. We'll finish

1 reviewing that, and we'll have it marked.

2 (Discussion off the record.)

3 MEMBER SEXTON: If I can just clarify
 4 what we've been given, I have a total of seven
 5 documents presented. The first one was Michael
 6 Curtis, which I believe has already been resolved.

7 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Correct.

8 MEMBER SEXTON: The second one was
 9 Samuel Hisle, but I don't see any information on who
 10 that was from. The third one was Stacy Shepherd with
 11 information from the Franklin County Auditor. The
 12 fourth one was John Wallace, with information from
 13 the Franklin County Auditor. Larry Starr,
 14 information on a lease agreement was provided.
 15 Gladys Curry, with a Certificate of Death, and I
 16 think that one has already been resolved; correct?

17 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Right, that has been
 18 resolved.

19 MEMBER SEXTON: And Maurice Quinichett,
 20 which there is information from the Franklin County
 21 Auditor. So it's correct what we've been given.

22 MEMBER SINNOTT: Why don't we give the
 23 exhibits that Miss Barnes presented over to the court
 24 reporter so that she can mark them.

25 Mike, you counted seven of them?

1 MEMBER SEXTON: Yes.

2 MEMBER SINNOTT: We'll mark them.

3 MEMBER SEXTON: Two of which have
4 already -- two of which have already been revolved by
5 the Board.

6 (EXHIBITS 1-7 MARKED FOR
7 IDENTIFICATION.)

8 MEMBER SINNOTT: Miss Barnes, you own
9 the property located at 3742 Second Avenue, Grove
10 City; correct?

11 MS. BARNES: Uh-huh.

12 MEMBER SINNOTT: You need to answer for
13 the Board.

14 MS. BARNES: Yes, yes. I'm sorry.

15 MEMBER SINNOTT: You're telling us that
16 Nathaniel Collins does not reside at the property you
17 own at 3742 Second Avenue?

18 MS. BARNES: Correct.

19 MEMBER SINNOTT: He owns the property at
20 3361 Central Avenue, Grove City?

21 MS. BARNES: Uh-huh.

22 MEMBER SINNOTT: Is that --

23 MS. BARNES: Yes.

24 MEMBER SINNOTT: And you are informing
25 us that Forrest Nobleton does not reside at the

1 property you own at 3361 Central Avenue; correct?

2 MS. BARNES: Correct.

3 MEMBER SINNOTT: In light of that
4 testimony and the fact that both Mr. Collins and Mr.
5 Nobleton were sent notices of today's hearing at the
6 addresses at which they are registered and did not
7 respond, I move to uphold the challenge made to
8 Nathaniel Collins and Forrest Nobleton by Elberta
9 Barnes.

10 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
11 second?

12 MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.

13 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
14 favor signify by saying aye.

15 (Vote taken.)

16 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
17 same sign.

18 (No response.)

19 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

20 MEMBER SINNOTT: And staff, help us out
21 here. There is a -- we can assign a provisional-only
22 status to voters in response to a challenge; correct?

23 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: At this point,
24 yes.

25 MS. HEALY: You can cancel. In this

1 particular case, she has said that they don't live
2 there. She owns the property.

3 MEMBER SINNOTT: That's not my question.
4 We can assign a voter to a status where the voter can
5 vote only provisional; correct?

6 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Yes, we can.

7 MEMBER SINNOTT: And what is the proper
8 term for that?

9 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Just a flag.

10 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Flagging them as
11 provisional.

12 MEMBER SINNOTT: Flagging is not the
13 statutory term, but --

14 DIRECTOR LEONARD: The statutory term --
15 the statute only provides for a cancellation. The
16 instruction that we had some conversation with the
17 secretary -- the counsel for the Secretary of State's
18 office is that with -- that flagging them to vote
19 provisional would be an acceptable resolution for the
20 challenge, because to do so otherwise would result in
21 a person being canceled who might otherwise have been
22 legitimately able to vote a provisional ballot
23 elsewhere.

24 MEMBER SINNOTT: So if the Board
25 instructs that somebody is to be permitted to vote

1 only provisionally because of uncertainty about the
2 correctness of the registered address, that is the
3 instruction that we can implement? We can carry that
4 out; correct?

5 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Yes.

6 MEMBER SINNOTT: With the exception of
7 John Wallace and Gladys Curry and Maurice Quinichett,
8 Michael Curtis, Nathaniel Collins, and Forrest
9 Nobleton, I move that all others appearing on Exhibit
10 A be assigned the provisional-only status.

11 MEMBER MARINELLO: I'll second that.

12 MEMBER SINNOTT: All right.

13 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
14 second?

15 MEMBER SINNOTT: Yes.

16 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Okay. All those
17 in favor signify by saying aye.

18 (Vote taken.)

19 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
20 same sign.

21 (No response.)

22 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

23 MEMBER SINNOTT: While we're still on
24 the subject, is it completely clear to staff?

25 DIRECTOR LEONARD: It is John Wallace,

1 Gladys Curry --

2 MEMBER SINNOTT: Excluded from Exhibit
3 A, John Wallace, Gladys Curry, Maurice Quinichett,
4 Michael Curtis, Nathaniel Collins, and Forrest
5 Nobleton. So the motion related to all others
6 appearing on Exhibit A, and the instruction was to
7 move all of those voters to a provisional-only
8 status. Is that instruction sufficiently clear so
9 that the Board staff can follow it going forward?

10 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Yes.

11 MEMBER SINNOTT: That's what we wanted
12 to do; right?

13 MEMBER SEXTON: Yes.

14 MEMBER SINNOTT: Now I have struck
15 through Michael Curtis and Maurice Quinichett because
16 I believe there has been a resolution of those prior
17 to today; correct?

18 DIRECTOR LEONARD: I'm sorry?

19 MEMBER SINNOTT: Michael Curtis and
20 Maurice Quinichett, we've already achieved a
21 resolution to those two matters?

22 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Not Quinichett,
23 but Gladys Curry.

24 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Michael Curtis was
25 resolved at the previous Board hearing. Maurice

1 Quinichett still remains unresolved based on the two
2 resolutions the Board passed so far.

3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And Gladys Curry
4 was resolved.

5 MEMBER SINNOTT: Gladys Curry. Okay.
6 And we have taken care of by earlier action Nobleton
7 and Collins.

8 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Right.

9 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Right. So I think
10 the only one that you flagged that hasn't been taken
11 care of is Maurice Quinichett.

12 MEMBER SINNOTT: Quinichett.

13 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And, Ed, you said
14 that Maurice Quinichett did vote provisionally in
15 this past election?

16 DIRECTOR LEONARD: That is correct.

17 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: At this address?

18 DIRECTOR LEONARD: At this address.

19 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And so did one other
20 person.

21 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Correct, Stephanie
22 Larkins.

23 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Stephanie Larkins.
24 And you're saying that unless this challenge today is
25 upheld in the cases of Stephanie Larkins and Maurice

1 Quinichett, those provisional ballots would be
2 counted?

3 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Correct.

4 MEMBER SINNOTT: Ed, did you say you had
5 additional information about Maurice Quinichett?

6 MEMBER MARINELLO: I think the Auditor's
7 report was attached to --

8 DIRECTOR LEONARD: I believe the
9 Auditor's report was attached to what was submitted
10 by Miss Barnes.

11 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: That shows he owns a
12 property other than this?

13 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Correct. And on that
14 record from the Auditor's report it should reflect
15 that he is receiving the owner-occupied credit, the
16 two and a half percent rollback for those who own and
17 occupy their residence. He is, in fact, receiving
18 that credit.

19 MEMBER SINNOTT: You're a former county
20 treasurer, so you're telling us that he would have to
21 reside at a piece of property in order to receive the
22 tax credit that the Auditor's records show he is
23 receiving?

24 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Correct, and to do so
25 you would either not register as -- the property as a

1 rental, essentially holding yourself out as being the
2 owner and occupier of that property.

3 MEMBER SINNOTT: Well, that strikes me
4 as good evidence that he's living somewhere else.

5 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: It does to me, too.

6 MEMBER SINNOTT: I move to uphold the
7 challenge to Maurice Quinichett.

8 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
9 second?

10 MEMBER SEXTON: Second.

11 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
12 favor signify by saying aye.

13 (Vote taken.)

14 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
15 same sign.

16 (No response.)

17 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

18 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And in the case of
19 Stephanie Larkins, who voted provisionally from the
20 address here, 3606 Central Avenue, I don't recall on
21 the sheet -- the documents that we had any evidence
22 there.

23 MS. BARNES: Uh-uh.

24 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And, again, Mrs.
25 Barnes, you say she doesn't live there because you

1 know that how again?

2 MS. BARNES: Because I live out there
3 and I go by the house. She is my little cousin. I
4 know she has an apartment somewhere else, but, you
5 know, I don't have that address or anything.

6 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Is somebody living in
7 that property?

8 MS. BARNES: Yeah. Her parents.

9 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Her parents are
10 living in that property. This is going to be an
11 interesting Thanksgiving for you.

12 MS. BARNES: They're all going to be
13 okay. I just want to do the right thing.

14 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Well, under these --
15 I'm sorry.

16 MEMBER SINNOTT: No. Please.

17 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Under these
18 circumstances, Director and Deputy Director, we have
19 somebody who has voted provisionally, and because the
20 record had been flagged previously, so we would
21 normally -- the Board would normally confirm this
22 voter's address as a provisional voter; is that
23 right?

