1 P R O C E E D I N G S

2 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Mr. Chairman, it  
3 looks like we have a quorum, but I will go ahead and  
4 take roll.

5 Kim Marinello.

6 MEMBER MARINELLO: Here.

7 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Mike Sexton.

8 MEMBER SEXTON: Here.

9 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Doug Preisse.

10 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Here.

11 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: And Meredith  
12 Freedhoff.

13 MEMBER FREEDHOFF: Here.

14 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: We do have a  
15 quorum, Mr. Chairman.

16 Before we get started, we have a new  
17 court reporter. Actually, she's not a new court  
18 reporter, she's new to us, so if you wouldn't mind,  
19 when you are speaking, state your name and that will  
20 help Kathy out a bit, I suspect.

21 So the first item on the agenda is  
22 the approval of minutes from the 8/5/2024 and the  
23 8/14/2024 meetings of the Board of Elections, and I  
24 believe you were sent the minutes to peruse as you

1 would like.

2 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Um-hum.

3 MEMBER MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, Kim  
4 Marinello.

5 I move that the Board approve the  
6 minutes from the 8/5/24 and 8/14/24 meetings of the  
7 Franklin County Board of Elections as submitted.

8 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Doug Preisse.  
9 Second.

10 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been  
11 properly moved and seconded. All those in favor of the  
12 motion, signify by saying aye.

13 (Vote taken.)

14 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,  
15 same sign.

16 (No response.)

17 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

18 The next item on the agenda is the  
19 certification of write-in candidates, and I'll call on  
20 Jeff Mackey, who is the manager of petitions and  
21 filings, to go over that exhibit.

22 MR. MACKEY: Jeff Mackey. M-a-c-k-e-y.

23 You have in front of you Exhibit A,  
24 which includes two individuals who filed declarations

1 of intent to be write-in candidates. They've been  
2 reviewed by staff, found to be timely filed, valid and  
3 sufficient. We recommend them for certification.

4 DIRECTOR WHITE: Jeff, if I may, your  
5 exhibit references November 4, 2024, general election.  
6 That should be November 5th, so you'll want to make  
7 that correction once the Board votes on the motion.

8 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: The motion appears to  
9 be in order.

10 DIRECTOR WHITE: I think the motion is  
11 in order. I just wanted --

12 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Good. Thank you.

13 MEMBER SEXTON: Okay. Mr. Chairman,  
14 Michael Sexton. I move the Board certify the write-in  
15 candidates listed on Exhibit A as write-in candidates  
16 for the offices they are seeking for the November 5,  
17 2024, general election ballot.

18 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Doug Preisse. Second  
19 the motion.

20 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been  
21 properly moved and seconded. All those in favor of the  
22 motion, signify by saying aye.

23 (Vote taken.)

24 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,

1 same sign.

2 (No response.)

3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

4 Thank you, Jeff.

5 The next item on the agenda is the  
6 paper ballot allocation for the November 5th general  
7 election, and I'll call on Carla Patton, who is the  
8 manager of operations.

9 MS. PATTON: Carla Patton.

10 Good afternoon. Before you you have  
11 Exhibit B, which is the 2024 general election initial  
12 paper ballot allocation plan.

13 Per the Ohio Election Officials  
14 Manual, Chapter 5, Section 5.07, ballot quantities, we  
15 are required to provide five percent more of the number  
16 of provisional ballots cast in a previous like election  
17 for provisionals.

18 At the direction of the Secretary of  
19 State's office, we were told to look at the turnouts  
20 from 2008, 2012, 2016 and the 2020 general elections,  
21 and using the greater turnout from those elections for  
22 our calculations.

23 After looking at each of those  
24 elections, 2012 general election had the most number of

1 provisional ballots cast on election day, therefore,  
2 using that number from the 2012 general election, we've  
3 taken by precinct and multiplied the number of  
4 provisionals cast by 105 percent, then rounded that  
5 number up to the next increment of 25, as that's the  
6 size of the pads of ballots that we send out to  
7 locations.

8           For the election date paper-by-choice  
9 ballots, because of the voting method that we utilize  
10 with the voters using ballot marking devices as the  
11 primary method, our Board has the discretion to set the  
12 amount of paper ballots we provide, and in addition to  
13 the provisional ballots.

14           Again, looking at those same  
15 elections -- 2008, '12, '16 and '20 -- we took the  
16 highest turnout from any of those elections, which was  
17 the 2016 general election. So for this election we  
18 took 20 percent of the number of ballots cast on  
19 election day in 2016 in each of the precincts and then  
20 we rounded that number up to the nearest increment of  
21 25 and that gives us the total of election day ballots  
22 that we are sending out.

23           The quantities in Exhibit B are the  
24 totals for both the provisional and the election day

1 paper ballots as one quantity for each ballot styled  
2 that's being issued.

3 The calculations for the paper  
4 ballots have exceeded the requirements set forth by the  
5 Secretary of State, as found in the paper ballots we  
6 send out.

7 In the event that a location is running  
8 low on paper ballots on election day, we have the  
9 capability here in office to print those ballots on  
10 demand and get those out to the location in a timely  
11 manner.

12 This election we are asking -- we are  
13 allocating 129,825 ballots for election day use, and  
14 that is for paper-by-choice and provisional ballots.

15 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Carla, can you remind  
16 us, or at least me, with the numeric progression under  
17 ballot style from one until --

18 MS. PATTON: 1113 I believe is the  
19 (talking simultaneously) --

20 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: 1113, yes. What is  
21 that referencing as it relates to --

22 MS. PATTON: So ballot styles are  
23 created -- one, every precinct has its own ballot  
24 style, then within that precinct you may have a split



1 that is composed of a different district, whether it's  
2 a house/senate congressional district, the school  
3 district, the city or township.

