17	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Here.
18	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And Meredith

21	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We have a
22	quorum. I can begin the meeting now.
23	So you were sent the April 5th
24	minutes of the meeting. Do you have any questions

1	or comments? We could, I suppose, answer those
_	or commencs: we court, I suppose, answer those
2	now.
3	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Seems good.
4	MEMBER FREEDHOFF: Mr. Chairman, I
5	move that the Board approve the minutes of the
6	April 5th meeting of the Franklin County Board of
7	Elections as submitted.
8	MR. SEXTON: Mr. Chairman, I'll
9	second.
10	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
11	properly moved and seconded. All those in favor of
12	the motion, signify by saying aye.
13	(Vote taken.)
14	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
15	same sign.
16	(No response.)
17	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
18	carries.
19	We have to authorize the beginning
20	of the recount today at 9:00. We have two
21	recounts, one for republican county central
22	committee, 4th ward of Columbus, and the other one
23	for the democratic primary for state representative
24	in the 10th district.

1	And you might see some people out
2	there with yellow tags on. They're all going to
3	observe our recount. They've all filed proper
4	paperwork, so they're all eligible to go back in
5	the recount room, and we swore them in, so we're go
6	to go.
7	MEMBER FREEDHOFF: Thank you.
8	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: So if we
9	want to begin the authorization of the recount, we
10	can do that.
11	MEMBER SEXTON: Mr. Chairman, the
12	election results from the republican county central
13	committee Columbus, 4th ward, race requires a
14	recount. I move the Board authorize the start of
15	the hand count in all four precincts and that the
16	recount begin now, 9:00 a.m., on April 12th until
17	completed.
18	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second the
19	motion.
20	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
21	properly moved and seconded. All those in favor of
22	the motion, signify by saying aye.
23	(Vote taken.)
24	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,

2	(No response.)
3	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
4	carries.
5	I think we would be looking for
6	something similar to start the democratic primary
7	for state representative in the 10th district.
8	MEMBER MARINELLO: Okay.
9	Mr. Chairman, I move the election results from
LO	the democratic primary for state representative
11	10th district requires a recount. I move that the
12	Board authorize the recount to begin now,
13	9:00 a.m., April 12th until completed.
L 4	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second the
15	motion.
16	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
L 7	properly moved and seconded. All those in favor of
18	the motion, signify by saying aye.
19	(Vote taken.)
20	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
21	same sign.
22	(No response.)
23	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
24	carries.

1	There is an initiated ordinance
2	presented in Minerva Park, and I'm going to call on
3	Matt Kelly or, I'm sorry, Jeff Mackey from
4	petitions and filings to give us a brief
5	description of that.
6	MR. MACKEY: Jeff Mackey, manager
7	petitions and campaign finance.
8	DIRECTOR WHITE: Our audience is
9	gone.
10	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Got to go to
L1	work.
12	MEMBER FREEDHOFF: That's the fun
13	stuff. Fireworks.
L 4	MS. MACKEY: So on January 2nd, the
15	Village of Minerva Park forwarded to us a petition
16	they had received for initiated ordinance. They
L7	wanted to control the sale of fireworks in the
18	Village.
19	On January 4th, we certified back to
20	them that we found 233 total signatures on the
21	petition, 211 of which were valid. There were 984
22	votes cast at the 2022 general election for
23	governor in the Village of Minerva Park, which
24	meant that ten percent of that number would have

been 99 signatures, so they well exceeded the mark required as far as valid signatures on that petition. So we sent that letter certifying that back to the Village.

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The Village, in turn, fulfilled their responsibility by performing their duty to issue back to us a resolution to place that issue on the ballot. Once we got that, as I do with all things that we receive that want to be put on the ballot, I forwarded that to the prosecutor's office. They looked through that. The Board has one final duty before we place issues on the ballot for initiated ordinance or charter amendments or anything like that. The Board has to make its own determination as to the sufficiency and validity of an initiative petition that's certified to the Board for placement on the ballot, and the petition can be found invalid if any portion of the petition does not fall within the authority of the Village, city, township to enact the initiative. And this all falls under Revised Code Section 3501.38.