24 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Right, but by virtue
25 of the directive we are limited in the information

1 that we can consider for purposes of verifying a
2 voter's residence, for purposes of validating or
3 invalidating a voter's provisional ballot. We are
4 limited by directive to the records that the Board
5 has.

6 MEMBER SINNOTT: When she showed up to
7 vote, didn't she have to produce some sort of proof
8 of residence? I know I do.

9 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Voting provisional,
10 she would have had to simply write down her driver's
11 license number or the last four digits of her Social
12 Security number, would have been the identifying
13 information.

14 MEMBER SINNOTT: Nobody asked to see her
15 driver's license or any other form of identification?

16 MS. HEALY: Not if she voted a
17 provisional, no.

18 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Well, indeed, if you
19 showed up and didn't have identification, you would
20 be caused to vote provisional.

21 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Correct.

22 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So in this case she
23 was already flagged, but --

24 MS. HEALY: If the information on the
25 provisional matches what we have in the system,

1 then --

2 DIRECTOR LEONARD: We're not permitted
3 to search the BMV records to see where she has a
4 driver's license. We're not permitted to look at
5 other documentation outside of voter registration for
6 purposes of validating or invalidating a provisional.

7 MEMBER MARINELLO: So her parents live
8 there, you say?

9 MS. BARNES: Yes.

10 MEMBER SINNOTT: Well, knowing no
11 more -- really what we're -- are we going to count
12 that provisional ballot cast in 2017. Knowing no
13 more than we know right now, I'm inclined to do that.

14 MEMBER MARINELLO: I think we have to.

15 MEMBER SINNOTT: Do you need a separate
16 instruction on -- we already included her in the
17 provisional flagging.

18 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Correct. Based on
19 that -- based on that decision relating to this
20 challenge in which the Board --

21 MEMBER SINNOTT: I think you need our
22 instruction on whether to count her provisional
23 ballot, right, as it was cast in November 2017?

24 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Right.

25 MEMBER SINNOTT: I move that the

1 provisional ballot cast by Stephanie Larkins be
2 counted as to the November 2017 General Election.

3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
4 second?

5 MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.

6 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
7 favor signify by saying aye.

8 (Vote taken.)

9 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
10 same sign.

11 (No response.)

12 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

13 MEMBER SINNOTT: Does that take us
14 through all of the challenges with the exception of
15 Mr. Wallace?

16 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I think it does.

17 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: As it relates to
18 Elberta Barnes it does, right.

19 MEMBER MARINELLO: Do we have to deny
20 the challenge on Stephanie?

21 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: No. We just voted to
22 count it.

23 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Which would be
24 denying the challenge, provided the sufficient
25 information.

1 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Right. I think we
2 resolved all of these except for one, which is Mr.
3 Wallace, and we've been told that Mr. Wallace is
4 here.

5 And, Mr. Wallace, welcome. Mrs. Barnes
6 has informed us or suggested to the Board that you
7 may not be living where we're told you say you're
8 living. If you would like to address the Board, we
9 would -- we would welcome that. You'd have to come
10 over to the --

11 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Or he can sit
12 right here.

13 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: If you'd prefer to
14 sit, you can sit up front, but our court reporter
15 would like to get your name and address for the
16 record as well as us swear you in.

17 MR. WALLACE: All right.

18 (Mr. Wallace was sworn.)

19 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And would you state
20 your name and address for the record, please.

21 MR. WALLACE: John H. Wallace. I live
22 in Columbus, but I'm at the church more just as much
23 as I'm home, 773 South Kellner Road, Columbus, Ohio
24 43209.

25 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. Well, Mr.

1 Wallace, the Board's been told that you -- that you
2 don't live at the church, and we just asked you to
3 state your address, and you stated the address of a
4 home that you own and it is not the church.

5 MR. WALLACE: Right.

6 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So it sounds like you
7 live at that house and not the church.

8 MR. WALLACE: Well, I'm at the church
9 just as much as I'm home. I pay my gas and
10 electricity and my Y membership at the church, so I
11 consider myself -- I don't stay there all the time,
12 but I do stay there. As I said, I stay at the
13 Columbus address more than I do at the church, but I
14 still -- I actually live at the church. The church
15 is not -- not actually having services right now, so
16 I'm in the process of doing -- staying at the church
17 permanently, but I didn't find out about the
18 challenge, so I've been voting in Urbancrest. I'm
19 out there just as much as I'm in Columbus, so, to me,
20 that's -- I'm not physically there 24/7, but I'm
21 there a lot, so when I was -- when I found out I was
22 challenged, my residence was challenged, that's why
23 I'm at the meeting. I feel like I do live in
24 Urbancrest.

25 MEMBER SINNOTT: Mr. Wallace, where do

1 you spend the night?

2 MR. WALLACE: In Columbus.

3 MEMBER SINNOTT: I think what you're
4 telling us is that you're very devoted to the church
5 and you do a lot of work at the church.

6 MR. WALLACE: Yeah, and I stay there,
7 too, on occasion, maybe on weekends. I'm not
8 constantly -- I'm not there 24/7.

9 MEMBER SINNOTT: Occasionally you will
10 overnight at the church?

11 MR. WALLACE: Yes.

12 MEMBER SINNOTT: It's sounds as though
13 it's much more common for you to overnight at the
14 house in Columbus, though.

15 MR. WALLACE: Right. I didn't know the
16 law is you couldn't have two residences. I didn't
17 know that.

18 MEMBER SINNOTT: Do you receive mail at
19 home?

20 MR. WALLACE: At home and at the church.
21 Like I said, my gas -- I got my water, gas bill,
22 electricity bill at the church. I have receipts.

23 MEMBER MARINELLO: The gas bill is in
24 your name at the church?

25 MR. WALLACE: And electricity, yes.

1 MEMBER SINNOTT: Where do you keep your
2 clothes?

3 MR. WALLACE: At -- at the home, and I
4 got clothes at church. I got it two places. You
5 know, it's not -- to me not to consider residency,
6 well, this is the first time I've been challenged on
7 my home. I'm a lifelong resident of Urbancrest. I
8 stay in Columbus, but I spend a lot of time, the
9 majority of the time at the church.

10 MEMBER SINNOTT: When you get your
11 driver's license --

12 MR. WALLACE: My license is Columbus,
13 but, you know, I didn't know what -- I didn't know I
14 would get challenged. I mean, you know, I can have a
15 license -- if that's going to prove I'm a resident, I
16 can get my license changed, no problem, but since
17 I've been in Columbus and I stay at the church just
18 as much, so --

19 MEMBER SINNOTT: During the course of a
20 month, on average how many nights do you spend in
21 Columbus?

22 MR. WALLACE: I have been spending a
23 whole lot of time there -- not recently. I actually
24 was staying at the church. For the first part of the
25 year I was at the church 24/7, the first part of this

1 year, but since I moved in with my brother, we
2 have -- we share a duplex, so I would say it's half
3 and half and -- half and half, so I didn't -- my
4 question is, are you allowed to have two residences?
5 If I have two residence -- I mean, I don't know if
6 this is a movie star phase, but I know people who
7 have residency in New York. Because if they're an
8 actor, they have a residency in New York, they have
9 residency in California, say California. Is there a
10 law against having two residencies or what? I
11 mean --

12 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Well, what --

13 MR. WALLACE: What proves that -- do
14 your license prove that you got a -- you got two
15 residencies or the fact that you stay there?

16 MEMBER SINNOTT: Well, we're kind of
17 looking for the common sense indicators as to where
18 your residence is. What's the place you live in the
19 morning and have an expectation of returning to at
20 night?

21 MR. WALLACE: Right now I'm both.

22 MEMBER SINNOTT: But a moment ago you
23 said rather matter-of-factly you spend most of your
24 nights in Columbus. Is that correct?

25 MR. WALLACE: Now. Now I do, yes, but I

1 have stayed there overnight a number of times the
2 first part of this year.

3 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Remind us of the code
4 or the definition of residency.

5 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Definition of
6 residency.

7 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: For voting purposes.

8 DIRECTOR LEONARD: I don't have that off
9 the top of my head.

10 MS. HEALY: You have to be at the
11 residence 30 days before the election. You have to
12 be registered 30 days before the election at your
13 residence.

14 MEMBER SINNOTT: The question is what is
15 a residence.

16 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Where you intend to
17 return is what I recall somewhere. Is that not --

18 MR. MANIFOLD: "Under Ohio law, your
19 residence is...the location" -- "(1) the location
20 that you consider to be permanent, not a temporary,
21 residence and (2) the place where your habitation is
22 fixed and where, whenever you are absent, you intend
23 to return."

24 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Tell the court
25 reporter who you are and what you just read.

1 MR. MANIFOLD: Zach Manifold, Absentee
2 Voting Manager. That's from the Secretary of State's
3 office on, "Where is my residence for voting
4 purposes?" Well, there's more details through the
5 actual Revised Code Section 3503.02, Residence
6 Determination Rules.

7 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Mr. Wallace, I'm not
8 aware of any prohibition that anybody can have more
9 than one place that they own and even spend some time
10 at, but we're instructed by the code and by precedent
11 that most people have a principal residence which is
12 usually their voting residence as well.