4 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Right. Some of these  
5 ballots are going to be the same, but we still  
6 designate them a different ballot because the precinct  
7 number is different; is that correct?

8 MS. PATTON: Because the precinct number  
9 is different, yes.

10 So if you notice, any time that there  
11 is a like ballot within the same precinct, we will  
12 combine those numbers into one ballot style.

13 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay.

14 MS. PATTON: And all those calculations  
15 were taken into account when calculating these numbers.

16 MEMBER SEXTON: Follow up on that.  
17 Michael Sexton. So we have 100 -- 1113 ballot styles?

18 MS. PATTON: Yes.

19 MEMBER SEXTON: And that would cover --  
20 how many precincts do we have in the county?

21 MS. PATTON: We have 888 precincts in  
22 the county.

23 MEMBER SEXTON: I believe it's the same  
24 we had in the primary.

1 MS. PATTON: Correct.

2 MEMBER SEXTON: So looking at mine, I'm  
3 in 14B, you have here 1071 number of registered voters  
4 and then 175 recommended paper ballots?

5 MS. PATTON: Right, because that's the  
6 number of registered voters, so all the calculations  
7 are based on turnout from those previous elections.

8 MEMBER SEXTON: Okay. That 175 seems to  
9 be about 17 percent, and you said there's  
10 (simultaneously talking) --

11 MS. PATTON: Yeah, it was averaging out  
12 about 10, 11 percent of the registered voters of what  
13 we are allocating on paper.

14 MEMBER SEXTON: Okay. Thank you.

15 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Anybody else? Okay.

16 MEMBER FREEDHOFF: Meredith Freedhoff.  
17 Chairman, I move that the Board adopt the paper ballot  
18 allocation formula in Exhibit B compiled by the Board  
19 staff for the November 5th general election.

20 MEMBER SEXTON: Mr. Chairman, Michael  
21 Sexton. I'll second.

22 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been  
23 properly moved and seconded. All those in favor of the  
24 motion, signify by saying aye.

1 (Vote taken.)

2 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,  
3 same sign.

4 (No response.)

5 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

6 The next item on the agenda is the  
7 voting machine and Touch Pad allocation for the  
8 November 5th general election, and, again, I'll call on  
9 Carla Patton, the director of operations, to speak to  
10 that.

11 MS. PATTON: Exhibit C before you is the  
12 initial voting machine and Touch Pad allocation. So in  
13 this, this is based on voters within a location not  
14 based on a single precinct, unless it's a single  
15 precinct location.

16 So on this you have the ExpressVote  
17 Tabletops, which are our main -- is our ballot markers.  
18 Those have been allocated for one per every 320 voters,  
19 with a minimum of two in any location, for a total of  
20 2916 to be allocated.

21 The ExpressVote and kiosk is our ADA  
22 ballot markers, and those have been allocated at one  
23 for every 4100 voters, with a minimum of one in any  
24 location. Those can also be used by non-ADA voters.

1           And just as a note, all ExpressVotes,  
2 whether they are tabletop or kiosk, are ADA compliant  
3 and can be used by any ADA or non-ADA voters, so there  
4 are a total of 353 ExpressVote kiosks being allocated.

5           There are -- the ballot counters, the  
6 DS200 ballot scanners, have been allocated at one for  
7 every 2520 voters, with at least one in any location,  
8 for a total of 503 being allocated.

9           The Touch Pads, which are electronic  
10 phone books, are being allocated for one for every 790  
11 voters, with a minimum of three at any location, and a  
12 total of 1354 Touch Pads being allocated.

13           Again, all these are based on the  
14 current voter registration numbers. Before the  
15 election, we will look at those numbers again as the  
16 deadline approaches.

17           And we do have some additional  
18 equipment that is set aside for the purpose of  
19 allocating based on large increases in the voter  
20 registration numbers for any location that we may see.

21           So we would ask that you adopt the  
22 plan for the initial voting machine and Touch Pad  
23 allocation, as seen in Exhibit C.

24           MEMBER FREEDHOFF: Any questions?

1 MEMBER SEXTON: I just had one. So if  
2 we are looking at the last one on this sheet, the Ohio  
3 Union, that's ExpressVote Tabletops, how many precincts  
4 is that?

5 MS. PATTON: So there's nine precincts,  
6 but the number of precincts in the location is  
7 indicated by that first number within that LID number  
8 that's on the sheet, so that location has nine  
9 precincts in there.

10 That is a location that I fully  
11 anticipate will -- we will need to add equipment as the  
12 deadline approaches and voter registration drives take  
13 place on campus. The registration numbers are low  
14 because of the recent removal of voters due to  
15 inactivity this summer.

16 MEMBER SEXTON: Okay. So you are saying  
17 that 18 tabletops, nine precincts. Is there a formula  
18 where --

19 MS. PATTON: So, again, it's based on  
20 the number of registered voters. I believe in that  
21 location was a very low number for, you know, many of  
22 the precincts being campus precincts and they had right  
23 around maybe 500 registered voters at the time we  
24 pulled these numbers.

1                   So, like I said, I would anticipate  
2                   that number will increase significantly for the next --  
3                   for the reading prior to the election.

4                   MEMBER SEXTON: Okay. Thank you.

5                   MS. PATTON: And I will note that as a  
6                   result of us being able to purchase additional  
7                   equipment this past summer, this is an increase of over  
8                   230 machines being sent out than what we sent out in  
9                   the past locations.

10                  MEMBER MARINELLO: Mr. Chairman, Kim  
11                  Marinello. I move that the Board adopt the voting  
12                  machine and Touch Pad allocation formula in Exhibit C  
13                  compiled by the Board staff for the November 5th  
14                  general election.

