13	election and then voting machine and e-Poll book
14	allocation for the August 7th special election.
15	The Secretary of State requires us to look at these
16	on two separate occasions. This is the first of
17	those occasions where we'll authorize the use of
18	electronic poll books and the quantity and the same
19	with voting machines.
20	Carolyn, you want to go over that?
21	MS. GORUP: Carolyn Gorup,
22	G-o-r-u-p.
23	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Can we go
24	over paper ballots first?
25	MS. GORUP: Paper ballots first.

1 Okay.

Usually when we do paper ballots we compare previous like-elections. There are no previous like-elections to the special. We looked at the primary. The most provisional ballots that any one of these precincts had was 14. So after some discussions we decided that using a full pad of 25 in each location would meet the requirements for the provisional ballots.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And if for some reason we saw on election day that we were exceeding that, we have the ability to print more and deliver those.

4	Board with Exhibit E which outlines the increases
5	or the new pay rates for each of the employees and
6	that the funds are available within our budget to
7	do so.
8	MEMBER SINNOTT: I move the Franklin
9	County Board of Elections adjust the salaries of
10	those full-time employees listed on Exhibit E and
11	that those salary adjustments be made retroactive
12	to the first pay period of 2018.
13	MEMBER SEXTON: Second.
14	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
15	favor signify by saying aye.
16	(Vote taken.)
17	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
18	same sign.
19	(No response.)
20	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
21	carries.
22	There were three items or
23	actually two items. One is if you remember we
24	talked about Prime/3SG and our redistricting or
25	looking at the districts in the 3rd, 12th, and the

15th to make sure that all of our voters were assigned to the proper districts. At our last meeting Board Member Sinnott mentioned that maybe we ought to approach the auditor's office and see if they are able to do anything close or similar to what we were asking 3SG to do, and that turned out to be a very good suggestion.

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I've got emails here from the county auditor. And I think it's the recommendation of the director and myself that we pursue the county auditor and have them do the work and that we reach out to 3SG and tell them the situation we're in and that the auditor is willing to do this for basically nothing and if they would like to do the same work for nothing -- I can't image they would want to do that -- but if they would in order to see like -- what do you call it? -- a belt-and-suspenders approach so that we're double covered and that if we saw one was better than the other going into the fall we could either go with the auditor or 3SG. So I think at this point we're moving forward with the county auditor. We feel comfortable in what they've proposed.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: We met the day after the last Board meeting and had a very

1 productive meeting with them, a very quick 2 turnaround. They gave us a project plan and outlined the tasks that they felt needed to be done 3 4 in order to meet the timetable we needed to review the district boundaries. And I think you'll see 5 6 from the outline that they've -- already out of the 7 seven items that we outlined that needed to be done 8 before June 15th, that they've already got five of 9 those that are underway or completed. 10 So as I -- and -- based on the 11 meeting that we had with them I think everybody 12 walked away from that meeting feeling confident 13 that the auditor's office would be able to help us 14 with this particular project. 15 MEMBER SINNOTT: Good. Thanks for 16 following up on that. 17 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Thank you 18 for the recommendation. I don't believe we need 19 anything to pursue that. 20 DIRECTOR LEONARD: Just wanted to 21 keep you apprised. 22 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And then the 23 other item is the voting machine discussion. 24 you know, we narrowed down the vendors to Hart and

to ES&S. And we are going to have both of those

25

vendors come to the county commissioners on the 26th of this month.

DIRECTOR LEONARD: Right.

Again, the day after the last Board meeting, we met with the county administrative staff, fiscal officer, county administrator, our budget analyst, Gary Collins. He must have left already. But we met with them and kind of outlined what we had done to date and then what their recommendations were for moving forward. Because, obviously, the cost of the voting machine systems are -- although a portion of it will come from state funding, the balance would come from the county and the commissioners will have to authorize that money. And we wanted to make sure we were in a position to answer any questions they might have with regard to the system to go with.

So based on that recommendation we set up an opportunity for the commissioners to have a demonstration of each of the systems before we finalize any decision on a recommendation going forward. So we just wanted to make sure you all were aware of that. Like I said, right now it looks like it will be June 26th where each of the commissioners will have an opportunity to see both