13 MR. WALLACE: Up to this -- up to now, I
14 voted there last year. I mean, if I was living --
15 nothing has changed. I was living and vote there
16 last year and this year because of this challenge, so
17 what's the difference between last time I voted and
18 this time?

19 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: You did suggest to us
20 something changed, and that's that you spend most of
21 your time at your Columbus residence.

22 MR. WALLACE: Yeah, but I -- I stay at
23 one residence. I stayed at my -- in Columbus. I
24 stay at the church. So what you all are saying is
25 unless I can prove I stay at the church 24/7, which

1 that's not -- no problem, but if I gotta stay out at
2 Urbancrest to vote, then I'll stay at Urbancrest. It
3 don't make no difference, but right now most of my
4 time I'm living in Columbus.

5 MEMBER SINNOTT: Well, this is how I see
6 it, I think Mr. Wallace is telling us that there's a
7 structure in Urbancrest and a structure in Columbus,
8 and he has the opportunity to come and go at each one
9 as he chooses.

10 MR. WALLACE: Right.

11 MEMBER SINNOTT: But he did tell us that
12 these days he spends most of his nights at the
13 structure in Columbus, and that strikes me as being
14 the most important piece of evidence on the question
15 of what is his residence; so as to the challenge to
16 his residence at the 3567 First Avenue property, I
17 move that we sustain, that we uphold the challenge.

18 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
19 second?

20 MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.

21 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
22 favor signify by saying aye.

23 (Vote taken.)

24 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
25 same sign.

1 (No response.)

2 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

3 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Mr. Wallace, thank
4 you for coming in. I think if you intend to vote in
5 Urbancrest in the future, you need to live there.

6 MR. WALLACE: Okay.

7 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Otherwise, vote at
8 the other address.

9 MR. WALLACE: Say I move to the church,
10 which I'm thinking about doing anyway, then what do I
11 do, go back and do this again, if I start living
12 at -- actually living at the church 24/7?

13 MEMBER MARINELLO: Are you allowed to
14 live in a church?

15 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Yes.

16 MEMBER MARINELLO: I mean, do you have a
17 statement of occupancy or something like that?

18 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Correct me, staff, or
19 instruct us, we have not canceled Mr. Wallace's
20 registration at the church address. We have merely
21 upheld the challenge for this election alone.

22 MEMBER SINNOTT: No. I think we just
23 voted to -- we just voted to decide that he's not
24 living in Urbancrest, so he can't be registered to
25 vote there. If his circumstances change, if you are

1 spending most nights, for example, at the church, no
2 longer the house in Columbus, then you can change
3 your voting residence on the basis of what's true
4 about your life going forward.

5 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: My question is, is
6 Mr. Wallace now, after we acted, still registered at
7 3567 First Avenue or not?

8 MEMBER SINNOTT: He's not.

9 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: He's not?

10 MEMBER SINNOTT: He's not.

11 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So you just have to
12 reregister.

13 MEMBER SEXTON: Correct. So what you
14 could do right now, in our estimation, you could
15 register at the Columbus address. If your life
16 circumstances of what's happening in the real world
17 changes and you're spending most nights at the church
18 in Urbancrest, then it would be proper for you to
19 register to vote at that address going forward, but
20 only after your life circumstances, what's happening
21 in the real world, changes.

22 MR. WALLACE: I understand.

23 MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay.

24 MR. WALLACE: So once I start staying
25 there at the church, then I can get -- I have to be

1 registered.

2 MEMBER SINNOTT: I think that's the
3 logic of the situation, Mr. Wallace. That's right.

4 MR. WALLACE: All right.

5 MEMBER SINNOTT: If you can come to the
6 Board and say truthfully I spend most of my nights
7 there and that's where I keep my clothes and when I
8 get up in the morning, my plan is to go to my home in
9 the church, that would signal that you're properly
10 registered to vote in Urbancrest.

11 MR. WALLACE: All right.

12 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: He wouldn't need
13 to come to the Board to do that. If he reregistered
14 at Urbancrest, he wouldn't need to come to the Board
15 to do that, unless he's challenged; right?

16 MEMBER SINNOTT: Well, you have to
17 communicate that to --

18 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: When you say
19 "the Board," you don't mean --

20 MEMBER SINNOTT: We just decided -- we
21 canceled his registration at 3567 First Avenue, Grove
22 City.

23 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Correct.

24 MEMBER SINNOTT: So something is going
25 to have to happen in the future if he is, in fact, in

1 residence at 3567 First Avenue to get him
2 reregistered at that address.

3 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Right. He would have
4 to take some action to reregister. It doesn't
5 require him to come back to the Board.

6 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: To come to the
7 Board.

8 MEMBER SINNOTT: Come to the Board, I
9 was speaking --

10 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I just wanted to
11 make sure he is clear, that he does not have to come
12 back.

13 MR. WALLACE: So I don't need to come
14 back to reregister? Say tomorrow the church is my
15 address, what do I do in order to vote next time?

16 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Just submit a
17 registration form, which we can give you. You can
18 walk out the door with it, although unless your
19 circumstances change, you should register at your
20 Columbus address, because that's where you told us
21 you're principally living right now.

22 MEMBER SINNOTT: The reality of your
23 life needs to change first and -- it's really no
24 different than moving from one house to another.
25 After you move from one house to another, you tell

1 the Board, and there are many different ways by which
2 you can do that, but you tell the Board that you
3 moved and your new residence is the new house, and if
4 you are going to move, in our estimation, from your
5 current residence in Columbus to the residence at the
6 church, after you have made that move and you're
7 really living at the church, you will need to tell
8 the Board that that's true, because we want all
9 voters voting from where they really live.

10 MR. WALLACE: All right. Okay.

11 MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay. Thank you, Mr.
12 Wallace. We appreciate you coming.

13 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Thank you for coming.
14 And, thank you, Mrs. Barnes.

15 MEMBER SINNOTT: Yes.

16 MS. BARNES: I have one question. To
17 further correct the books, what is the procedure
18 going forward? What do I need to do? I know I did
19 this at a late state prior to the voting, but I did
20 leave out a lot of different ones, more that needs to
21 be corrected, but I know I could not do that at the
22 hearing now because they weren't submitted. Like my
23 mother, for one, you know, I wanted to see how --
24 what I would do to get her name off.

25 MEMBER SINNOTT: Miss Barnes, I think in

1 the interest of time, it makes sense for you to get
2 in touch with the Board staff --

3 MS. BARNES: Okay.

4 MEMBER SINNOTT: -- and talk to the
5 Board staff about what evidence is useful to the
6 Board about what registered voters are properly
7 identified at their address. That is, if you want to
8 say -- you want to prove to us that somebody is not
9 living where he's voting, what evidence would be
10 useful to us, and that's a good conversation to have
11 with staff. It's probably not a good conversation to
12 have in an open Board meeting in the interest of
13 time.

14 MS. BARNES: Well, I just want to know
15 the procedure. You know, do I contact you? Do I --
16 what do I do?

17 MEMBER SINNOTT: Contact the Board of
18 Elections, call the Board, stop by the Board, e-mail
19 the Board and say I have these questions, and someone
20 on the Board staff will help you.

21 MS. BARNES: That's what I need to know.
22 Thank you.

23 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Thank you, Mrs
24 Barnes.

25 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Board Members, there

1 is one last challenge that is unrelated to the
2 challenges presented by Mrs. Barnes, and that is a
3 challenge presented by John Worley. He is a Dublin
4 resident who challenged the voter registration of a
5 Matthew Nolan Ray as being -- I believe you have that
6 in front of you -- as being registered at the address
7 at which Mr. Worley lives, 6258 Wexford Woods Drive,
8 Dublin. On his challenge form he indicates that he's
9 been receiving mail from the Board of Elections and
10 from the Ohio Department of Motor Vehicles that is
11 addressed to Mr. Nolan and that he states that Mr.
12 Nolan doesn't reside at that residence.

13 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: What's this -- the
14 last page of the John Worley challenge document?

15 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Miss Healy, Alicia
16 Healy can speak to that. That would be the Licking
17 County --

18 MS. HEALY: So it appears that the voter
19 lived in Licking County.

20 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So this -- explain
21 this document, Alicia.

22 MS. HEALY: So it's a merged record, so
23 if there's a merged record, the reason why the record
24 is merged is because the information that we put into
25 our system matches the information that's in Licking

1 County; so it was a duplicate record. So once those
2 records are duplicate, we have to determine that if
3 this person is here, if those five matching factors,
4 with the name, with the date of birth, with the
5 social or the driver's license, if that matches, it
6 will duplicate, and then that record will be merged
7 to us from that other county.

8 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Is this Licking
9 County Board of Elections' information we're looking
10 at on the right side of this document?

11 MS. HEALY: Yes.

12 MEMBER SEXTON: So is it correct to say
13 that this person, Mr. Nolan, registered -- it says
14 here he registered on 10/3/2017?

15 MS. HEALY: Yes.

16 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: That center column
17 that is being referenced, is that Licking County
18 registration information?

19 MS. HEALY: No. In the middle is what
20 we have.

21 MEMBER SEXTON: The middle is Franklin
22 County, and the far right is Licking County?

23 MS. HEALY: Yes. I'm not the duplicate
24 person, but I'm quite sure that what's on the right
25 side is what the factors that match what we have

1 on -- in the middle.

2 MEMBER SINNOTT: Well, now that's weird,
3 if that's true, because we're showing a registration
4 date of October 3 of 2017?