15                  CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Second the motion.

16                  DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been  
17                  properly moved and seconded. All those in favor of the  
18                  motion, signify by saying aye.

19                  (Vote taken.)

20                  DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,  
21                  same sign.

22                  (No response.)

23                  DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

24                  The next item on the agenda -- thank

1 you, Carla -- are voter challenges. I believe we have  
2 two voter challenges, and I will call on Sara Ziemba,  
3 the supervisor of voter services, to walk us through  
4 those.

5 MS. ZIEMBA: SARA, S-a-r-a. Ziemba,  
6 Z-i-e-m-b-a.

7 Good afternoon. And today we have  
8 two voter challenges. Both of the challengers are  
9 here. I don't believe either of the challenged  
10 voters are here, so we will proceed with both of those  
11 challenges.

12 The first one that we are going to go  
13 over will be the challenge against Samantha Y.  
14 Tillotson, 318 Hampton Park, Westerville, Ohio 43081,  
15 brought to us by Mr. Anthony M. Burges, also of 318  
16 Hampton Park, Westerville, Ohio 43081.

17 Ms. Tillotson currently is actively  
18 registered at 318 Hampton Park. Her original  
19 registration date was April 30th of 2024, on a paper  
20 registration form collected by an advocacy group in the  
21 community.

22 As she is just registered in April,  
23 Ms. Tillotson has never voted in Franklin County and  
24 has had no other activity on her record, other than

1 that one paper form collected by the advocacy group.

2 Mr. Burges, the gentleman who has  
3 brought the challenge to the Board, has been registered  
4 to vote in Franklin County at 318 Hampton Park,  
5 Westerville, Ohio, 43081, since 1997. He is an active  
6 voter and has voted regularly at that address of 318  
7 Hampton Park since he registered in 1997 and does have  
8 valid standing to bring this challenge to the Board  
9 today.

10 Obviously, we'll let you talk to  
11 Mr. Burges here in a minute, but with what we found in  
12 Ms. Tillotson's file, and the affirmation that she did  
13 not live at that address on Mr. Burges's challenge  
14 form, voter services found no other evidence or  
15 anything on file to contradict Mr. Burges's challenge  
16 that she does not live there and we would recommend  
17 that the Board uphold the challenge today.

18 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And remind us as to  
19 the notification of the interested parties.

20 MS. ZIEMBA: Yes. So each party  
21 receives a certified mail letter sent to them, and we  
22 also noticed the challenge in the Daily Reporter with  
23 the court prior to this hearing today.

24 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay.



1 MEMBER FREEDHOFF: And what is the voter  
2 advocacy group?

3 MS. ZIEMBA: The voter advocacy group  
4 would be the Black Fork Strategies.

5 And Mr. Burges is right here, if  
6 you'd like to speak with him.

7 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: We would love to  
8 hear -- how do you say your last name?

9 MR. BURGES: Burges.

10 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: We'd love to hear  
11 from Mr. Burges. If you will please join us at the  
12 podium. And for our proper recordkeeping, I think we  
13 swear you in by our court reporter. You are prepared  
14 to do that?

15 (Anthony Burges is duly sworn.)

16 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So you know, Preisse  
17 is a Welsh name, but I'm going to try to be not biased  
18 in your favor. I see your shirt.

19 MR. BURGES: I was born in Wales, so  
20 I've been here since I was six.

21 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. All right.  
22 Well, we are sympathetic.

23 MR. BURGES: Despite that, right?

24 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: To the serious

1 matters here, thank you for bringing it to our  
2 attention.

3 MR. BURGES: Certainly.

4 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Please proceed and  
5 tell us your story.

6 MR. BURGES: Certainly. We've lived at  
7 Hampton Park --

8 MS. HUMMER: We need him to state his  
9 name.

10 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: For the record, if  
11 you'll give us your full name.

12 MR. BURGES: Certainly. Anthony M.  
13 Burges, 318 Hampton Park, Westerville, Ohio 43081.

14 We've lived in Westerville since  
15 1994. Actually originally from the Cleveland area. I  
16 got transferred down here. Lived in the Columbus area  
17 twice now. This current time since 1994. Have only  
18 lived in that house, 318 Hampton Park, since that time.

19 And occasionally we've received  
20 mail -- there's actually two of them, the one that most  
21 recently, that just came recently, which was in the  
22 name of Tillotson, and she has never lived at our  
23 house.

24 The other one is a Chandra Carter,

1 which came a couple of years ago. We have been getting  
2 email -- or postage mail for that as well.

3 And have we covered that one as well?

4 MS. ZIEMBA: We didn't find her  
5 registered, so that must be from someone else's list.  
6 She's not registered.

7 MR. BURGESS: All right. Yeah. So we've  
8 received two of them. And, actually, yesterday we  
9 received a campaign worker for Sandra Tillotson at our  
10 house knocking on our door, which was kind of ironic.

11 But again, like I say, she's never  
12 lived at our property at all. The only one that's  
13 lived at our house, other than our daughter, for a  
14 short period of time was our niece and her name is not  
15 Tillotson, so...

16 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. Questions?  
17 Okay. I don't have any questions. Thanks for the  
18 thorough work, Sara. Thank you.

19 MR. BURGESS: Thank you.

20 MEMBER FREEDHOFF: Thank you for coming  
21 here today.

22 Mr. Chairman, Meredith Freedhoff. I  
23 move that the Board approve the challenge of right to  
24 vote filed by Anthony Burgess, 318 Hampton Park,

1 Westerville, Ohio, against Samantha Tillotson of the  
2 same address, in order that Samantha Tillotson's  
3 registration be removed from the Franklin County Board  
4 of Elections file.

5 MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.

6 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been  
7 properly moved and seconded. All those in favor of the  
8 motion, signify by saying aye.

9 (Vote taken.)