The prosecutor's office also reviewed the ordinance as submitted and reviewed that against the state statutes on fireworks. I'm

going to defer to the prosecutor's office here to kind of brief you on that.

ATTORNEY HUMMER: So good morning,
Board members. We did look at this, and it's quite
different for me, since I used to be a city
attorney, to say anything is contrary the home rule
because those words never came out of my mouth
'cause I was big advocate of home rule for each
city jurisdiction; however, being versed in that
area, this is an analysis on home rule authority,
whether Minerva Park has home rule authority to
place this initiative on the ballot.

You've all received a legal opinion regarding that analysis of that. We would just stress that what we looked at is specifically the language of the fireworks code and whether the state specifically laid out when a municipality is allowed to enact laws and when a municipality — and what is separately governed by the state. And, clearly, the state had set forth purchase as a separate part of the code that could not be regulated under home rule authority, and, therefore, our recommendation is that this initiative not be placed on the ballot.

1	We understand that this may be
2	subject to litigation and we want to make sure you
3	are aware of that in advance since we have received
4	phone calls regarding that.
5	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Do you remember
6	when the pertinent section was last amended or
7	adopted?
8	ATTORNEY HUMMER: I do not have
9	that, but it's recent, I believe.
.0	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Oh, is it?
.1	ATTORNEY HUMMER: I believe that
.2	there was an overhaul of the fireworks code.
.3	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: That sort of
.4	rings a bell. I also remember, as a staffer being
.5	on floor in the senate, when there was a major
16	revision in probably the late '80s or early '90s,
. 7	yeah. Big changes, but maybe some more recent,
8.	okay.
. 9	ATTORNEY HUMMER: I believe and I
20	don't have it in front of me, but I believe there
21	are areas that specifically and this initiative
22	includes some of those areas where you're permitted
2	to regulate time of when fireworks are allowed to

go off, for instance. But this is about the actual

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sale, so it encompasses an area of the state code that, in our opinion, is not permitted to be regulated.

MEMBER FREEDHOFF: You mentioned you received some phone calls about this already. What is the feedback you're getting?

ATTORNEY HUMMER: That if it's not placed on the ballot, there will be a legal challenge.

MEMBER FREEDHOFF: Okay.

MR. MACKEY: And then since the prosecutor has weighed in with their opinion, staff's recommendation is that this issue should not be placed on the ballot as well. If the Board concurs or disagrees, you can either vote to place that on the ballot now or vote to not place that on the ballot, whatever the case may be.

MEMBER FREEDHOFF: Thank you.

Mr. Chairman, in the matter of the petition for initiated ordinance presented to the Village of Minerva Park proposing Ordinance Section 678.10(f)(1) be submitted to electors of the Village for their approval or rejection at the general election to be held on the 5th day of

1	November 2024. I move, in accordance with
2	ORC 3501.31(m) authorizing the Board to examine
3	whether a municipal initiative falls within the
4	municipality's authority to enact, that the Board
5	determine that the petition is invalid because the
6	proposed ordinance does not fall within the scope
7	of the Village of Minerva Park's home rule
8	authority, and that the proposed ordinance should
9	not appear at the 2024 general election.
10	MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.
11	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been
12	properly moved and seconded. All those in favor of
13	the motion, signify by saying aye.
14	(Vote taken.)
15	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
16	same sign.
17	(No response.)
18	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
19	carries.
20	I don't show anything else to come
21	before the Board today. I think our next meeting
22	would be to hear about the recount, and I think we
23	tried to schedule that on Monday, April 15th at
24	3:00 p.m.

1	MEMBER MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, I
2	move that the Board recess the meeting and
3	reconvene Monday, April 15th at 3:00 p.m.
4	CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I second the
5	motion.
6	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those in
7	favor of the motion, signify by saying aye.
8	(Vote taken.)
9	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,
10	same sign.
11	(No response.)
12	DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion
13	carries.