5 MS. HEALY: Yes. That's when he
6 registered.

7 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: At what address?

8 MS. HEALY: At the Wexford address.

9 MS. BROWN: I think it's a BMW
10 registration.

11 MS. HEALY: Yes. This came from the
12 Secretary of State's office.

13 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And then -- okay.
14 Then his new registration matched BMW, Social
15 Security number, name, et cetera, in the Licking
16 County record, and so it was -- it popped up as a
17 possible duplicate.

18 MS. HEALY: Yes.

19 MS. BROWN: What you have there is not
20 unusual.

21 DIRECTOR LEONARD: I'm sorry?

22 MS. BROWN: That's not unusual.

23 MEMBER SINNOTT: I'm having a hard time
24 figuring out what Mr. Ray did in the real world.

25 This registration date of 10/3/17, which we

1 understand to be for the Dublin address, what do we
2 think that is?

3 MS. HEALY: This record here, we think
4 this came from the BMV. Is that what you're asking?

5 MEMBER SINNOTT: No.

6 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: What do we have on
7 file here? If he registered at the BMV, doesn't --
8 don't they forward us the record?

9 MS. GORUP: We get an electronic record.

10 MS. HEALY: Something that you don't see
11 that we see, I just made a copy of it, but you can
12 pass that around. That's how we can determine how we
13 got that voter registration, because you can now
14 register online. So if he did that update online,
15 that's how we would receive it, to indicate to us how
16 that person registered.

17 MEMBER SINNOTT: We have a sworn
18 statement from John Worley saying he lives at 6258
19 Wexford Woods Drive and this fellow named Matthew
20 Nolan Ray does not.

21 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Is this a sworn
22 statement?

23 MEMBER SINNOTT: It's made under penalty
24 of election falsification. So we have also received,
25 we believe from the Bureau of Motor Vehicles, a

1 report that as of October 3, 2017, Mr. Ray was
2 reporting that his address was 6258 Wexford Woods
3 Drive.

4 DIRECTOR LEONARD: That's what I need
5 clarification of.

6 MEMBER SINNOTT: Yeah. Right. This is
7 confounding.

8 DIRECTOR LEONARD: And this is not a
9 challenge that we need to address in order to move
10 forward. We can come back to this this afternoon and
11 allow staff to get some clarification on the
12 information that you have so that we can make sure --
13 this individual did not vote. There's no provisional
14 that pertains to them. It wouldn't affect us if we
15 were to move on to other business and return to this
16 challenge this afternoon when we return for the
17 remaining business of the day.

18 MS. HEALY: Can I add also, sometimes
19 when we receive something from the BMV, it's a
20 possibility that some information might have been
21 transposed. We don't know if the address was -- the
22 number was transposed. We have had issues with that
23 from the BMV in the past.

24 MEMBER SINNOTT: Yeah. I don't know how
25 to resolve this, so...

1 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I think that Mr. Ray
2 was sent the notice of this meeting at the Dublin
3 address.

4 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Right.

5 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Well, let's pass on
6 it.

7 MEMBER MARINELLO: Okay.

8 MEMBER SINNOTT: You can figure that
9 out.

10 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Uh-huh.

11 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: What's next?

12 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We'll try to
13 figure that out by this afternoon.

14 All right. The next item on the agenda
15 is provisional ballots for consideration, and I'll
16 turn that over to Alicia and Amie. I'll start out by
17 saying the documents you want to look at is the
18 General 2017 Provisional Ballot Report. Now, there
19 is -- there is going to be a change such that the
20 3,206 provisional ballots that we're looking at
21 remains the same. However, the approved -- if you
22 remember, when we just did the Quinichett, that goes
23 from approved to reject; so the real number of
24 approved is now 2,827.

25 MEMBER SINNOTT: Uh-huh.

1 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And the reject
2 is 345, because of the Quinichett.

3 MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay.

4 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: That went from
5 approved to reject.

6 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: What about the case
7 of Mr. Wallace?

8 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: He didn't vote,
9 so that's not a --

10 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Oh, he didn't vote?

11 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: He didn't vote.

12 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay.

13 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: There were two
14 that voted. One was Stephanie Larkins, and one was
15 Maurice Quinichett. Stephanie Larkins continues to
16 be approved, and Maurice Quinichett went from
17 approved to reject, so that's why the numbers
18 changed.

19 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay.

20 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Alicia.

21 MS. HEALY: Okay. So we have -- the
22 2,828, it will be 2,827 that's approved, and 345
23 that's rejected. So we have 34 for Board review.

24 DIRECTOR LEONARD: And the documents
25 that you have, Exhibit B, outlines the categories for

1 why they would be approved and then also, in red,
 2 those categories that will be rejected.

3 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. Do we need
 4 further explanation or clarification? Who has it?

5 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Are you going to
 6 go through these?

7 MS. HEALY: We have to get the approval.

8 MEMBER SEXTON: We do the approval and
 9 then we go through the -- Mr. Chairman, I move that
 10 the Board approve the counting of the 2,827
 11 provisional ballots and rejection of 345 provisional
 12 ballots as identified in Exhibit B and that all
 13 provisional ballots deemed valid will be counted and
 14 included in the official canvass results for the
 15 November 7, 2017, General Election.

16 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

17 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
 18 favor signify by saying aye.

19 (Vote taken.)

20 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
 21 same sign.

22 (No response.)

23 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

24 MEMBER SINNOTT: And I move that the
 25 Board authorize the staff to extract the approved

1 provisional ballots.

2 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
3 second?

4 MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.

5 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
6 favor signify by saying aye.

7 (Vote taken.)

8 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
9 same sign.

10 (No response.)

11 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

12 And the remaking of?

13 MS. HEALY: 81, a remake of 81.

14 MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay.

15 MEMBER MARINELLO: I move that the Board
16 authorize the staff to remake 81 provisional ballots
17 and that these remade ballots shall be tabulated and
18 included in the official canvass of the results for
19 the November 7, 2017, General Election, with a report
20 to be made to the Board later today at 3:00 p.m.

21 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

22 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
23 favor signify by saying aye.

24 (Vote taken.)

25 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,

1 same sign.

2 (No response.)

3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

4 MS. HEALY: Are we ready to go over the
5 Board review?

6 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Yes.

7 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Board Members, there
8 are -- the number again is 34?

9 MS. HEALY: Yes.

10 DIRECTOR LEONARD: For Board review.

11 MS. HEALY: So the first 16 that you're
12 going to take a look at are the date of birth.

13 MEMBER SINNOTT: Okay. Help us out
14 here, Alicia. You say date of birth.

15 DIRECTOR LEONARD: By -- as required for
16 part of the provisional ballot process is that the
17 voter must put a birth date in the space provided for
18 the birth date. It is one of the required fields.
19 According to Directive 2016-38 provided by the
20 Secretary of State's office, for consideration of
21 provisional ballots of the General Election of 2016,
22 we were given direction that as long as the voter
23 places any information that purports to be a birth
24 date, that the Board -- the Board has to accept that,
25 but it does state in the -- that it's -- that the

1 Board must make a decision about it. It's not
2 something that staff can do.

3 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So that directive --

4 DIRECTOR LEONARD: If there's some
5 information in the birth date field that purports to
6 be a birth date --

7 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: We have to examine it
8 and we have to --

9 DIRECTOR LEONARD: And you have to
10 accept it. If they leave it blank, it's rejected.
11 If they put something in it that purports to be a
12 birth date, then the Board has to accept that. Now,
13 if it's deficient in other respects, then -- but if
14 they do put something in that purports to be a birth
15 date.

16 MEMBER SINNOTT: I think you're also
17 saying that in the case of all these people, other
18 information that they have provided checks out in
19 terms of who they purport to be?

20 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Correct.

21 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: These are just birth
22 date questions?

23 MS. HEALY: Yes.

24 DIRECTOR LEONARD: But per the
25 directive, it has to come to the Board's

1 consideration.

2 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Right. Do you want
3 to look at those or --

4 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: How many were
5 there, Alicia?

6 MS. HEALY: Sixteen.

7 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: There were 16
8 there?

9 MS. HEALY: Yes.

10 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: You're not going
11 to find that on there. We would just need a motion
12 to accept those. We could wait until the end, until
13 she does all of them, or take these --

14 MEMBER SINNOTT: We'll wait and look at
15 them.

16 DIRECTOR LEONARD: And these are the one
17 instance where the voter has only placed the year and
18 the day -- or the month and the day, it purports to
19 be a birth date. They left out the year.

20 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's a number.

21 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: It looks like the
22 Board's -- all Board Members have examined these 16.

23 MEMBER SINNOTT: I move that as to the
24 16 provisional ballots having error only as to the
25 date of birth, that those ballots be counted.

1 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
2 favor signify by saying aye.

3 (Vote taken.)

4 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
5 same sign.

6 (No response.)

7 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

8 DIRECTOR LEONARD: I don't believe you
9 asked for a second.

10 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I'm sorry. Was
11 there a second?

12 MEMBER SINNOTT: I assumed that we were
13 going to count them.

14 MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.

15 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All right.
16 There's a second. All those in favor signify by
17 saying aye.

18 (Vote taken.)

19 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
20 same sign.

21 (No response.)

22 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

23 MS. HEALY: For the next voter, his name
24 is John, but he wrote Giovanni on his form, and in
25 2010 he did request an absentee ballot, and he also

1 used the same name that he used on the provisional
2 this time.