10 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,  
11 same sign.

12 (No response.)

13 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

14 I'll call on Sara again for the next  
15 voter challenge.

16 MS. ZIEMBA: All right. Thank you.

17 Sara Ziemba, supervisor of voter services, again, and  
18 this challenge is against Kwon Ye M. Robinson, 432 East  
19 Rich Street, Apartment 5F, Columbus, Ohio 43215,  
20 brought to the Board by Mr. Gregory G. Smith, also of  
21 432 East Rich Street, Apartment 5F, Columbus, Ohio  
22 43215.

23 Mr. Kwon Ye Robinson is -- was  
24 registered on a paper form collected by an advocacy

1 group originally on June 17th of 2024, and then on  
2 July 31, 2024, brought in -- the same advocacy group  
3 brought in a paper form for him for this address that  
4 we are bringing to the Board today, which is 432 East  
5 Rich Street, Apartment 5F.

6 The first form was actually for 432  
7 East Rich Street, Apartment 4F, and I believe that Mr.  
8 Smith will talk a little bit about this when he gets up  
9 here.

10 But within the period of a month, we  
11 have a form for Mr. Robinson in 432 East Rich Street,  
12 Apartment 4F, and then the next month it was 432 East  
13 Rich Street, Apartment 5F.

14 But it is the Apartment 5F homeowner  
15 that has brought the challenge to the Board today.

16 Mr. Robinson's current registration  
17 status is inactive, and this throws another sort of  
18 wrench into this case. The 2024 National Change of  
19 Address Program, which is the lis maintenance directive  
20 that the Secretary of State gives to the boards to  
21 carry out once a year, we just completed that in  
22 August 2024, and as part of that directive, the Board  
23 received notice from the USPS, the United States Postal  
24 Service, that Mr. Robinson submitted a change of

1 address to the Post Office saying that his current  
2 residence is 2306 Foxy Drive in Bethlehem, Georgia, so  
3 --

4 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Where was that picked  
5 up?

6 MS. ZIEMBA: That's from the -- he  
7 submitted a paper to the Postal Service that said this  
8 is a -- like a change of address form to the USPS  
9 saying, I live here now, please send my mail to this  
10 address.

11 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: How do you know it's  
12 a "he," by the way?

13 MS. ZIEMBA: It could be a he or she.  
14 Mister or missus. Either one.

15 MEMBER FREEDHOFF: Where was that in  
16 Georgia?

17 MS. ZIEMBA: 2306 Foxy Drive, Bethlehem,  
18 Georgia.

19 MEMBER MARINELLO: When did he turn that  
20 in?

21 MS. ZIEMBA: Sometime over the course of  
22 the last year. Yeah, the change of address -- we sort  
23 of just get a file from the Secretary of State and we  
24 use it to update our system. And in cases where voters

1 have indicated to the Post Office that they moved out  
2 of state or out of county, their status changes from  
3 active to inactive, and we send a letter asking them to  
4 confirm where they live.

5 So Mr. Robinson will get a letter  
6 from us in a week -- a couple weeks asking him to  
7 confirm does he still live at Rich Street, or cancel  
8 his registration if he lives out of state now.

9 So that's sort of ancillary to the  
10 main fact here, which is that the homeowner, Mr. Smith,  
11 lives at this house and asserted on his challenge form  
12 that he is the only person living at that residence and  
13 he does not know Mr. or Ms. Kwon Ye M. Robinson.

14 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And Mr. Smith is  
15 here?

16 MS. ZIEMBA: Mr. Smith is here today,  
17 yes. Mr. Smith has been registered to vote in Franklin  
18 County since 1992, and has lived at 432 East Rich  
19 Street, Apartment 5F, since 1999.

20 Mr. Smith is an active voter, votes  
21 regularly, and is also a seasonal staff member in our  
22 voter services department here at the Board of  
23 Elections.

24 MEMBER FREEDHOFF: They picked the wrong

1 person.

2 MS. ZIEMBA: Yes, they did.

3 So I'm sure you want to hear from  
4 Greg here in a minute, but the combination of his  
5 testimony on this challenge form, the notice from the  
6 national change of address that Mr. or Miss Robinson  
7 lives in Georgia, all of that, we found nothing to  
8 contradict the fact that this individual does not live  
9 at 432 East Rich Street, Apartment 5F.

10 MEMBER MARINELLO: What happens to 4F?  
11 Is it just moot now?

12 MS. ZIEMBA: Yeah, so 4F is moot. Like,  
13 once you send in a registration update, we just updated  
14 the address from 4F to 5F. We would have sent a voter  
15 acknowledgement letter to that address, Apartment 4F.  
16 We never received it back undelivered, so it could  
17 have -- just whoever lives in 4F could have thrown it  
18 away or didn't make a notice of it.

19 MEMBER MARINELLO: Yeah.

20 MS. ZIEMBA: But 5F we have here to talk  
21 to you today, Mr. Chairman.

22 MEMBER SEXTON: And what's the staff  
23 recommendation?

24 MS. ZIEMBA: We would recommend that the



1 challenge be upheld just based on the fact we have  
2 testimony from the homeowner and the NCOA change of  
3 address indicating where the voter indicated he lives  
4 in Georgia.

5 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And we did try to --

6 MS. ZIEMBA: Of course, yes, we sent the  
7 certified letter and noticed it with the clerk of  
8 court.

9 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. Shall we hear  
10 from Mr. Smith?

11 MS. ZIEMBA: Yes.

12 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Who it sounds like he  
13 knows his way around here.

14 MR. SMITH: Yes, he messed with the  
15 wrong person.

16 Gregory Smith, 432 East Rich Street,  
17 Unit 5F, Columbus 43215.

18 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Want to swear him in?

19 (Gregory Smith is duly sworn.)