3 MEMBER SINNOTT: Everything else checks
4 out?

5 MS. HEALY: Yes, but based on the
6 signatures, the name does not match what we have on
7 file.

8 MEMBER MARINELLO: It does match?

9 MS. HEALY: It does not. The last part
10 of it does, but we don't know if John and Giovanni is
11 Italian. Is that --

12 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Yes, that is John in
13 Italian.

14 MS. HEALY: Okay.

15 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And so we -- what's
16 the question on this one, whether --

17 MS. HEALY: Accept it.

18 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I move that -- I
19 would move that we accept the provisional ballot of
20 Giovanni Dipaolo.

21 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
22 second?

23 MEMBER SEXTON: Second.

24 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
25 favor signify by saying aye.

1 (Vote taken.)

2 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
3 same sign.

4 (No response.)

5 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

6 Are you explaining the Williams ballot?

7 MS. HEALY: Yes. So if you notice,
8 Louise Williams, on the driver's license, it appeared
9 that she wrote her full Social, with the last four
10 being the Social got matched on the system, but then
11 if you see in the Social she wrote a different number
12 for her Social, but that number does not match the
13 Social that we have on file.

14 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: With the difference
15 being --

16 MS. HEALY: It matches under the
17 driver's license, because if you look at the driver's
18 license number, that is not an Ohio driver's license
19 number.

20 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: She wrote in her
21 Social Security number.

22 MS. HEALY: It appears that she wrote in
23 her Social, but then if you look down where she wrote
24 in the Social, the number that she wrote -- well, she
25 wrote it correctly. Then she crossed it out, and

1 then she wrote it incorrectly, but everything else on
 2 the provisional envelope matches.

3 MEMBER SINNOTT: Do we have instructions
 4 from the Secretary's office about --

5 DIRECTOR LEONARD: I think it's in terms
 6 of the person wrote it -- the right information in
 7 the wrong spot, but it's there. It's sufficient to
 8 identify the voter as the correct voter.

9 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Was that Lois or
 10 Louise?

11 MS. HEALY: Louise.

12 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Louise.

13 MEMBER SINNOTT: I move that we count
 14 the provisional ballot of Louise Williams.

15 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
 16 second?

17 MEMBER SEXTON: I'll second.

18 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
 19 favor signify by saying aye.

20 (Vote taken.)

21 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
 22 same sign.

23 (No response.)

24 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

25 MS. HEALY: So the next provisional we

1 have, that you have before you is Peter Alexander
2 Lauterbach. His wife earlier that day voted on the
3 machine under his name. He then later came in and
4 voted a provisional. If you look at the notes there,
5 the poll worker, if you read the notes that's on the
6 provisional form that the poll worker wrote -- the
7 VLM of that LID wrote what happened, and also on the
8 top of the corrections pages they said exactly what
9 happened. So we're trying to determine should we
10 count the provisional for Peter Alexander and then
11 the machine vote to give credit to his spouse,
12 Allison Gail.

13 MEMBER MARINELLO: But she came in to
14 vote for him, not for himself?

15 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: It says on here it
16 appears that it's our staff's mistake. You can read
17 the -- you can read the notes.

18 MS. HEALY: But we also have a copy of a
19 signature that was done on the poll pad and also the
20 signature that we have from Mrs. Gail in 2016, how
21 she signed it, and it doesn't match, so that's an
22 aside there.

23 MEMBER SINNOTT: When you say it doesn't
24 match, you mean it doesn't look the same to you?

25 MS. HEALY: Yes. And I'm not sure,

1 because it's on the poll pad, possibly it wouldn't
2 be -- look the same anyway.

3 DIRECTOR LEONARD: But you do have
4 information from the voting location manager to
5 indicate that --

6 MS. HEALY: It happened.

7 DIRECTOR LEONARD: -- what had happened,
8 that the wife came in earlier, accidentally voted,
9 and signed the poll pad for her husband's entry.

10 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So she wrote it and
11 her vote was counted?

12 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: For him.

13 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: It showed that he
14 voted. It was really she.

15 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Right.

16 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And this is his
17 provisional ballot.

18 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Later in the day he
19 came in and voted. They made him vote provisionally.

20 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Because he had
21 already voted, quote-unquote.

22 MS. GORUP: If I may, this is -- when we
23 had a paper poll book -- I mean, that's a common
24 problem, where the husband and wife will sign on the
25 wrong line, and there's a procedure that -- or

1 there's an operating procedure that they were
2 supposed to follow with the paper poll book, make a
3 correction to indicate that. However, they weren't
4 aware of how to do that with the electronic poll book
5 to make that correction to show that the wife had
6 voted, not the husband.

7 MEMBER SINNOTT: I do think that the
8 electronic poll books make it difficult to sign your
9 signature in the real world the way they're presented
10 to the voter.

11 MEMBER SEXTON: That could be right.

12 MEMBER SINNOTT: I move that we count
13 the provisional ballot of Peter Lauterbach.

14 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
15 second?

16 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

17 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
18 favor signify by saying aye.

19 (Vote taken.)

20 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
21 same sign.

22 (No response.)

23 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

24 MEMBER SINNOTT: Friends, I have to
25 leave to make an argument in Richland County. I'm

1 going to leave you. No doubt the Board will be able
2 to achieve consensus on all other matters coming
3 before it. I'll check in with you soon, though.

4 MS. HEALY: For the next one that you're
5 going to --

6 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Have a good
7 Thanksgiving.

8 MEMBER SINNOTT: Thank you. You all do
9 the same.

10 MEMBER SEXTON: Safe traveling out
11 there.

12 MEMBER SINNOTT: Fortunately there's no
13 snow and there can be this time of year.

14 (Mr. Sinnott leaves the meeting.)

15 MS. HEALY: So the next situation that
16 we have is election night the poll worker received a
17 loose ballot with an envelope, so the ballot was not
18 put inside the envelope, but at the end of the night
19 the poll worker basically just put the ballot and the
20 envelope inside the blue bag, so when we received it
21 here, it was not put in the bag, but the good thing
22 is that that was the only provisional for that
23 particular LID, so we do recommend that we count it.

24 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: That's Mr.
25 D'Onofrio.

1 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I move that the Board
2 count the ballot for Mark D'Onofrio.

3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
4 second?

5 MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.

6 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All in favor
7 signify by saying aye.

8 (Vote taken.)

9 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
10 same sign.

11 (No response.)

12 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

13 MS. HEALY: So we have a similar
14 situation, but in this particular one there's six
15 loose ballots and six envelopes. The good thing
16 about that is that they all voted the same ballot
17 style, 714.

18 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And the
19 recommendation by the staff is to count these?

20 MS. HEALY: Yes.

21 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Because the
22 provisionals in all other respects are valid for
23 approval. All the requisite information is contained
24 on them. Simply the ballot was not placed in the
25 right -- not placed in the envelope, and they're all

1 the same ballot style; so, therefore, no reason not
2 to.

3 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: What are we calling
4 this set? How many are there?

5 MS. HEALY: There are six, 21 through
6 26.

7 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Call it set of
8 six.

9 DIRECTOR LEONARD: It may be beneficial
10 to read the names of each of those for purposes of
11 the record.

12 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Okay.

13 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I move that we count
14 the ballots of six voters about to be named by the
15 Deputy Director.

16 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: McMillian, last
17 name Elmore, another -- well, the first name on that
18 one was Kenyatta, another Elmore, first name Rasheed,
19 Traci Cooke, Cindy Elmore, and Timothy Carpenter.

20 MEMBER SEXTON: I'll second.

21 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
22 favor signify by saying aye.

23 (Vote taken.)

24 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
25 same sign.

1 (No response.)

2 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

3 MS. HEALY: For the next one you're
4 going to receive there are two loose ballots, but in
5 this particular case the poll worker gave 422 to
6 vote -- the voters, but one of the voters, Faith
7 Maupin, was in the wrong location, so her ballot
8 wouldn't count, but because Kay Nagahara had the same
9 ballot style, we don't know which one belonged to her
10 and which one belonged to Faith Maupin. So we
11 recommend that neither ballot be counted but that
12 credit would be given to Nagahara.

13 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Credit for
14 voting.

15 MS. HEALY: For voting.

16 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: But the vote
17 itself would not count.

18 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Because you can't
19 tell which is which?

20 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Can't tell,
21 that's correct.

22 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay.

23 MS. HEALY: That should be 27 and 28.

24 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Twenty-eight,
25 and we're doing 34.

1 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: What are the numbers
2 of these two?

3 MS. HEALY: Twenty-seven and 28.

4 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Should we read the
5 names again? I'll move that the Board not count the
6 ballots of the about-to-be-mentioned voters.

7 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Maupin and
8 Nagahara.

9 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: But that voter
10 Nagahara is given credit for having voted in the most
11 recent election.

12 MEMBER SEXTON: Second.

13 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
14 favor signify by saying aye.

15 (Vote taken.)

16 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And all opposed,
17 same sign.

18 (No response.)

19 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

20 MS. HEALY: So the next voter you have
21 is Robert Ashbrook. The signature doesn't match, but
22 he is in a nursing facility. We know by the address
23 that's on the provisional envelope. We're not sure,
24 you know, if he had a stroke, but the signature
25 doesn't match, but all the other information does

1 match.

2 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Yeah. It looks like
3 there's an effort.

4 MEMBER MARINELLO: Yeah.

5 MS. HEALY: If you turn it over, you can
6 see what his signature looked like before.

7 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: But the key
8 piece of information there is that that vote was
9 taken in a nursing home.

10 MEMBER MARINELLO: Yeah.

11 MEMBER SEXTON: I would move that we
12 count the vote of Robert Ashbrook.

13 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
14 second?

15 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

16 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All in favor
17 signify by saying aye.

18 (Vote taken.)

19 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
20 same sign.

21 (No response.)

22 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

23 MS. HEALY: So the next person you have,
24 Jerri Ann Hill, wrote her name in cursive where it
25 says to print.

1 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: You mean up at the
2 top?

3 MS. HEALY: Yes.

4 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Do you have the
5 directive -- do we have what the directive says?

6 DIRECTOR LEONARD: The directive
7 indicates that it must be printed, and that's -- that
8 might be brought to your attention because --

9 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We think the
10 intent, although it is to print so that you can read
11 the name, the question is if you can read the name
12 when it's in cursive, is that good enough. However,
13 the directive, as the Director said, if it is not
14 printed --

15 DIRECTOR LEONARD: No. It just simply
16 says that it must be printed and with a valid
17 signature and --

18 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Yeah, it must be
19 printed.

20 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Are we going to
21 adhere to that strict standard that it must be
22 printed versus the intent behind the print
23 requirement was that the signature can't be
24 written -- or it can't be written out where you
25 have --

1 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's not
2 legible.

3 DIRECTOR LEONARD: -- illegible, thank
4 you, that the printed name will give you guidance as
5 to who signed the envelope.

6 MS. HEALY: So we have -- I'll just go
7 ahead and give you these three more that are similar.
8 So Ann Brown, William Dalton, and Dale Cox.

9 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: So those are all
10 the same, where they were all cursive?

11 MS. HEALY: Yes.

12 DIRECTOR LEONARD: In all other respects
13 the provisional ballot is a valid provisional ballot.

14 MEMBER SEXTON: Okay. I would move that
15 we count these ballots of Jerri Ann Hill, Annie M.
16 Brown, William F. Dalton, Jr., and Dale E. Cox.

17 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

18 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
19 favor signify by saying aye.

20 (Vote taken.)

21 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
22 same sign.

23 (No response.)

24 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.
25 If my addition is correct, we should have one more.

1 MS. HEALY: Yes. The last person we
2 have Theresa Fellows. Her signature does not match
3 what we have on file. She actually printed the
4 signature. She had a name change, which would have
5 been okay, but the signature that she signed was
6 printed as opposed to her signature. It doesn't
7 match what we have on file.

8 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: That's more printed.
9 This looks --

10 MS. HEALY: And on the back you can see
11 the signature there.

12 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: That's a printed A
13 and the last name -- so there's -- there's two
14 questions here; is that right? The signature --

15 MS. HEALY: Doesn't match.

16 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: -- in part doesn't
17 match and there's --

18 MS. HEALY: And it's printed.

19 DIRECTOR LEONARD: If the signature had
20 been signed in cursive and everything appeared
21 identical except for the last name, would we have
22 counted that?

23 MS. HEALY: Yes.

24 DIRECTOR LEONARD: So really the only
25 question then becomes is that a signature or is that

1 printed.

2 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: It doesn't match.

3 MS. HEALY: But everything else on it
4 matches.

5 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Yes.

6 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Under the
7 circumstances of a name change, what do we do
8 normally?

9 MS. HEALY: The signature has to match
10 what the person printed at the top of the provisional
11 envelope, so if the name matched what they signed as
12 an update to their name change, then we would accept
13 it.

14 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: How did this one
15 become provisional in the first place? What was
16 the --

17 MS. HEALY: Her name, the name change.

18 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So when she went to
19 vote, she said my -- she signed a different name.

20 MEMBER SEXTON: And if you look at it,
21 some of these are -- it looks to me to be connecting
22 (indicating).

23 MEMBER MARINELLO: It's cursive.

24 MEMBER SEXTON: It's cursive.

25 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I see what you mean.

1 DIRECTOR LEONARD: But the reason she
2 would have voted provisional essentially is she
3 presented herself with that name when the poll pad
4 had her listed under her maiden name.

5 MS. HEALY: She didn't have the proper
6 documentation to vote on the machine, so a marriage
7 certificate --

8 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Because it was a
9 different name?

10 MS. HEALY: Yes.

11 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And everything else
12 matches?

13 MS. HEALY: Yes.

14 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Well, I'm satisfied
15 that she tried to do the right thing, so I would move
16 that we count the ballot of Theresa A. Fellows.

17 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
18 second?

19 MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.

20 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
21 favor signify by saying aye.

22 (Vote taken.)

23 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
24 same sign.

25 (No response.)

1 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.
2 So if my addition is correct, out of those 34 we had
3 32 that were good and two that were bad that we would
4 not count. We already did the provisional ballots
5 for consideration, so I guess what I would look for
6 would be a motion to count 32 and to reject two on
7 top of the motion that we already made earlier.

8 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Now, the Board did,
9 as it related to each one, as we went through --

10 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: We already did it.

11 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Okay.

12 DIRECTOR LEONARD: So that motion --

13 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Okay. So we
14 don't need a number. Okay. All right. Very good.
15 The remaking of absentee ballots.

16 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I'm going to ask for
17 a 60 second pause.

18 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: So granted.

19 (Recess taken.)

20 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It appears that
21 we have everybody back. The next item is the
22 remaking of absentee ballots. I'll call on Zach and
23 Gene.

24 MR. MANIFOLD: Good afternoon. We
25 actually have four ballots that we need to remake.

1 One of them came back in what they call a USPF body
2 bag. It got beat up pretty bad on the way.

3 MR. SHELL: They apologized for it.

4 MR. MANIFOLD: We need to remake that.
5 Another one got mangled pretty bad. I'll pass these
6 around. This one, the front actually shifted. It's
7 further over here. Our tabulator won't run if it
8 shifts like that. Then we have one more. I don't
9 know that you'll necessarily want to open this and
10 look at it. It's covered in some sort of substance.
11 We think it's animal substance, but you probably
12 don't want to touch it.

13 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Are you recommending
14 that these be counted?

15 MR. MANIFOLD: These four all need to be
16 remade, so we'll have the --

17 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Was it a malicious
18 act or an accident?

19 MR. MANIFOLD: No. Well --

20 MR. SHELL: A cat urinated on the --

21 MR. MANIFOLD: Yeah, we believe it's cat
22 urine, is what we think it is.

23 MEMBER MARINELLO: Who is going to make
24 sure?

25 MR. SHELL: It was cat for sure. Well,

1 I'm the one that got it out.

2 MR. MANIFOLD: He's the one that pulled
3 it out.

4 MR. SHELL: Then I'm the one who put it
5 into the white envelope to cut down on the smell,
6 because when we got it, it was still kind of wet, so
7 I isolated it in a white envelope. His ID envelope
8 is all -- his or her identification envelope is still
9 in the envelope, so you may not want to look in there
10 to see what the name is. You don't want to with all
11 that substance on it.

12 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: What are we calling
13 this set, absentee remakes?

14 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Absentee
15 remakes.

16 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Is there a motion?

17 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Yes.

18 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I move that the Board
19 authorize the staff to remake four absentee paper
20 ballots and that these remade ballots shall be
21 tabulated and included in the official canvass of the
22 results for the November 7th, 2017, General Election,
23 with a report to be made to the Board later today at
24 3:00 p.m.

25 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a

1 second?

2 MEMBER SEXTON: Second.

3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
4 favor signify by saying aye.

5 (Vote taken.)

6 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
7 same sign.

8 (No response.)

9 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.
10 Then I believe there were ten absentee
11 ballots that require the Board's action on voter
12 intent.

13 MR. MANIFOLD: Yes. So we have ten
14 ballots. We wrote the race on here, Gene will point
15 it out to you, on each -- on each ballot which races
16 we need some clarification on.

17 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: They're listed
18 as one through ten.

19 MR. MANIFOLD: The first one, the first
20 ballot is -- the first race on that ballot, the Muny
21 Court judge, there's an unclear mark there.

22 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Can we address these
23 one by one?

24 MR. MANIFOLD: I think so.

25 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. Then how do we

1 identify -- I don't know about by voters, but we can
2 say --

3 MR. MANIFOLD: They're marked.

4 MEMBER MARINELLO: I move that the Board
5 count the vote in question for Andrea Peeples on
6 Exhibit 1.

7 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
8 second?

9 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

10 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
11 favor signify by saying aye.

12 (Vote taken.)

13 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
14 same sign.

15 (No response.)

16 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

17 MR. SHELL: The second one would be the
18 city attorney race.

19 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I move that the
20 ballot identified as No. 2 reflect that the voter
21 voted for Zach Klein in the Columbus City Attorney
22 race.

23 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
24 second?

25 MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.

1 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
2 favor signify by saying aye.

3 (Vote taken.)

4 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
5 same sign.

6 (No response.)

7 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

8 MR. SHELL: No. 3 is the city council
9 race.

10 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: This was the case
11 where they vote for --

12 MEMBER MARINELLO: Three.

13 MEMBER SEXTON: They vote for three
14 here; right?

15 MR. SHELL: Uh-huh.

16 MEMBER MARINELLO: She initialed it.

17 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: All right.