20 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Thanks for being  
21 here. Please tell us --

22 MS. HUMMER: Will you please identify  
23 yourself?

24 MR. SMITH: Gregory Smith. I live in

1 the Rich Street Lofts, Downtown Columbus. Have lived  
2 there since 1999. I'm the only person who has lived in  
3 this unit since 1999.

4 Received in the mail an  
5 acknowledgement letter that -- we send out, when  
6 someone registers, we send an acknowledgement letter  
7 out. I received that for someone who I didn't even  
8 know.

9 I checked with my building to see if  
10 anyone in the building knew the name. No one in the  
11 building knew the name.

12 So when I came in to work, I looked  
13 him up to see and noticed that they had registered in  
14 4F back in June.

15 4F has been vacant since Memorial  
16 Day, so 4F is probably not even good, at that point.  
17 So then I talked to Sara about how I file it just to  
18 make sure that person can't vote with that residential  
19 address, and here I am.

20 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. Thank you.  
21 Any questions for Greg?

22 What do you do here at the Board?

23 MR. SMITH: Registrations.

24 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Well, you never

1 should have let this happen.

2 MR. SMITH: It would have been funny if  
3 I was keying it in.

4 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Well, of course this  
5 is a serious matter, so thanks for your service here  
6 and also for bringing this to our attention.

7 I don't have any questions.

8 MEMBER MARINELLO: I don't have any  
9 questions.

10 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Thank you.

11 MEMBER SEXTON: Mr. Chairman, if there  
12 are no questions -- Michael Sexton -- I move that the  
13 Board approve the challenge of the right to vote filed  
14 by Gregory Smith, 432 East Rich Street, Unit 5F,  
15 Columbus, Ohio, against Kwon Ye M. Robinson of the same  
16 address, and order that Kwon Ye M. Robinson's  
17 registration be removed from the Franklin County BOE  
18 voter file.

19 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Doug Preisse. Second  
20 the motion.

21 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been  
22 properly moved and seconded. All those in favor of the  
23 motion, signify by saying aye.

24 (Vote taken.)

1 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,  
2 same sign.

3 (No response.)

4 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: The motion  
5 carries.

6 The next item on the agenda would be  
7 to hire Rachel Williams as a full-time employee in  
8 accounts payable and payroll clerk.

9 Rachel Williams has been a part-time  
10 employee here at the Franklin County Board of Elections  
11 since October of 2023. She worked prior to this at the  
12 Barberton Municipal Court as a deputy clerk, and for  
13 two years she worked at the Summit County Board of  
14 Elections.

15 Her father, you may well know he's  
16 the chairman of the Summit County Board of Elections  
17 and chairman of the Summit County Republican party, and  
18 Rachel said she wants to work here at the Franklin  
19 County Board of Elections to see how a real board of  
20 elections operates, and we'll make sure that these  
21 minutes go to Brian so that he reads that.

22 So I think Rachel is here, and I  
23 think at least our Republican members know Rachel, and  
24 if you want to wave to our Democrat members so they

1 know who you are.

2 MS. WILLIAMS: Nice to meet you.

3 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: You are going to  
4 be required to get at least one of their votes in order  
5 to be...

6 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: You better be  
7 bipartisan. That's super. Yes, we do, Rachel, and we  
8 are excited about her coming on full-time in the  
9 position.

10 MEMBER FREEDHOFF: Any questions?

11 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: You are in charge.

12 MEMBER FREEDHOFF: I'm very excited,  
13 Mr. Chairman -- Meredith Freedhoff -- to move that the  
14 Franklin County Board of Elections hire Rachel Williams  
15 as an accounts payable and payroll clerk, full-time  
16 positions, beginning Monday, August 26, 2024, at a rate  
17 of 21.54 per hour.

18 MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.

19 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been  
20 properly moved and seconded. All those in favor of the  
21 motion, signify by saying aye.

22 (Vote taken.)

23 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,  
24 same sign.

1 (No response.)

2 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.  
3 Fantastic. Welcome aboard.

4 MEMBER SEXTON: Congratulations.

5 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: The next item on  
6 the agenda is the hiring of early vote center managers,  
7 and I'll call on Matt Kelly, who is the manager of the  
8 absentee ballot and early vote center department.

9 MR. KELLY: Good afternoon Mr. Chairman,  
10 members of the Board. Matt Kelly, K-e-l-l-y, absentee  
11 department.

12 Today I'm asking you to approve the  
13 hiring of our two early vote center managers. We have  
14 them here in the room today, Republican Kathy  
15 Ferguson -- wave, Kathy -- and Democrat Paula Belcher.

16 Both Kathy and Paula have worked with  
17 the Board in the past as the managers of the early vote  
18 center. In fact, it has been the last two elections,  
19 two big elections, where we've hired managers that  
20 Kathy and Paula have both served in that role.

21 We have budgeted for the set of  
22 managers for this election as well as the set of deputy  
23 managers, which we'll get to in a little bit. The  
24 difference here in this election, because it is a

1 presidential year, we normally hire managers for 32 to  
2 34 days. We are asking the Board to extend those days  
3 to a total of 40 days.

4 Managers are paid on a daily rate  
5 basis, so asking for 40 days. We are adding a couple  
6 additional days for additional training. We are  
7 formalizing our training of both our managers and all  
8 of our staff members.

9 And the early vote center physical  
10 setup is going to take a few more days. As you  
11 noticed, there has been some construction going on in  
12 the building. The former Game Stop space has been  
13 renovated to be part of the early vote center, and that  
14 will be a part of our game plan to use all four rooms  
15 in 2024 election.