18 MEMBER MARINELLO: I move that the
19 Board, on Exhibit 3, members of council being Jasmine
20 Ayres, Shannon Hardin, Priscilla Tyson.

21 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

22 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
23 favor signify by saying aye.

24 (Vote taken.)

25 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,

1 same sign.

2 (No response.)

3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

4 DIRECTOR LEONARD: If we could, for the
5 sake of the court reporter, make sure that we're
6 speaking loudly enough.

7 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Who was the last
8 candidate on that? I had Ayres, Hardin and --

9 MEMBER SEXTON: Tyson.

10 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Multiple races.

11 MR. SHELL: This one, you see here,
12 here, and we're not sure there, where they're trying
13 to indicate -- the same way with that one. That
14 looks good on the back (indicating).

15 MEMBER MARINELLO: It looks like they
16 were doing it a little bit lower than the circles.

17 MEMBER SEXTON: This one is --

18 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Hard to tell. This
19 one is hard to tell, too.

20 MEMBER MARINELLO: I don't know, putting
21 the X there helped a little (indicating).

22 MEMBER SEXTON: It's clear. That one
23 is --

24 (Discussion off the record.)

25 DIRECTOR LEONARD: You want to --

1 regarding the ballot for each contest? We don't need
2 a motion for each contest, just a motion as it
3 relates to Ballot No. 4 and the contest you've
4 identified.

5 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Right. I think let
6 me make this motion and see if my colleagues agree.
7 On Ballot No. 4 the voter -- the vote would reflect a
8 no vote in judge of Municipal Court term commencing
9 1/1/2018, a vote for Cindi Morehart in Municipal
10 Court commencing 1/2/2018, a vote for Jodi Thomas for
11 Municipal Court, term ending 12/31/2019, and votes
12 for Kieran Cartharn, Shannon Hardin, and Will Petrik,
13 Columbus City Council.

14 Do you think these need to be addressed
15 (indicating)?

16 MR. SHELL: No.

17 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: What about this one
18 (indicating)?

19 MR. SHELL: Yes.

20 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And finally a vote
21 yes in Columbus issue -- or on Issue 1.

22 And you think this is okay?

23 MR. SHELL: Yes.

24 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And that was in
25 the form of a motion. Is there a second?

1 MEMBER SEXTON: Second.

2 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
3 favor signify by saying aye.

4 (Vote taken.)

5 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
6 same sign.

7 (No response.)

8 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

9 MR. SHELL: City council race.

10 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Did I ask, does the
11 staff have all that?

12 MR. MANIFOLD: Yes.

13 MEMBER SEXTON: I would move that in
14 Exhibit 5 we count the votes for Will Petrik, Jasmine
15 Ayres, and Mitchell Brown.

16 MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.

17 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
18 properly moved and seconded. All those in favor
19 signify by saying aye.

20 (Vote taken.)

21 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
22 same sign.

23 (No response.)

24 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

25 MR. SHELL: Issue 2 is the question on

1 that one.

2 MEMBER SEXTON: I move in Exhibit 6 that
3 there will be no votes cast on Issue 2.

4 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

5 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
6 favor signify by saying aye.

7 (Vote taken.)

8 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
9 same sign.

10 (No response.)

11 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

12 MR. SHELL: This one is Issue 4
13 (indicating).

14 MEMBER MARINELLO: I move that the
15 Board, regarding No. 7, be counted as for the tax
16 levy on Issue 4.

17 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

18 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
19 favor signify by saying aye.

20 (Vote taken.)

21 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
22 same sign.

23 (No response.)

24 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

25 May I ask a question on six? Was that a no vote or a

1 no votes.

2 MEMBER MARINELLO: Zero votes.

3 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Zero votes cast.

4 MR. MANIFOLD: No votes cast.

5 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: No votes cast.

6 All right.

7 MR. SHELL: Upper Arlington council
8 race, they cut -- they circled the bubbles, but as
9 you see on the other ones, they did not fill them in.

10 MEMBER SEXTON: Is this just on Upper
11 Arlington?

12 MR. SHELL: Yes, sir.

13 MEMBER SEXTON: I would move that on
14 Exhibit 8, in the City of Upper Arlington for members
15 of council, votes be cast for Michelle M. Hoyle, Jim
16 Lynch, and Brian Close.

17 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

18 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
19 favor signify by saying aye.

20 (Vote taken.)

21 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
22 same sign.

23 (No response.)

24 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

25 MR. SHELL: Municipal judge, here is

1 what they did, but they also have checks there and
 2 there that color the bubbles (indicating).

3 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: On Ballot No. 9 I
 4 vote -- I mean, I move that no vote be counted in
 5 Municipal Court judge race term commencing 1/1/2018.

6 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
 7 second?

8 MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.

9 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
 10 favor signify by saying aye.

11 (Vote taken.)

12 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
 13 same sign.

14 (No response.)

15 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

16 MR. SHELL: And the last one is -- it
 17 should be on the back. We're not quite sure where
 18 they were headed on that one.

19 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: What about these
 20 (indicating)?

21 MEMBER MARINELLO: He's gone over all
 22 the names.

23 MR. SHELL: I think those we can
 24 associate with the bubble there, and that one is out
 25 in no man's land, really out there.

1 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay.

2 MEMBER SEXTON: On Exhibit 10 I would
3 move on Issue 1 that no votes be counted.

4 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
5 second?

6 MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.

7 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
8 favor signify by saying aye.

9 (Vote taken.)

10 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
11 same sign.

12 (No response.)

13 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

14 MR. SHELL: That's our ten.

15 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Thank you. I do want
16 to address, before we move onto the next item on the
17 agenda, I confirmed with counsel, legal counsel, we
18 were addressing the question of whether or not a copy
19 of the ballot that you just examined, whether a copy
20 of that ballot should be made part of the record for
21 purposes of -- I don't know if you've ever done it
22 before, but if somebody were to question your
23 determination about voter intent, I don't know
24 whether that's reviewable, but -- I mean, it doesn't
25 indicate any one particular voter's vote, but it does

1 indicate the intent -- I mean, if it would become
2 part of the record. I don't know -- I don't know if
3 we've done it before.

4 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I don't recall doing
5 it before. Well, what's your recommendation?

6 MR. LECKLIDER: A copy be made.

7 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: A copy. Okay.

8 MR. LECKLIDER: It doesn't reflect the
9 voter's identity.

10 DIRECTOR LEONARD: It doesn't reflect
11 the voter's identity, but if -- say it were a close
12 race in a particular area and one of the ballots that
13 was counted was a ballot that was a voter intent
14 issue and somebody wanted to challenge it and say
15 wait a minute, that challenges your determination of
16 voter intent. Again, I get to the question of I
17 don't know if that's a -- if that is a reviewable
18 decision or if the court would reverse -- if a court
19 would reverse your decision as to voter intent and
20 say no, based on our determination, the Board got it
21 wrong, this is voter's intent --

22 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Well, I agree with
23 you. Let's just -- we'll keep a copy.

24 MR. MANIFOLD: We'll make copies. Okay.

25 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Jus make a copy of

1 that before you --

2 MR. MANIFOLD: Make copies before they
3 go into the -- okay.

4 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: The next item
5 before we recess is holiday hours. In the past the
6 Board has seen fit to give four days off during the
7 period of Christmas and New Year's, a few days
8 before, a few days after. Because we have a
9 potential election in the 12th Congressional
10 District, we have thought that we probably ought to
11 be here, everybody should be here outside of January
12 5th, so the recommendation, if you see fit, would be
13 to allow employees to take four days off of their
14 choosing between December 18th and Friday, January
15 5th, and that has been a past practice.

16 MEMBER MARINELLO: I move that the
17 Franklin County Board of Elections authorize each
18 full-time employee 32 hours, four days, of personal
19 leave to be used by the employees anytime between
20 Monday, December 18th, 2017, and Friday, January 5,
21 2018.

22 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

23 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
24 favor signify by saying aye.

25 (Vote taken.)

1 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
2 same sign.

3 (No response.)

4 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

5 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I move that the Board
6 recess until --

7 DIRECTOR LEONARD: My suggestion was to
8 whether we can consider returning at 4:00 rather than
9 3:00, because of the fact that we anticipated -- and
10 that was Carla Patton that just came in to ask.

11 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Oh, because of the
12 delay of processing?

13 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Exactly. It took us
14 a little longer than anticipated to complete this
15 session.

16 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: What do we think
17 the time -- how much time are we going to spend at
18 four?

19 DIRECTOR LEONARD: We had anticipated
20 three hours and we would have finished at noon and
21 been able to convene at 3:00.

22 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: On the back
23 side, how long will it take?

24 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Oh, how long will it
25 take?

1 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It shouldn't be
2 very long.

3 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Yeah, it shouldn't be
4 very long at all, as long as we don't have any voter
5 intent issues.

6 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: What time is
7 your thing?

8 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I have a 5:00. I can
9 move it. If you think we'll get it done about a half
10 an hour, I'm okay.

11 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Okay. You want to
12 show up on at 3:45? And if everything is ready at
13 3:45, we can get started.

14 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay.

15 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Since we're in recess
16 of the 10:00 meeting, it's not an issue of notifying
17 the public of a meeting. We're still in our 10:00 --
18 10:30 meeting.