16 If you remember, back in 2020, during  
17 the middle of the pandemic, we used the warehouse as  
18 our main machine room. We will be using the Ohio Room,  
19 which we formerly called the L Room, as well as the new  
20 Game Stop space, as our machine space. So having four  
21 rooms in play, getting that set up and getting  
22 everything tidy like we want it before election, that  
23 will require a few extra days of work on the front-end,  
24 so I would ask that you approve the hiring of these two

1 wonderful people. They promise to do a good job.  
2 They've done a great job in the past. I'm happy to  
3 answer any questions.

4 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Thank you. Sounds  
5 good. How does it sound to you?

6 MEMBER SEXTON: Mr. Chairman, Michael  
7 Sexton. I move that the Board hire Kathy Ferguson,  
8 Republican, and Paula Belcher, Democrat, as managers of  
9 the early vote center for the 2024 general election at  
10 the rate of \$312.50 per day for no more than 40 days  
11 and not to exceed \$12,500 for each manager.

12 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Doug Preisse. Second  
13 the motion.

14 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been  
15 properly moved and seconded. All those in favor of the  
16 motion, signify by saying aye.

17 (Vote taken.)

18 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,  
19 same sign.

20 (No response.)

21 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

22 Again, I'll call on Matt Kelly for  
23 the hiring of vote -- early vote center deputy  
24 managers, and you might want to explain why we need



1 deputy managers.

2 MR. KELLY: Sure. So in budgeting this  
3 year, we knew it was going to be a big presidential  
4 year, and we have allocated extra dollars or additional  
5 dollars to hire deputy managers. Going into this year  
6 we knew that we would be renovating spaces and  
7 expanding our footprint in the early vote center from  
8 two and a half or three rooms to four rooms, including  
9 that Game Stop space that's been renovated, which is  
10 almost -- well, it is its own room by itself, and,  
11 therefore, we need deputy managers to cover more of the  
12 square footage for that entire space.

13 In fact, the two deputy managers we  
14 are asking for approval today have worked in the  
15 machine room before as specific machine judges.  
16 They've been kind of our lead people, both Republican  
17 and Democrat, in that space.

18 The two folks that we've had in the  
19 past are Peter LaBianca and Steve Chandler. As I said,  
20 they have been our lead Republican and Democrat -- I  
21 wouldn't say deputy managers, but our lead D&R managers  
22 of that machine area space or that machine-judged  
23 space. They will primarily be in charge of the machine  
24 room, making sure voters stay in the machine room when

1 they have a ballot and making sure they leave their  
2 ballot in the ballot box before they exit. Very  
3 important to voting.

4 Both managers have worked with us in  
5 the machine area for, I believe, three elections a  
6 piece, if not four, as well as serving -- I know Steve  
7 served as ballot temp before and Peter has worked in  
8 the back office of absentee as well, so we got a number  
9 of elections working with absentee, and I would ask  
10 that you approve of the hiring of deputy managers for  
11 this election.

12 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Sounds good to me.  
13 Any questions for the Board?

14 MEMBER SEXTON: I just have one  
15 question. We have done this in the past, if I  
16 remember, in 2000, for bringing in the deputy.

17 MR. KELLY: We didn't formally do it in  
18 2000. We did it in 2022.

19 MEMBER SEXTON: 2022.

20 MR. KELLY: Yeah. We budgeted for it in  
21 2022, I believe, as well because we had -- again, we  
22 are coming out of the pandemic. We had a bigger  
23 election that year spread out over a number of rooms.

24 MEMBER SEXTON: Okay. Mr. Chairman, if

1 there are no other questions -- Michael Sexton -- I  
2 move the Board hire Peter LaBianca, Republican, and  
3 Steve Chandler, Democrat, as deputy managers of early  
4 vote center for the 2024 general election at the rate  
5 of \$262.50 per day, for no more than 40 days, and not  
6 to exceed 10,500 for each deputy manager.

7 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Doug Preisse. Second  
8 the motion.

9 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been  
10 properly moved and seconded. All those in favor of the  
11 motion, signify by saying aye.

12 (Vote taken.)

13 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All those  
14 opposed, same sign.

15 (No response.)

16 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

17 The next item on the agenda is the  
18 hiring of parking attendants and, again, I'll turn that  
19 over to Matt Kelly.

20 MR. KELLY: Obviously I'm in charge of  
21 all the spending today.

22 So I would ask the Board to approve  
23 the purchase order. We are looking at hiring the  
24 company SP Plus Parking, they are a Columbus operation,

1 to help us with our parking management this election.

2 Normally we would hire a parking  
3 company to mainly focus on the last week or the last  
4 two weeks of a busy election season. In 2020, there  
5 were no parking companies during the pandemic. They  
6 all basically folded up during that time.

7 This SP Plus has been consistently  
8 working with us since they re-formed. I think they  
9 were formerly known as Parking Solutions, which you may  
10 have heard of before. They've re-formed into a bigger  
11 company, or were swallowed up by a bigger company, SP  
12 Plus.

13 We reached out to a number of parking  
14 companies. Some, obviously, had other things going  
15 on -- things happening during the month of October. As  
16 you can imagine, with the court-enforced congress at  
17 the fairgrounds and this little event that goes on  
18 every Saturday up at Ohio State, it causes a lot of  
19 people to need parking assistance.

20 What's before you today is a full  
21 staffing plan. This doesn't mean that we will be  
22 spending every dollar allocated by the Board under this  
23 purchase order. The full staffing plan kind of ramps  
24 up our operations, so we start out hiring just a few of

1 their parking folks the first week, then we ramp it up  
2 a few more the second week, and by the third and fourth  
3 week and the weekends, that's when we are really  
4 spending a lot of the parking attendant dollars those  
5 last two weekends.

6 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: We don't have -- and  
7 maybe we don't need it, I speak for myself, but  
8 describe it in a little more detail because we don't  
9 have the paperwork in terms of the staff and the number  
10 of people, where they are running around, how they are  
11 staying out of harm's way.