19 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Then I will alter the
20 motion and move that the Board be in recess until
21 3:45 p.m. today.

22 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
23 second?

24 MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.

25 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in

1 favor signify by saying aye.

2 (Vote taken.)

3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
4 same sign.

5 (No response.)

6 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We're in hearing
7 recess.

8 - - -

9 (Recessed at 1:05 p.m.)

10 - - -

11 (Reconvened at 4:25 p.m.)

12 - - -

13 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Let the record
14 show that we have returned from recess, and I believe
15 Robert's Rules of Order does not require me to take
16 roll. However, I will make a note that Board Members
17 Marinello, Sexton, and Preisse are here.

18 The first order of business is to have
19 an absentee ballot remake and a provisional ballot
20 remake report from Zach Manifold.

21 MR. MANIFOLD: All right. So we didn't
22 have any more absentee remakes. Everything was good
23 on that. Everything that we remade from earlier, we
24 were -- everything worked great. We had 221 total
25 absentee ballots that came in after election day that

1 was marked good or absentee deficiency letters that
2 were returned to correct ballots that were on hold,
3 so the absentee number was 221, just so you know
4 that, and then we had 40 of those 81 that you
5 authorized us to remake. Once we opened the ballot
6 and matched it up, most of them -- most of them did
7 have the correct ballots on them. So we had 40
8 remakes on the provisional, and everything is
9 included in the final count.

10 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Any questions
11 for Zach?

12 If not, we'll move to the certification
13 of the November 7th General Election results. Carla
14 Patton.

15 MS. PATTON: You have in front of you a
16 paper-clipped packet with the results of the official
17 canvass on top. We canvassed a total of 202,510
18 votes. On the back of that report you will find the
19 write-in report of the certified candidates who
20 received votes for the election and the actual number
21 of certified votes they received. So all election
22 day paper, i-votes, absentee paper in house and
23 provisional were included in the report. To clarify,
24 these are only the Franklin County numbers. They do
25 not include any votes from the overlapping counties,

1 for the races that overlap in other counties.

2 DIRECTOR LEONARD: With that, you've
3 been presented all the information that the Board
4 needs in order to certify the results of the November
5 7, 2017, election.

6 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: If and when you
7 are ready, I would entertain a motion to accept
8 the -- we are calling this Exhibit C?

9 MS. PATTON: Exhibit C.

10 MEMBER SEXTON: Chairman, I move that
11 the Board certify and declare as final the official
12 canvass of votes cast at the November 7th General
13 Election as identified in Exhibit C and submitted by
14 staff.

15 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
16 second?

17 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

18 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
19 favor signify by saying aye.

20 (Vote taken.)

21 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
22 same sign.

23 (No response.)

24 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: The motion
25 carries.

1 In anticipation of possible recounts in
2 three races, we have the Reynoldsburg City Council,
3 Reynoldsburg School Board, and Canal Winchester City
4 Council races. We are still waiting to hear -- in
5 the instance of Reynoldsburg City Council and
6 Reynoldsburg School Board, we're waiting to hear from
7 Fairfield County and Licking County. In the case of
8 Canal Winchester City Council, we're waiting to hear
9 from Fairfield County, but we are anticipating
10 recounts, so what we'd like to do in anticipation is
11 draw the precincts in advance so that we don't have
12 to call you back for a meeting to do that.

13 So I'll turn the meeting over to Jeff,
14 and we'll start with Reynoldsburg City Council. If
15 you want to explain what you're doing.

16 MR. MACKEY: I have here tickets that
17 say -- for Reynoldsburg City Council, and since I
18 have three different ones, I want to make sure I
19 got all the right tickets, stay with the right group,
20 so in the case of Reynoldsburg City Council, and it
21 will have the written number on it.

22 DIRECTOR LEONARD: For the purpose of
23 notifying each of the candidates that are involved in
24 the recount and canvass wanted to observe the process
25 and make sure that it is, in fact, random, you are

1 allowed to do so.

2 MR. MACKEY: It includes all the
3 different LIDs in Reynoldsburg in here, so if you
4 decide who would like to draw the LID for us.

5 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: One of the Board
6 Members I think probably should do that.

7 MEMBER MARINELLO: I'll do it.

8 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: She's never gotten it
9 wrong yet.

10 MEMBER MARINELLO: That's right.

11 MR. MACKEY: 1,201. To get us to five
12 percent --

13 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We're going to
14 get up to five percent, and at that point we stop; is
15 that correct?

16 MR. MACKEY: I'm sorry, was there a
17 motion to do it by LID, not --

18 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: You know what,
19 we probably do need a motion in this order.

20 MEMBER MARINELLO: All right.

21 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: You are correct.

22 MEMBER MARINELLO: In anticipation that
23 the results from Fairfield County and Licking County
24 may require a recount, I move that the Board conduct
25 a recount in the Reynoldsburg City Council race by

1 voting locations, using the Location Identification
 2 Numbers for each of the voting locations in the city.

3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
 4 second?

5 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

6 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
 7 favor signify by saying aye.

8 (Vote taken.)

9 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
 10 same sign.

11 (No response.)

12 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.
 13 Now you can proceed. Thank you.

14 MR. MACKEY: 3,023.

15 MS. GORUP: 3,023? That takes us over.

16 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Where is the percent
 17 calculation? Was that seven percent?

18 MS. GORUP: Five percent is 250 of the
 19 votes.

20 MR. MACKEY: Right behind her head is
 21 the total.

22 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: 449, okay.

23 DIRECTOR LEONARD: In reviewing the
 24 Secretary of State's election official manual as it
 25 relates to recounts, what it shows is that for a DRE

1 county such as Franklin County, what you would do is
2 conduct a -- a counting of the ballot -- the votes
3 for the candidates in this contest, for the voter
4 verifiable paper tape for every machine in these
5 precincts, compare -- then run -- once you've got
6 those totals, you run a report from the actual flash
7 drives for each of those machines and then compare
8 that, that report generated for machines in those --
9 in those voting locations with the paper tape numbers
10 that were done by the staff as well. So you compare
11 that report to the numbers on the electronic report.
12 If they're identical --

13 (Discussion off the record.)

14 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Compare the report of
15 the check of the paper tape with the electronic
16 report. If those numbers are identical, then the
17 Board simply runs -- the employees would run the
18 electronic cartridges for every machine and generate
19 a report, and that would be the results. So every
20 precinct is counted as long as the paper tape matches
21 the electronic report for the selected precincts. If
22 they don't, then you have to try and verify the --
23 the results -- the difference between the two and
24 resolve that difference, and if you can't, then
25 what's on the paper tape is what determines the --

1 the outcome for those precincts.

2 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Got it.

3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All right.

4 We'll move on to the potential recount for the
5 Reynoldsburg School Board, and I would need a motion.

6 MEMBER SEXTON: In anticipation as
7 the -- Mr. Chairman, I move that in anticipation that
8 the results from Fairfield County and Licking County
9 may require a recount, I move that the Board conduct
10 a recount in the Reynoldsburg School Board race by
11 voting locations, using the Location Identification
12 Numbers for each of the voting locations in the
13 Reynoldsburg School Board District.

14 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
15 second?

16 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

17 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
18 favor signify by saying aye.

19 (Vote taken.)

20 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
21 same sign.

22 (No response.)

23 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

24 MR. MACKEY: 6,001.

25 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: What is it,

1 please?

2 MR. MACKEY: 6,001.

3 MS. GORUP: That does it. And thank you
4 for not choosing 9,001.

5 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: If there are no
6 questions concerning that, we'll move to the Canal
7 Winchester City Council, and I would look for a
8 motion.

9 MEMBER SEXTON: Mr. Chairman, I move in
10 anticipation that the results from Fairfield County
11 may require a recount, I move that the Board conduct
12 a recount in the Canal Winchester City Council race
13 by voting locations, using the Location
14 Identification Numbers for each of the voting
15 locations in Canal Winchester.

16 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second.

17 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
18 favor signify by saying aye.

19 (Vote taken.)

20 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
21 same sign.

22 (No response.)

23 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

24 MR. MACKEY: 2,042.

25 MS. GORUP: That does it.

1 MR. MACKEY: Thank you.

2 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Before we complete
3 the proceedings for today, I did want to -- I wanted
4 to circulate before the Board the certification of
5 results by the most populous county for the city
6 council race in the City of Westerville. We received
7 results from the city -- from Delaware County for the
8 results of Delaware County, and, therefore, it's the
9 most populous county. We can certify the results.
10 What I'm going to circulate is the sign-off sheet the
11 Board members have to sign, which will then be
12 provided to the City of Westerville so that they can
13 then swear their candidates in by December 1st, which
14 is an issue because if it's delayed or if Delaware
15 County is delayed, it may affect when Delaware County
16 can swear in its city council candidates. Their
17 official day of swearing in is December 1st. There's
18 no vote required, but I just wanted the Board members
19 to know I'll be circulating that.

20 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there any
21 more business to come before the Board of Elections?
22 If not, I'd entertain a motion to adjourn.

23 MEMBER MARINELLO: So moved.

24 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Is there a
25 second?

1 MEMBER SEXTON: Second.

2 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
3 favor signify by saying aye.

4 (Vote taken.)

5 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
6 same sign.

7 (No response.)

8 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We are
9 adjourned.

10 (Thereupon, the meeting of the Board was
11 adjourned at 4:35 p.m.)