12 MR. KELLY: Absolutely. So our parking  
13 attendants, we have them -- currently, the first week  
14 we would have four attendants, basically, to get the  
15 people in the lot, and the first two rows of the  
16 parking lot down closer to the early vote center, we'll  
17 have them getting them as deep into the parking lot as  
18 possible.

19 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: And what are they  
20 wearing?

21 MR. KELLY: They are wearing -- and they  
22 bring their own flashlights, they bring their own  
23 protective vests and -- reflective vests, and I don't  
24 think they have a hat, but they have -- they bring

1 their own flags.

2 And, like I said, they are helping us  
3 move cars into parking spots and, quite frankly,  
4 clearing the way of campaign workers that may be  
5 blocking people from parking. They are very helpful  
6 there.

7 They are professional. A lot of them  
8 have worked with us before in the past, so we have  
9 return workers coming back to work before.

10 So the first week we would have four  
11 attendants working the lot, and as we get busier during  
12 the second week we would add two more, so there would  
13 be six. And we could put two more down in front of the  
14 former Sam Ash location, so that other part of our  
15 parking space down there is attended as well.

16 Then the third week we would ramp up  
17 to having ten attendants. That's when curbside starts  
18 getting busy. So the curbside will be down by the east  
19 corner of the building.

20 We'll have parking attendants  
21 directing people into the curbside area, where we vote  
22 a lot of folks during the second -- or, I'm sorry, the  
23 third and fourth weeks of early voting.

24 Obviously there's weekends involved

1 that third week.

2 And then the fourth week is our  
3 busiest week, where we are voting, literally, thousands  
4 and thousands of people each day. I think our busiest  
5 day is around 7000 people we vote -- yeah, we are  
6 expecting anywhere from 110 to maybe 120,000 early  
7 voters this time around, so that's when we would have  
8 the most parking attendants that day. That would be 12  
9 attendants covering all of the lot out in front of the  
10 early vote center and all of the lot all the way down,  
11 basically, to where Home Buys (phonetic) used to be.

12 All that parking space -- we'll use  
13 every single space, so we need to get cars dispersed as  
14 they get into the lot. Once the voters get back in, we  
15 need people getting them out of the lot so we can get  
16 those spaces empty.

17 So it's a well thought-out plan. We  
18 sat down with our security folks ahead of schedule. We  
19 even talked about how we want traffic to flow in one  
20 directional way, how we get cars out, and the company  
21 has been very helpful in helping us with planning that.

22 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Very well. Thank  
23 you.

24 MEMBER FREEDHOFF: Do these attendants

1 assist with people who want to vote from their cars or  
2 need to vote from their cars?

3 MR. KELLY: No, they do not. In fact,  
4 they are there to help people park and only help people  
5 park.

6 I know we have people that pull into  
7 the lot and they'll roll down their windows and start  
8 asking questions about absentee ballots, absentee  
9 dropoff. They'll ask questions about how to register  
10 to vote after the fact, and our parking attendants are  
11 instructed to direct them either to the ballot  
12 information tent we have out there or to get them  
13 parked and have them come in the building if they have  
14 very, very specific questions, so they are trained to  
15 do one thing and one thing only and that is to get our  
16 folks parked.

17 MEMBER FREEDHOFF: Will they help to  
18 manage where they need to park if they are going to  
19 vote from their car?

20 MR. KELLY: Yes, they'll be down at the  
21 curbside location directing people into that area.  
22 It's a specified area and we'll have a large electronic  
23 sign with an arrow that says "curbside voting this way"  
24 too.



1 MEMBER FREEDHOFF: Thank you.

2 MR. KELLY: Um-hum.

3 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: I was asking a  
4 question of somebody the other day too, not exactly  
5 related to this, but what's the signage? Maybe this  
6 isn't your bailiwick, Matt.

7 MR. KELLY: I bet it is.

8 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: The signage for  
9 curbside voting.

10 MR. KELLY: So for curbside voting, we  
11 have a few things. We have sandwich board signs that  
12 say "area reserved for curbside voting only." That's  
13 at the entryway. We kind of got it blocked off. So  
14 only curbside voters can go to an area, so there's not  
15 a lot of bodies walking in between cars, besides our  
16 own people who are wearing protective or reflective  
17 vests.

18 We have an electronic sign that says  
19 "curbside ADA" with an arrow pointing to where people  
20 need to go with their cars to the curbside area.

21 We will have our Homeland Security  
22 volunteers out at the entrance of the curbside area  
23 kind of screening people to make sure that they are ADA  
24 curbside voters and not someone who is trying to drop

1 off.

2 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: How do you do that?  
3 I didn't think we were allowed to do that. What can  
4 you do?

5 MR. KELLY: We are making sure their  
6 intent is to go to the ADA curbside area and not to  
7 come to the front desk to drop something off, so we are  
8 screening them to make sure they are a voter going to  
9 the right place.

10 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: All right. Thank  
11 you.

12 MEMBER FREEDHOFF: Meredith Freedhoff.  
13 Chairman, I move that the Board hire SP Plus to provide  
14 parking attendants for the early vote center during the  
15 period of early voting and that SP Plus be paid  
16 \$76,044.50.

17 MEMBER SEXTON: Mr. Chairman, Michael  
18 Sexton. I'll second.

19 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been  
20 properly moved and seconded. All those in favor of the  
21 motion, signify by saying aye.

22 (Vote taken.)

23 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,  
24 same sign.

1 (No response.)

2 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.

3 The final item on the agenda is the  
4 purchase of blank ballot card stock, and I'll, again,  
5 turn that over to Matt Kelly.

6 MR. KELLY: Again --

7 MEMBER FREEDHOFF: More money. More  
8 money.

9 MR. KELLY: Mr. Chairman, members of the  
10 Board, if you remember the last time I was up at this  
11 podium requesting dollars for ballot stock, I said I  
12 might be back. Well, here I am.

13 Since the last time we ordered ballot  
14 stock, we have confirmed that Franklin County will be  
15 doing a two-sheet ballot this election, basically  
16 doubling every piece of paper that we handle. That  
17 means double the size for our test desk, that means  
18 double the size of our provisional preprinted ballots  
19 that we need, paper-wise, so it basically adds a bunch  
20 of paper to our process.

21 And, as a backup, because we do not  
22 know things that could come at us, if we are in the  
23 middle of mailing ballots or if we are halfway through  
24 an election that we had ballots mailed, and something

1 would happen where there was a court case where we have  
2 to change something on the ballot, we need a back-up  
3 plan and spare ballot paper just in case.

4 900,000 sheets of ballot paper stock  
5 would accomplish this. That will bring our total  
6 ballot stock in the building up to and past 1.5 million  
7 pieces of ballot paper. That will protect us from  
8 something that could be changed and it will protect  
9 us -- we won't go to a three-sheet ballot, but it will  
10 protect us through this election having the two-sheet  
11 ballot.

12 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: So we are two sheets?

13 MR. KELLY: We are at two sheets. And  
14 the good news is, if we do not use all of the ballot  
15 stock, we can use it in a future election.

16 DIRECTOR WHITE: There are some counties  
17 that have three-sheet ballots this year?

18 MR. KELLY: Yeah.

19 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Okay. Sounds good,  
20 Matthew. Any questions?

21 MEMBER MARINELLO: No, none here.

22 Mr. Chairman, Kim Marinello. I move  
23 that the Board authorize the expenditure of \$135,000  
24 for the purchase of 900,000 sheets of blank ballot

1 thermal paper card stock and -- card stock from ES&S  
2 for use in the November 5th general election.

3 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Doug Preisse. Second  
4 the motion.

5 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's been  
6 properly moved and seconded. All those in favor of the  
7 motion, signify by saying aye.

8 (Vote taken.)

9 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: All opposed,  
10 same sign.

11 (No response.)

12 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Motion carries.  
13 Prior to adjourning, if I could --

14 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Thanks, Matt.

15 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: Thank you, Matt.

16 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Is this on the  
17 agenda?

18 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: It's not.

19 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Proceed.

20 DEPUTY DIRECTOR PAYNE: I think it will  
21 be worthwhile. As you came in the lobby, you might  
22 have noticed the electronic signage that welcomed  
23 individuals into our Board of Elections.

24 It's disability voting rights week,

1 and Josiah Lanning (phonetic) of our staff has put  
2 together a program for this week and I've asked him, if  
3 he wouldn't mind, to just say a couple minutes about  
4 today's program and then what we have planned for the  
5 rest of the week.

6 Josiah, if you could speak up, that  
7 would be great.

8 MR. LANNING: Absolutely. Thank you for  
9 your time.

10 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Introduce yourself so  
11 it is part of the record.

12 MR. LANNING: My name is Josiah Lanning.  
13 I'm the Franklin County ADA coordinator. First and  
14 foremost, thank you to the Board for the creation of  
15 the new ADA position, and also thank you for the  
16 acquisition and process of a van, which will allow me  
17 to go and ensure every polling location is physically  
18 accessible.

19 Since the creation of this new  
20 position, the Board has begun a comprehensive effort to  
21 accommodate one of the most neglected and forgotten  
22 communities in Franklin County, people with  
23 disabilities. Statewide, there are around  
24 three million people with disabilities, that's about

1 30 percent, and in Franklin County we have an estimated  
2 58,000 people with disabilities.

3 Today the Board of Elections held an  
4 event specifically designed to educate people with  
5 disabilities about the accommodations the Board of  
6 Elections can provide at polling locations.

7 This afternoon I met an individual  
8 who kind of put everything into perspective for me. He  
9 came in, introduced himself. He had his seeing eye  
10 dog, so Kyla and Pickle got along really well.

11 With this individual I met, he is  
12 uniquely deaf and blind, and he was explaining to me  
13 the challenges of his disability in voting, and he  
14 always votes absentee because he can't hear very well  
15 and he can't see.

16 So I listened to everything he had to  
17 say and I said, Excuse me, sir. Have you -- I know you  
18 said you know we had adaptations with our machines, but  
19 have you had the opportunity to actually experience  
20 them? He said, No, I haven't.

21 So, well, I have got great news for  
22 you. We have trainers here that would be more than  
23 willing to help you. So after about ten minutes, you  
24 can see the change on his face when he finally

1 realized, You know what? I don't have to cast my  
2 ballot in isolation anymore. I can go vote with  
3 everybody else.

4 Thanks to your support and our shared  
5 vision of civic and voter engagement, this man was  
6 ecstatic to learn that he can be just like anybody  
7 else.

8 Later this week, the Board's outreach  
9 will convene at the Columbus Colony House, an  
10 independent living facility designed for the deaf and  
11 blind residents of Columbus. Together, through our  
12 investment of time and education, all Franklin County  
13 residents will be empowered to exercise their right to  
14 vote by whichever method they choose. Thank you.

15 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Nice job. Good work.  
16 We hired you because of your dog, you know.

17 MR. LANNING: Well, he made a new friend  
18 today.

19 CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Such a great story on  
20 top of a great story. Thank you for sharing that and  
21 your good work.

22 DIRECTOR WHITE: A lot of voters came  
23 in, got to experience the equipment, and so I want to  
24 thank you, Josiah, for putting together the event.



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CHAIRMAN PREISSE: Good work.  
Vote to adjourn.  
MEMBER MARINELLO: Second.
